

# Violence and Chaos in Haiti and South Africa

aiti had still not recovered from the devastating cyclone that had struck it nearly a decade ago. South Africa after the legacy of Mandela had engaged in the process of building a viable democracy.

Suddenly, mayhem has engulfed both countries. Haitians suffered a lot during the 'Papa Doc' Duvalier years with their 'tontons macoutes,' but once the dictator was gone they had hoped for better days to come. There was a semblance of a return to a more orderly form of governance, one more stable and lending its ears to the people who had faced hardships for so long. Governments changed but the lives of the people did not undergo as fast an improvement as they would have wished. Given their dire initial starting point, even small incremental changes in their conditions as regards food, housing, employment, education and health would have meant a lot to them.

Willy-nilly, despite the persisting political instability, positive changes were taking place, albeit slowly. Unfortunately came that devastating cyclone, with thousands of deaths and damage to human habitations and infrastructure. The UN along with many organizations in the US stepped in to provide emergency and then medium- to long-term support in reconstruction and re-instituting the essential services as a basis to scaling up all amenities that a functioning country requires. Alas, there was mishandling and diverting of food aid and millions that were being poured in. Poverty, unemployment, poor health and educational services have continued to plague the country.

Against this backdrop there was bitter political rivalry brewing, and then the brutal killing of President Jovenel Moïse in his residence. There had been calls for him to step down, but they went unheeded. No less than 39 persons have been identified and arrested as having forged the conspiracy to assassinate the President. The protests and violence that have followed his death mean that the country is likely to slide backward again, both socio-economically and politically.

On the other hand, South Africa is a much richer and much more developed country with enormous resources of gold and diamonds, along with well-established health, educational, financial services that can rival the best anywhere, as well as a functioning legal system with a strong judiciary, including a Constitutional Court. The outgoing President Jacob Zuma, after resisting initially, had had to bend to the rule of law, and having been found guilty, and realising that the system was stronger than him, voluntarily gave himself up to the police. He was sent to jail to spend the 18 months of imprisonment that he had been imposed.

His supporters took a different line. In the looting, vandalism and hooliganism that they have unleashed, they have cut the ground from under their own feet. They have destroyed beyond belief those businesses that gave them employment and their essential provisions, and instilled fear and loss of confidence not only among the business class, but in society at large. For not even small and medium entrepreneurs in the townships have been spared, their means of livelihood gone for ever, a future of poverty staring at them. Worse still is that among them are many single mothers with many mouths to feed.

On the other hand, there have been no less than 70 deaths at least. Was this a simple protest or was it an insurrection, an attempt at subverting the state? To what extent is tribalism involved? Whatever be, the grim reality is that in both Haiti and South Africa, rebuilding is going to be a long-drawn affair – if at all it can begin under conducive conditions that their respective citizens only can bring about. Tall order indeed.

One nagging thought that keeps coming back when we take cognizance of these disturbing events: Mauritius has been lucky in having SSR and his Labour Party preside over the destiny of the country and for having instilled a culture of tolerance and power sharing since the early days of independent Mauritius. Neither Haiti nor South Africa has been as lucky, except for the brief five-year period when Nelson Mandela was at the helm of the latter country.



# Why most economists continue to back lockdowns

Pitting health against the economy is a false dichotomy



ith the prospect of a lengthier lockdown looming over Sydney, the idea of "living with the virus" has resurfaced.

New South Wales' health minister, Brad Hazzard, raised the prospect of abandoning the lockdown and accepting that "the virus has a life which will continue in the community" at a press conference on Wednesday. NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian and Prime Minister Scott Morrison have rejected that idea, but many voices in the media have been pushing it.

As with pandemic policy in general, much of the discussion of the Sydney outbreak has framed the problem as one pitting health against the economy. In this framing, epidemiologists and public health experts are seen as the advocates of saving lives, while economists are seen as the advocates of saving money.

In reality, the great majority of Australian economists support policies of aggressive suppression or elimination — that is, keeping case numbers close to zero, and clamping down when an outbreak threatens.

#### **Broad agreement**

As with epidemiologists, that broad agreement encompasses a range of views about the appropriate response in any particular case.

Some economists, and some epidemiologists, supported the NSW government's decision to delay a lockdown, while others wanted earlier action. But only a minority in either group support the idea of

ending restrictions and waiting for herd immunity to protect us.

Unfortunately, as we have already seen in the case of climate change, many media outlets thrive on conflict. It is more interesting to present a debate between a pro-lockdown public health expert and an anti-lockdown economist than to present a nuanced discussion of the best way to suppress the virus, taking into account insights from a range of disciplines.

#### Understanding exponential growth

Why have economists endorsed the policy of suppression with more enthusiasm than, for example, political and business leaders?

First, because economists understand the concept of exponential growth.

While economics' stress on growth is rightly contested, its centrality to economic concepts means related concepts from epidemiology, such as the reproduction number (R), are immediately comprehensible to us.

Once you understand how rapidly exponential processes can grow, the idea that lockdowns are "disproportionate responses to a handful of cases", as *The Australian* has editorialised, loses its superficial attraction.

here is no health system anywhere in the world that hasn't at some stage been overwhelmed by the tsunami of the Covid-19 pandemic. Naturally, the focus has been on dealing with the risks and challenges it has posed, which continue to receive the greatest attention. However, while all this has been going on, it must be underlined that besides coping with Covid, health systems had to also handle all the non-Covid medical and health conditions that form part of their daily routine, and that by far exceeded the Covid load. Covid is dramatic and important - but no less so are the myriads of other problems that health services face 24/7, non-stop and that are equally demanding as well as deserving of as much if not more attention.

For example, the Washington Post reports: 'In 2019, nearly 72,000 people died from drug overdoses. In 2020, amid the coronavirus pandemic, more than 93,000 people died from overdoses, according to National Center for Health Statistics' provisional data. That horrifying figure represents a record year-over-year increase of 30 percent. Public-health crises converged as the pandemic stretched health-care resources, and illegal fentanyl and other opioid drugs continued to drive a high death toll.'

In fact, the US has been facing an 'opioid' crisis for several years, and a company producing opioids and coercing or inducing medical practitioners to overprescribe them has been heavily fined by the courts. Doctors deemed to have 'colluded' have not escaped chastisement either. One condition of interest to me is low backache, and I have been appalled to read about the overuse of opioids in its management, contributing significantly to the crisis and mortality. This is a medication that I personally use in very specific circumstances and for limited periods for that problem, there being other more effective options of treatment.

On the other hand, in the UK, a joint investigation by Channel 4 News and The Independent has revealed what has been termed the 'Nottingham maternity units scandal,' reporting that 'dozens of babies have died or been left with brain damage at a maternity service accused of bad care and neglect. From 2010 to 2020, at least 46 babies have suffered brain damage and 19 have been stillborn at Nottingham University Hospitals NHS trust maternity units. There have also been 15 deaths at the units involving mothers and babies.

'Poor record keeping,' a 'culture of fear,' a 'warning notice' issued by the Clinical Quality Commission (CQC) whose recommendations were only partially implemented - the outcomes were the resultant of several factors, as is to be expected and is usually the case in such complex medical issues. There was 'evidence of poor care of both mothers and babies and of repeated failures to investi-

gate deaths of babies,' with accusations of a 'failure or delay to treatment' and of a 'failure to recognise complications' as well as 'inadequate nursing care.' Further, 'vacancies were allowed to build up which meant staff were stretched and a lack of beds meant at-risk women would face delays for treatment.' At the same time, though, there was praise for 'many of the staff for working hard to maintain safety.'

Reading this was painful for me. This may not be the

National Health System (NHS) where I had trained for several years over 40 years ago, but in spite of all these shortcomings, it still remains in my view one of the best health systems of the world. What has spoilt it, according to what I learn from my contacts in the UK, is excessive and overzealous bureaucratese, but also shortcomings in training and continuity of care.

Childbirth and maternal health have been a major focus of medicine throughout the ages. I do not envy my obstetriciangynaecologist colleagues. Obstetrics is one of the most exacting specialties to practise, and I do not relish the thought of my experiences during my posting in that department as a junior resi-


The death of a newborn is a tragedy for both health staff and the parents and family, and it is not always avoidable. The same logic applies to all other cases across the whole medical spectrum. But what is important is to be prepared to the best of one's ability and resources, and here qualifications, training and experience are crucial. This is a very broad and complicated matter, but there are basic principles that can guide one. The approach and solution(s) can only be at systems level, and that mean at all levels of the system of healthcare.

Specifically as regards maternity, for example, there must be qualified and trained midwives who, by definition, can only gain experience under the supervision of experienced and dedicated midwives. To start with of course they must be qualified nurses, which locally means obtaining a diploma in nursing after following a 3-year course at the Central School of Nursing, after which they must follow a course of training in midwifery. The former one-year course had been abolished some years back (for reasons that I need not go into here), and replaced much later by a two-year course. However, for the past two years this course has not been run. Covid or no Covid, this ought not to have happened. Unless this issue is taken up with the urgency it deserves, and all related matters too are analysed and viable solutions worked out by clear-headed minds focused on bringing improvements rather than finding heads to chop, the risk of tragedies

But it is not only Obs-Gynae that is concerned, the same approach must inform all other specialties, clinical and non-clinical, on a proactive, ongoing basis. Only one policy innovation

has been brought about for the overall improvement of healthcare quality in the past decade, and that was the introduction of Continuing Medical Education through the Finance Bill in 2011. CME too has faced difficulties in the Covid period, and here also there is a need to revisit the conduct of this programme from a systems perspective. There will always been a long way to go and millions to do - but it's up to the country to make a good start in the hope of a sound finish.





The story of the world's arduous battle against Covid-19 has been repeatedly undermined and hobbled by successive surges and waves of infection caused far too often by governments who imposed lockdowns and restrictions to contain the spread of the virus too late or lifted them too soon. At a time when the overriding imperative should have been to protect and save the lives of people against a deadly pandemic, which has already caused more than 4 million deaths in the space of some 18 months, such questionable choices have invariably been dictated by uncalled for pressures from economic actors and vested lobbies.

The upshot is that new waves of coronavirus infection fuelled by new and more contagious variants such as the highly infectious Delta and Lambda variants continue unabated to infect and cause deaths and distress in the world in a context of widespread vaccination inequality. A third wave of infection is affecting countries around the world. The Delta variant has already been identified in more than 100 countries whereas the Lambda variant, first identified in Peru (which has by far the highest number of Covid deaths per capita), has already spread to 29 countries.

Many scientists speak of the Lambda variant's unusual combination of mutations, which may make it more transmissible. These mutations may make it easier for Lambda to bind to our cells and make it. harder for our antibodies to latch onto the virus and neutralize it.

#### Unethical

In a letter published in The Lancet last week, more than 100 scientists have condemned the UK government's plans to lift all coronavirus restrictions and stated that the government's strategy which 'tolerates high levels of infection is both unethical and illogical'. The scientists also claimed that a hasty lifting of restrictions will cause an exponential growth of Covid-19 and risks 'leaving hundreds of thousands of people with chronic health problems, long Covid and disability'.

Nobel-winning geneticist Paul Nurse also warned that if the government opens up England too hastily 'we could create a variant resistant to vaccines'. Last week, the World Health Organization also cautioned against the complete lifting of public

health and social measures at a time when there has been a 33% increase in new infections in the European region in the last week.

Despite the potent risks flagged by the scientists and the UK health secretary's admission that daily cases could exceed 100,000 in the summer from the current level of more than 27,000 new cases reported every day, the United Kingdom Prime Minister Boris Johnson announced this week that he planned to lift Covid-19 restrictions, including social distancing and mask mandates adding that UK must learn to live with the virus. In essence, the government is shifting the responsibility of dealing with the rapidly spreading virus to companies and individuals raising legitimate questions about who assumes the cost of liabilities.

'We must learn to live with the virus' has therefore become the new leitmotiv of governments bent on arbitrating in favour of the economy and the realpolitik of corporate balance sheets as opposed to saving lives. Rising rates of infection and deaths are callously considered as expendable collateral casualties. Instead of taking robust actions as per their mandate as elected MPs to contain the spread of Covid-19 and save lives, the onus of protection against the virus is shifted to the people who 'will need to take personal responsibility'.

#### **Questionable mantra**

In Mauritius, the government bent on opening our frontiers to shore up the tourism and hospitality sector has also blithely adopted the mantra that 'we must learn to live with the virus'. However, the rising number of daily cases of Covid-19 infection in many enterprises, hospitals, schools and random locations across the country attests to the fact that Covid-19 is no longer limited to clusters and red zones but is extensively present in the community. There is thus a heightened risk of coronavirus infection in the country while commuting, at the work place, at school and while shopping, etc., especially as government has lifted all restrictions on economic, social and sporting activities. We also know that fully vaccinated persons can be infected and be a carrier of the virus. There have already been several such cases reported in the country.

In such a context, students commuting to school in crowded buses, the majority of which are not vaccinated, are particularly vulnerable to the pervasive and insidious risk of infection. Already more than 10 schools have already registered cases of Covid-19 infection in the country. This means closure of the schools, contact tracing and PCR testing of all those in contact with the infected persons and the quarantine of those tested positive. After the disinfection and sanitization of the school, it is once again opened to students. What if new cases of infection are detected during the 14 day cycle of the virus? This will entail new contact tracing, PCR testing and quarantine measures. This could trigger an unending cycle. This is a very onerous, disruptive and patently ill-thought-out protocol which needs to be urgently

The government and the ministries concerned must therefore take stock of the pervasive risk of Covid-19 infection in the country and must fully assume their responsibilities to above all assure the safety of students, as most of them are not vaccinated and therefore at risk. They cannot pass the buck.

#### Core problem

The core problem facing the country is that the government has so far been unable to contain the spread of the second wave of Covid-19 infection since its outbreak in early March and break its chain of transmission. Covid-19 now has a pervasive presence in the country as evidenced by the rising number of daily cases of infection in locations scattered across the country. Despite the muddled way the daily

tally of Covid-19 cases is presented on national TV, the number of new cases of infection has registered a quantum 97% jump of 275 new cases during the 5-15 July period.

It is therefore clear that all is not well with the management of the second wave of Covid-19 infection in the country. This failure cannot only be attributed to the irresponsibility of some. The competent management of the pandemic lies with the government and requires that it constantly reassesses and reviews its decisions in the light of the evolution of the Covid-19 situation locally, on the scientific front and in countries which are our main trading partners and principal sources of tourists in the world. Many countries such as Australia, UK, Germany, France, the US, Japan or South Africa have had to radically revise their Covid-19 related decisions and policies in the light of events in order to better manage the pandemic. There is no shame or ruffled egos in honestly correcting failed policies.

#### Risky gamble

Against such a backdrop, the opening of our borders to tourists this week under the present circumstances is therefore fraught with risks. It is a risky gamble. The hotel personnel and those working at the airport and in the hospitality sector will be at risk of being infected by more contagious variants and be carriers of the virus to their close ones and in the community. No one wants highly contagious Covid-19 variants to spread in the country. Fully vaccinated persons can still be infected. This is a lose-lose situation.

The government cannot bury its head in the sand. The present Covid-19 situation in the country is untenable. We need to urgently fix it. This can judiciously be done as Mauritius is a small country. Rational decision making requires that we take all steps necessary to first contain and break the chain of transmission of the virus to urgently make Mauritius Covid-safe even if it means investing in a two weeks plus lockdown. In a context of rising numbers of cases of Covid-19 infection, this is a small price to pay against the continuously rising costs of quarantine, contact tracing, PCR tests, hospitalization and diverse support measures, etc., borne from public funds.

Secondly, we urgently need to take all actions necessary to expedite the vaccination programme to achieve herd immunity in the country at the earliest.

#### **Decisive actions**

The status quo will make matters worse. It requires urgent and bold decisions before the situation gets out of hand. The onus is squarely on government to do what it takes to make the country Covid safe again and attain herd immunity. Once this is securely achieved, the country can safely reboot the economy and judiciously open its frontiers without fear and latent apprehensions. # Twitter sees jump in govt demands to remove content

witter Inc saw a surge in demands over the course of last year from governments around the world to take down content posted by journalists and news outlets, data to be released by the social media platform for the first time will show.

In its transparency report to be published on Wednesday and a copy of which was seen by Reuters, Twitter said verified accounts of 199 journalists and news outlets on its platform globally were subject to 361 legal demands from governments to remove content in the second half of 2020, an increase of 26% from the first half of the year, reports Reuters.

It declined to elaborate on which countries submitted the demands, or how many of the legal demands pertaining to journalists or news outlets the platform complied with.

The new details in Twitter's biannual report on its enforcement of policy rules and the information and removal requests it receives comes as Twitter and other social media companies including Facebook and Alphabet's YouTube are facing scrutiny from governments around the world over the content allowed on their platforms.

On Monday, Cuba began restricting access to Facebook and messaging apps like Telegram amid widespread anti-government protests. Last month, Nigeria banned Twitter's service from the country and ordered television and radio stations not to use the platform to gather information.

The company said globally it received over 14,500 requests for information between July 1 and Dec. 31, and it produced some or all of the information in response to 30% of the requests. Such information requests can include governments or other entities asking for the identities of people tweeting under pseudonyms.

Twitter also received more than 38,500 legal demands to take down various content, and said it complied with 29% of the demands.

Twitter has been embroiled in several conflicts with countries around the world, most notably India over the government's new rules aimed at regulating content on social media. Last week, the company said it had hired an interim chief compliance officer in India and would appoint other executives in order to comply with the rules.

Like other social media companies, Twitter has struggled to police hate speech, misinformation and other abuses on its service, with Chief Executive Jack Dorsey among the tech leaders who appeared in a hearing before Congress in March on misinformation.

Major social media companies were most recently under fire this week over racist abuse on their platforms directed at Black players on the England soccer team.

# There may be illegitimate parents, but no illegitimate children: Karnataka High Court

Karnataka High Court bench has observed that the law must recognize the fact that there may be illegitimate parents but there can never be illegitimate children.

The bench headed by Justice B V Nagarathna striking out the clause prescribed by the Karnataka Power Transmission Corporation Ltd (KPTCL) in this regard, reports Swarajya.

"No child is born in this world without a father and a mother. A child has no role to play in his/her birth. Hence, law should recognise...there may be illegitimate parents, but no illegitimate children," the Karnataka HC bench observed, reports Times of India.

The clause mentioned in the 2011 circular issued by KPTCL maintained that the second wife or her children are not eligible for getting jobs on compassionate grounds, if the second marriage had taken place secretly without the knowledge of the first wife and society.

The petitioner was denied eligibility on compassionate grounds appointment, as it said the second wife or her children were not eligible to get jobs on compassionate grounds.

The petitioner's father, who worked as a lineman, died in June 2014. His application seeking a job on compassionate grounds was rejected by the KPTCL.

Challenging this order, the petitioner had approached the court. His petitions were not allowed by the single judge bench of the high court. However, the divisional bench allowed the petition and addressed the grievance.

# Sputnik V Covid vaccine's single dose triggers strong antibody response: Study

ccording to a study, a single dose of the Sputnik V vaccine may be enough to evoke strong antibody response against SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, in already infected people.

The new study, published in the journal Cell Reports Medicine, examined whether a single dose of Sputnik V vaccine would achieve greater public health benefit than two doses by allowing protection of a larger population more quickly, reports news agency PTI.

Previous studies have found that two doses of Sputnik V, a vector vaccine produced using a combination of two adenoviruses, results in 92 per cent efficacy against Covid-19 infection, reports Susmita Pakrasi of Hindustan Times.

"Due to limited vaccine supply and uneven vaccine distribution in many regions of the world, health authorities urgently need data on the immune response to vaccines to optimize vaccination strategies," said study senior author Andrea Gamarnik of the Fundacion Instituto Leloir-CONICET in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

The researchers noted that the evidence from other vaccines offers support for the one-shot approach. The AstraZeneca vaccine, for example, shows 76 per cent efficacy after a single dose, and the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines may induce sufficient immunity in previously infected individuals after one dose, with no apparent benefit of an additional dose, they said.

The researchers compared the effects of one and two shots of Sputnik V on SARS-CoV-2-specific antibody responses in 289 healthcare workers in Argentina. Three weeks after the second dose, all volunteers with no prior infection generated virus-specific immunoglobulin G (lgG) antibodies.

However, even within three weeks of receiving the first dose, 94 per cent of these participants developed

IgG antibodies against the virus, and 90 per cent showed evidence of neutralising antibodies, which interfere with the ability of viruses to infect cells.

The research further showed that IgG and neutralising antibody levels in previously infected participants were significantly higher after one dose than those in fully vaccinated volunteers with no history of infection.

A second dose did not increase the production of neutralising antibodies in previously infected volunteers. "This highlights the robust response to vaccination of previously infected individuals, suggesting that naturally acquired immunity might be enhanced sufficiently by a single dose, in agreement with recent studies using mRNA vaccines," Gamarnik noted.

The researchers stated that further studies are needed to evaluate the duration of the immune response and to assess how antibody levels relate to vaccine protection against Covid-19.

# Why Indians are choosing Canada over US, experts testify before US lawmakers

Indians are now choosing Canada over the United States because of the outdated US immigration policies, immigration and policy experts have said testifying before a panel of US lawmakers, underlying that the per-country quota on issuing the green cards is driving Indian talent away from the United States.

Testifying before the House Judiciary Committee-Subcommittee on Immigration and Citizenship, National Foundation for American Policy Stuart Anderson said the backlog is increasing and, within a decade, more than 2 million people will be waiting in line for the green cards and they might have to wait for years and decades, reports Poulomi Ghosh of Hindustan Times

On the other hand, it is easier for international students to work in temporary status and then acquire permanent residence in Canada. Jennifer Young, CEO, Technology Councils of North America, said Canada's pre-pandemic immigration rules allowed its companies to hire high-skilled foreign talent in even four weeks.

India has been contributing significantly to the number of international students in the United States. For example, out of the US's total full-time graduate students pursuing Computer Science, 75 per cent is from outside. In the 2016-17 academic year, two-thirds of the international students were from India. According to an analysis of the US government data by the National Foundation for American Policy, this share has declined by more than 25 per cent between 2016-17 and 2018-19.

At the same time, Indian students studying at Canadian universities rose by 127 per cent, from 76,075 in 2016 to 172,625 in 2018, according to the Canadian Bureau for International Education.

"In sum, Canada's immigration policies are much better than America's for facilitating the entry of talented individuals. Congress established America's policies in 1990, before smartphones, e-commerce, social media, cloud computing and the daily use of the internet exploded the demand for high-skilled technical labour. The world has changed since 1990. US immigration policy has not," Anderson said.

# UAE becomes 1st Gulf nation to open embassy in Israel

he United Arab Emirates on Wednesday became the first Gulf nation to open an embassy in Israel, nearly a year after both countries signed an agreement to normalise diplomatic ties.

The new mission is located in Tel Aviv Stock Exchange building. The ceremony was attended by new Israeli President Isaac Herzog.

UAE Ambassador Mohammad Mahmoud Al Khajah officially presented his credentials at the beginning of March but the official opening was not held until now, reports ANI.

"It is a great honour to open the embassy here. Ten months ago our two countries signed the Abraham Accords with a vision of dignity, prosperity and peace for the two peoples," Khajah said at the ceremony on Wednesday. He added: "This is just the beginning. Both countries are innovative nations and we will harness these new approaches for the prosperity of the countries."

Herzog, who took office last week,

hailed the embassy opening as an "important step for the entire Middle East."

Last month, Israel Foreign Minister YairLapid visited the UAE on the first official trip by an Israeli minister to the Gulf state, where he inaugurated the Israeli embassy in Abu Dhabi and a consulate in Dubai.

Israel and the UAE announced in August 2020 that they would normalise diplomatic relations, bringing over a decade of covert ties into the open. Bahrain, Sudan and Morocco later also joined the US-brokered Abraham Accords, and other countries were also rumoured to be in talks.

Bangladesh will lift its nationwide coronavirus lockdown for the country's second-biggest religious festival, the government said Tuesday, even as new infections soared to record levels.

The cabinet said all restrictions would be eased in the country of 169 million people from Thursday, ahead of the Eid al-Adha festival which will be celebrated from July 20 to 22 this year. The removal of the curbs would "normalise economic activities" ahead of the celebrations, it added. Tens of millions of people usually head back to their villages to mark Eid al-Adha with their families, reports AFP.

Bangladesh imposed its strictest-ever lockdown at the start of the month as new Covid-19 cases and deaths climbed to pandemic highs. Under the lockdown, people were only allowed to leave home for emergencies and to buy essentials, with public transport, shops and offices shut.

But infections have continued to climb, with nearly 14,000 people testing

positive on Monday -- a new daily record -- to take the total number of cases to just over one million. The death toll has risen above 16,600. But experts say the real figures could be much higher amid fears of

underreporting.

Mohammad Shahidullah, who heads a health committee that advises the government on how to manage the pandemic, said his group of experts opposed the easing of the lockdown.

"The committee opines that this strict lockdown should be continued till there is a declining trend in infections," said Shahidullah. "Amid the lockdown, there is an increasing trend of infections and fatalities. The infection level is still very high."

The announcement came as authorities restarted the country's Covid-19 vaccination drive, which virtually ground to a halt in late April after imports of shots from neighbouring India were suspended to meet local demand amid a massive virus surge.

The revived inoculation programme kicked off on a large scale on Tuesday with two million shots of Sinopharm from China and 2.5 million Moderna doses from the United States via the Covaxprogramme.

So far, 4.2 million people in Bangladesh have been fully vaccinated with two doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine bought or donated from India.

In nearby Bhutan, half a million Moderna doses arrived late Monday from the United States via Covax. More shots are expected to be donated by Denmark, Croatia, Bulgaria, China and several other countries.

The tiny Himalayan kingdom, which has a population of 770,000, had pleaded for more shots after using up most of the 550,000 AstraZeneca doses donated by India.

It had inoculated more than 60 percent of its population with first doses in late March and early April.

In India, where cases have declined from record highs in May, Prime Minister Narendra Modi warned against people flocking to northern Himalayan states to escape the scorching summer heat.

"The virus does not come and go on its own... we bring it with us when we disobey the rules. Experts are warning us repeatedly that careless behaviour -- like overcrowding -- will lead to an increase in Covid cases," he said Tuesday during a meeting with state leaders.

# 'Press conferences and Facebook Lives do not win elections'

'The "L'Espoir" platform will have to convince the younger generation that dynastic and patronage-based politics will be replaced by a new political culture'

ven as the country is currently facing two major challenges in the health and economic sectors, the government seems bent on arbitrating in favour of the economy. It is thus keeping the schools open and will proceed with the complete reopening of our frontiers as from 1 October with the attendant risk of losing the gains that have been made so far in the fight against the Covid pandemic, the more so in light of the rise in Delta variant cases which is forcing many countries to put in place tougher restrictions. Dharam Gokhool, former Education minister says in today's interview that if 'we should now live with Covid-19 as the new normal, then this new situation calls for an entirely new multi-pronged approach, a new way of thinking... which should transcend the fragmented, narrow, sectoral, silos response we are witnessing'. He also shares his views on another worrying trend - rising unemployment, which might have already crossed the 100,000 mark, and which according to him, with the end of support schemes for the unemployed or for those on furlough, could be 'the precursor to a looming social crisis'. He also comments on the current political scene, urging the 'L'Espoir' platform to come up with a credible, better deal for the people. Read on

Mauritius Times: Like most other countries, we are also currently facing two major challenges: one, the health issues with the resurgence of the Covid infection in different localities, and second, the economic impacts of the pandemic. The government seems to believe that economic recovery should now prevail over the health challenges, and that we should revert back to normality in particular in the sectors of tourism and education. Are we doing the right thing, or do you have fears that things may get out of hand?

**Dharam Gokhool:** For the last two years, Covid-19 has been a terrible tragedy for the global community. The health crisis quite naturally took precedence over the economy and the narrative, so far, has been that people's lives matter. The economy was put on the back-burner. With the passage of time, it is now being realised that Health and livelihood cannot be segregated. Hence the focus is now shifting to economic recovery.

But the global community is also constantly being reminded that Covid-19 is not going to go away so soon and that we should now live with Covid-19 as the new normal. If that is the case, then this new situation calls for an entirely new multi-pronged approach, a new way of thinking based on a whole-systems, innovative, proactive paradigm, which should transcend the fragmented, narrow, sectoral, silos response we are witnessing.

There is a huge difference between doing things right,

where the focus is on incremental, operational efficiency, and doing the right things, where the focus is on charting a new transformational agenda for surviving and thriving together in a Covid-19 ecosystem. This, to my mind, should have been the real challenge, which calls for a bold, farsighted, visionary leadership at the helm of the nation. In the absence thereof, I am afraid the measures being advocated will not take us too far.

\* We have not yet attained herd immunity, the number of Covid vaccines delivered to date and vaccinations done are below the threshold required. There have also been cases of indiscipline and breaches of the Quarantine Act at social gatherings, weddings, etc, which have led to a surge in Covid cases. Another cause for worry are the yet to come Delta or Lambda variants. Is it safe in these conditions to keep the schools open and to reopen completely the frontiers

The "L'Espoir" platform has been criticising and attacking the Government, conference after conference, but has it so far come up with a credible, better deal for the people? In the initial phase, herd immunity through an aggressive vaccination strategy, together with accompanying sanitary measures, was thought to reduce the risks to health and life, associated with the Covid-19 pandemic. A number of developments have since put into question the whole concept of herd immunity.

Controversies about vaccine effectiveness (people with two doses of vaccines being contaminated and some countries starting a third dose), the difficulty in tracking asymptomatic cases, virus mutations, the lack of compliance with sanitary measures like wearing of masks, social distancing, have also put into question the very notion of herd immunity. Is herd immunity still a realistic, achievable target? Or will it have to be recalibrated in the light of developments mentioned earlier?

With the constant increase in the number of cases of infections, the risk factor is very much a matter of live concern. Slogans like "Covid Safe", "Covid Free" and "Sel Solution Vaccination" have considerably undermined public confidence. It is quite understandable that parents do not want their children to be exposed to contamination. With the opening of frontiers, the risk factor is likely to increase. By keeping schools and frontiers open, is not the Government sending the contradictory signal that the economy matters more than the health of the population?

\* As for the immediate, rising prices have also become a major cause of concern for a large number of people, hitting in the main low-income and middle-class households. Government's Rs 500 M subsidy granted to importers and distributors for price control has come in for strong criticisms from different quarters. One comment from *Resistans ek Alternativ* worth mentioning is as follows: "The state persists in squandering public funds to feed the big capitalists. This social inequality is unfair...". What's you take on that issue? Do you think the subsidy will really trickle down to the consumer?

Covid-19, across the world, has had a crippling effect on the global economy.

Developing economies have been hit the hardest, and the lower- and middle-income groups have suffered the most. Many have been pushed below the poverty line. With the combined effect of inflation, depreciation of the rupee and the significant rise in prices of a wide range of household commodities, the economic burden of the poorer sections of the population has increased considerably.

True it is that Government has come up with schemes like the Wage Assistance and Self Employed Assistance, but such

\* On the other hand, another worrying trend is the rising unemployment rate, which is likely to become a very dominant issue in the months ahead. There is controversy about the figures of Statistics Mauritius, and the Leader of Opposition is of the view that we

have already crossed the 90,000 mark. There is a lot of uncertainty regarding the government's wage assistance scheme and about job losses once that scheme is terminated. Are we in for troubled times ahead?

Before I comment on the issue of unemployment and job losses, let me state

that it is a matter of grave concern that Statistics Mauritius has got itself entangled in controversies, which has led its Chairman, a well-respected professional, to resign from his office only a few days after growth projection figures were tampered with, without any credible explanations or justifications. Reminds me of a similar deplorable situation at the Mauritius Standards Bureau. Unbridled political interference has been taking a heavy toll on governmental credentials.

As far as unemployment, under employment and job losses are concerned, it is no secret that when economies go through recessions, fewer jobs are created; employees are put on furlough. SMEs, which contribute to the largest share of employment, are hit the hardest and self-employment opportunities dwindle. Those who are more vulnerable are youth and women. Some 10,000 plus graduates and diploma-holders are in the employment queue since years

If we add up the backlog of unemployed, in all categories - be they unskilled, diploma-holders and graduates and those on furlough - we might well have crossed the 100,000 mark. With the end of support schemes for the unemployed or for those on furlough, the situation cannot but deteriorate. And that could be the precursor to a looming social crisis.

\* There has been a lot of spending by the government since the onset of the pandemic in March 2020 with the financing of the Wage Assistance Scheme, and the latest being the Rs 500 M price subsidy. That is clearly not sustainable, but Lord Desai, the former MIC chairman, has been saying lately that speak the language of their bosses to whom they owe allegiance for obvious reasons

I always thought that Lord Desai was made of another mettle, a respected professional who would scrupulously resist being labelled as "his master's voice". By a strange coincidence, his statement resonates with similar statements from Government ranks inside and outside the National Assembly, till very recently.

The National Audit Office's severe strictures on wastage of public funds and the recent ICAC investigations into alleged cases of corruption in the procurement of medical supplies for Covid-19 are only the tip of the iceberg as far as the questionable financial stewardship of public funds is concerned.

Governments are there for saving lives and livelihoods but not at the expense of wastage or misuse of public funds. Besides, the use of public funds should abide by the sacrosanct principles of transparency and accountability. Is MIC exempted from these obligations?

A forensic investigation of how public funds of the MIC have been disbursed and utilised and how much of the funds will be recuperated, at the end of the day, will provide the nation with a graphic account on the misdirection or otherwise of public funds.

On a concluding note on this issue, Government is coming to realise the ABC of basic economics that one has to cut one's coat according to the available cloth, and that the assistance schemes could well be unsustainable.

# Yes, you can still get Covid after being vaccinated, but you're unlikely to get as sick

People who are vaccinated and still contract Covid-19 are less likely to develop severe symptoms, be hospitalised, or die from it

When a Covid cluster includes people, who are vaccinated against the virus, we inevitably hear rumblings of complaint from people who wonder what the point is of vaccination.

But when you read past the headlines, you usually see the answer: in most cases, those who were vaccinated and contracted Covid-19 didn't die, didn't develop severe symptoms and didn't need to be hospitalised.

For the unvaccinated in their later years, the chance of dying from Covid is high. For unvaccinated people in their 80s, around 32% who contract Covid will die from it. For people in their 70s, it's around 14%. (For unvaccinated people in their 60s, it drops to around 3%. And for under-50s, it's less than 1%.)

The good news is both Pfizer and AstraZeneca are very effective at preventing severe disease and death from Covid-19, even from the more virulent Delta strain.

#### So how effective are our vaccines?

Preliminary data from the United Kingdom shows after your first dose of either Pfizer or AstraZeneca, you're 33% less likely than an unvaccinated person to contract the Delta variant.

Two weeks after your second dose, this rises to 60% for AstraZeneca and 88% for Pfizer. This data is for any form of Covid-19, from mild to severe.

But when you look at how much the vaccines reduce your risk of developing

severe illness that requires hospitalisation, the coverage is high for both. Pfizer and Astrazeneca vaccines are 96% and 92% effective (respectively) in preventing Delta variant hospitalisations.

#### Why do some people still get Covid after being vaccinated?

Vaccines aren't magic barriers. They don't kill the virus or pathogen they target.

Rather, vaccines stimulate a person's immune system to create antibodies. These antibodies are specific against the virus or pathogen for the vaccine and allows the body to fight infection before it takes hold and causes severe disease.

However, some people won't have a strong enough immune response to the vaccine and may still be susceptible to developing Covid-19 if exposed to the virus

How a person responds to a vaccine is impacted by a number of host factors, including our age, gender, medications, diet, exercise, health and stress levels.

It's not easy to tell who hasn't developed a strong enough immune response to the vaccine. Measuring a person's immune response to a vaccine is not simple and requires detailed laboratory tests.

And while side effects from the vaccine indicate you're having a response, the absence of symptoms doesn't mean you're having a weak response.

It also takes time for the immune system to respond to vaccines and produce antibodies. For most two-shot vaccines, antibody levels rise and then dip after the first dose. These antibodies are then boosted after the second.

But you're not optimally covered until your antibody levels rise after the second dose.

#### What does Covid look like after being vaccinated?

The PCR tests we use to detect SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, are very sensitive and can detect a positive case even if you have low levels of the virus in your system. This means a person can test positive for SARS-CoV-2 but still not have symptoms of Covid-19.

Of those vaccinated people who have reported symptoms, the vast majority report mild ones, with a shorter duration.

There is always a chance a vaccinated person could pass the virus onto a non-vaccinated person without having symp-

toms themselves.

But vaccinated people who develop Covid-19 will likely have a lower viral load than unvaccinated people, meaning they're less likely to spread the virus.

One study estimated those who were vaccinated with either Pfizer or Astra-Zeneca were 50% less likely to pass it on to an unvaccinated household contact than someone who wasn't vaccinated. This transmission will likely reduce again if both household members are vaccinated.

But if you're not vaccinated and contract Covid-19, you're much more likely to spread the virus.

#### What about future variants?

So far, the preliminary data (some of which is ongoing and/or yet to be peer reviewed) shows our current vaccines are effective at protecting against circulating variants

But as the virus mutates, there is increasing chance of viral escape. This means there is a greater chance the virus will develop mutations that make it fitter against, or more easily able to evade, vaccinations.

Scientist are closely monitoring to ensure our current and/or future vaccines are effective against the circulating strains.

To help the fight against Covid-19 the best thing we can do is minimise the spread of the virus. This means get vaccinated when you can, ensure you maintain social distancing when required and get tested if you have any symptoms.

## Why most economists continue to back lockdowns

A clear majority of economists surveyed in May 2020 (after the end of the national lockdown) supported strong social distancing measures to keep R below 1. Most of those who disagreed felt alternative measures could hold R below 1 at lower costs. Only a handful supported a "let it rip" strategy.

#### Considering counterfactuals

Second, economists understand counterfactuals — that is, the need to specify what would have happened under an alternative policy.

It is easy to make the point that lockdowns are both economically costly and psychologically traumatic. But the counterfactual is not a situation where the economy is unaffected and everyone is happy. Living in fear of the virus, and watching family and friends suffer and die from it, is psychologically traumatic.

As regards the economic

costs, the steps people take to reduce their exposure to risk are themselves costly, as is the need to allocate medical resources to treat the sick.

#### Weighing trade-offs

Third, and most importantly, economists understand about trade-offs.

There are always trade-offs within the space of policy choices. Should we lock down at the first sign of an outbreak and risk unnecessary costs, or wait until later and risk a longer and harsher lockdown? Should we incur the costs of purpose-built quarantine facilities, or accept the greater risk of leakage from hotel quarantine?

Economists also understand that not all choices involve tradeoffs. Sometimes one policy is unequivocally worse than another, on all relevant criteria. While there are always trade-offs somewhere in policy space, it's often the case that, of the live options, one dominates the other



in all important dimensions.

On the central question of suppression versus herd immunity, there was no trade-off, as countries like Sweden found out.

The evidence points strongly to one conclusion. Allowing the virus to spread uncontrolled would have done more economic damage than temporary lock-downs, as well as causing thousands of avoidable deaths and tens of thousands to suffer severe, and possibly long-lasting, illness.

#### Risk and uncertainty

Finally, economists understand the complexities of risk and

uncertainty.

One implication is the benefit of diversification by "backing every horse in the race", as opposed to "putting all your eggs in one basket", or even a few.

The federal government's vaccine policy relied heavily on a limited range of options — primarily AstraZeneca, and the University of Queensland's vaccine venture — both of which ran into problems. If we had followed the logic of diversification, we would be much better placed than we are now.

Economics doesn't have all the answers. No one knows that better than economists. Dealing with the pandemic requires insights from a range of disciplines. But lazy stereotypes, pitting one profession against another, don't help.





## From flying boats to secret Soviet weapons to alien visitors

### A brief cultural history of UFOs

The history of UFOs weaves together public fascination, government secrecy and cultural phenomena. Recent news and shifts in the government's stance on UFOs are giving new life to the mystery

On June 25, 2021, the U.S. government released a nine-page preliminary report on UFOs, or, as it is now calling them, Unidentified Aerial Phenomena, or UAPs. The report is the latest notable event in what has been a renaissance for UFOs in recent years. Greg Eghigian is a historian of science at Penn State who has published research and is writing a book on the history of UFOs in the U.S. We spoke with him for The Conversation Weekly podcast the day before the new report came out to better understand the cultural history of UFOs in the U.S.

Below are excerpts from our conversation that have been edited for length and clarity.

#### When did the idea of UFOs first emerge?

The idea of aliens and that other worlds might be inhabited actually goes back to ancient times. The question was a matter of real debate among philosophers, scientists and theologians in the Western world by the 18th century and it was widely accepted that alien civilizations existed.

But something changed in the 19th century. That's when you first start to see these reports of people seeing what they say were flying ships overhead. The things people describe back then sound a lot like the things they were familiar with - they literally saw ships and vessels that would normally float on the sea in flight. Some people would see steam-powered ships.

But it's really not until the summer of 1947 that people began to regularly speak of seeing flying objects that some attributed to extraterrestrials.

#### What happened in 1947?

A pilot by the name of Kenneth Arnold was flying his small plane near Mount Rainier in Washington state. As he was flying around he said he saw some sort of glimmer or shine that caught his eye and was concerned that maybe he was going to have a collision with another aircraft. When he looked, he saw what he described as nine very odd-shaped vessels flying in formation.

After Arnold landed, he reported his sightings to authorities at a nearby airport and eventually talked to some reporters. When a reporter asked Arnold to describe how the things moved, he said, "they flew like a saucer would if you skipped it across water." Some very clever enterprising journalists came up with the headline "flying saucers" and from that point forward they were flying saucers - even though Arnold never uttered the phrase himself.

A Gallup poll six weeks after the event

discovered that 90% of Americans had heard the term flying saucer. This was the beginning of the phenomenon that some call the flying saucer era and the contemporary idea of UFOs.

Within days other people in the country began reporting having seen similar things in the sky. Within weeks the U.S. Air Force decided to look into the reports. Arnold's story also triggered a lot of press interest and soon the international media were covering this story. It was a worldwide phenomenon within months.

#### Who starts to look into UFOs?

Two things happened in parallel: First were government-sponsored investigations in the U.S., specifically within the Air Force. Starting in 1947 the Air Force set in motion a number of different projects all basically interested in one question: Do UFOs represent a national security threat? The government wasn't interested in a deep scientific analysis of these things.

On the other hand, from 1947 to 1950 you had a lot of the general public who were just utterly fascinated with the mystery of flying saucers. What are they? Are they real? If they are real, who's behind them? Some people threw around the idea of aliens, but that's not really the major theory that people bought into. Most people - if they thought the sightings were real - believed they were either secret weapons of the U.S. military or secret weapons or secret aircraft of the Soviets.

So out of this fascination developed what you could call the equivalent of fan groups - flying saucer clubs. Those

became the seeds of growth in the 1950s and 1960s for UFO organizations first at the local, then the national and then the international level.

#### How did government programs fit into the UFO ecosystem?

A lot of what the Air Force did was behind closed doors and supposed to be clandestine. The government has released files over many years that show that a considerable number of UFO sightings were people seeing secret airplanes like the U2. It's no surprise that the Air Force would try to keep strict control over what's revealed to the public.

But that strict control is one of the many things that fed conspiracy theories over the years. The idea among UFO believers became "The government isn't shooting straight with us. Somehow we've got to get these people to disclose all the information they know."

#### What is the modern American perspective on UFOs?

Up until the '90s the Cold War played a really fundamental formative role in how people in the U.S. imagined UFOs - both in terms of how we think about humanity's prospects technologically, but also relating to the fears and anxieties surrounding the Cold War. But when the Cold War ended, interest fell off. From the late 1990s into the early 2000s media coverage was nominal.

That all changed with the 2017 revelations about the secret UFO project in the Pentagon. This spurred on a resurgence of interest in UFOs. The way the media were

talking about UFOs had lot of the same elements from before: Are these things alien? If they're not alien, are they from our military or somebody else's military? Are the people who were pushing the narrative and stories of sightings operating in good faith or are these con men?

In so many ways this was all really reminiscent of the 1940s and 1950s.

#### Do you see a shift in how scientists think of UFOs?

In my conversations with scientists I've been seeing some movement toward a willingness to say, "This stuff is maybe worthy of looking into more seriously." The important change since the 1990s - specifically for astrophysicists and astronomers - has been the discovery of so many planets around other stars that could possibly support life.

I'm excited by the prospect of deeper study - both as a phenomenon that needs to be investigated by physical scientists but also as a social and cultural phenomenon. Mystery breeds speculation, and the UFO phenomenon is not a puzzle that can be easily solved. The mystery part gives people an opportunity to ask big questions about not just humanity's place in the universe, but about the limits of technology and knowledge. I think that's why people keep returning to the question of UFOs.

## 11 Ways to Relieve Bloating

That too-full feeling may be thanks to something you ate. Or it could be constipation, or a symptom of a medical condition. Here's what you can do, as advised by Jennifer Robinson, MD, of WebMD, to ease the discomfort.

#### Why are you bloated?

It's that too-full feeling you get in the belly after you eat a bit too much. Or it might be the type of food you ate, or how fast you ate it, or too much salt, fat, or sugar, that causes gas, weight gain, constipation, or water retention. Certain medical conditions like celiac disease, Crohn's disease, irritable bowel syndrome, or ulcerative colitis might also make it more likely.

#### Gassy foods

Beans are a great source of fiber and protein. They also have a substance called raffinose that bacteria need to break down. That can produce gas and lead to bloat. It's not bad for you, and how gassy you get varies from person to person and by types of beans. Broccoli, cabbage, and Brussels sprouts also have raffinose. Your body

will likely adjust. Over-the-counter meds may help you digest these foods more easily.

#### Find the FODMAPs

These are a group of carbs that are hard to digest for some people. They can cause bloating from gas and fluid buildup. FODMAPs include lactose in dairy, fructose in fruit and honey, and many others. Keep notes on how your body handles different foods. Share that info with your doctor to help figure out whether FODMAPs might be to blame, so you know if you need to drop them from your diet.

#### Slow down!

The faster you eat, the more air you swallow. Your stomach can swell when it traps the air, which sometimes passes on to your intestines. Plus, you down more food when you eat quickly. That's in part because it can take as much as 30 minutes for your stomach to tell your brain that you're full. You might overdo it before your brain gets the message -- and that can also make you feel bloated.

#### Put boundaries on bubble

Limit fizzy drinks. The gas that you swallow when you drink soda and other bubbly drinks -- beer, champagne, seltzer -- can fill up your digestive system. You burp some of it away, and some remains and moves through your digestive system until it "passes" out the other end. That's why it's called "passing gas."

#### Be carb-smart

Your body taps into this fuel more quickly than protein or fat, which take longer to digest. After your body uses the carbs it needs for energy, it stores the rest: first as glycogen, which makes your body retain water, and then in fat cells. Both can make you feel bloated. It can help to avoid "simple" carbs, like white bread and pastries, in favor of "complex" carbs, like whole grains and vegetables that take longer to digest.

#### Eat just enough

Your stomach is only about the size of a fist. Food compacts somewhat through the digestive process, but if you eat too much, it starts to stretch out your stomach, and that can make you feel bloated. Plus, too much food

makes it more likely that you'll overdo the salt, carbs, fat, and calories, all of which can also make you feel bloated.

#### Limit salt

Your body needs it to work, but most of us get more than we need. It prompts your body to retain more water, which can make you feel bloated. It also can cause kidney problems and high blood pressure. You may get more salt in your diet than you realize from processed and fast foods. So check food labels for salt (sodium) levels and remember: Just because you don't taste it, it doesn't mean it's not there.

#### Constipated?

When you get "stopped up," you can feel bloated. Mostly, it happens when you need water, fiber, or exercise. But diet changes, illness, or stress also can do it. It usually passes, but exercise, water, and over-the-counter meds can help. See a doctor if you're losing weight and don't know why, it lasts more than a week or two, or you have dizziness, belly pain, or blood in your stool. These could be signs of something more serious.

#### Check on your weight

Have you gained 10 or more pounds in the last year? That's often the case for people who say they feel bloated. It could be because that weight often goes on around the belly, which leaves less room for your stomach to stretch. You and your doctor may be able to build a well-balanced diet and exercise program that helps you lose weight and feel less bloated.

#### Trim fat calories

Your body takes quite a while to digest fat. That means it can stick around in your stomach for a while and leave you feeling bloated. Plus, it's the most calorie-dense food that you can eat. Those calories can add up quickly and cause you to gain weight, which could also make you feel bloated. It might help to limit fat calories with lean protein, whole grains, and vegetables.

#### Manage medical conditions

Your doctor can help you figure out if gut conditions like irritable bowel syndrome, Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, celiac disease, infection, or others are causing your bloating. Treatment may include changes in diet, sleep, and exercise habits, along with medication. The more closely you follow your doctor's suggestions, the more likely you are to ease your bloating. Tell your doctor if your bloating is severe or comes back.




people even after so many years. The artists playing characters on the show are wonderful and I am not replacing anyone as I have not been offered the show."



## South Africa in flames: spontaneous outbreak or insurrection?

Corruption thrives in a destabilised state with weak institutions. South Africa cannot be allowed back to that space because there will be no turning back

South Africans spent most of mid-July glued to their news outlets, from established media outlets to TikTok, from streaming news to old-fashioned printed words, to see just one thing: would Jacob Zuma blink? Would the country finally get some taste of revenge for the state capture, looting, destruction of institutions and threats to the country's democracy their former president had enabled and championed? Would the rule of law win?

Zuma blinked, with a few minutes to spare, and handed himself over to police. An hour or so later he was booked into a rather comfy looking "state of the art correctional facility" in Estcourt (which had taken 17 years to refurbish).

The rule of law won. The institutions that had been so assiduously hollowed out under the nine years of his presidency had flexed their new-found muscle. The Constitutional Court had long held firm, the police were rather more wobbly, but despite much assegai-rattling by family members and the Zuma Foundation, into prison he went. No ANC leader expressed joy, only sorrow that the man had fallen so low; for people not in such elevated positions, it was a rare moment of jubilation in the midst of a global pandemic that has us locked down, again.

Protests that had been low key since he was arrested on Wednesday night (7 July 2021) exploded into an orgy of looting, marching, xenophobic attacks, arson, truck-burning, stabbing and shooting, and blockading of roads and freeways (among others) by Sunday. It seemed - and Zuma's allies and (adult) children were quick to preach the word - that he was so popular and such an object of sympathy that a spontaneous outbreak of bloody violence and theft was unavoidable, and a dark portent if Zuma was not immediately released. Prescience seemed to have replaced profligacy.

The stakes were (and remain) exceptionally high. Thanks in part to the commission of inquiry into state capture and corruption Zuma established and later refused to attend. Zuma is now known to have allowed the Gupta family, using organised crime money-laundering vehicles, to bankrupt the state. As has been noted, fish rot from the head. From the time that he was fired by former president Thabo Mbeki (in 2005) to date, Zuma has deployed his infamous Stalingrad legal strategy. In effect, he has been fighting every single item in court while adopting the victim stance of a man more sinned against than sinning.

Sadly, Zuma is not a Shakespearian hero, but a man of decidedly clay feet. For nine years as president, he outmanoeuvred pretty much all and sundry - he reshuffled cabinets to destabilise oppo-



nents; he forced the Whip and faced down multiple votes of no confidence; he allowed R50 billion to be stolen by his friends, the Gupta family - all now safely in Dubai - and ran state and party as both cash cow and defensive wall.

He met his match in Cyril Matamela Ramaphosa, who succeeded him as ANC and national president. Ramaphosa has moved with the cold, calculating methodology that proves him to be the real chess master (Zuma has a passion for the game). Ramaphosa has outmanoeuvred Zuma and many of his allies in the ANC (such as secretary general Ace Magashule). He has done this by trying to resuscitate the organs of state, investigation and prosecution that had been severely damaged by his predecessor.

The rule of law - which took a pummelling over the last decade - seems to be out of rehab. Zuma may only be in prison for a contempt charge - but the notion that the first ANC leader in orange overall would be Zuma was not a fantasy that played out as realistic in most imaginations.

#### Why the violence

Many reasons have been offered for the violence, looting, racist bile and bloodshed that erupted. These include:

- the pent-up frustration of hungry and cold people facing few prospects for socio-economic improvement;
- inequality and the gulf between the conspicuous consumption of the "made it" compared to others;
- ethnic tensions within the ANC, with the president representing a "minority" tribe and apparently lacking legitimacy;
- good old stereotypical Zulu nationalist violence was breaking out as it did in the early 1990s;

• internal ANC factional tensions were spilling onto the streets; and more.

All of these have some truth. Yet none provides a narrative thread that ties together these disparate issues and scattered but clearly organised acts of violence. Part of the gap in our understanding is how a middle-of-the-night incarceration of Zuma - albeit done in the blaze of TV arc lights - led to such a widespread and destructive but apparently spontaneous outbreak.

This narrative suits Zuma and his supporters perfectly: pity for the victimised former president unleashed patriotic fervour that was unstoppable, proving his popularity and victim status. Family, the Zuma Foundation and others all began pumping out the narrative - much as Zuma's daughter tweeted the video of a gun firing bullets into a poster of Ramaphosa. Subtlety did not play much of a role.

But when the Minister of State Security reported on the morning of Tuesday 13 July that her spies had managed to stop attacks on substations, planned attacks on ANC offices and in Durban-Westville prison, things began to look different. How did they know of the plans, and for how long? Who was doing the planning? How did they stop it?

When "impeccable sources in the intelligence service and law enforcement" warned of arms caches at Zuma's home, Nkandla; when we recall that the police admitted to "losing" some 20,000 weapons in the 2000s, as had the State Security Agency, we are permitted to ask uncomfortable questions.

Suddenly the acts look rather more organised and rather less spontaneous.

Neeshan Balton, executive director of the not-for-profit lobby group, the Kathrada Foundation, has suggested that part of the strategy was a wildfire - strike lots of matches and just let them burn whatever is in their path to destabilise the democratic project.

This too is premised on the existence of a plan.

The danger with suggesting that this was not at heart a set of random acts by poor people who were overcome by emotion at the thought of Zuma in prison but rather a (more or less well) planned and executed attempt to destabilise the state is that rather than "joining the dots" as Public Enterprises Minister Pravin Gordhan advised, one may be constructing a crazy conspiracy theory.

The definition of insurrection is to rise against the power of the state, generally using weaponry. Conspiracies exist. From dark warnings of another massacre like the one at Marikana in 2012 should Zuma be touched, to planning sabotage against municipal infrastructure, and fanning the flames of xenophobic violence, it seems very difficult to ignore the planned insurrection at hand.

Poor and hungry people exist, and the state should be ashamed. But hungry people do not become violent looters on behalf of better-known looters who are in jail. They may well be available for mobilisation (looting, violence, marching) behind the organisers - but it is the organisers that need to be brought to book, and who must also face the rule of law.

Corruption thrives in a destabilised state with weak institutions. South Africa cannot be allowed back to that space because there will be no turning back.
