2019 Elections Reopening the Pandora's Box

t would seem that Xavier Duval has reopened the Pandora's box as regards the conduct and organisation of the 2019 elections by the Electoral Commission (EC) with his assertion pertaining to the alleged use of the Social Media Analytics Cloud (SMAC) software by the EC for the last elections - a software that would allow for the profiling of electors. This has been denied by the Electoral Commissioner Irfan Rahman in a press communique, stating that the Leader of the Opposition would be making "misleading claims". "The indisputable facts are as follows: No such software has been acquired, nor is it used by the Office of the Electoral Commissioner or the Electoral Supervisory Commission in connection with the voter database," he said. Not to be so easily dismissed, Xavier Duval responded to the EC's denial by referring to the State Informatics Ltd's communique, as published on its website, indicating its successful completion of the EC's project "to upgrade its software application using the latest technology that can support SMAC".

After the discrepancies noted in the Recapitulation of Votes forms with respect to the election in Constituency No. 19, revealed two years after the last elections by the EC itself (that is, on 13 January 2022 when the electoral petition case lodged on 28 November 2019 by unreturned candidate Jenny Adebiro came up for hearing), the opacity surrounding the operation of Computer Rooms at Counting Centres, the alleged use of social media analytics is a matter of serious concern. The literature relating to social media analytics informs us that the use that's made of it is drawn from its 'ability to gather and find meaning in data gathered from social channels to support business decisions'. That's not all, since in 2018, a popular social networking site came under heavy fire from US regulators after it was found that a third-party vendor had collected data of users illegally and which was then used to influence the outcome of the US 2016 presidential elections. The attraction in social analytics is said to be its ability to 'simplify data from dozens of networks, millions of people and a variety of activities' giving a far deeper understanding of user behaviour and demographic data than Google Analytics ever could.

Unless the Electoral Commissioner were to come forward with the confirmation that no such social analytics software has been acquired nor been made use of in the last elections, in response to Xavier Duval's reference to the State Informatics Ltd's website communique, one would be perfectly entitled to ask whether the Commission which, under the Constitution, has 'general responsibility for and shall supervise, the registration of electors... and the conduct of elections' would be acting in conformity with its mandate if it were to be carrying out the profiling of electors, and if so for whose benefit?

In a detailed analysis of the impact of social media data on elections, Prashanth Ramesh & Ashwin Srinivas of Latent View, involved in business analytics and data engineering, speak of the crucial role that social media plays in today's politics: 'As users increasingly turn to social media to voice their opinions about social issues and share news and other information with their peers, they generate immense amounts of information. If analyzed intelligently, this information can provide a wealth of data about the pulse and preferences of voters.

'One of the methods to accomplish this is through psychographic studies. Data obtained from the news feed, timelines, and messages can also aid in profiling individuals based on their nature. This information can help in micro-targeting advertisements to narrow constituencies during the electoral campaign. This data may, for instance, allow for early detection of emerging issues and trends in populations of interest, which could be of considerable value. Political strategists segregate and tag people (individual or a community) based on their psychographics for better performance of their campaigns.'

Moreover, expertise in digital campaigning and even manipulation of social media content is already being made use of in some African countries, points out Martin N Ndlela, Professor of Communication, Inland Norway University of Applied Sciences. International consultancy firms like the now defunct Cambridge Analytica (CA) came into prominence by stage-managing Donald Trump's shock win in 2016 but even before they helped Mr Trump, the company was active in Kenya, using the work it says it did during the 2013 elections, then again for the 2017 elections as one of its case studies. CA hints that it would have been busy elsewhere in Africa, notably South Africa and Nigeria.

The EC's swift denial communique has not only earned it egg on its face, but more worryingly, raises a number of questions about who and under what conditions would SMAC be used for. In Kenya, "using scaremongering tactics to win votes ahead of the August 2017 elections," or propagating fake videos about key opposition figures that would go viral were part of the game, said Rebekka Rumpel, research assistant for the Africa program at think tank Chatham House.

This is indeed pretty serious. Will the authorities come clean on the matter?

resh revelations in the partygate affair have many asking why Boris Johnson feels no need to resign. The full version of the report by civil servant Sue Gray into gatherings at Downing Street during pandemic lockdowns included multiple images of the prime minister raising a glass near a table littered with wine bottles. He had previously insisted in the House of Commons that no rules were broken on this date.

Whether or not the photos depict Johnson enjoying a party is now a central question in the debate over whether he should resign for breaching the ministerial code.

Has Boris Johnson broken the ministerial code?

The ministerial code is a set of rules which government ministers are expected to abide by during their time in office.

The code includes a duty for ministers to abide by the law. This is set out in paragraph 1.3, which details "the overarching duty on ministers to comply with the law and to protect the integrity of public life".

The code also specifies that ministers must abide by a document published in 1995 called the Seven Principles of Public Life – which is also reproduced in full in the annex of the code. These principles are selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership.

We already know that Johnson was fined by police for attending a party in Downing Street on June 19 2020. The fine is an acknowledgement by the Metropolitan Police that they consider the prime minister to have broken COVID laws. That raises an obvious question: if the prime minister has broken the law, then hasn't he broken the ministerial code too? The answer, unfortunately, when it comes to matters of the British constitution, is that it is never that simple.

Before assessing the facts of the case against the prime minister, it's important to understand, in this situation, that the ministerial code is not a legal document. It reflects constitutional rules and conventions rather than laws.

he government appears trapped in its contrived narratives. It seems blind to the tremendous hardships and increasing difficulties faced by the people to make ends meet in a context of continuously escalating food prices and basic existential needs and the sustained erosion of their purchasing power fuelled by the unchecked depreciation of the Rupee. People are fully aware through international news channels and social media that citizens across the world, including those in developed countries are also enduring similar distress owing to the surging prices of food and energy in the wake of the war in Ukraine and the sanctions imposed.

Against such a grim backdrop, people expect government to take bold and decisive actions to alleviate their current distress. Instead, government rhetoric is trying to justify the slapping of four successive hikes of mogas and gasoline prices at the maximum allowable rate of 10% in the space of some 5 months by cock and bull narratives. The price of mogas thus increased from Rs 50.70 per litre on 28 December 2021 to Rs 74.10 per litre on 19 May 2022 representing a cumulative price increase of 46%. Repeatedly parroting the narrative that fuel prices are surging across the world and that the latest increases of local fuel prices are still lower than in a selected number of countries to mask the specificity of the gasoil and mogas pricing system in the country in press conferences, ministerial declarations at every opportunity does not make it right in the larger context of the financial distress of households.

Narrative versus reality

The crying reality is that there is a Rs 34 difference between the CIF price of Mogas of some Rs 39 per litre and the latest gas station price of Rs 74.10 per litre announced last week made up of various contributions and subsidies and VAT, etc. Despite the government's claim, the majority of commuters, including some 225,000 owners of motorcycles and autocycles comprising field and factory workers and self-employed service providers are not reimbursed their fuel costs. The increases also affect the cost of energy in manufactures and industries.

In the context of the continuously rising cost of living, would it not have been in order to provide relief to citizens and industries by waiving the imposition of contributions which are not related to the price of fuel and which artificially inflate the price of mogas and gasoil until the situation comes back to normal, the more so as there seems to be no end to the war in Ukraine?

Windfall gains

In contrast, food and energy companies have seen their profits surge exponentially. According to an Oxfam brief 'Profiting from pain' released this week in the context of the Davos World Economic Forum, the Covid-19 pandemic compounded by the steep increases in food, basic necessities and energy prices due to the war in Ukraine and the related sanctions imposed have generated a surge in the fortunes of billionaires as companies in the food, pharma, energy, and tech sectors have cashed in whilst millions of people around the world are facing a global cost-of-living crisis.

The richest 10 men have more wealth than the poorest 40% of humanity combined. 'Inequality, already acute before Covid-19, has risen to unprecedented heights since the start of the pandemic. The rapidly rising prices of food and energy, which hit the incomes of the poorest hardest, are set to drive up global inequality still further. There is an urgent need for governments to implement highly progressive taxation measures that in turn must be used to invest in powerful and proven measures to reduce inequalities.

'Global food prices have spiralled by 33.6% in the past year and are expected to increase by 23% in 2022.' Oxfam estimates that 263 million people could be pushed into extreme levels of poverty this year because of Covid-19, rising global inequality, and soaring food prices rises due to the war in Ukraine and the related sanctions.

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IMF proposals

The UN has warned last week that the world is facing the risk of a global food crisis owing to the adverse impact of the prolonged war in Ukraine and the sanctions imposed. Alive to the dire consequences of rising food and energy prices on households, Kristalina Georgieva, the head of the IMF proposed this week that governments should subsidise food and energy as people around the world are struggling with the rising cost of living. She added that support measures and subsidies have to be preferably provided directly to people. Is government not tuned to these sensible proposals to alleviate the hardships of households?

In a bid to safeguard their food security many countries across the world are banning exports of wheat, other grains, edible oils and chicken which would trigger scarcity and cause food prices to soar further. War in Ukraine, climate change and inflation are already taking their toll all over the world.

To crown it all, the US, the EU and NATO countries continue to support the Ukraine war effort with tens of billions of dollars of advanced weaponry which are bound to prolong the war instead of ending it through a peace deal. From Strategic Ambiguity to Strategic Confusion?

It is time for the US to take the lead and influence President Xi and the CCP to act like adults and understand that peaceful trade is far more productive than a military takeover

President Biden's remarks during a joint news conference with Prime Minister Kishida in Japan about whether the US would intervene militarily if China invaded Taiwan, have drawn the ire of the Chinese Communist Party and prompted much speculation about whether Biden's statements were calculated or a gaffe by an aging politician.

To get some perspective, we might start with a transcript of Biden's remarks at the press conference. (N.B. This is my transcription of what I heard on the video). The relevant portion:

Reporter: Are you willing to get involved militarily to defend Taiwan if it comes to that?

Biden: Yes.

Reporter: You are?

Biden: That's the commitment we made. That's the commitment we made... We agree with the One China policy... But the idea that it can be taken by force is just not appropriate. It would dislocate the entire region and be another action similar to what happened in Ukraine, so it's a burden that is even stronger.

This doesn't sound to me like a gaffe. Rather, it seems more an attempt to rethink Biden's mistaken equivocal responses about Ukraine. It seems to evince a desire not to repeat what could only have been a message to Russia that it would face no military opposition from NATO and the US if it invaded Ukraine. In fact, President Biden explicitly said as much when he equated a potential Chinese invasion of Taiwan to Putin's invasion of Ukraine and noted that the burden (on the US) is even stronger. In a previous comment, I explained my view that Biden blinked when it came to Ukraine and that his equivocating has brought us to where we are. Clearly, his comments in Tokyo were a forceful attempt to forestall a Chinese invasion of Taiwan. Or at least an attempt to forestall Chinese adventurism along the lines of Putin'sUkraine invasion.

The problem is that White House and the US diplomacy and defense establishment bureaucracies sprang into action almost immediately to explain away Biden's remarks. And at the same time, the Chinese Communist Party's apparatchiks sprang into their chorus of petulant juvenile laments. It was almost a foregone conclusion that some Chinese official would declare that Taiwan is strictly an "internal affair" as far as China is concerned and that China would not compromise on its sovereignty or territorial integrity. Spare me, the childish antics. And, if we take a closer look at the American bureaucrats' "explanations" we see that they really did not detract from Biden's basic message.

Let us first understand what the One China policy is and what strategic ambiguity means. The One China doctrine or policy (depending on which side you are on) dates to the end of the Chinese civil war when the victorious Communist Party declared that the mainland was the People's Republic of China. Meanwhile, the defeated Kuomintang (KMT) relocated to Formosa or Taiwan and pretended to still rule China. The Communist Party not only rejected the KMT's claim to be the legitimate ruler of China but also claimed that Taiwan was an integral part of China and that they would use force if Taiwan ever threatened to formalize its break with the mainland by declaring independence.

Of course, China was in no position to invade Taiwan and take it over by force. And so, the status quo remains that Taiwan, an independent nation in all but recognition by the CCP, has lived with the Sword of Damocles hanging over it.

To make a long story short and perhaps to oversimplify matters, when the US sought to establish diplomatic relations with China, it essentially agreed to recognize China's claim that that there is only one China and to break diplomatic relations with Taiwan. Of course, the US found a way to maintain informal relations with Taiwan. The US also passed the Taiwan Relations Act under which it guaranteed support to Taiwan to defend itself. So far, this has meant arms sale, training and joint military exercises, but not necessarily direct military involvement in case of an attack by China.

The US recognizes the People's Republic of China as the only legitimate government of mainland China and acknowledges, but does not agree with, China's claim that Taiwan is an integral part of China.

When it comes to defense of Taiwan, the US has maintained what has come to be known as "strategic ambiguity" about whether it would come to Taiwan's assistance if China attacked the island. Let us be realistic about this. From 1949 when the KMT retreated to Taipei until perhaps 2010, China was not about to invade Taiwan especially if the US came to Taiwan's aid. Since

then, China's military prowess has been growing. There are still some who question whether China has the capability to mount a successful amphibious invasion of the island. And there is talk by Taiwanese diplomats about the need to emulate some of the asymmetric warfare strategies that the Ukrainians have successfully used. But it does seem inevitable that in the next 10-20 years, China will likely have the capability to invade Taiwan.

Taiwan's Foreign Ministry thanked Biden for reaffirming US support for the island if Beijing invaded.

However, China's Foreign Ministry expressed "strong dissatisfaction and firm opposition." Then there were the obligatory remarks that China has no room for compromise or concessions relating to matters of sovereignty and territorial integrity. In a petulant addendum, the spokesperson declared: "No one should underestimate the strong determination, firm will, and strong ability of the Chinese people to defend national sovereignty and territorial integrity, and do not stand against the 1.4 billion Chinese people." Of course, the CCP probably does not speak for 1.4 billion Chinese people but that is another matter.

The apparent purpose of the doctrine of strategic ambiguity has been to dissuade the CCP from attacking Taiwan while keeping Taiwan from taking US support for granted and provoking China by declaring independence.

A White House official quickly said that Biden's comments did not reflect a policy shift away from the One China policy. But this is meaningless. The US has surely never reconsidered the idea that there is only one China.

It is time to recognize that there is one China but also one Taiwan. Surely, the adult response is for the US to convince Taiwan to agree that it no longer has any claim to the Chinese mainland.

Registration of Voters

"If there is nothing mysterious or untoward about the use of the Social Media Analytics Cloud by the Electoral Commission for the 2019 elections,

why should the Electoral Commissioner deny it...?"

he Electoral Commissioner's Office is proceeding apace with its canvassing of electors in what must be the most antiquated method available, that is door to door checking of inhabitants at a fixed period in time. There have been numerous allegations that the 2019 exercise have either deprived some 7% of voters of their legitimate rights or, worse still, an unaccounted for 45,000 voters were ditched out of the register instead of 9,900 previously. We have failed to hear from the EC any plausible let alone convincing explanations regarding those serious failings or the controversial use of computer rooms during the 2019 counting process. Lex weighs in.

* According to the Section 4(2) of the Representation of the People Act 1958, only those persons having reached the age of 18 on 15 August in that year, and Commonwealth citizens (having resided in Mauritius for at least two years) are qualified to be registered as electors and to vote. That's for qualification for registration as voters, but does the law make it an obligation for citizens, qualified by virtue of age, to get themselves registered as electors, and if so what would be the penalty for failure to do so?

There is nothing in the law that makes it an obligation on a citizen of 18 years or more to register as an elector. Just as there is no law that makes voting compulsory at an election.

* The tedious registration of electors process as prescribed by the Representation of the People Act 1958 may need to be revamped with the input of latest technology. There have also been calls expressed on the need to introduce a rolling register of voters so as to avoid excluding voters. That should not be a big deal in a small country like Mauritius as compared to what obtains in India where hundreds of millions of Indian citizens are duly registered by the Electoral Commission of India, isn't it?

We cannot compare Mauritius with India. However, the system certainly needs to be revamped as it is an archaic system with shades of the colonial era. It is ridiculous to have public officers go from house to house to register electors or to confirm that their names appear on the electoral list. If the public officer does not meet with the people who had previously been registered as electors, what happens? Does this mean that the name of an elector which is already on the list is then simply blotted out?

* The Representation of the People Act came into force in 1958, much earlier than the National Identity Act, which came into operation in 1985, and which requires Mauritian citizen having attained the age of 18 to apply for the Mauritius National ID Card within a grace period of six months. In 2019, the Electoral Commission should have had access to the Mauritius National ID Card's database to countercheck and correct any discrepancy in its Electors' List allowing for reasons of deaths, emigration, etc. That should be possible, isn't it?

Many things are possible, it only requires the will to get things properly implemented. The Electoral Commission and the Electoral Commissioner should formulate proposals that are commensurate with modern-day technology. Remember how they were quick to introduce the controversial computer rooms in the 2019 elections. Both the Electoral Commission and the Electoral Commissioner should be constantly on the alert and come up with new ideas to reinforce the democratic process.

* Checking if one is indeed registered to vote at the next elections should be a rather straightforward matter. Is that indeed the case as things stand today?

It should be, but it does not appear to be so. What happened during the 2019 elections is an eye-opener: numerous

people who genuinely believed they were on the electoral list were sent back from the voting centres because their names did not appear on the electors' list. What this amounts to is that they were effectively forfeited the right to vote due to the bureaucratic failings of the Electoral Commission.

Should we therefore expect people to leave their place of work or residence and go check with the Electoral Commission until the eve of elections to ensure that their names remain on the electors' list? What if their names are not there despite the fact that they had voted in previous elections? Will the Electoral Commission come forward with remedial measures in such cases to ensure that these people may exercise their right to vote?

* There have indeed been reports about so many people having learnt to their dismay on election day in 2019 that their names did not appear on the list of registered voters. According to Leader of Opposition Xavier Duval, 6800 qualified voters registered their protests for that reason. How could that be possible when so many of these same people had been able to cast their votes in previous elections?

The answer is simple. Something is terribly rotten in the State of Denmark.

The custodians of the electors' lists have been incapable to provide us with clear rational answers. Were the names omitted deliberately to favour one particular party/alliance? We do not know. Were the names omitted through an administrative error? We do not know. Until we get straightforward answers from the custo-dians of the lists, the suspicion of impropriety will persist.

* Xavier Duval referred to figures available in 'Statistics Mauritius & Electoral Commission's Office, which indicate that 45,412 gualified voters were left out from the 2019 elections, as against 9900 in the 2014 elections. That makes around 4.6% from the total number of citizens, potentially voters, having attained the age of 18. That's pretty serious... since a shift of only 5% in the electoral voting pattern with or without the Bangladeshis' votes - might have changed the electoral outcome. Shouldn't that have called for an investigation into that huge discrepancy?

Right from day one there has been a call for a thorough investigation. What has been the result? Nothing has happened. The fact that nothing has happened may mean a lot of things...

Surging commodity prices, disrupted supply chains, and unprecedented trade and financial sanctions will all weigh on growth and push inflation higher in the nearterm. Central bank interest hikes could push parts of the global economy into recession.

Against such a forbidding backdrop, the government is at pains to justify its inaction. Is it alive to these potent risks weighing on the socio-economic outlook? Instead of repeatedly rehashing past social and other assistance schemes implemented during the Covid-19 pandemic, people want government to competently address and resolve their current existential hardships and difficulties.

This is also not the time for commercial partners, supermarket companies and retailers to reap windfall gains and cash in on escalating prices of food and existential needs at the expense of consumers but for unequivocal solidarity to help consumers tide over the crisis. Can government ensure that this is so? Otherwise, consumption will be dented. There must also be competent and robust currency stabilizing measures to protect consumers, a more rigorous price control by the authorities as well as a reduction of fuel prices through a review of the fuel pricing system, as suggested above. Beyond the rhetoric and given the extensive availability of land. it is also high time to make food security in the country become a reality.

Above all, this is not time for culpable inaction.

* In fact, in November 2019, 838 foreign nationals residing in Mauritius - 523 Indians, 68 South Africans, 36 Pakistanis, 67 Britons and 45 Bangladeshis - registered in our electoral lists might have cast their votes in the then general elections, and possibly helped produce an electoral outcome that would not affect them directly. Is that acceptable?

The outcome did not depend only on the foreigners' votes. But it is a shameful aberration to allow foreigners many of whom do not know anything about the stakes involved to vote in our elections. * Allegations have recently been made about the use of Social Media Analytics Cloud (SMAC) software by the Electoral Commission (EC) for the 2019 elections that would allow for the profiling of electors. This has been denied by the Electoral Commissioner, but this has been followed up by Xavier Duval who referred to the State Informatics Ltd's communique, as published on its website, indicating its successful completion of the EC's project "to upgrade its software application using the latest technology that can support SMAC". Is that perfectly in order in light of the Representation of the People Act 1958?

Computers were introduced at the last elections without any legal text that provided for them at an election. But the Supreme Court found this normal in two cases. The Electoral Commissioner stated that he introduced computers as an administrative measure.

It would appear that the Electoral Commission has become a law unto itself, such that it feels authorized to implement any administrative decisions for the purposes of elections and registration of voters. performing its task as purveyor of information and public watchdog in democratic societies.'

It should be remembered that some 10 years ago, the extradition of Gary McKinnon, a computer hacker who managed to break into the computer systems of NASA and the US defence department in search of information about UFOs and left behind some mildly rude messages about the systems sloppy security, was halted by Theresa May, the Home Secretary at the time.

freedom of speech and opinion and whistle blowers who driven by a high sense of probity expose scandals, covert dealings and actions against the public interest at their own risk and peril.

It is probably in reaction to this abject reality and growing public outcry that the Disinformation Governance Board set up three weeks ago by the White House and the Department of Homeland Security labelled 'Ministry of Truth' (from George Orwell's book 1984) by critics has been unceremoniously shut down.

The world is keenly awaiting the decision on Assange as it would determine whether democracy is strengthened rather than insidiously undermined.

As Imran Khan's Azadi march started on Wednesday, clashes between party workers and cops broke out at several places in Punjab, Karachi and Lahore, reports Hindustan Times

Before the march entered Islamabad, the army was called in to protect the Red Zone of the city consisting of important structures like the Supreme Court, Prime Minister's residence, etc., from what Imran Khan wanted to be a 'peaceful protest'. Islamabad was sealed off to not allow the entry of the march and police shelled tear gas as Islamabad turned into a battleground on Thursday.

Pakistan's Geo News claimed PTI supporters attacked its office injuring some journalists.

Imran Khan reached Islamabad and addressed the march where he said the government would be happy if he stages a sit-in as that would lead to more clashes between his partymen and the police. "I had decided that I will sit here until the government dissolves assemblies and announces elections, but of what I have seen in the past 24 hours, they (govt) are taking the nation towards anarchy." The PTI chairman also claimed that five protesters from his party were killed in clashes.

"The PLA Eastern Theater Command recently organised multiple military services and branches to conduct a joint alert patrol and realistic combat exercises in and above the waters around the island of Taiwan," Senior Colonel Shi Yi, a spokesperson of the Eastern Theatre Command, said in a press release on Wednesday.

"This is a stern warning to the recent collusive activities by the US and Taiwan

Separately, Chinese defence ministry spokesperson, Senior Colonel Tan Kefei, said, "The PLA is all set to await the order for battle, and will take all necessary measures to resolutely thwart interference by external forces and 'Taiwan independence' forces' secession attempts".

The announcement of the drill comes a day after China and Russia sent air force bombers over the seas in northeast Asia coinciding with the in-person Tokyo summit of the leaders of the Quad countries India, the US, Australia and Japan, It was Beijing's and Moscow's first joint military exercise since Russia's invasion of Ukraine on February 24.

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Zelensky says war getting worse as 'Russia going all in'

Russian troops advanced in eastern Ukraine on Tuesday, pounding key cities and aiming "to destroy everything there," President Volodymyr Zelensky said, as Moscow signalled it was digging in for a long war against its neighbour. Heavy fighting, meanwhile, was reported in the Donbas, the eastern industrial heartland that Moscow's forces are intent on seizing. "The situation is very difficult and unfortunately it is only getting worse. It is getting worse with every day and even with every hour," SergiyGaidai, governor of the eastern region of Lugansk, said on Tuesday as Russian forces were bombarding the industrial city.

More than six million people have fled Ukraine and eight million have been internally displaced since the war broke out, according to the United Nations, reports Hindustan Times.

Here are latest developments in Russia-Ukraine war

1. The Ukrainian military said on Tuesday that Russian troops had fired at Ukrainian border guards in the northeastern Sumy region in the latest of a series of alleged cross-border attacks over the past few weeks. "Seven shots from Russian territory," the official said.

2. Meanwhile, Russian shelling con-

tinued around Ukraine's second-largest city of Kharkiv Tuesday, even after Russian troops withdrew from its surroundings last week.

3. In the port-city of Mariupol, workers digging through the rubble of an apartment building found 200 bodies in the basement, Ukrainian authorities said Tuesday as per news agency AP. The city - home to 400,000 people before Russia's invasion - has seen some of the worst suffering of the 3-month-old war.

4. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky in his video address on Tuesday night said that Russia is using everything at its disposal in the fight for four cities in the eastern Donbas region. "The situation in the Donbas now is very difficult," Zelensky said yesterday. "Practically the full might of the Russian army, whatever they have left, is being thrown at the offensive there. The occupiers want to destroy everything there."

5. The Ukrainian president renewed his appeal for even more weapons from the West to keep Ukraine in the fight including multiple-rocket launchers and tanks. The Ukrainian army is fighting back, but "it will take time and a lot more effort by our people to overcome their advantage in the amount of equipment and weapons," he said last night.

6. The European Union will allow Ukraine to export grain through EU ports to help avert a global food crisis, Commission President Ursula von der Leyen said. The EU was also "financing different modes of transportation so that Ukraine's grain can reach the most vulnerable countries in the world."

7. Meanwhile, in a bid to recover from the economic crisis, the Russian parliament approved a bill on Tuesday that would allow the government to appoint new management of foreign companies that pulled out of Russia after its invasion of Ukraine. Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said the new law made it even more imperative for foreign companies remaining in Russia to leave. "It's the last chance to save not only your reputation but your property," he said in a statement.

War in Ukraine may trigger global recession, says World Bank chief

Russia's war on Ukraine Rcould trigger a global recession because of the impact on food, energy and fertiliser prices, with developing nations among the worst affected World Bank president David Malpass said Wednesday. He said that while Ukraine and Russia would likely see significant contractions, Europe, and the United States were seeing slower growth. On China he said the relatively sharp slowdown was due to Covid, inflation and a pre-existing real estate crisis.

"As we look at global GDP... it's hard right now to see how we avoid a recession. The idea of energy prices doubling is enough to trigger a recession by itself," he was quoted by Reuters. He did not give details on when it might begin.

The World Bank chief's warnings are one of several about increased global risks, driven most recently by the war in Ukraine but also fuelled by a Covid-19 pandemic and associated restrictions that are now in its third year, reports Hindustan Times.

A day before Malpass' warning the Institute of International Finance slashed 2022 growth outlook for global output from 4.6 per cent to 2.3 per cent.

The risk of a worldwide recession has also been flagged at the ongoing World



Economic Forum in Davos, with concern over inflation at its highest level in a generation in major economies including the United States, Britain and Europe.

Last month the World Bank reduced 2022 global growth forecasts from 4.1 per cent to 3.2 per cent - due to the impact of Russia's war on Ukraine.

For India the World Bank in April lowered growth estimates from 8.7 per cent to 8 per cent, business publication Live Mint reported. This was on the basis of worsening supply bottlenecks and rising inflation risks due to the war.

In India retail prices grew at 7.8 per cent - the highest in eight years - squeezing household budgets and likely paving the way for more monetary action by the Reserve Bank of India, which raised rates last week to combat spiking inflation.

Texas student caught with firearms outside school day after mass shooting horror

student in Texas, AUnited States, with was caught firearms outside a high school in Richardson city, the police department said, a day after mass shooting in the US state sent shockwaves across the world. In a statement, the Richardson Police Department said that it received a phone call at 10.55 am (local time) in the 1500 block of East Spring Valley

Road, reporting a male holding what appeared to be a rifle. "The male was last seen walking towards Berkner High School, located at 1600 East Spring Valley Road," the police department said.

"Within minutes of the call being dispatched, numerous police officers from various units within the Richardson Police Department responded to Berkner High School and initiated a search and investigation into this incident. Nearby schools were notified of the police activity," the statement added.

The male suspect was identified as a "juvenile student" of the high school. He

was located inside the school, but no weapons were found, reports Hindustan Times.

This incident comes a day after a deadly shootout at the Robb Elementary School in Uvalde city of Texas - 19 students and two teachers were among those who lost lives.

The shootout at the Robb Elementary School again sparked criticism of the constitutionally protected US gun laws, especially those allowing the sale of automatic weapons to people under the age of 21.

"Nous nous assurerons qu'aucun 'Mickey Mouse business' n'ait lieu en 2024...

Mauritius Times: La dépréciation de la roupie et l'appauvrissement grandissant de certaines sections la population, le "state capture"... il y a là suffisamment d'éléments parmi d'autres pour l'opposition de contrer efficacement l'actuel gouvernement, mais selon plusieurs observateurs, il ne semble toujours pas qu'elle soit en mesure de démontrer le bien-fondé de ses vues et de se présenter comme une alternance valable. Vous en êtes conscient, non?

Cader Sayed-Hossen: En ce qui concerne la situation économique, la réalité des choses est bien plus grave qu'il puisse sembler à première vue. Alors qu'en 2014 (quand le Parti Travailliste était au pouvoir), le US Dollar valait Rs 30.66, il vaut aujourd'hui Rs 43.50 : la roupie s'est dépréciée de 43% en 8 ans de régime Jugnauth, entraînant ainsi un renchérissement insupportable du coût de la vie à Maurice.

Très objectivement? Non. Comment est-ce que les

mêmes incapables qui ont œuvré depuis 2015 au démantèlement de toute la prospérité que le Parti Travailliste a construite entre 2005 et 2014 pourraient-ils redresser la barre en deux ans et atteindre une bonne santé économigue en 2024 ?

- Le Foreign Direct Investment ou investissement étranger direct, FDI, a chuté de 54% entre 2014 (Rs 18.5 milliards) et 2021 (Rs 8.5 milliards).
- La dette publique est passée de Rs 238 milliards en 2014 (61% du PIB) à Rs 413 milliards en 2021 (89% du PIB). Si nous tenons compte des emprunts hors budget, par le truchement des véhicules à usage spécial ou *special purpose vehicles*, la dette publique a dépassé 105% du PIB, alors qu'il est largement admis qu'une dette publique de 80% du PIB est le maximum que nous pouvons supporter sans faire obstacle à notre développement économique et social.

Il y a quelque chose de paradoxal dans la perception de cette guerre. Si on en croit les médias occidentaux, c'est un conflit qui a ou qui aura un impact sur le monde entier. Or, tel n'est pas le cas. Les effets de cette crise affectent particulièrement les pays voisins et l'Europe, lourdement dépendants du gaz naturel russe et de l'huile de tournesol et du blé ukrainiens.

Cette crise est probablement, avec la spéculation qui est toujours un facteur important dans la détermination des prix des commodités ou *commodities*, une des raisons derrière la récente augmentation du prix du gaz (LNG, *liquefied petroleum gas*) que nous achetons. Il est donc faux de dire que la guerre entre la Russie et l'Ukraine constitue pour nous un défi majeur, même si le gouvernement a plusieurs fois tenté, et le fera encore, de mettre ses difficultés économiques, surtout le renchérissement répétitif du coût de la vie sur le dos de la guerre en Ukraine. Par contre, la pandémie a eu, autant pour les ménages et les affaires que pour l'Etat, un coût financier certain.

Je ne pense pas qu'il y ait une «nouvelle crise» car la guerre entre la Russie et l'Ukraine, tout en ayant un impact relatif sur certains de nos partenaires commerciaux, ne nous affecte pas directement.

Mais crise il y a, et cette crise c'est l'écroulement d'une bonne partie de notre structure économique. Le secteur industriel périclite (cela se voit aux chiffres à l'exportation) parce que le ministère de l'Industrie est inactif, notre agriculture se meurt parce que nous n'avons pas de ministre de l'Agriculture – seulement un Attorney General qui agit comme ministre de l'Agriculture à temps partiel.

Dans ces deux secteurs très importants, il n'y a plus de dialogue Etat-Opérateurs Economiques, la synergie Etat-Secteur Privé n'existe plus comme c'était le cas sous le Parti Travailliste.

Le tourisme se remet lentement de la pandémie. Le *Global Business Sector*, GBS, est le seul secteur qui soit en bonne santé et j'espère de tout cœur que cela continuera. Mais nous devons aussi constater que la balance des paiements est devenue très ou trop lourdement dépendante du GBS.

Donc, est-ce que le gouvernement a les moyens d'affronter cette crise? Non. Alors il aura recours encore à l'endettement. J'ai envie de dire, comme Macbeth, *"this government is in blood steeped so far..."*

Les lles-Soeur he Francomaniac press has for some time been publishing the programmes of Radio St Denis; and at least one reporter on Le Cernéen listens to the news bulletins from the *radio dyonisienne*. It seems that Hon. Sauzier's letter to the Times, which appeared on March 12, was the subject of a news item in the morning newscast from

Radio St Denis on March 13. One wonders what interest there is for the people of Reunion in comments on constitutional development in Mauritius. And equally one wonders what interest there is for the people of Mauritius in the emissions of Radio St Denis... the action of the Francomaniac press in publishing the Reunion radio programmes is equivalent to the Daily Worker in England publishing the English-language programmes of Radio Moscow.

Instead of broadcasting about reactionary Mauritian's animadversions on the report of the Electoral Boundary Commission, Radio St Denis could perform a valuable service in broadcasting, instead, details about life in Reunion. For Reunion, l'île soeur, is an overseas department of France, and if we look at conditions in that island we can judge for ourselves what life would be like in Mauritius if Mauritius were still a French colony (or overseas department). And we can see, too, the fruits of French colonialism and the results of 300 years of French rule in Reunion.

But first let us turn to the testimony of the French periodical Démocratie Nouvelle of May 1955. We read that the aim of French colonialism is a mission civilisatrice, aimed at transforming arabes, berbères, noirs, jaunes, en autant de Français de langue et de culture, égaux en tout à leurs concitoyens de la métropole. But French capitalism has never accepted or put into operation this doctrine except in so far as it has been necessary to train a local elite to carry on the local administration. The capitalists ont toujours farouchement limité la diffusion de l'instruction et l'octroi des droits, qui les auraient privés de la possibilité d'exploiter à vil prix le travail des populations dont le niveau de vie misérable, l'ignorance et la dépendance permettaient les bas salaires.

These criticisms, made by Jean-Maurice Hermann in the periodical referred to, lead to the conclusion that France would cut a better figure in the world si elle avait offert aux pays d'outre-mer des instituteurs, des médecins, des ingénieurs plutôt que des parachutistes et des gendarmes. And Hermann alleges that France has not applied the principles of equality, but the principles du racisme et de la terreur policière.

Certainly Madagascar has suffered la terreur policière; 700.000 died in the Malgache repression eleven years ago, and that island still awaits economic development and political rights. (It is said that the deficiency of meat exports from Madagascar to Mauritius has its origins in an economic link-up between Malgache and Mauritian capitalists who are using Mauritian reliance on imported meat as a political weapon). And although Reunion may have escaped the terreur policière, it certainly suffers from a

shortage of teachers and doctors: and it has suffered a denial of rights.

I turn to the January 1958 issue of the Paris periodical Les Cahiers du Progressisme in which a brief article refers to the matters A la Réunion. It begins by referring to the legislative elections last November: c'est M. Cerneau qui a été élu contre Jean Hinglo, candidat républicain progressiste... ces élections, entachées de

fraudes graves, ont abouti à une véritable suppression du suffrage universel.

The article also details certain aspects of normal life in Reunion — which is, remember, an overseas department of France, and all the Reunionnais are therefore, in legal theory, equal to the inhabitants of metropolitan France. Says the article: le travailleur perçoit des allocations familiales cinq fois plus faibles que celles du travailleur en France, on du fonctionnaire en service dans l'île. (This underlines the criticism made in Démocratie Nouvelle relating to the training of a local elite). But, the Reunionnais fonctionnaire enjoys conditions of service inferior à celles de son collègue de même grade venant de l'extérieur. Other facts of life in the outpost of France in the Indian ocean are that 40% des jeunes appélés soient reformés pour déficience physique; il y ait 25,000 tuberculeux pour 300,000 habitants, soit 1 tuberculeux sur 12 Réunionais; il y ait 11,000 chômeurs sur 70,000 salariés.

Our Francomaniacs will be sure to retort that conditions in Mauritius are not much better. If they do so, they can be told that it is up to them to help the Government to redress the evils of malnutrition, low wages and squalid housing conditions; they can be told that they can give active support to the Government to introduce unemployment allowances; they can be told that they must be prepared to pay higher taxes to help the poor and unfortunate of Mauritius.

On the other hand, perhaps, the Francomaniacs will not say that conditions in Mauritius are not much better than in Reunion. If they do not compare Mauritius favourably with Reunion, it will be because they know that conditions for the people of Mauritius are bad - in which case we can still say to them "Co-operate with the Government to introduce unemployment allowances, to redress the evils of low wages, poor housing and malnutrition, and to provide for the cost of all this social amelioration by paying higher taxes and by not exporting your profits to South Africa."

How, in fact, do Mauritius and Reunion compare in certain aspects for which comparable statistics are available? Let us see if the criticism is valid that France has not sent teachers and doctors to her overseas possessions, whether colonies or departments.

In Reunion, in 1949, there was one bed for every 280 inhabitants. By 1952, the number had fallen to 220 per bed. In Mauritius, on the other hand, there was one bed for every 210 inhabitants in 1949 and as low as 135 in 1952. In France, in 1952, there was one bed for every 65 inhabitants only.

In France in 1954 there was 1 doctor to every 1100 persons. In Reunion, in 1953, however, there was 1 doctor to



every 5300 persons. This was, I will admit, much better than five years earlier, when there was only 1 doctor to as many as 20,000 persons; and in this matter of doctors, Reunion is slightly better-off than Mauritius; for in Mauritius there was 1 doctor to 5900 persons in 1954 - slightly worse than in 1949 when there was 1 doctor to 5400 persons.

Mauritius has a lower proportion of its total population at school than has Reunion: but whereas the school-going proportion of the population rose in Mauritius between 1950 and 1954, in Reunion the school-going proportion of the population fell. And using 1954 figures again, while in Mauritius there were 33 pupils to each primary school teacher, in Reunion there were 42 pupils per teacher. In 1954, too, there were 48 Mauritians in every 100,000 of population enrolled at institutions of higher education; but for Reunion, this information is "not available". Dare we suggest that it is not available because it is discreditably low? All the foregoing statistics come from a very reliable source: Report on the World Social Situation prepared by the Bureau of Social Affairs of the United Nations Secretariat and published by the United Nations in April 1957.

For a last statistical comparison between Mauritius and Reunion, I turn to a UNESCO publication, World Illiteracy at Mid-Century, published in Paris in French and in English editions late in 1957. From this invaluable book we learn that illiteracy among the adults of Reunion was 60.6% of the adult population; but in Mauritius the illiteracy rate among adults was lower, at 45-50%. The Report on the World Social Situation gives an illiteracy rate of 51.8% for Mauritius at the 1952 census.

Little in these comparisons reflects credit on the French administration of the overseas department of Reunion Little in them suggests that Radio St Denis, or the administration of the island, can afford the time to meddle in the affairs of Mauritius. Instead of commenting on a matter which is an internal affair of the Mauritian people, Radio St Denis should be first putting its own house in order. When illiteracy has been eliminated in Reunion; when TB has disappeared; when the 11,000 workless are in work; when educational and medical facilities are equal to those in Mauritius; and when there is equality in fact as well as in practice between the Reunionais and the expatriate Frenchman — then will be time that Mauritians will gladly permit Radio St Denis to poke its nose into their affairs. Until then, Radio St Denis can mind its own business, and leave Mauritius to mind its.

And until then the Francomaniac press would be better advised to leave off publishing the Reunion wireless programmes.

The stakes are not difficult to contemplate. Taiwan's people have a democratic society and a productive economy that does significant volumes of trade with both the US and mainland China. The CCP does not need more land or more people. In the long run, trading with Taiwan is a far more productive proposition for the CCP than is satisfying some imagined national pride that an island remaining independent for 73 years is a vital necessity for China.

We should also not underestimate the importance of the Taiwanese manufacturers as supplies of semiconductors, scientific and medical equipment, and, in general, to the worldwide supply chain of engineered products.

Biden is right to point out that an invasion of Taiwan equates to an invasion of Ukraine and that such an action would destabilize the entire Pacific region.

66 The stakes are not difficult to contemplate. Taiwan's people have a democratic society and a productive economy that does significant volumes of trade with both the US and mainland China. The CCP does not need more land or more people. In the long run, trading with Taiwan is a far more productive proposition for the CCP than is satisfying some imagined national pride that an island remaining independent for 73 years is a vital necessity for China..."

It is time for the US to take the lead and influence President Xi and the CCP to act like adults and understand that peaceful trade is far more productive than a military takeover of an unwilling people. We have seen too much killing over imagined national pride over the course of human history and most recently in Ukraine.

If President Biden's remarks reflect this reality, we should welcome them. If he blundered into them, it is a more welcome blunder than the blunder that Putin gave us.

Sue Gray report Why hasn't Boris Johnson resigned?

It's also important to note that each new prime minister updates and re-issues the ministerial code at the beginning of their tenure, which also means that the prime minister himself is the final arbitrator of the code.

It is for Johnson to decide whether a minister should be investigated after being accused of breaking the code. This is clearly a questionable state of affairs when it is the prime minister who stands accused of the breach.

Did Boris Johnson mislead parliament?

Fresh evidence that a party took place on government premises on November 13 2020 are particularly important because they bring into play another part of the ministerial code: the section that cites misleading parliament as a resigning offence.

November 13 is key because the prime minister has been asked about that date specifically in the House of Commons. During prime minister's questions on December 8 2021, Labour MP Catherine West asked if he would tell the House whether a party had taken place on that day and the prime minister said:

Given that there is now photo evidence, the allegation is that the prime minister has misled parliament.

According to paragraph 1.3c of the ministerial code:

It is of paramount importance that Ministers give accurate and truthful information to Parliament, correcting any inadvertent error at the earliest opportunity. Ministers who knowingly mislead Parliament will be expected to offer their resignation to the Prime Minister.

The challenge with this part of the code (beyond the prime minister having the final say over the it) is the word "knowingly". However much the evidence suggests that a party was held on November 13 in contravention of the lockdown rules of the time, it is incredibly hard to prove that the prime minister knowingly misled parliament if his reasoning for his answer to West's question was that he believed the event on November 13 was within the rules.

It is also important to note at this stage that the

Metropolitan Police have not fined the prime minister for his attendance at this event. That makes it all the easier for him to insist that he has not broken the code and does not have to resign on this point.

All this helps to explain why, in responding to the findings of the Sue Gray report in parliament, Johnson insisted once again that he had no knowledge of most of the events that took place in his home and workplace at the time and that his own attendance was fleeting and in compliance with rules about workplace gathering.



What happens next?

If the prime minister is not going to police the ministerial code, then it raises the question of who will. Without a legal mechanism, it comes down to parliament (particularly MPs).

The house has called on its privileges committee to investigate Johnson for having potentially misled parliament. This is a cross-party committee and is due to begin its investigations after the publication of the Gray report. How long the investigation will take is up to the committee and any sanctions recommended will need the approval of the whole house – so it can't itself issue any sanctions against Johnson.

In practice, and given the government's substantial majority, it really comes down to Conservative MPs to decide Johnson's fate. They have the option of triggering a vote of no confidence in his leadership. The publication of Sue Gray's report might tip some Conservative MPs over the edge and trigger such a vote.

It's worth remembering that two important by-elections are coming up. If this scandal is followed by a double loss, more MPs might be tipped over the edge and a vote against Johnson could happen. But the prime minister has survived before and may survive again. His political future and the future of the government rest in the hands of his own MPs.

Haven't had Covid yet? It could be more than just luck

Even taking into account people who have had COVID but didn't know it, there's still likely to be a group of people who have never been infected.

We all know a few of those lucky people who, somehow, have managed to avoid ever catching Covid. Perhaps you're one of them. Is this a Marvel-esque superpower? Is there any scientific reason why a person might be resistant to becoming infected, when the virus seems to be everywhere? Or is it simply luck?

More than 60% of people in the UK have tested positive for Covid at least once. However, the number of people who have actually been infected with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, is thought to be higher. The calculated rate of asymptomatic infections varies depending on the study, though most agree it's fairly common.

But even taking into account people who have had Covid and not realised it, there is still likely a group of people who never have. The reason why some people appear immune to Covid is one question that has persisted throughout the pandemic. As with so much in science, there isn't (yet) one simple answer.

We can probably dismiss the Marvel-esque superpower theory. But science and luck likely both have a role to play. Let's take a look.

The simplest explanation is that these people have never come into contact with the virus.

This could certainly be the case for people who have been shielding during the pandemic. People at significantly greater risk of severe disease, such as those with chronic heart or lung conditions, have had a tough couple of years.

Many of them continue to take precautions to avoid potential exposure to the virus. Even with additional safety measures, many of these people have ended up with Covid.

Due to the high level of community transmission, particularly with the extremely transmissible omicron variants, it's very unlikely that someone going to work or school, socialising and shopping hasn't been near someone infected with the virus. Yet there are people who have experienced high levels of exposure, such as hospital workers or family members of people who have had Covid, who have somehow managed to avoid testing positive.

We know from several studies vaccines not only reduce the risk of severe disease, but they can also cut the chance of household transmission of SARS-CoV-2 by about half. So certainly vaccination could have helped some close contacts becoming avoid infected. However, it's important to note that these studies were done pre-omicron. The data we have on the effect of vaccination on omicron transmission is still limited.



Some theories

One theory around why certain people have avoided infection is that, although they are exposed to the virus, it fails to establish an infection even after gaining entry to the airways. This could be due to a lack of the receptors needed for SARS-CoV-2 to gain access to cells.

Once a person does become infected, researchers have identified that differences in the



immune response to SARS-CoV-2 play a role in determining the severity of symptoms. It is possible that a quick and robust immune response could prevent the virus from replicating to any great degree in the first instance.

The efficacy of our immune response to infection is largely defined by our age and our genetics. That said, a healthy lifestyle certainly helps. For example, we know that vitamin D deficiency can increase the risk of certain infections. Not getting enough sleep can also have a detrimental effect on our body's ability to fight invading pathogens.

Scientists studying the underlying causes of severe Covid have identified a genetic cause in nearly 20% of critical cases. Just as genetics could be one determining factor of disease severity, our genetic makeup may also hold the key to resistance to SARS-CoV-2 infection.

infection on nasal cells from human donors. We grow these cells on plastic dishes which we can then add virus to and investigate how the cells respond. During our research we found one donor whose cells could not be infected with SARS-CoV-2.

We discovered some really interesting genetic mutations, including several involved with the body's immune response to infection, that could explain why. A mutation we identified in a gene involved with sensing the presence of a virus has previously been shown to confer resistance to HIV infection. Our research is on a small number of

donors and highlights that we're still only scraping the surface of research into genetic susceptibility or resistance to infections.

There's also the possibility that previous infection with other types of coronaviruses results in crossreactive immunity. This is where our immune system may recognise SARS-CoV-2 as being similar to a recent invading virus and launch an immune response. There are seven coronaviruses that infect humans: four that cause the common cold, and one each that cause Sars (severe acute respiratory syndrome), Mers (Middle East respiratory syndrome) and Covid.

How long-lasting this immunity may be is another question. Seasonal coronaviruses that circulated pre-2020 were able to reinfect the same people after 12 months.



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Resistance exercise may be superior to aerobic exercise for getting better ZZZs

Resistance exercise may be superior to aerobic exercise as a way to get better sleep, and sleep is important for cardiovascular health, according to preliminarv research.

"It is increasingly recognized that getting enough sleep, particularly high-quality sleep, is important for health including cardiovascular health. Unfortunately, more than a third of Americans don't get enough sleep on a regular basis," said study author Angelique Brellenthin, Ph.D., assistant Prof of Kinesiology at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa.

"Aerobic activity is often recommended to improve sleep, yet very little is known about the effects of resistance exercise versus aerobic exercise on sleep. Our study is one of the largest and longest exercise trials in a general adult population to directly compare the effects of different types of exercise on multiple sleep parameters."

Previous research has confirmed that not getting enough sleep (the recommended amount for adults is seven to eight hours a day) or getting poor quality sleep increases risks for high blood pressure, elevated cholesterol and atherosclerosis, which happens when fatty deposits build up in arteries. Not getting enough sleep is linked to weight gain, diabetes and inflammation, all of which can worsen cardiovascular disease. Sleeping too much or too little also has been shown to increase the risk of stroke, heart attack

and death.

For this study, researchers enrolled 386 adults who met the criteria for overweight or obesity, which was a body mass index from 25-40 kg/m². Participants were inactive and had elevated blood pressure, measuring from 120-139 mm Hg systolic (top number) and 80-89 mm Hg diastolic (bottom number).

The various workouts included:

Aerobic exercise participants could choose among treadmills, upright or recumbent bikes or ellipticals for their aerobic modality during each session. Researchers monitored their heart rates to keep them continuously in the prescribed heart rate range for a moderate-tovigorous intensity exercise.

The resistance exercise group completed their sets and repetitions on 12 resistance machines to work all the major muscle groups in a session. The machines included leg press, chest press, lat pulldown, leg curl, leg extension, biceps curl, triceps pushdown, shoulder press, abdominal crunch, lower back extension, torso rotation and hip abduction. Participants performed three sets of 8 to 16 repetitions at 50-80% of their onerep maximum.

The study found:

More than one third (35%) of study participants had poor quality sleep at the beginning of the study.

Among the 42% of participants who

were not getting at least 7 hours of sleep at the study's start, sleep duration increased by an average of 40 minutes in 12 months for the resistance exercise group, compared to an increase of about 23 minutes in the aerobic exercise group, about 17 minutes in the combined exercise group and about 15 minutes in the control group.

Sleep efficiency increased in the resistance exercise and combined exercise groups, but not in the aerobic exercise or no exercise group.

"While both aerobic and resistance exercise are important for overall health. our results suggest that resistance exercises may be superior when it comes to getting better ZZZs at night," Brellenthin said. "If your sleep has gotten noticeably worse over the past two stressful years, consider incorporating two or more resistance exercise training sessions into your regular exercise routine to improve your general muscle and bone health, as well as your sleep."

Is it possible to recreate dinosaurs from their DNA?

Ever since moviegoers saw the first 'Jurassic Park,' millions have wondered if scientists could make a dinosaur in the lab.

s a paleontologist - that's a scientist Awho studies ancient life – I'm asked this question all the time. After all, the scientists in "Jurassic Park" (and later, "Jurassic World") used DNA to recreate dozens of dinosaurs: Triceratops, Velociraptor and T. rex.

And if you saw any of those movies, you had to wonder: Could real scientists do that today?

The ABCs of DNA

DNA - which stands for deoxyribonucleic acid - is something in every cell of every organism that ever lived on Earth - including dinosaurs.

Think of DNA as molecules that carry the genetic code, a set of instructions that helps bodies and minds grow and thrive.

Your DNA is different from everyone else's. It determines many of the characteristics that define you, like the color of your eyes or whether your hair is straight or curly.

DNA is much easier to find in the "soft parts" of an animal - their organs, blood vessels, nerves, muscle and fat.

But a dinosaur's soft parts are long gone. They either decomposed or were eaten by another dinosaur.

Is DNA in the fossils?

Dinosaur fossils are all that's left of those prehistoric animals.

Immersed for tens of millions of years in ancient mud, minerals and water, the fossils come from the dinosaur's so-called "hard parts" - its bones, teeth and skull.

We find dinosaur fossils in the ground, in riverbeds and lakes, and on the sides of cliffs and mountains. Every now and then, someone finds one in their backyard.

Often, they're guite near the surface, and usually, they're embedded in sedimentary rock.

With enough fossils, scientists can build a dinosaur skeleton - what you see when you go to the museum. The trouble with 'dino-DNA'

But scientists have a big problem when trying to find DNA in dinosaur fossils.

DNA molecules eventually decay. Recent studies show DNA deteriorates and ultimately disintegrates after about 7 million years.

That sounds like a long time, but the last dinosaur died at the end of the Cretaceous Period. That's more than 65 million vears ago.

Dig up a fossil today, and any dino-DNA within would have long since fallen apart.

That means, as far as scientists know, and even using the best technology available today, it's not possible to make a dinosaur from its DNA.

Although it's too late to find dino-DNA, scientists recently found something almost as intriguing.

They discovered DNA fragments in the fossils of Neanderthals and other ancient mammals, such as woolly mammoths.

Now that makes sense: those fragments are less than 2 million years old, well before all of the DNA would decay.

Imagine for a moment ...

Just for fun, let's imagine that somehow, sometime in the future, researchers came up with fragments of dinosaur DNA.

With only fragments, scientists still could not make a complete dinosaur.

Instead, they would have to combine the fragments with the DNA of a modernday animal to create a living organism.

That creature, however, could not be called an actual dinosaur. Rather, it would be a hybrid, a blend of dinosaur and, most likely, a bird or reptile.

Think that's a good idea? After all, the scientists in the "Jurassic" movies tried that. And you know what happened there.

This blood sugar problem makes you more likely to develop type 2 diabetes and heart disease

What is prediabetes? It's when your blood sugar is higher than normal, but not high enough to be called diabetes. You won't necessarily notice any symptoms -- you can have it and not know it. A simple blood test can tell you if you do. You're at risk if you're overweight, over 45, and you don't exercise. It makes you more likely to have type 2 diabetes and heart disease, but you can take steps to change that.

Lose Weight: It doesn't have to be a lot. If you lose just 7% of your body weight, it can make a huge difference (that's only 14 pounds for a 200-pound person). The first step is to eat healthier food with fewer calories. Start by keeping track of your weight, eating habits, and physical activities.

Eat Healthy: A good rule of thumb is to fill half your plate with non-starchy vegetables (asparagus, Brussels sprouts, and carrots, among many others). One quarter should have starchy foods (like potatoes, corn, or peas). The remaining



quarter should be protein -- chicken, fish, or beans are best. Be extra careful with carbs like baked goods or pasta -- they can raise your blood sugar.

Exercise: You'll lose weight faster and feel better if you get out and burn more calories. You don't need to train for a marathon: A brisk 30-minute walk five times a week should do the trick. A workout buddy can sometimes help you stick to a routine, so call a friend or join a gym and make some new ones. Aerobic (walking, swimming, exercise dancing) and strength training (weight lifting, pushups, pull-ups) are both good. A little of both is best.

Get Your ZZZs: The right amount of shut-eye helps keep your blood sugar at healthy levels. If you can't stay asleep, wake up too early, or get less than 5 hours a night, you're more likely to get diabetes. About 7

or 8 hours a night is ideal. For better sleep, don't have alcohol or caffeine late in the day, keep regular sleep hours, and stick to a calm, quiet bedtime routine.

Don't Smoke: If you smoke, now's the time to quit. Smokers are 30% to 40% more likely to get type 2 diabetes than non-smokers. And if you get diabetes and still smoke, your symptoms may be worse and your blood sugar may be harder to control.

Medication: Certain drugs can help with blood sugar levels and obesity, as well as high cholesterol and high blood pressure. And you're more likely to have those if you have prediabetes. If you do, take your medication as prescribed -- it can improve your health and help you live longer.

Car, finalement, ce sont eux les vrais responsables de ce pétrin économique qui empoisonne la vie des milliards d'habitants dans le monde entier. Qu'on ne se trompe pas de coupable!
