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Corruption Index & Freedom of Information

auritius takes the 49th place on the latest Transparency International's Corruption Perceptions Index. The country progresses by one point and falls below the bar of the 50 least corrupt countries in the world. Mauritius moves up to 4th in Africa with an index of 54, doing better than Rwanda. Even though money laundering is not among the crimes taken into account by the Index, Transparency Mauritius maintains that the measures taken by Mauritius to get out of the grey list of the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) has undoubtedly had a positive, albeit marginal, effect on the country's ranking.

This is not really cause for rejoicing since ground realities here and the present government's track record of fighting corrupt and fraudulent practices tell a different story. The perversion of Public Procurement procedures through various means by marauding top echelons in major purchasing Ministries as evidenced by the most recent Emergency Procurements of drugs and medical equipment, the CEB corruption scandal highlighted by the ADB are now on record. So too were the shenanigans around useless Pack & Blister oxygen ventilators during the 2020 period of the pandemic or the wheelings and dealings at the STC. Set against such glaring evidences of financial misdemeanours, the record of ICAC to fearlessly track and tackle wrongdoers, leaves much to be desired.

We need not also recall either the absence of concrete results in many major cases where no inquiry has even been felt necessary (high-risk loans at the State Bank of Mauritius or the earlier high-voltage financial losses of the national carrier) and the general absence of any prosecutions, still less sanctions, in all the aired high-profile cases of white-collar crimes. One wonders whether the inquiry into the St Louis case, what appears to be a clear-cut case of massive corruption involving a "complot" at our administrative levels to thwart the public procurement process, will prove to be yet another pointless and utter waste of time, or whether this matter is not being politically instrumentalised to keep on a tight leash one former minister and an opposition leader whose names have allegedly been mentioned in the never disclosed ADB report.

As for its sister agencies, the CCID and MCIT, charged with investigating fraud or other criminal activity, their track record in what has become the tragic and cold-blooded murder of an MSM activist who threatened in frustration, it seems, to spill the beans on corrupt practices to which he was party, the Kistnen saga, has seen the summum of unknown unknowns

despite the DPP-ordered judicial enquiry.

True it is that the inclination towards corruption, or the perception thereof, has been apparent since a few decades. State lands have been given to selected cronies. Contracts have repeatedly been awarded to certain specific beneficiaries for public works, sometimes by splitting them in order not to fall under the scrutiny of the central procurement agency. In other cases, favours have been granted to specific persons or groups, to the detriment of all, influencing public bodies to do so, enhancing benefits or reducing costs in favour of the targeted few. Emergency conditions around the pandemic have allowed a thorough by-pass of public procurement checks and balances enabling many well-heeled individuals and companies to enrich themselves fabulously and without any qualms.

It is the power politicians and bureaucrats give themselves that facilitates acts of corruption. The more loosely rules and regulations and laws are liable to be interpreted, the more the abuse by means of corruption, especially in the world's most morally decrepit countries. Often, citizens have seen our politicians ride high (especially during electoral campaigns) to proclaim their so-called attachment to a corruption-free state. It's time that they walked the talk. For example, why don't they demonstrate their commitment by enacting and effectively enforcing a well-balanced Freedom of information Act? A call for such a legislation has been made since decades now and is also on this government's manifesto, and we are still waiting! Does that not reek of cynicism and taking the people for a ride? The same also goes for the Political Financing Bill, which the best brains on the matter are convinced that it was so crafted as to be doomed from the word go. By the way, why should the Declaration of Assets by body politic and high mandarins be state secrets if we are aiming for transparency as a normative parameter of public life?

The present government has still enough time to move in the direction of allowing a retrospective scrutiny of accretion of wealth by its members, nominees and other high office holders. Getting this done within reasonable parameters of disclosure and appropriate legal oversight, it would not only salvage at least part of the country's reputation, but also its own too. There's more to gain both for the country and politically by taking such eminently actionable measures promptly as a demonstration of the government's seriousness and concern over financial misdemeanours that have engulfed the country under the law of omerta.

Voters value honesty in their politicians above all else

Boris Johnson continues to insist the public cares more that he 'gets on with the job' than what happened in Downing Street over lockdown. But he may be wrong



s pressure mounts on the UK prime minister, Boris Johnson, members of his party are considering their options. Should they topple him or keep him? Those who want him out fear that the public will not forgive the string of alleged social events held in Downing Street while the rest of the country lived under strict Covid lockdowns. Their anger may cost the Conservatives dearly at the next election. Those who are hesitating do so because Johnson had been such an electoral success story before this scandal.

We at the UCL Constitution Unit are conducting a major study of public attitudes to democracy in the UK that sheds new light on what matters most to voters. Our latest findings from a large-scale survey of the UK population conducted last summer suggest Conservative MPs are right to be concerned about the fallout of "partygate". Integrity is extremely important to voters. It is in fact valued above all other traits in a politician.

When we asked about a range of characteristics that politicians should have, "being honest" came top. This was followed by "owning up when they make mistakes". "Getting things done" and "being inspiring" were far behind

Johnson has a trademark tactic – seen repeatedly at Prime Minister's Questions – of batting away critics by saying he is focused on delivering the people's priorities. When asked about any potentially questionable behaviour or incidents, he insists that members of the public care more about "getting Brexit done" than it does about anything else.

Thad never thought that I would receive this call that was such a surprise, coming as it did out of the blues as the saying goes. It was from someone who had 'known' me much before I met him. He was a teacher of English and English literature in a private secondary school. Unbeknown to me, he was a regular reader of the *Mauritius Times*, and of my articles as I was to

learn from him afterwards. This was the first 'connect,' at the intellectual level if I may call it so. Subsequently, if my memory serves me right, we met through common friends, though perhaps only a couple of times, but enough to discover that we had a shared interest in literary and philosophical matters.

This goes back over twenty years ago. I had written an article in the *MT* on the great sage of India, Mahayogi Sri Aurobindo. Michael, for that is his name, had a close friend who was a lawyer, Hervé (who has since passed) who was an adept of Sri Aurobindo. He too had read the article, and while discussing it with Michael, the latter told him that he knew me. Hervé expressed the wish to meet me and discuss further about Sri Aurobindo. I was delighted when Michael called to share with me his conversation with Hervé, and I invited them for lunch at my place on a Sunday shortly after.

We spent some very pleasant moments tog\ether. Hervé had a more thorough knowledge of Sri Aurobindo than me, for I had only recently begun to read about him and to initiate myself into some of his writings. Herve was far ahead, and was already initiated into the yogic practices advocated by Sri Aurobindo, and it is from him that I first heard about the concept and practice of 'nirvikalpa samadhi' that Sri Aurobindo had elaborated upon.

For recall, Sri Aurobindo was one of the first thinkers to come up with the idea of India's independence from British rule. He was accused of exploding a bomb in which a high British official was killed in

Kolkata and put in jail by the British. Released after a trial one year later, he was being persecuted by the British for sedition, and in 1910 he escaped to Pondicherry which was under French jurisdiction. He devoted the rest of his life to the practice of 'Integral Yoga' in the ashram which he founded there until his death in 1950, when his disciple Mirra Richard, known as the 'Mother of Pondicherry' took over to carry on his activities. She went on to found Auroville, and she herself passed in 1972.

The call from Michael was totally unexpected, inasmuch as we had hardly met again, except when he came to gift me a copy of a book of his poems. Earlier, he had given me his copy of 'The Oxford Dictionary of Quotations' (1953) which he

felt would be more useful to me because of my writing and in any case, he would be retiring in a few years. It had a soft cover, and I got it bound in hard cover, and it keeps coming in handy.

It was two days ago that Michael had called, and I was pained to hear his changed voice, as well as his manner of speech which was slow, and the articulation was not clear. He apologized for that, and for this reason he kept the call short. But he felt so deeply about my article 'The Gift of Life' in last week's issue of *MT* that he thought he must absolutely ring me to express his feelings and appreciation. I was amazed that despite retiring as a teacher, and probably with a medical pro-

blem that is affecting his speech, he has nevertheless kept up with reading the *Mauritius Times*, and was so touched by my article that he rang me to say so.

Similarly, to Michael, over the years I have come across several other persons who too have told me about their 'connect' with me through my articles, belonging to diverse walks of life and age groups. I have met them face-to-face in different settings, but a number of times I have received calls from perfect strangers telling me they have read such and such article and giving their own views on the subject matter that I had dealt with. One of the most heartwarming calls I had was from someone who told me that he was a secondary school physics teacher, and had made a

collection of cuttings of my articles. I have never met him.

It is always gratifying to learn that one is somehow touching the lives of others in a positive way, something that happens purely unintentionally because for me writing is a way of sharing my thoughts, what I read or know a little about, for I believe in the saying that knowledge is not knowledge until it is shared. In this way, writing is akin to my core profession of medicine where I deliberately and directly impact on the lives of the patients whom I treat. Both callings are about touching the lives of people and I hope to be able to do so as long as my faculties permit.

Unlike medicine, though, writing is an intangible way of reaching out to people, of 'giving' unknowingly. But life offers all of us opportunities to bestow other precious, indeed invaluable gifts. A teacher friend of mine put that beautifully - what you can give that has no cost and yet is priceless:

Building the Mauritius We Want This is not the time for reckless adventurism. There is only one way forward

he country faces daunting socio-economic challenges in the wake of the dire fallouts of the Covid-19 pandemic in a context of growing public indebtedness, strapped public finances and worsening fundamentals. economic This grim situation has been compounded by appalling governance, questionable and costly misuse of public funds as well as a patent absence of accountability

Thus, a galling opacity shrouds costly projects such as the Rs 19 billion Safe City project whose deliverable benefits remain elusive or the Rs 5 billion Cote d'Or Multi-Sports Complex, the allocation of tens of billions of Rupees of Mauritius Investment Corporation Ltd (MIC) funds blithely drawn from the country's foreign exchange reserves to bail out distressed conglomerates and other companies, emergency procurement tenders and infrastructure projects generally, etc. This is in the teeth of the government glib rhetoric about accountability, transparency and good governance.

Parochial agendas

What on earth is the rationale of extending the metro line to Ebene and the Reduit campus from Rose Hill entailing the construction of a costly bridge instead of building a branch line from St Jean in relatively open ground to Ebene and Reduit? Have all options been carefully gauged to determine the least costly and disruptive option? It is also imperative to judiciously determine the choice of any further extension of the metro network on the basis of a rigorous and transparent cost-benefit exercise instead of rashly embarking on costly ad hoc extensions driven by narrow parochial agendas at public expense.

Covid-19 has also exposed the fundamental weaknesses of an economic model highly dependent on the tourism industry and real estate activities and projects whose viability depends on the sale of high-end properties to foreigners and unrestricted air travel. With a whopping banking debt of some Rs 55 billion and billions of Rupees obtained from the MIC, the hospitality sector remains extremely vulnerable especially as only some 179,000 passengers tra-velled to Mauritius in the last quarter of 2021 after our borders were opened on 1 October 2021.

This raises the question of the number of passengers who actually stayed in hotels as a certain proportion of tourists opt to stay in private accommodation. The economic actors of the sector and government are therefore desperate for the tourism and hospitality sector to pick up momentum as quickly as possible. This will require a well-honed promotional and marketing strategy which offers a safe, competitive, enriching and unique holiday experience to tourists in the country.

In a bid to boost the beleaguered travel industry, various countries are lifting all restrictions on international travel. Eng-land and Scotland an-nounced this week that people arriving from abroad as from 11 February will no longer have to take Covid tests if they are fully vaccinated. Travel to France is now permissible to fully-vaccinated British travellers. This is expected to encourage skiing trips and visits to Disneyland Paris in the coming weeks and during February half-term as around 17 million UK citizens visit

Spending largesse

What makes matters worse is that instead of promoting productive economic activities, the government continues to grant freebies the country can ill afford (presumably to obtain political mileage) to all and sundry from public funds. Despite massive investments from the budget allocation for a National Flood Management Programme of Rs 11.7 billion for the construction and upgrading of some 1500 drain projects across the island over the next three years to prevent flooding in flood prone areas and localities, flooding in these areas after each heavy rainfall remains unabated. The recent torrential rains have again showcased the distress caused to people in diverse localities through recurrent flooding.

Consumer outcry

The government also seems blind to the distress and inability of more than 47% of employees earning up to Rs 15,000 per month to meet their essential existential needs in a context where the prices of consumer goods fuelled by the unchecked depreciation of the Rupee are rising almost every week. Consumers are legitimately up in arms at the inability of government to stem such greedy profiteering.

The unprecedented circumstances caused by the Covid-19 pandemic require exceptional price control and currency stabilizing measures to protect consumers. Instead of alleviating the cost of groceries of households, the government's Rs 500 million support measure basically subsidizes the profits of retailers and supermarkets. The economic policies of the government cannot be driven by a fixation with VAT earnings to shore strapped government revenue at the expense of consumers.

In the larger world context, the IMF has cut its world economic growth forecast to 4.4% for 2022, down from an estimate of 4.9% in October, as the Covid-19 pandemic enters its third year, based on weaker prospects for the US and China, the world's two largest economies. This will affect economic recovery prospects.

Clamour for a new political culture

At a time when the country needs a paradigm shift in governance and a sea change in political culture and government policy framework, the main opposition parties are blithely hammering out a deal on the modalities of a hotchpotch political alliance to challenge the incumbent government with essentially the same leaders and protagonists

who have been repeatedly rejected by the electorate at the last two elections. As before, the negotiations are based on the principle that nothing is agreed until the full shopping list of each party's demands is agreed. This disconcerting situation begs so many burning questions.

Ideals instead of deals

Is it not blatantly clear to the political class and everyone that what the people clamour for is a fundamentally changed political culture based on ideals, principles and an ethos distanced from power-sharing deals which provoked the 2014 electoral debacle? Do the leaders of the Labour Party-led coalition and the MMM, which registered one of their worst electoral defeats in 2019 with 14 and 8 elected MPs only, seriously think that they represent a credible alternative which can rally the multitude to their cause? The stakes are high. Defeat is not an option. The MMM must realize that dissent within its ranks has dented and eroded its electoral base.

This is not therefore the time to cut deals behind the back of the people but to champion ideals. The political class must realize that the people want a new dawn which reboots po-litics with the seminal ideals, principles and ethos the independence of the country was fought on. Makeshift arrangements on interim Prime Ministers or widely decried mentors to soothe the hurt egos of defeated leaders are anathema to the people.

The people also want an end to political interference and high-handedness as well as nepotism, cronyism and the decried policy of nominating the party faithful to cushy key governments posts at the head of state institutions and state-owned companies. They want meritocracy and competence to prevail at all echelons of state institutions, companies and the government Establishment.

The people want talented and competent new leaders with a track record of achievements and a new political class which commits to principles of meritocracy at all levels, transparency and accountability, good governance and a commitment to promote the independence and efficiency of state institutions and the government Establishment as well as the highest standards of propriety in the management of the affairs of the State.

The people want to reinstate a vibrant democracy where the interests of people and the continuous improvement of their welfare remain at the centre of government actions. They want an independent and fair Speaker and the allegiance of elected MPs to first and foremost promote the interests of the people and to uphold public interest at all times.

New dawn

People therefore want a new start with an innovative blueprint for the future which recast the economic model, brings about important reforms, overhaul all levels of the education system on the best benchmarks prevailing in the countries with the best education systems in the world and significantly improve the prospects and standard of living of the young. They want government to robustly address the threats of climate change, end coal use and urgently boost green and renewable energy production.

Mauritius is therefore at a key crossroads. If we want to build the Mauritius we want, the pathway to obtain the endorsement of the people and success at the polls is well defined. Political parties, the political class and all those who adhere to the ideals and values of a new dawn for people and country must adapt accordingly or perish. This is not the time for reckless adventurism. There is only one way forward

Sanctity of The Vote

Restoring the institutions' credibility and regaining the trust of the population require shying away from complacency

he richest and most powerful federal Presidential democracy in the world has, as we know, been locked in the most hilarious narrative peddled by Trumpists that the election he himself and many states under Republican control supervised, had been rigged and his undoubted victory stolen from him. The only acceptable results should have declared him the winner, through whatever means, including the January 6 organized riotous insurrection to pressure Washington lawmakers and the Vice President Mike Pence to hand him victory against the nation's majority votes.

None of the 60 or more legal challenges brought by Trumpists to courts disclosed any evidence of wrongdoing at any material scale, as his own outgoing Dept of Justice had concluded, but amazingly, more than 35% of ordinary Americans believe that stolen "Big Lie" peddled by right-wing extremists and associated media. The sanctity of the vote in the US federal structure, electoral colleges, and the mechanisms for electoral oversight in that peculiar set-up, never before challenged, is now a raging internal political debate, although the US peculiarities make it difficult to extrapolate anything of interest for parliamentary democracies.

An international podcast brings to mind that there have been during this pandemic other less visible soldiers of fortune called to attend other important frontlines for any country. The Police or Fire and Rescue Services may indeed be seen as the necessary, impartial, equitable and comprehending force people relied upon during the pandemic difficulties, their role essential as other frontliners, soldiers maintaining peace, justice, liberty and civil quiescence.

These are often recognizable but what about the other frontliners, less visible but equally important to our survival during the pandemic, asked the author of the podcast. Where were the frontliners of elections where any were being held, he asks, and were they not soldiers of our democratic processes, frontliners fighting for our hard-earned voting rights and our civic freedoms? The population will make its own judgement on that.

Who were the frontliners when the MV Wakashio was allowed to enter our national waters, ram into our coral reefs and wallow th ere for twelve days or more, spilling its black muck that ordinary citizens rushed to stem with unlimited enthusiasm and artisanal means?

What about the frontliners safeguarding our public procurement processes during emergency, were they dispensed of the same levels of dedication and professionalism we expect from health personnel?

Can investigative agencies and officers pick up the notorious slack in their efforts so as to be effective frontliners for cleaner government, unmasking corruption that seems to sully the atmosphere and restore our beliefs in a sputtering democracy?

Electoral Petitions & Recount

that there must be some solid prima facie grounds justifying such a prayer to be accepted. In the Adebiro case at No. 19, there were such "glaring discrepancies" according to the two Supreme Court Justices and accepted by legal counsel of all parties, including those of the Electoral Commissioner and the Electoral Supervisory Commission, that the outcome of a court-supervised recount became unavoidable. That such obvious anomalies and discrepancies in a vote tally summary form kept for unknown reasons confidential, went undetected is quite shocking. Lex comments on the legal aspects and consequences of this landmark judgment.

* We learn from the judgement delivered by Justices Aruna Narain and Denis Mootoo in the case Adebiro O.J. v Collendavelloo I.L. & Ors that it was Mr Mulloo, former Chief Electoral Officer and now Adviser to the Electoral Commissioner, who brought to the attention of the Court the "discrepancies" noted in the Recapitulation of Votes form. The Electoral Commissioner Irfan Rahman, in a statement thereafter, said he had "instructed his legal advisers not to oppose the prayer for recount of all valid ballot papers... in the light of the discrepancies noted". Neither Mr Mulloo nor Mr Rahman stated when the discrepancies were discovered. That these discrepancies are now revealed, two years after the elections, suggests that there is something amiss here, isn't it?

Of course. Not amiss, but very serious. How come that it is two years after Ms Adebiro filed her petition that the irregularities are surfacing. According to the procedure on ballot count, the votes are called aloud and inscribed on what is called a Recapitulation Vote Form. How come these mistakes were not found earlier. This is very disturbing.

* We also learn from the same judgement that the Senior Counsel for the Electoral Supervisory Commission also made a statement to the effect that the Commission "was not aware earlier of the "apparent mistake" in the Recapitulation of Votes form". How is it possible that that Commission which, under the Constitution, has "general responsibility for and shall supervise, the registration of electors... and the conduct of elections" was not made aware of these discrepancies the more so since the election in No. 19 was being challenged?

Easy to explain. Apparently, the Recapitulation of Votes Form is a confidential document which is handed over to the Electoral Commissioner by the Returning Officer after the results are finally proclaimed. If the Electoral Commissioner and the members of the Electoral Commission had done their job properly and perused that particular Form, they would have been bound to see the discrepancies.

* Why should such an important document in the conduct of the counting process and the proclamation of elected candidates be kept confidential? What

eyes of concerned parties including the Electoral Commissioner, the Electoral Commission, and their lawyers.

* This begs the question: What could have prompted the Electoral Commission to reveal at this point in time, that is on 13 January 2022 when the case (lodged on 28 November 2019) came up for hearing, the discrepancies noted in the Recapitulation of Votes form?

One wonders who had that bright idea to have ecourse to computers for the counting process behind the back of candidates'

could be the importance of confidentiality in this particular matter?

God knows, but it's certainly an aberration that such a Form, which records the number of votes obtained by all candidates, should be kept confidential. Had a copy been handed over to all candidates, the discrepancies would surely have been found much before 2022.

* The alleged opacity surrounding the operation of Computer Rooms at Counting Centres should be good reason for the Recapitulation of Votes form to be made available to election candidates or their representatives, don't you think?

Absolutely, the more so given the total opacity surrounding the computer rooms. One wonders who had that bright idea to have recourse to computers for the counting process behind the back of candidates without the latter being informed accordingly in advance of that measure. Worse still the candidates were denied access to the computer rooms.

It's unfortunate however that in the earlier petition lodged by Erza Jhuboo the Supreme court did not find anything irregular in that decision.

* Our understanding is that Justices Narain and Mootoo have ordered a recount in view of "the glaring and unexplained discrepancies in the Recapitulation of Votes form that are on record and point *prima facie* to mistakes in the counting process", and also because none of the respondents in this case, that is Mr Ivan Collendavelloo, the Electoral Commissioner, the Electoral Supervisory Commission, and the Returning Officer, objected to a recount. Without the Recapitulation of Votes form made available to the Court and the admission of discrepancies, the case might have taken a different turn, isn't it?

Exactly. If the Form had not been made public, nobody would have been apprised of the glaring discrepancies and everything would have been deemed to be regular in the

God knows, but it's certainly an aberration that the Recapitulation of Votes form, which records the number of votes obtained by all candidates, should be kept confidential. Had a copy been handed over to all candidates, the discrepancies would surely have been found much before 2022..."

Only the Electoral Commissioner and the Electoral Commission alone can answer this question. They might have taken things for granted and did not indeed realise that there were discrepancies in the counting of votes. I dare not say that they kept quiet even if they had seen the irregularities.

* What could be the reason/s for Justices Narain and Mootoo to order that the recount be taken by the Acting Master and Registrar of the Supreme Court, not the Electoral Commission? Is that in the normal scheme of things?

Since the recount has been ordered by the Court, the count which is still under judicial scrutiny must be supervised by a court official.

* To suggest that this case and the judgement delivered by Justices Narain and Mootoo will have an impact on the other pending electoral petitions may be farfetched, isn't it? One should not jump the gun at this stage - unless similar discrepancies would have been noted in those constituencies and the Electoral Commission chooses to bite the bullet and state the facts as they are, right?

A recount is not granted for the mere asking. The case law is clear on this. There must be solid grounds for a recount to be ordered even if the different parties consent to such a recount.

If no prayer for a recount is made in electoral petitions, the Court will not allow the petitions to be amended to insert that particular averment. The Adebiro judgment has made this clear. This is what the judges stated: "...we hold that a recount may exceptionally be ordered in this case on grounds not averred in the election petition. Our order in these very exceptional circumstances should not in any way however be construed as a licence for aggrieved candidates to enter election petitions within the prescribed delay and to later seek as a matter of course to aver or rely on new grounds outside delay."

* Let's assume that Ivan Collendavelloo and the other candidates whose election have been contested by way of electoral petitions are disqualified as elected candidates following recounts ordered by the Supreme Court; they might still go to the Privy Council for a final determination of the issue, right? We would then have reached the eve of the next general elections...

Any decision may be appealed to the Privy Council with the leave of the Supreme Court. However, it is difficult to see what grounds of appeal can be raised in that and the other cases. Breakfast with Bwana

Christopher Krebs, nominated by Trump and confirmed by a unanimous Senate vote as head of the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency declared the 2020 election was "the most secure in American history." Trump's Attorney General William Barr who, gratuitously and without evidentiary support, had opined that mail-in balloting is susceptible to fraud, also said there was no evidence of fraud in the election. As well, Mitch McConnell, the Republican Senate Majority Leader, declared that Biden had won the election. These three staunch Republicans earned Trump's scorn for their disloyal failure to subscribe to his lies.

Trump was impeached twice but escaped conviction both times because the Democrats did not have the votes to convict by a two-thirds majority. After the second trial by the Senate, Mitch McConnell said: "There is no question, none, that President Trump is practically and morally responsible for provoking the events of the day." He also noted that Trump watched the events unfold on television and took no action. "A mob was assaulting the Capitol in his name," he said. "These criminals were carrying his banners, hanging his flags and screaming their loyalty to him."

backed the election results conceding that Biden is the legitimate President of the United States, and "Joe Biden and Kamala Harris are lawfully elected." But Graham also did not vote to convict Trump. Since then, he seems to have changed his position once again after he spent a weekend playing golf with Trump earlier this month, calling him a "damn good President" and having forgiven Trump and claimed that independent voters too would forgive Trump if he ran again.

In March 2016, as Donald Trump was contending to be the Republican Party's nominee for President, Mitt Romney the 2012 Republican nominee who eventually lost to Barack Obama, gave a speech in which he expressed his conviction that America is poised to lead the world for another century. He rattled off some of the major challenges facing the nation but optimistically projected that if we make the right choices, America's future would be even better than its past and better than its present. Romney concluded his speech with these words: "Here's what I know. Donald Trump is a phony, a fraud.

It is somewhat easier to understand that in countries where communication is tightly controlled, the Internet is not always available, and communications can be censored, the opportunity to engage in organized resistance is limited. We have seen how ruthless oppression in Hong Kong, Russia, Turkey, Myanmar, and North Korea makes resistance well nigh impossible. In a country such as the United States, this excuse is not available.

Of course, even in the United States, communication is often channelled in subtle ways so that falsehoods and misinformation

are amplified. But there has to be something more to this than just blaming social media or cable TV outlets for why ordinary people gravitate to falsehoods and conspiracy theories.

Why do almost 40% of Americans believe that the election was stolen and why did almost two-thirds of Republican responders to a recent NPR/Ipsos say that they believe the verifiably false and debunked claims that voter fraud helped Biden beat Trump?

It has been the hallmark of American democracy that the loser in an election accepts defeat after all lawful challenges are exhausted. Lawful challenges include demands for recounts were allowed by applicable state laws and rules and challenges filed with courts of appropriate jurisdiction. Donald Trump is the first American president who not only alleged that the election was stolen from him but tried to subvert the administration of the electoral process in order to have himself declared the winner.

Trump and his campaign, as well as surrogates and supporters filed some 63 lawsuits challenging the election results. They lost all but one and that one involved a minor procedural victory that did not change the result. But Trump's efforts were more sinister. Not only did his personal attorney Rudy Giuliani orchestrate an effort to issue to the National Archives fraudulent certifications of electors purporting to have been duly elected, but Trump himself pressured the Georgia Secretary of State to "find" him the votes necessary to win that state's election.

Part of this may be explained by the fact that people simply don't want to admit that they have backed a loser. But there are other forces, some more subtle and some not so subtle

If we go back to Trump's first campaign, one has to acknowledge that he displayed a certain genius for putting his finger on hot button issues. Americans have for long resented the loss of their jobs to China. Never mind that America's corporate CEOs have been complicit in the transfer of American jobs and technology to China. But when Trump accused China of unfair trade practices, theft of American technology, and promised to put a stop to it, he won the hearts and minds of a significant number of Americans. When Trump played on Americans' fears of illegal immigrants committing violent crimes, rapes, and selling drugs, he played upon racist fears that the country was slowly evolving from a majority white nation to one more mixed and more brown.



When Trump derided the Iran nuclear deal, he played on the fears of evangelicals that the US was abandoning Israel. And when he lamented the failure of NATO's members to pay their fair share of defense costs, he played upon more fears of Americans that the Europeans were taking advantage.

Trump played on the exhaustion of a nation fatigued by seemingly endless wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

It was difficult for Trump supporters to see how Biden, who expressed no concern about any of these issues, could prevail. And for good measure, Trump's Make America Great Again slogan had the necessary tinge of patriotism.

Theory of stupidity

Now all this is about to come apart at the seams. The Congressional Committee investigating the events of January 6, 2021 has won a significant victory when the Supreme Court ruled against Trump's claims of Executive Privilege to shield White House documents from the committee's subpoena. So far, documents reveal that Trump went so far as to draft an Executive Order directing the Secretary of Defense to seize voting machines around the country. Such an order in the opinion of experts would be patently unlawful and perhaps the military would never have carried it out. On the other hand, the National Guard units in states loyal to Trump may well have heeded such orders

position at the helm of one of the world's largest companies for an ephemeral stint under a man he was later to call a "f—king moron."

"Against stupidity we have no defense. Neither protests nor force can touch it. Reasoning is of no use. So, the fool, as distinct from the scoundrel, is completely self-satisfied. In fact, they can easily become dangerous, as it does not take much to make them aggressive. Ukraine crisis updates: What to know as tensions rise

Russia has placed more than 100,000 troops near Ukraine's border and ratcheted up war games in the region.

Moscow denies it is planning an assault, but the United States and its NATO allies fear that Russia is planning for war — and are making preparations of their own, reports AP.

Here are things to know about the international tensions over Ukraine, a crisis reminiscent of the Cold War.

THE U.S. says NO

The U.S. has made no concessions to the main Russian demands over Ukraine and NATO in a long-awaited written response delivered to Russia on Wednesday in Moscow, Secretary of State Antony Blinken said.

Blinken said the U.S. response, delivered to the Russian Foreign Ministry by U.S. Ambassador to Russia John Sullivan, gave up no ground on "core principles" such as NATO's open-door membership policy and the alliance's military presence in Eastern Europe.

Blinken said the document made clear that the U.S. is standing by its oft-stated positions. "There is no change, there will be no change," he said. But, he said the written response to Russia also contains "serious" offers for a diplomatic path to de-escalate soaring tensions over Ukraine by addressing Russian concerns on other matters.

Russia has demanded guarantees that NATO never admit Ukraine and other ex-Soviet nations as members



and that the alliance roll back troop deployments in former Soviet bloc countries, a region Moscow still views as its sphere of interest

What do Ukrainian leaders say?

Ukrainian officials have sought to calm nerves as tensions escalate.

Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said

Wednesday that while the concentration of Russian troops near Ukraine poses a threat, "their number is now insufficient for a large-scale offensive."

"They are still missing some key military elements and systems to mount a big, full-scale offensive," Kuleba told reporters.

He also noted that causing alarm could be an end in itself. Russia, he said, hopes to destabilize Ukraine by "spreading panic, raising pressure on Ukraine's financial system and launching cyberattacks."

What is the mood on Ukraine's front line?

Soldiers and civilians in eastern Ukraine are waiting with helpless anticipation to see if war comes.

They understand that their fate is being decided by politicians in distant capitals. Even politicians in their own capital, Kyiv, have found themselves on the sidelines of several rounds of high-stakes diplomacy that so far have not yielded a breakthrough.

The battle-weary region has been fighting pro-Russia separatist fighters since 2014. It is an area close to where Russia has massed tens of thousands of soldiers in a troop buildup that U.S. President Joe Biden says could mount the largest invasion since World War II.

What is happening on the diplomatic front?

Envoys from Russia, Ukraine, France and Germany met Wednesday for more than eight hours in Paris to discuss the separatist conflict in Ukraine's eastern industrial heartland. Although there was no breakthrough, they promised to meet for new talks in two weeks in Berlin.

The 'Partygate' scandal: Where matters stand



Boris Johnson's future as UK prime minister hangs in the balance as he grapples with two investigations — including one by the police — into alleged rule-breaking parties in government buildings while the country was in lockdown.

The so-called 'partygate' controversy has gripped the country for weeks, escalating on Tuesday after police began a formal probe. That followed news of — among others — a "bring your own booze" party in Downing Street at the height of coronavirus restrictions in 2020, as well as a birthday party for Johnson.

The scandal was already being investigated by senior civil servant Sue Gray, and her report is seen as central to whether members of Johnson's Conservatives

would continue to back him as a leader. That review could come within days after police raised no objection to its publication, according to reports in local media, reports Bloomberg.

Meanwhile, the police probe is another damaging development for the prime minister, who is already facing calls to resign, even from within his own party, and slumping poll numbers.

Among the key issues are whether any of the events breached coronavirus rules, when Johnson learned of the May 2020 BYOB party, and whether he ignored concerns from some within his office about it. Johnson has also been accused of misleading Parliament, which would customarily be a resigning matter.

Working 'closely' with India to handle border problem, US should not interfere: China

China on Thursday said it will work "closely" with India to properly handle the ongoing border tension and strongly criticised the US for saying it was concerned by Beijing's attempts to coerce its neighbours including India.

The Chinese defence ministry added that the border problem is a bilateral matter and both China and India oppose interference from a third party, reports Hindustan Times.

Defence ministry spokesperson, Wu Qian said "...China neither "coerces" nor is "coerced" by others, and strongly opposes the US forcing "coercive diplomacy" on other countries, Wu said on Thursday.

Wu was referring to comments made by the White House press secretary, Jen Psaki ahead of the 14th round of military talks between India and China on January 12 to resolve the ongoing border tension between the two countries along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh. "We've been pretty clear how we view Beijing's behaviour in the region and around the world. We believe it can be destabilising. And we're concerned by the People's Republic of China's attempt to intimidate its neighbours," Psaki said.

Referring to the China-India border issue, Wu stressed that the Chinese side believed that the last round of talks were positive and constructive. "...China will work closely with the Indian side to pro-

perly handle the border issue through negotiation and consultation," Wu was quoted as saying by the official China Military Online website.

Indian and Chinese border troops have been locked in a border standoff in eastern Ladakh since May 2020, when a violent clash in Pangong lake area led to both sides gradually deploying tens of thousands of soldiers as well as heavy weaponry along the border.

India has repeatedly and consistently rejected China's allegations that Indian troops crossed over to the Chinese side of the LAC in eastern Ladakh, asserting that New Delhi has always taken a responsible approach towards border management and maintaining peace and tranquillity in the border areas.

Omicron survives over 21 hours on skin, more than 8 days on plastic

Astudy conducted by the researchers from the Kyoto Prefectural University of Medicine in Japan has now claimed that the Omiron variant of coronavirus can remain alive on skin and plastic more than the earlier variants of the virus like Alpha, Beta, Delta and Gamma. The study is yet to be peer-reviewed and has been posted recently on BioRxiv. According to the findings, Omicron can remain alive on the skin for over 21 hours and more than eight days on any plastic surface. This might be the reason why Omicron is spreading faster compared to other strains, the study said.

For the study, the researchers compared the survival time of the other variants and concluded that the Alpha, Beta, Gamma and Delta variants could remain alive on plastic surfaces for 56 hours, 191.3 hours, 156.6 hours, 59.3 hours, and 114 hours, respectively.



Omicron, on the other hand, can survive on a plastic surface for 193.5 hours, more than 8 days, reports Hindustan Times.

On skin samples, the average virus survival times were 8.6 hours for the original version, 19.6 hours for Alpha, 19.1 hours for Beta, 11 hours for Gamma, 16.8 hours for Delta and 21.1 hours for Omicron, the study claimed.

The findings also include the effectiveness of ethanol on all variants. Although Alpha, Beta, Delta, and Omicron variants showed a slight increase in ethanol resistance in response to increased environmental stability, all VOCs on the skin surface were completely inactivated by 15-second exposure to 35 per cent ethanol, it said, asserting that santisiting hands frequently is highly recommended.

Omicron is the latest variant of SARS-CoV-2, which was first identified in South Africa on November 24, 2021. Since then, the variant has been spreading at an unprecedented spread replacing Delta, and led to a fresh surge of the pandemic across the world.

Researchers find 2 paths to 'super immunity' against Covid-19, no correlation with age



There are two paths towards "super immunity" against coronavirus disease and both provide roughly equal levels of enhanced immune protection, according to a new study. Researchers at Oregon Health & Science University studied the quantity, quality and breadth of humoral immune response from and without natural infection in addition to vaccination against Covid-19. They found that the additional antigen exposure from Covid-19 substantially boosts immunity regardless of whether it occurs before or after vaccination

"It makes no difference whether you get infected and then vaccinated, or if you get vaccinated and then a breakthrough infection," said Fikadu Tafess, co-author of the study. "In either case, you will get a really, really robust immune response — amazingly high."

The Covid-19 vaccines approved by the World Health Organization significantly reduce overall mortality and severe illness from the infection. Several studies have shown that people with hybrid immunity – induced through vaccination after recovering from coronavirus infection

- have enhanced immune responses as compared with the vaccinated peers with no prior infection. But the effects of post-vaccination breakthrough infections on humoral immune response was yet to be determined, reports Kunal Gaurav of Hindustan Times.

The OHSU researchers measured neutralizing antibody responses from 104 vaccinated individuals, including those with breakthrough infections, hybrid immunity, and no infection history. The participants, vaccinated with the Pfizer Covid-19 vaccine, were divided into three groups: 42 with no infection, 31 who were vaccinated after an infection, and 31 who had breakthrough infections following vaccination.

"We find that human immune sera following breakthrough infection and vaccination following natural infection, broadly neutralize SARS-CoV-2 variants to a similar degree," the authors said in the study published in the journal Science Immunology.

While age negatively correlates with antibody response after vaccination alone, the researchers concluded that there was no correlation with age in breakthrough or hybrid immune groups.

Covid-19: 'Flurona' isn't real, people can get co-infection, say researchers

Some posts on social media talked about one such infection named 'flurona' in Israel, which the users said is a double infection of Covid-19 and influenza.

But healthcare experts have now dismissed this, saying it's not a different thing.

"The contractions like 'flurona,' I think they're very misleading to people. It presents the idea two viruses have somehow merged into one, which is not at all the case," Dr Ellen Foxman, an immunologist at the Yale School of Medicine, told NBC News. "Somebody got a co-infection, reports Amit Chaturvedi, Hindustan Times.

People get co-infections all the time."

Other researchers too agree with Dr Foxman. Dr Guy Boivin, a clinical virologist in Quebec, explained that co-infection can result in three outcomes: Little or no symptoms, severe illness due to virus attacks at the same time or one infection could block another.

According to reports, the first case



of 'flurona' was recorded late in December in a pregnant woman who was admitted to the Rabin Medical Centre in Petah Tikva to give birth. Israeli newspaper Yedioth Ahronoth reported that the young woman was not vaccinated.

At that time, Dr Nahla Abdel Wahab, a doctor at Cairo University Hospital, had told Israeli media that 'flurona' may indicate a major breakdown of the immunity system as two viruses are entering the human body at the same time.

Israel is administering a fourth vaccine shot against Covid-19 to indi-

viduals with a compromised immune system. It is mulling expanding the coverage to younger population as well.

Last week, the Indian SARS-CoV-2 Genomics Consortium (INSACOG) said that the Omicron variant is in the community transmission stage in India and has become dominant in multiple metros.

It also said BA.2 lineage, an infectious sub-variant of Omicron, has been found in a substantial fraction in the country.



The Education Code - A Reappraisal

Tho is responsible for education in Mauritius, the Director of Education or the Minister of Education and Institutions? It is clear on reading the Education Ordinance recently published that the Director wields powers he ought not to have under a ministerial system. For example, it is the Director who "shall determine the qualifications and conditions for admission to the Teachers' Training College". Only those primary schools will be entitled to grants in aid which will comply to conditions (enumerated in the Ordinance) to the "satisfaction of the Director".

It is again the Director of Education who shall determine who are qualified to teach in the secondary schools. Be it noted that in certain sections of the Ordinance we read of the Director empowered to do things "with the concurrence of the Minister"; we owe this addition to Hon. Chadien, who tabled a motion to that effect when the Bill was debated in Council on the 6th December. We all know that the grant of scholarships is a matter of great importance. Yet the Director of Education is given sole authority to decide on the schedule of studies of the scholarship examination as the following testifies: "Clause 22, section 3: The schedule of studies for each of the scholarship examinations mentioned in regulations 19 and 20 of these regulations shall be such as the Director shall from time to time approve." In these circumstances, what is the role of our Education Minister?

What is more strange is that the Education Ordinance leaves scope for a state within a state in the Education Department. We mean the Education Authorities governing aided primary and secondary schools. The Director cannot appoint in an aided school a teacher "unacceptable to the Education Authority concerned." Promotions also in aided primary schools shall be made by the Education Authorities when the aided primary school are run by grants-in-aid from the general revenues of the colony, why should government not exert more control upon them? And the teachers who receive the same training and do the same work as the teachers of government schools are subject to the whims of the Education Authority in so far as promotions and transfers are concerned. Favouritism and nepotism reign supreme. And the Education Ordinance makes provisions for their rule. For how long, we do not know. The expectations of thinking people that this archaic system would be swept away by the Education Ordinance have fallen flat.

Primary Scholarships

Many a time we have protested in the columns of the MT against the injustice inherent in our primary scholarship system. Other contributors have done so. The MT has consecrated many editorials to this question. But all to no purpose. The Education Ordinance does not provide anything to allow children of rural areas to attend scholarship classes which are the monopoly of some schools in towns. We advocated the creation of central schools in the country districts affording facilities to potential scholars in rural areas.



The Education Ordinance ought to have revised the whole system of the grant of junior scholarships and not leave the village pupil with great disadvantages while competing with his fellows in the town. This is a serious omission. This is sheer squandering of public money on children of well-to-do families who can well afford secondary and even university education for their sons and daughters. The use of French as a compulsory language in the 6th Standard and the Junior Scholarship examinations is another glaring injustice with regard to the child whose mother tongue is an Oriental language and who on his first day to a primary school does not know even Creole. Only seven years later such a child is given to answer a compulsory French paper just as the child of the French speaking parents. What injustices are not committed in this island in the name of French!

Teaching Medium

In clause 43 of the Education Ordinance, we read:

- "1. In the lower classes of Government and Aided Primary School up to and including Standard III, any one language may be employed as the medium of instruction, being a language which in the opinion of the Director is most suitable for the pupils". (italics ours)
- "2. In Standard IV, V and VI of the Government and Aided Primary schools the medium of instruction shall be English and conversation between teacher and pupils shall be carried on in English: provided that lessons in any other language taught in the school shall be carried on through the medium of that language."

On paper the above clause appears to be an excellent solution to the language problem, apart from the fact that the Director is vested with absolute authority to decide on a question of which he may be quite in the dark. The Education Ordinance has been put into force since the 28th of December. The classes for 1958 have been resumed. Has the Director given his opinion on the medium of instruction?

We are led to believe that the medium of instruction is still French in all the primary schools in the island. Is it the opinion of the Director that the Indo-Mauritian child, dwelling say at Creve Coeur or Petit Raffray, knows French enough for him to consider it as a medium of instruction? But the unfortunate child does not know a word of Creole in many instances. To him French is as foreign as English. If it is impracticable to make his mother tongue (Hindi, Urdu, Tamil, Telugu or Marathi) the medium of instruction, let him learn English right from Standard I. There are two strong reasons for doing so. The child will be better able to cope with the situation in Standard IV. V and VI when he will have to converse with his teacher in English. And it will be the furtherance of the objective of the Education Department to ensure "the more effective teaching of English and the spread of the English language in the Colony". As matters stand the child

on reaching Standard IV will be more conversant with French than with English. It will be a big handicap for him suddenly to switch over to English as a medium of instruction.

Oriental Language Schools

In Part I of the Education Ordinance, School means: "any assembly of not less than ten pupils for the purpose of receiving regular full-time or part-time instruction and includes vernacular schools and night schools." It follows that all baithkas and maktabs fall within the denomination of 'schools'. Many of these are in poor conditions. They have for years, in some cases for almost half a century, been the only places where rural children have been able to learn their mother tongue, be it Hindi, Tamil, Urdu or any other Oriental language. These schools are run thanks to the tireless and voluntary efforts of generous individuals or organizations — of people who take pride in their culture and their mother tongue. Language is the life-blood of a culture and yet Government has shown very little interest in the teaching of Oriental languages.

Now these schools are threatened to be closed "if the school premises constitute a dangerous building, or are structurally unsuitable to contain a school or are insufficiently protected against the risk of fire," and if "the qualifications and experiences of the proposed teachers are not adequate to ensure the efficient conduct of the school and if the proposed school premises or equipment will not allow of efficient tuition in the subjects to be taught in the school" (vide Education Ordinance Clause 10 and 11). The threat of closing these schools is no less than adding insult to injury.

The solution to the problem is not closing down the vernacular schools and night schools but to help them to develop on healthier lines. It is a policy of setting the clock back. The irony of it is that we have an Education Minister who happens to be an Indo-Mauritian and under whose guidance the revised Education Code has been enacted.

All people of Asiatic descent should strongly protest against the insertion of that clause in the revised Education Code.

However, our findings suggest otherwise. When we asked respondents to "imagine that a future prime minister has to choose between acting honestly and delivering the policy that most people want", 71% chose honesty and only 16% delivery. When we asked whether respondents agreed more that "healthy democracy requires that politicians always act within the rules" or that "healthy democracy means getting things done, even if that sometimes requires politicians to break the rules", 75% chose the former and just 6% the latter.

It is worth repeating that these findings come from the summer – before the Owen Paterson affair and "partygate". They are not knee-jerk reactions to short-term headlines. The vast majority of voters expect politicians to act honestly and follow the rules.

Limiting power at the very top

Another less obvious but equally important pattern emerged from our findings. Voters do not want power to be unduly concentrated in the hands of the prime minister and their government. Many favour at least somewhat greater powers for parliament – 45% think MPs should decide what the House of Commons debates, against 30% who think the prime minister or government should do so.

Even more clearly, and perhaps surprisingly, most want judges to constrain ministers too. We asked respondents to "imagine there is a dispute over whether the government has the legal authority to decide a particular matter on its own or whether it needs parliament's approval", and to consider how the dispute should be settled. Most (51%) said it should be settled by judges and only 27% chose government ministers or politicians in parliament. We also asked about whether judges should play a role in resolving whether a new law violates rights. Depending on the rights that we asked about, between 65% and 77% of respondents said that the courts should have their current powers under the Human Rights Act or even be given stronger powers to strike down laws directly.

A large majority also said that civil servants should be "neutral and permanent government employees" rather than "appointed by the government of the day". And most respondents thought that someone who had previously said the BBC should be neutral in its reporting could be a suitable candidate for BBC chair, but that someone who had said the BBC should be less critical of government could not.

The reason for these answers appears clear: most people don't trust politicians, and they trust the politicians closest to power least. They therefore welcome limits on what those in power can do.

Our study is investigating public attitudes to democracy not only through surveys, but also through a citizens' assembly, which shows whether people think the same or differently once they have thought and learnt about the issues in depth. We will publish full results of the Citizens' Assembly on Democracy in the UK in the spring. But initial findings fit the survey responses closely. Assembly members said "we feel dissatisfied with how democracy is working in the UK today because there is a lack of honesty and integrity in politics". By large majorities, they favoured greater powers for parliament and the courts vis-à-vis the exe-

However, the current ructions in the Conservative Party pan out in the coming weeks, those in power should be clear: people in the UK expect their leaders to act with integrity – and they expect a system of checks and balances on executive power to be maintained. A leader who violates these principles harms him or herself and damages confidence in democracy.



Which personality traits can be improved without personal motivation?

Could a company train an employee to become more conscientious, even if the worker isn't invested in improving that trait? A new study suggests yes. But improving someone's emotional stability without that person's commitment is not likely to happen, says Southern Methodist University psychology professor Nathan Hudson.

The goal of his recent research published in the 'Journal of Research in Personality' was to test two theories; that successful personality intervention may require that participants chose which traits they change, and that they be actively invested in changing the target traits.

He found that conscientiousness -- the ability to be responsible, hard-working and organized -- could be improved even if participants were not motivated to change. Completing a series of tasks over a regulated period was found to change habits and therefore improve conscientiousness.

But emotional stability was a different matter: Study participants only got better at handling difficult situations if



they chose to work on their emotional stability. Otherwise, tasks they were given over four weeks proved to be ineffective

"This provides promising evidence that schools, companies, or other organizations could ask people to make relatively minor changes that could help improve their lives by making them more organized and responsible over time," Hudson said. "In contrast, it appears that emotional stability might require a bit more investment from the people who partake in an intervention."

Hudson stressed that this research isn't about trying to control people.

"The idea of personality trait change - especially other people trying to change an individual's personality - can sound scary. But whether we recognize it or not, society is filled with interventions designed to try to change our personality traits," he said. "For instance, elementary school

is a giant intervention designed to help children become more intelligent, yes, but also kinder and more sociable, responsible and hardworking."

Previous research by Hudson and other psychologists has shown that people who actively worked to change aspects of their personality were, in many cases, successful in achieving the results they desired.

But before now, it wasn't clear if a person could have successful results if they didn't choose which personality trait they were looking to change and weren't invested in making that change.

Why is emotional stability different from conscientiousness?

Hudson suspects that the reason people must be motivated to change emotional stability is that this trait deals with negative emotions.

"For many people, it can be difficult to 'just stop feeling angry' or 'just stop being stressed," he said. "My hunch is that indirect strategies for changing someone's emotions, such as writing in a journal or thinking about positive things, can only really work when people want to use those techniques to change their emotions."

Conscientiousness, on the other hand, can be easily faked and increased over time through mechanical acts, like cleaning your room or using a calendar.

"Motivation is largely irrelevant to interventions targeting conscientiousness, as long as participants adhere to the intervention," Hudson said.

Prescribing the abortion pill without restrictions is safe and effective

Abortion remains safe after Canada removed restrictions on the medical abortion pill mifepristone in November 2017. That's one of the key findings from a UBC-led study published today in the 'New England Journal of Medicine'.

The study used comprehensive government health data to examine 315,000 abortions in Ontario between 2012 and 2020. An analysis showed no increase in abortion-related health complications following the removal of restrictions on Mifepristone, which is considered the "gold standard" drug for medical abortion globally.

"Complications were already very rare,

and we found that abortion continued to be safe and effective when Mifepristone was prescribed without restrictions," said Dr Laura Schummers, the study's lead author. "This is the strongest evidence yet that it is safe to provide the abortion pill like most other prescriptions -- meaning any doctor or nurse practitioner can prescribe, any pharmacist can dispense, and patients can take the pills if, when and where they choose."

Canada was the first country in the world to remove all supplemental restrictions on the dispensing and administration of Mifepristone.

The previous rules, which went into



place when the drug was first approved in July 2015, included a requirement that physicians observe patients taking the medication. Additionally, the drug could only be dispensed to patients by specially trained physicians who registered with the manufacturer, and not by pharmacists.

Many of the restrictions that Canada

removed are still mandated by countries around the world, including the U.S.

"Our study is a signal to other countries that restrictions are not necessary to ensure patient safety," says Professor Wendy Norman, the study's senior author and professor in UBC's department of family practice. "There is no scientific justification for Mifepristone restrictions, which only make it harder for people to access the care they need."

The findings revealed that the uptake of medical abortion -- those performed using medication, rather than surgically -- was rapid following the change in policy. Before Mifepristone became available, 2.2 per cent of abortions were provided using medication. That percentage rose to 31.4 per cent two years after the drug became available as a normal prescription.



what is the kids smallest animal ever?

Scientists have identified the world's smallest animal - for now. It could be possible smaller creatures exist that have not yet been discovered

The biggest animal in the world is easy to see, if you know where to look. Living in every ocean except the Arctic, the blue whale is the largest animal on Earth — weighing as much as 200 tons with a heartbeat that can be heard up to two miles away.

But the smallest animal in the world? Even if you knew where to look, could you see it? To track down the tiniest creature, scientists had to first decide what they were looking for and then, where they might find it. The first question – "What is an animal?" – is something that scientists have debated for centuries.

What is an animal?

In the language of science, an animal is an organism made of multiple cells. Cells are the building blocks of all living things – a human body, for example, is made up of trillions of cells. Some organisms, like bacteria, are made of just one cell. They are not considered animals.

The simplest single-celled creatures – including bacteria – are called prokaryotes. They don't contain a nucleus, the feature that acts like the main control center for a cell. More complex cells have an enclosed nucleus. They

are called eukaryotes. Anything from an earthworm to a zebra or you are all eukaryotes and all are considered animals.

If it can't be seen, does that count?

Based on this definition, an animal can be something so small that it's not possible to see without a microscope. This is definitely not something that you would probably call an "animal." A recent discovery is an organism that is invisible to the eye, a parasitic jellyfish called Myxozoa. They are very small and reaching barely 20 micrometers. Stretched out end to end, it would take more than 1,000 of these creatures to equal 1 inch.

Probably the smallest of these parasitic jellyfish is Myxobolus shekel, which is no more than 8.5 micrometers when fully grown.

This species was described in 2011, so is pretty new. So is



the decision that Myxozoa are related to jellyfish, which scientists agreed on in 2015. The discovery of these types of jellyfish occur once in a while, so it is possible that a new and even smaller animal will be discovered in the future.

The process of elimination

Let's assume that you're looking for the smallest "animal" that is visible to the human eye. Some invertebrates, or animals without a backbone, and

other smaller organisms are not visible to the human eye. What is left are vertebrates, animals with backbones that include mammals such as a dog, a whale or you, reptiles such as snakes or crocodiles, birds, fishes and amphibians. Most amphibians, like frogs, are born in water and breathe with gills until they mature, when they develop lungs and an ability to live on land.

In this group of animals, it is the amphibians that win the prize for the smallest animal known, for the moment.

Scientists traveled to New Guinea, the second largest island in the world, to study the the island's wildlife. This is where they found the smallest known type of frog called Paedophryne amauensis. The body length of an average adult is reported at less than 8 mm, about the size of a pea. When it was discovered in 2009, it was immediately awarded the title of "world's smallest vertebrate."

My uncle ran the airforce canteen in Cotton Green and his partner, yes, you guessed it, was Mr Canteenwala. They had this fantastic cook, Mr Bhaiiwala.

Their mild and meek manager, Mr Jeejeebhoy, nod-ded his head and agreed with everything everybody said.

My grandfather was the Sheriff of Bombay. I think he was the first and only Parsi to hold this position. Being Sheriff, it was only natural that he had Mr Bandookwala and Mr Golimarwala as his constant companions.

Grandfather had many Parsi friends who were in politics. There was this squeaky clean khadi-clad Mr Ghandy, and the not so clean, Mr Kalaghandy — who was invariably being hounded by Mr Kotwal. But, he never left home without his friends, Mr Barrister, Mr Vakil, Mr Lawyer and their *munshi*, Mr Mehanty.


My grandfather built Hotel Waldorf on Arthur Bunder Road in Colaba. So, for this, he naturally used the services of Mr Contractor and Mr Mistry. Yet...he never went to the conservative moneylenders when short of money, but borrowed it from his Parsi friend, Mr Readymoney.

Our neighbour and family physician was Dr Adi Doctor — he was only half a doctor. He lived with his inlaws Mr and Mrs Pochkhanawala. My sister swears they ate only poached eggs for breakfast.

I remember going to Dr Doctor's sister's wedding. She married one Mr Screwala. What he did for a living, I do not know to this day.

Get your priorities right







Au vu du nombre d'arrestations des passeurs et trafiquants dont les noms sont étalés dans la presse, qu'est-ce qui entraverait donc la remontée vers la source de tout un trafic ?

La nouvelle vague

A l'instar de tout autre secteur lucratif, celui qui envoie les consommateurs dans les bras de Morphée est doté d'une capacité d'innovation et de restructuration qui n'a rien à envier aux autres. On était habitué aux cargaisons cachées sous d'autres marchandises dans le commerce maritime, aux petits emballages dans la doublure des valises à l'aéroport, d'autres qui ressortent par voie anale des passagers, et encore plus astucieux, quand la voie vaginale s'offre comme transit presque sûr de jouissance...

On n'arrête pas le progrès. La gente féminine se prête volontiers au jeu de cache-cache piloté par le mâle. La libération de la femme version #Metoo a des beaux jours devant elle. Pour peu qu'elle se lance dans un discours victimaire, on aura tout vu ! Cover-up parfait, employée normale sans histoire acceptant d'héberger sous son toit les colis suspects. « Pas de vague ainsi », croyait le petit ami. Et encore mieux, innocence virginale (?) d'une ado de quinze ans, dont la candeur ne surprend pas, qui se plie à la volonté de son prince du cœur en s'offrant comme couverture immaculée. L'honneur de la gente féminine (on ne peut dire 'femelle' au risque de s'attirer la foudre des détenteurs de la bien-pensance chez les Amazones libérées et les alliés mâles parmi les plumitifs) est sauvé par l'intervention sans concession d'une grandmère qui a lâché le morceau illico presto chez les gabelous du quartier.

Autre nouveauté : à force de regarder les films américains, les jeunes suspects réclament maintenant le droit au silence en l'absence de leur avocat. Bien joué. Forte est la tentation de surfer allègrement sur une vague où on se laisse glisser sans entrave, où il n'est pas question

de s'arrêter en si bon chemin. Pensez donc! Vous pouvez vivre sans grand effort sauf celui de récupérer le colis du bonheur, et de dépenser sans scrupules. L'argent facile, le quick buck, et la vie facile... Voiture neuve, rave party, et - au diable ! ces adolescents défoncés en bordure des routes. Avec la réouverture du tourisme, certains font la manche en plein jour auprès des touristes dans les rues de Grand Baie. Phénomène nouveau, les automobilistes sont sollicités par les jeunes en état de manque à l'arrêt des feux. La police intervient, paraît-il; il n'est pas question de ternir l'image du paradis réouvert aux visiteurs venus des pays riches. Tant mieux!



Le maillon faible

Que se passe-t-il quand les habitants sont au courant d'un trafic de drogue bien huilé qui n'a souffert ni d'usure ni de rouille depuis 25 ans, c'est-à-dire, un quart de siècle dans le quartier d'une ville ou dans un village ? Surtout le vôtre. Comment arrive-t-on à une situation qui renforce l'impunité des marchands de la mort ?

Selon les soupçons et les dires, toute la chaîne de commanditaires, passeurs, forces de l'ordre, certains hommes de loi (voire hommes de foi prêchant la bonne parole dans les prisons), pourrait être gangrenée par la tentation forte de l'argent facile.

Parfois, c'est le travail des forces de l'ordre qui est entravé par les ordres venant d'en-haut pour épargner les coupables. Dans d'autres cas, certains se rendent complices du crime en acceptant quelques centaines de milliers de roupies des commanditaires des réseaux. Ce grand désordre est amplifié par l'entrée

dans la danse de certains hommes de loi, comme l'a souligné le dernier rapport sur le trafic de drogue, dans ce fléau criminel si dévastateur.

L'île, étant un grand village, tout le monde raconte ce qu'il sait à quiconque veut écouter. Ce qu'on appelle des exemples concrets, surtout dans votre quartier où certains se sont livrés sans être inquiétés à ce commerce lucratif sous l'apparence de commerce florissant affiché par le nombre de quincailleries, boutiques de vêtements, boulangeries, snacks, etc... Train de vie suspect, voiture de sport à un million pour le fils de 20 ans, plusieurs achats de terrains et de maisons, ouverture de commerce çà et là pour ne citer que quelques exemples.

La faiblesse de ces veinards, c'est que fiers de leur intouchabilité, du pouvoir financier, les contrats juteux octroyés par leur protecteur, ils s'en vantent auprès des autres. Difficile de se taire lorsque la chance vous sourit depuis des lustres.

Solution

Faut-il tout laisser aux mains des autorités concernées ? Manifestement non. Il s'agit des vies gâchées de milliers de jeunes gens, d'une économie parallèle illicite, de meurtre de pères et mères et d'autres règlements de compte. Quand des cas n'aboutissent à rien et qu'une certaine opacité et un silence des médias nourrissent un sentiment d'impuissance dans la population, les habitants gagneraient à se mobiliser dans un 'Drug Watch' dans chaque région pour collecter les données et les dossiers de chaque cas, et réclamer des comptes aux gouvernants. Ceci afin que toute la chaîne des fournisseurs jusqu'au revendeurs et autres complices soit tenue à s'expliquer sur l'échec de certains cas, et que toute corruption soit dévoilée au grand public.

La délation étant une vilaine affaire, il faudrait envisager un autre mode de coopération du public avec les autorités pour une meilleure efficacité dans le combat contre les architectes du paradis virtuel.
