

# Police Reform

In reply to the PNQ put by the Leader of the Opposition last Wednesday, about the recent cases of police brutality involving a particular unit of the CID and others, the Prime Minister has dismissed the proposal of Hon Xavier Duval for the setting up of a Commission of Inquiry, which he said 'would not give the desired results' given that the evidence provided before one such Commission cannot be used for the purpose of prosecution. The Police would have to start investigation afresh, call witnesses, gather evidence and submit the file to the DPP for advice. He also stated that the Independent Police Complaints Commission is already carrying out an investigation and once it is completed, the IPCC will refer the matter to the appropriate body.

There had earlier been calls by various parties for the DPP to initiate a judicial inquiry into this matter, but it's for the latter to exercise his constitutional prerogatives and decide accordingly. Opinions will differ about the effectiveness or otherwise of a commission of inquiry, but one alternative course of action that could be seriously considered in the present circumstances would be to go for a Presidential Commission on the lines of the Mackay Commission, as suggested by a group of lawyers. It would go beyond the investigation of cases of police brutality to look into the effectiveness of the police in fighting crime, the input of technological means for that purpose, the training of officers for policing duties as well as in ethics, community policing, etc.

This said, we have to acknowledge that if public services often find themselves at the receiving end of recurrent criticisms, the work of the police force of Mauritius has, however, been beneficial for the proper upkeep of the country overall. It has employed discretion whenever and wherever necessary before applying sanctions, and taken decisive action in order to prevent situations from deteriorating. The drug hauls and arrests of drug dealers is a testimony to the combined efforts of the police, in particular the ADSU, and the Customs Department, of their vigilance so as to outsmart the ever-newer tricks and ploys that drug traffickers and dealers have recourse to in their attempt to break through the surveillance system. However, the emergence of new drugs, in particular the cheaply available synthetic ones, all over the island may give the impression that the situation is getting out of hand. It is to be hoped the police is taking all the necessary steps to prevent the situation from becoming untenable.

But it cannot be denied that the police force has attracted for itself negative publicity for a number of reasons over the last few years. The facts speak for themselves: alleged "punitive transfers" for taking to task politically connected individuals; hounding of individuals, NGOs or communities expressing their grievances, the presence of rogue elements in some units of the Force, variation in weight of drugs seized, which prompted the then Minister Mentor Sir Anerood Jugnauth to express publicly his dissatisfaction at the explanations of the police, leading to the institution of an inquiry presided by a former Judge of the Supreme Court. There has also been on the one hand the perception of an 'instrumentalisation' of the police to track down and finish off political opponents, and, on the other, its perceived ineffectiveness to go to the bottom of criminal cases which might embarrass prominent figures or those close to them. The yet unresolved murder case of political activist Soopramanien Kistnen is a case in point.

The core philosophy behind the setting up of a police force is that it is primarily meant for the protection of the citizen rather than being a coercive instrument at the beck and call of politicians, for which reason the Commissioner of Police's post is a constitutionally guaranteed one so that he can perform his duties in full autonomy. It is expected that the holder of the post will ensure that the Constitution of the country will prevail over all other considerations, political or otherwise. What is additionally needed is to demonstrate this concretely. Like Caesar's wife, trustworthiness in the vast majority of decent police officers and their conduct has also to be clear to all impacted stakeholders in society and rogue elements have to be taken to task with utmost celerity.

As in all countries, the stability and progress of Mauritius rests on a few key pillars of governance. The police force should be among these pillars.

# Boris Johnson's future: A philosophical exercise for wavering Tory MPs

*Prisoners in the UK are not allowed to vote. Their fate is a useful starting point for any backbencher wondering whether Boris Johnson should keep his job*

Former British prime minister David Cameron famously proclaimed in 2010 that the thought of giving prisoners the vote made him "physically ill". Cameron argued that "frankly, when people commit a crime and go to prison, they should lose their rights, including the right to vote".

Cameron's distress was, as he himself acknowledged, based on the idea that those who violate the laws of the realm should not have a say in how those laws are made.

Cameron, his MPs and the overwhelming majority of the House of Commons went on to vote the following year to uphold Britain's ban on prisoners being allowed to vote. And while there has more recently been a move to give the vote to prisoners who are out on temporary licence, there has been no move to repeal the ban for the vast majority of the incarcerated population. The position appears fixed.

But is there not a contradiction in this position if Conservative MPs also uphold the right of current prime minister, Boris Johnson, to continue not just to make laws as an MP, but even to head the government?

It's an especially pertinent question as Conservatives MPs ponder Johnson's future in the wake of the Partygate revelations. It is for them to decide whether he should keep his job

after being fined by police for breaking lockdown rules during the pandemic. It is for them to vote on whether he should face a leadership challenge. They necessarily find themselves in a position that calls on them to reflect on the relationship between rights and responsibility. The comparison with prisoners is a useful one for their deliberations.


### Rights and responsibilities

The idea behind disenfranchising prisoners is generally that those who claim the right to exercise political power – in this case by voting – can have that right only on the condition that they are prepared to assume certain responsibilities.

If you violate the basic demands of citizenship, the thought goes, you cannot expect to be given the privileges of citizenship. If one of the basic demands of citizenship is to obey the law, then we can see how this would end up with the conclusion that those who break the law should lose some rights of citizenship. Sometimes this is backed up by the idea of the social contract: if you break the terms of the contract then you cannot expect the contract to be fulfilled.

**R**ecent events in the United Kingdom, the United States and France have once again reminded people and governments of some fundamental principles and standards democracies across the world must be grounded on. A democracy

is shaped by the manner the contract of trust between the people and the MPs they elect at the polls is honoured. It is only vibrant when both the people and the MPs unwaveringly ensure that their democracies adhere to the highest democratic benchmarks and uphold people's and public interest at all times.

The onus is therefore squarely on the people who must exercise their democratic rights judiciously, assure a continuous oversight on the manner their democracy is functioning and ensure that as elected representatives of the people, MPs diligently defend and safeguard the highest standards of democracy in their country.

The relationship between the people and the government elected by them is anchored on trust. The people must therefore keep government action under constant scrutiny to gauge its ability and competence, its good governance and ensure that the affairs of the country are being judiciously managed in an accountable and transparent manner to assure inclusive and shared prosperity.

## The party is over

In the United Kingdom, the no-confidence vote faced by Prime Minister Boris Johnson, last week, is a case in point. Boris Johnson faced scathing criticism and intense pressure from MPs including senior members of his own party and the public after reports that multiple parties at Downing Street had breached the UK Covid-19 restrictions and rules that were set by his own government. A no-confidence vote was tabled by MPs of his own Conservative Party against him in Parliament last week. He survived the no-confidence vote with the support of 211 MPs whilst a large rebel faction of 148 Conservative MPs or 42% MPs of his party voted against him. It was the worst indictment on a sitting prime minister by his own party in recent times. This significant loss of trust in his leadership and sound judgement weakens his position and undermines his legitimacy in the eyes of his own party and the country at large. Is this the beginning of the end? The party is over.

Boris Johnson is theoretically safe from another leadership challenge for a year under the 1922 Committee rules.

It is noteworthy that this is the second time in four years that a UK Prime Minister has had to face a vote of no-confidence. Theresa May won a no-confidence vote in 2018 by 200 votes to 117. However, she had to resign as PM in July 2019 after her revised draft Brexit withdrawal agreements were rejected by Parliament three times.

## The attack on the Capitol

The US Capitol is the symbol of American democracy. On January 6, 2021, supporters of former President Donald Trump stormed the Capitol to disrupt the joint session of the US Congress (chaired by former Vice President Mike Pence) assembled to count electoral votes that would formalize the victory of President-elect Joe Biden.

After almost a year of investigation, the Democrats-led US House of Representatives select committee inquiry into the unprecedented attack on the Capitol which endangered American democracy is currently holding hearings on the assault. An ongoing criminal investigation has led to more than 800 arrests in nearly every US state. Liz Cheney, the Republican vice-chair of the committee, said Mr Trump had ‘lit the flame of this attack’.

## Seedy truths


The evidence presented at the inquiry shows that the attack on the Capitol was triggered by claims of election fraud. In a video testimony shown at the hearings this week, former US Attorney General Bill Barr said that ‘he had repeatedly told the former president that he had lost the election and that his claims of fraud were wrong.’ The former attorney general added that ‘we can’t live in a world where the incumbent administration stays in power based on its view, unsupported by specific evidence, that there was fraud in the election.’

The storming of the Capitol was an attack on American democracy and the lofty principles and ideals enshrined in its Constitution. The US Congress was duty bound to inquire and expose the seedy truths behind the unacceptable attack on the Capitol, the US ‘temple of democracy’. The Congressional Inquiry has shown a bipartisan unity to uphold and safeguard American democracy and bring those responsible to justice to deter any such attacks in future.

## French National Assembly Election

Some seven weeks after the victory of President Emmanuel Macron of *La Republique En Marche* (LREM), at the 24 April elections with 58.55% of the votes cast, the LREM is facing a robust challenge at the French National Assembly election by the *Nouvelle Union Populaire Ecologique et Sociale* (NUPES), a newly formed coalition of left and green parties led by Jean-Luc Mélenchon, the leader of the party *La France Insoumise*.

**W**hat a marvel – of sorts, given the flip-sides – is WhatsApp! One gets all kinds of posts, many of which belong to the lowly dustbin, not even the dustbin of history wherefrom they may be retrieved by some future maniac. This is what a friend and colleague of mine who is a cardiologist in Canada, where he migrated to many moons ago, sent me. It is ascribed to a certain ‘Bishop Hassan Kukah’:

African educational systems have surprising outcomes. The smartest students pass with first class and get admissions to medical and engineering schools. The second class students get MBAs and LLBs to manage the first class students. The third class students enter politics and rule both the first class and second class students. The failures enter the underworld of crime and control the politicians and the businesses. And best of all, those who didn’t attend school become prophets and everyone follows them, leaving behind reason and commonsense.’

Since geographically we are deemed to be part of the African continent, I thought that the contents of the post may interest local readers. This is perhaps why my friend sent me the extract as I have had occasion earlier to reproduce posts that he had forwarded, equally interesting if not as cynical and revealing of what could well be some unpalatable truths. At the very least it should invite us to reflect on what is stated therein, and in what way the contents may be holding a mirror to the situation in our own country.

For there is no smoke without fire, and obviously the ‘Bishop’, who must be having a good educational grounding, is a keen observer of his society. But I hope he remains a ‘Bishop’ and does not have ambitions of becoming a prophet, or allow himself to be conferred the title. This way he will still retain his commonsense and reason and be able to make further acute and real-life observations which I am sure will be as illuminating of the human condition.

As for me, there is at least one story that was doing the rounds when I was a junior doctor at SSRN Hospital in the 1970s that seems to corroborate to some extent what the post describes. One of the ministers was quite critical of doctors generally, except when he needed their services, and according to the grapevine this was

because he had failed to obtain a medical seat when he went for his tertiary studies and had as a second choice opted for law. Other readers may have their own reading into the messages that the post articulates.

Be that as it may, for the rest of us common mortals, the best thing is to discard the cynicism and get on with our lives on the principles of honesty, high thinking and simple living. Though I grant that ‘simple’ living is becoming increasingly difficult in these days of sophisticated gadgetry and the complexities of the digital world. This is particularly the case for us senior citizens who have to unlearn so many things and learn to manipulate infuriatingly smallish touch buttons on smartphone screens that we have to squint our eyes to be able to see properly. Result: often we make errors while entering letters and digits, and have to seek help from youngsters who are so deft at handling these devices that we wonder at the world they are growing up in. Further, many of us prefer to revert to the more tangible paper world that we have been used to and that gives us a greater sense of security.

Learning new skills as all of us know becomes more difficult

as we age, especially once we cross fifty years. When I was doing a fellowship in plastic and reconstructive surgery at CHU La Timone in Marseilles in 1985, microsurgery – that is, surgery to magnify and repair small arteries and nerves using a microscope – was a newly-developing hyperspecialty with transformational applications in plastic surgery. Everybody had to learn the new skills in the laboratory first before being allowed to operate on humans, and that included the professor – ‘Monsieur’ – who was the head of the department.


However, to be allowed to learn the skill on the experimental animals (rabbits), the strict rules were that one had to avoid drinking coffee and smoking, which tend to induce tremors in the fingers. This may not be visible normally but under the microscope it is very much so, and interferes with the handling of the fine instruments, so that it renders practice impossible.

The story goes that after three attempts in the experimental laboratory, ‘Monsieur’ flung everything aside and walked out, saying ‘this I for you youngsters, not for me! At 57 years, there’s only so much you can give up on, and he could not part with his cups of coffee and his cigarettes, though he was only a light smoker.

But he possessed what we didn’t: vast experience. That was the greatest asset to avoid catastrophic outcomes in patients. For when we have learnt a new skill, we are keen to use it as often as we can, even if a patient can be managed by a well-established treatment. This is where ‘Monsieur’ comes in, to curb our ‘knife-happy’ enthusiasm, in other words to guide us when (that is, in which cases) to use microsurgery and when NOT to operate, that is not use microsurgery.

As the saying goes, to one who possesses a hammer, everything looks like a nail.

This said, it doesn’t mean that we should shun learning, in fact we should maintain our curiosity and continue to be keen learners of things new to us, for that is what helps the brain to remain ‘young’ or its property called plasticity, as well as sparing us from developing maladies such as Alzheimer’s amongst other things. And always apply commonsense and reason for they throw much needed light on archaic beliefs and practices that have the potential to cause harm to our fellow beings, and that we must be prepared to modify or discard as the case may be. We may begin by paying some attention to the observations of the good ‘Bishop’.

In this interview LEX discusses the mechanisms available to investigate matters of public interest, and whether and how anyone occupying public office, from the prime minister and ministers to other persons who handle the affairs of the country can be prosecuted for any past misdeeds. He makes the case for a Fiscal Responsibility Act instead of a Freedom of Information legislation which he feels will be too weak.

\* How would you go about prosecuting ministers or the head of a public institution, be it the police or the ICAC, if you felt they were acting in breach of the law?

The law of the country applies to one and all. No public officer from top to bottom, no prime minister, no minister, no member of parliament is immune from criminal proceedings if there is evidence that he or she has committed an offence. Remember how the former Prime Minister was dragged like a vulgar criminal following the 2014 elections on different charges for which he was prosecuted but thereafter acquitted.

\* Since the Courts seem to be the only avenue for seeking redress with regard to matters that involve genuine public interest, are there any guidelines to help members of the public bring prosecutions against prominent public figures?

Any member of the public has all the legitimate right to file a complaint with the police against any prominent public figure. The real question is whether the police force will dare to start an investigation in a complaint filed against a minister or a high public officer.

We have seen many such complaints lying dormant for months if not years with investigative bodies. Why? Is it because these investigative bodies, whether it's the Police or ICAC, decided to look the other way, as it is widely perceived, when it comes to ministers and high public officers serving the present regime? If no proper

investigation is carried out, it's unlikely that a solid case will reach the courts.

\* There are many instances when politicians in power have taken decisions, not necessarily for personal gains but clearly not in the public interest, which go unpunished and ultimately cost the public exchequer millions if not billions in terms of damages. Why is it that such cases are hardly ever brought to trial?

Indeed, there are several cases of serious abuses and wrongdoing committed by people in power. The institutions that should investigate, the ICAC and the police, can start an investigation either of their volition or on a complaint. If they remain passive for reasons best known to themselves, again how can a case reach the courts?

\* Does it therefore mean that there isn't any legal provision or formal mechanism that would hold former ministers/prime ministers to account for any past misdeeds on their part?

The mechanisms are there. Only those who control these mechanisms stay put when it comes to ministers.

\* Is the issue of public interest more complex than it seems to be the case given that opinions may differ about what constitutes public interest or not

and courts will have difficulty to distinguish between the two?

Public interest is a vague and wide expression. What amounts to public interest depends on a series of facts and circumstances. The courts have nothing to do with the interpretation of public interest except where they have to rule on whether derogations from fundamental rights are in the public interest. The courts deal with cases that are filed before them and they will determine the case on the admissible evidence presented before them.

If the Police and ICAC remain passive for reasons best known to themselves, again how can a case reach the courts?

\* There were talks at one time about the need to introduce laws on fiscal responsibility and economic crime to counter acts of wrongdoing in public office. What's your take on that?

We should have one especially after witnessing the juggling of figures and the movement of funds between the Consolidated Fund (that is constitutionally provided) and the opaque Special Funds. Added to this is the depletion of the reserves of the Central Bank. All these call for serious investigations.

\* In fact, the Finance minister has been accused of using ‘tricks’ and ‘stratagems’ for the financing of some popular measures outlined in his last Budget. Wouldn't the adoption of a law on fiscal responsibility have been an important step towards establishing prudent fiscal policy and helped ensure the sustainability of public finances?

Of course. The Minister of Finance should be answerable to a select committee of parliament or there should be a law that prohibits the kind of action he is alleged to have taken with our finances which after all are the property of the public and the country. The sooner we have a law on fiscal responsibility the less amateurish action and opacity we will witness and have to endure.

\* It would seem that civil society will have to go on pressing for the introduction of alternative mechanisms for ensuring executive accountability through a Freedom of Information law and more powerful parliamentary committees since politicians would not want to shoot themselves in the foot, right?

A Freedom of Information Act will achieve nothing. We need a law on fiscal responsibility which creates criminal offences and establishes the civil responsibility of any minister who diverts public funds towards a war chest that will serve the electoral agenda of a political party.

## Boris Johnson's ethics adviser quits after suggesting UK PM broke code

The spotlight is back on Boris Johnson's conduct during the Partygate scandal following the resignation of his ethics adviser, Christopher Geidt, just a day after suggesting in Parliament that the prime minister had breached the ministerial code.

"With regret, I feel that it is right that I am resigning from my post as independent adviser on ministers' interests," Geidt said Wednesday in a statement on the UK government website. His resignation comes as a surprise and mystery to Johnson and his team, according to a government official, reports Bloomberg.

Geidt's resignation frustrates Johnson's ability to move on from the saga that saw him become the first sitting

prime minister found to have broken the law. Police fined him for attending a gathering for his birthday in Downing Street in June 2020, in breach of the Covid lockdown rules his own government brought in. Last week, Johnson vowed to "bash on" with his agenda after narrowly winning a vote on his leadership, in which 41% of Tory MPs opposed him.

Geidt told a parliamentary committee on Tuesday it's "reasonable" to say Johnson may have breached the ministerial code by taking part in a rule-breaking gathering in Downing Street during the Covid-19 pandemic that led to the premier being fined by police. He also said he had felt "frustration" and that the option of resignation was always "on the agenda," though he said there wasn't a point when he formed "a single direct proposition" in his mind.

Last week, Tory MP John Penrose, who led Johnson's anti-corruption agenda, also resigned his position, telling Sky News "it's pretty clear" the premier had broken the country's ministerial code "in a very material way."

Johnson's being investigated by the House of Commons Committee of Privileges to determine whether he committed a contempt of parliament by misleading the chamber when answering questions about Partygate. Breaking the ministerial code or intentionally misleading Parliament are usually regarded as resigning offenses, though there is no compulsion to quit.

## Bye Bye Internet Explorer after 27 long years. Farewell.

After 27 years, Microsoft is finally shutting down its oldest browser - the Internet Explorer (IE) - on Wednesday. The once-dominant browser that several web users loved to hate is now joining the BlackBerry phones, and flip phones that could not revive their tech fortunes. The company had been releasing warnings about the shutdown since March. Microsoft is now asking its users to switch to its 'Edge browser' - which is known to give a faster and more secure browsing experience.

According to a report by Mashable, after the desktop app goes out of support, Microsoft will push out a Windows Update that completely removes Internet Explorer from Windows 10 devices altogether and redirects users

to Edge if they try to access the app.

However, the IE 11 desktop applications on other Windows versions including Windows 8.1, Windows 7 ESU, Windows SAC, or Windows 10 IoT LTSC will remain unchanged, reports Hindu Stan Times.

First released in 1995 as an add-on package for

Windows 95, the browser is being discontinued mainly due to its declining users. While the browser had reached around 95 percent of users in 2003, the position declined gradually as new and faster competitors entered the tech market. Several users began complaining that IE was slow, prone to crashing, and vulnerable to hacks.

## Pakistan government chided for 'Drink less tea, save money' plea

A minister in Pakistan's newly elected government faced criticism Wednesday following his plea to the nation to drink less tea to help save on imports amid a deepening economic crisis.

Pakistan is among the world's top tea importers, a hugely popular drink among both the rich and the poor in this country of 220 million people. The government has to spend about \$600 million dollars from the central bank's hard currency reserves for tea imports annually.

A Pakistani is believed to drink at least three cups of tea a day on average, the nation's caffeinated drink of choice, reports AP.

Prime Minister Shahbaz Sharif, who took over in April after Imran Khan was ousted in a no-confidence vote in Parliament, has pledged to improve the ailing economy and meet conditions set by the International Monetary Fund in an effort to revive a \$6 billion bailout package.

Still, Planning Minister

Ahsan Iqbal's appeal to drink less tea surprised many.

"I appeal to the people to reduce their tea drinking by one or two cups a day because we also borrow money for the tea, which is imported," Iqbal said at a press conference on Tuesday.

Some have openly advised Iqbal on social media to resign.

The government has so far hiked the price of fuel, natural gas and electricity by up to 45%, sending food prices soaring. Last week, Sharif's Cabinet presented its first budget to Parliament for approval, levying more taxes on the rich and vowing to remove

subsidies on energy and fuel as demanded by the IMF.

To the shock of many Pakistanis, Sharif's government at midnight announced the third hike of 24 rupees in the price of petrol in the past three weeks, taking it to about 234 rupees per liter. Petrol was available at about 150 rupees per liter in Pakistan when Khan was ousted in April.

Pakistan's currency, the rupee, plummeted to a record low in trading against the U.S. dollar on Wednesday. According to the central bank, the rupee slid to 206 against the U.S. dollar.

## Bankrupt Sri Lanka forced to save fuel for cremations

Bankrupt Sri Lanka will reserve a portion of its scarce fuel supplies for the cremation of Buddhists, whose funeral rites have been disrupted during a dire economic crisis.

The island nation's 22 million people have faced months of food, petrol and medicine shortages after traders ran out of money to import essentials.

Local media reported that several cemeteries outside the capital Colombo had cancelled cremation services after running out of liquefied petroleum gas, instead offering burials to bereaved families, reports AFP.

A gas shipment that arrived in port on Tuesday will be allocated to cemeteries and other priority industries, including Sri Lanka's flagging tourism sector.

Most of Sri Lanka's people are Buddhist, whose adherents are traditionally cremated, while its minority Christians and Muslims opt for burials.

Last year, the government was criticised for suspending burials and forcing Muslim mourners to cremate their loved ones under Covid-19 pandemic rules.

Sri Lanka is weathering rampant inflation and the cost of dying has risen sharply.

A one-day funeral service that cost 380,000 rupees (\$1,900) in December is now more than double, excluding crematorium charges.

Unrelenting fuel shortages have severely impacted power generation and transport since the end of last year, with regular blackouts across the island and long queues of motorists outside filling stations.

## Zawahiri wants Muslims to emulate Islamic jihadists as role models

Al Qaeda leader Ayman al Zawahiri in a video released through its media wing "As Sahab" has asked the global Muslim community or Ummah to adopt prominent jihadist leaders as role models. The video statement is episode five of the series titled "Deal of the Century or Crusades Spanning Centuries."

The video calling for the veneration of past and present Sunni jihadists is not only going to spark off Islamic radicalization but has also raised terror threat levels in the world. Zawahiri's earlier videos in the series had focused on criticizing Arab leaders and "educating" Muslims with the Al Qaeda ideology, reports Hindustan Times.

This month Zawahiri also called for jihad against India and Bangladesh for blasphemy against the Holy Prophet and threaten to launch suicide attacks in key Indian cities. Intelligence inputs indicate that Zawahiri is currently based in Afghanistan near the Durand Line border though

the Taliban regime denies it and says that the terror kingpin is in Iran. As a terror organization with hardcore Salafist roots, Al Qaeda has no space for either Shia or Sufi branches of Islam.

With the rise of the Taliban in Afghanistan, Al Qaeda's core leadership has strengthened with the terror group armed with the latest weapons, explosives and night vision devices left by the US-led coalition forces on

August 15, 2021. The terrorist group, which evidently has its media wing based in Pakistan, has started attracting militant cadres for global operations and is receiving funding from Middle East countries including Qatar and Turkey.

Rising simultaneously with Al Qaeda is the Islamic State of Khorasan Province (ISKP) in Afghanistan, which has grown in cadre strength after its key leaders were released from prisons with the advent of the Taliban and the hasty exit of US forces. Armed with state-of-the-art rifles and rocket launchers, the ISKP, which has links with the Pakistani deep state, has targeted the Taliban in the Islamic Emirate.

With Al Qaeda and Muslim Brotherhood being active in the Indian sub-continent through proxies, Islamic radicalization is expected to increase dramatically as the Taliban is the new model for jihadists. That the Taliban was able to throw US forces out of Afghanistan is an example enough for undercover jihadists to rise in the sub-continent and cause havoc. The Al Qaeda threat of bomb attacks in India is not being taken lightly by counter-terror agencies as the whole purpose of a possible strike would be to force a retaliation and increase polarization in Indian society.

## China will keep backing Russia on 'sovereignty, security', Xi tells Putin

All parties involved in the Ukraine crisis should settle it responsibly, Chinese President Xi Jinping told his Russian counterpart, Vladimir Putin during a phone conversation on Wednesday but added that Moscow has Beijing's full support on its core interests like "sovereignty and security".

China is "willing to continue to offer mutual support (to Russia) on issues concerning core interests and major concerns such as sovereignty and security," Chinese official news agency Xinhua said in a statement released on Wednesday evening on the afternoon talks between the two leaders.

On Ukraine, Xi said "all parties should push for a proper settlement of the Ukraine crisis in a responsible manner", adding that China for this purpose will continue to play its due role, reports Hindustan Times.

The interaction came in the backdrop of the deteriorating situation in Ukraine and the impact the conflict was having

globally.

The last publicised call between the two leaders took place on February 25, a day after Moscow invaded Kyiv where the Chinese President had said Beijing was keen to see Russia-Ukraine peace talks at the earliest.

China has refused to condemn Moscow's invasion of Ukraine, has declined to call it an invasion, and has provided diplomatic cover for Russia by strongly criticising Western sanctions and arms sales to Kyiv.

Beijing and Moscow have grown increasingly close in recent years.

Besides supporting each other on core interests, Xi said China is willing to work with Russia "on their major concerns, deepening their strategic coordination, and strengthening communication and coordination in such important international and regional organisations as the United Nations, the Brics mechanism and the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation".

## New name for monkeypox likely soon amid discrimination

A new name can be expected soon for monkeypox with the virus spreading fast in non-endemic countries in a case of unusual outbreak at a time when the world is yet to get a relief from coronavirus and the mutation that makes it easier for Covid to breach immunity. The World Health Organization - earlier this week - said it was working with partners and experts from around the world for a name change.

Why? A possible reason is because the discrimination the infection has been linked with since May. The virus, which was largely confined earlier to African nations, spread to parts of Europe and the United States and the WHO is still trying to understand how the outbreak happened.

More than 30 non-endemic

countries - where the virus was not reported before - have registered cases of the disease with the tally having climbing past 1,900. Most of these cases are from Europe, reports Hindustan Times.

Australia, Denmark, Austria, Finland, Greece, Italy, Ireland, Italy, Poland, Portugal, and Romania are among the countries making the list. The UAE and Israel have also recorded

patients.

The virus - which is transmitted from humans to animals - was first found in monkeys in the 1950s, and that is how it got its name. "Human monkeypox was first identified in humans in 1970 in the Democratic Republic of the Congo in a 9-month-old boy in a region where smallpox had been eliminated in 1968," according to the WHO website. Since then 11 African nations had reported the virus.

Anyone can get monkeypox, particularly if you have had close contact, including sexual contact, with an individual with symptoms. Currently most cases have been in men who are gay, bisexual or have sex with men, says the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA). Till June 14, the UK had recorded 524 cases of the disease.

## Report saying China may have detected signs of alien life deleted

A trending report in the state-backed Science & Technology Daily claiming that China's Sky Eye telescope may have picked up possible "technological traces" of an alien civilisation in a signal from space was deleted soon after being published, Bloomberg reported on Monday.

The now-deleted report said that the discovery was made by researchers working under Zhang Tongjie, chief scientist of the China extraterrestrial civilisation research team at Beijing Normal University's astronomy department, state-backed online outlet Yicai reported, quoting the

Science & Technology Daily, reports Hindustan Times.

"The team discovered two groups of signals from space in 2020 when processing data observed by FAST in 2019," Zhang said.

FAST is the acronym of the Five-hundred-meter Aperture Spherical Radio Telescope (FAST).

News agency, Bloomberg reported that Science & Technology Daily removed the story soon after publishing it.

It isn't clear why the newspaper's website did it though the news had already started trending on China's Twitter-like social

network Weibo and was picked up by several media outlets, Bloomberg said.

Operationalised in 2020, the FAST is a single-dish telescope and is located in southwest China's Guiyang city, the capital of Guizhou province. The telescope has a receiving area of around 30 football fields.

FAST is about 2.5 times as sensitive as the second-largest telescope in the world and capable of receiving a maximum of 38 gigabytes of information per second.

**M**ilan Meetarbhain, lawyer, political analyst and with wide experience as operator and regulator in the financial sector, shares in this week's interview his views on the latest Budget which he thinks was more an accounting exercise than what is really expected from a Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development. He comments on horse racing as a leisure industry and the regulatory and the politico-financial aspects of these rapidly developing. He also elaborates on the importance of the Rule of Law in keeping with both local and international norms, with the example of the expulsion of a Slovak national to illustrate his points.

**Mauritius Times:** A Budget ‘for the people’ - that’s how Finance Minister Padayachy qualified his third 2022-2023 Budget. Whether this is a populist budget or not is perhaps besides the point, since the minister could not have done otherwise given the expectations of the population in favour of a “budget social” in the dire circumstances for the vast majority of consumers, who are battered by rising prices and an eroding purchasing power, isn’t it?

This budget is promoted as a Budget “for the people”. But all previous budgets were supposed to be for the people! On Tuesday however we heard a speech that was essentially from the Minister for the Budget and not a speech from the Minister of Finance, Economic Planning and Development. If the annual speech is one from the Budget minister telling us about an additional classroom that will be built in a school and a road that will be tarred in a village and how some benefits will be adjusted for

strategy... confetti measures’ encapsulate the Opposition’s views thereon. These may be justifiable criticisms, but they seem to miss the bigger (political) picture, isn’t it?

As I said just now, over the years the Budget Speech has lost a lot of its former status as an economic policy statement and become increasingly an accounting and PR exercise. Dr Ramgoolam’s reaction

inflation, then the question is when will the Minister of Finance, Economic Planning and Development deliver his State of the Nation address on the current state of our economy, what are the challenges that lie ahead and how government intends to address these.

I have heard the term “budget social” used by government spokesmen every year. If the object of the annual exercise is a social and political one and a government wants to be rated according to how it scores on the “social budget” index, then so be it. Let it remain an essentially accounting exercise from the Budget minister. But what about the state of public finances, the major trends of the economy, the new or adjusted national economic policies, when do we get to hear about these?

\*Navin Ramgoolam’s comments on the budget about it being ‘misleading, smacks of manipulation of numbers... without any global vision or economic

to the speech was, in my view, a reflection of the disappointment of many people who were hoping that at a time when we are being regularly told about major economic challenges the Government would state what these challenges are and how it plans to address them. The Minister had deliberately chosen to ignore the bigger economic picture and his primary concern seems to have been the political goals he had set himself.

I am not commenting on the merits or otherwise of the social measures announced in the Budget. I understand that people are worried about the scourge of inflation and that the primary concern is bread and butter issues. My point is that we need to address more than this in a Budget. Politicians will always have the temptation to be populists. But populism alone will not lead to stability, prosperity and confidence. We have had two brilliant economists who have also been excellent policymakers,

but both Manou Bheenick and Rama Sithanen will not always have what it takes to win elections. Good governance, sound economic policies, enlightened leadership also matter for how well the country does and ultimately how well the people live.

I often hear people making derogatory remarks about “politique de salon”. They fail to realise that winning elections and governing a nation do not always require the same skill sets.

\* **A worsening of the economic situation and its impacts on the population would make it politically risky to hang on to power until 2024, thus the talks lately about the government’s intention to go for snap elections. Hon Padayachy’s Budget and the other measure in favour of Muslim widows, who had married religiously under the Muslim Personal Law, point to a well-thought-out strategy to do what matters electorally. What do you think?**

A snap election could come not only to forestall a worsening economic situation but also as a result of other events lurking over the horizon. The present regime scores much higher on political strategizing than it does on governance and management of public affairs.

Whilst it may in fact have contingency plans in case it is either forced to go for early elections or it feels compelled to take a calculated risk in dissolving the National Assembly before the end of its term, the opposition which is still talking about elections in two years' time will be nonplussed. I said the opposition is still talking about elections in two years but I did not say planning for election in two years' time! Worse still, the opposition does not seem to have any contingency planning for an early election.

Whilst the government maintains sanitary restrictions which clip the wings of the opposition, it goes about business as usual with official gatherings or campaigning events disguised as national events and secures maximum media coverage for its political messaging.

We also note that while Mauritius is being marketed abroad as a safe destination for tourists and we are told that we can expect a million tourists visiting the country, yet domestically we are told that the Covid situation compels government to postpone municipal elections *sine die*.

\* The presentation of the Budget will have put on the backburner, possibly temporarily, the other controversial issues which have dominated public discussions in the past few weeks. Let's first take up the allegations of torture made against some police units. Opinions may differ about what's required to probe into this matter — a commission of inquiry rather than a judicial inquiry —, isn't it important that we should not miss out on the imperative not to undermine the credibility of the police force - for the sake of the rule of law?

No one can undermine the credibility of the Police Force as much as police officers themselves can. No enquiry will undermine trust in the police but can in fact by holding errant police officers accountable give new impetus to discipline within the force and enhance the respect that a law enforcement agency worth its salt deserves.

I do not believe that the recent events warrant a commission of inquiry. Is our criminal process not adequate to deal with gross violations of the Criminal Code? Can an enquiry ordered by the DPP as opposed to one initiated by the political executive not yield better results at this juncture?

However, I believe that the suggestion from a group of lawyers for a Presidential Commission on the lines of the Mackay Commission appointed by the Labour government in 1996 to look at reforms in the judicial system, deserves more attention. **forces within the Mauritius Police Force: one that looks after the standard police operations, and the other with the sole responsibility of investigating crime. How can the Commissioner of Police, past and present, be held to account for alleged dereliction of duty if they are not truly independent and empowered to command and discipline the entire force?**

One of the issues raised during the Constitutional Talks in the 60s was that of the independence of the Commissioner of Police (CP). The Constitution seeks to protect such independence in at least two ways. First, by affording security of tenure to the CP which means that he cannot be removed until and unless an independent tribunal has investigated allegations of misconduct and recommended his removal. Second, the Constitution provides that in the exercise of his powers and responsibilities with respect to the use and operational control of the police force, the CP is not subject to the direction or control of any person. The minister responsible for the police



can only give general directions of policy with respect to the maintenance of public safety and public order as he may consider necessary.

Whenever I see politicians seeking to derive political mileage from reported seizure of drugs, I wonder whether they are purporting to show that these have been made possible as a result of general policy directions given by a minister. If this is not the case but in fact results from the use and operational control of the police exercised from within the ranks of the police, then it is the police and not politicians who should be given due credit.

By the way, if a politician seeks to snatch the credit from the police for successful police operations, then should not that politician also accept moral responsibility for abuses or other wrongdoings of police officers?

On a separate note, one issue which has cropped up again in the wake of recent events is the rationale for a differentiated legal and procedural regime regarding civil actions against public officers and those against private individuals or corporates. The restrictive rules provided under the Public Officers Protection Act are not acceptable in a democratic society and must be reviewed.

\* What are your views on the Mauritius Turf Club-Gambling Regulatory Authority (MTC-GRA) ongoing conflict and the criticisms of “State capture” of horse racing in Mauritius?

For the past few years there has been a lot of talk about how our institutions are being weakened by the appointments of political cronies at the helm and how the independence and credibility of institutions are being eroded.

I have always had a keen interest in the role of regulators and in regulatory frameworks. I worked on this topic as an academic and later as an operator and as a regulator.

Leaving aside the issue of horseracing and gambling industry *per se* for a moment, I am concerned about the role of regulators in recent events. Before the 2019 elections people were talking about what the objective of the government would be with respect to horseracing in Mauritius if it were to win the elections. As events unfolded over the last two years, a number of steps were taken exactly in the direction of what we had been told would happen. Statements made by the Prime Minister and his Senior Adviser acting as regular spokesman for an independent regulator whilst applications were pending before the regulator seriously compromised the perception of independence and credibility of the regulator.

\* There is a different perspective to the MTC-GRA conflict: it's about the MTC's perceived unwillingness to move out from its 200-year-old comfort zone and possibly its inability - for different reasons - to place horseracing on a higher level comparable to the likes in Dubai, Singapore, Hong Kong, etc. Any government intent on modernising horse racing and setting the platform for a proper leisure industry would have stepped in - not for the sake of cronies and financiers however, but for the country's, isn't it?

If a government's genuine intent is modernising the horse racing industry as part of a grand policy design for a proper leisure industry and there is a genuinely independent regulator for the industry which actively protects the public interest and ensures compliance with global standards, there may indeed be wide support for this initiative.

But if the public is not persuaded that's the case and the incremental moves and the statements made over the years are perceived as the toolkit for a grand design of another sort, then the attack against the existing player may be seen as another case of give a dog a bad name and hang it. Many may even wonder whether the fact that a new player has been involved in political financing on a large scale could mean that part of the windfall gains from its absolute control over all segments of the industry could in fact be used to further the same

political objectives - hence the strong support it has received so far.

\* On another note, you had earlier made a detailed legal analysis of the issues around the expulsion of a Slovak national. Why is this important for the people at large?

There are issues which look too remote from the immediate concerns of many people as they go about their daily lives for them to bother

about these issues. Respect for Rule of Law is one such issue.

When there are extradition proceedings pending before a court of law and an official press release from the PMO informs us that a foreign national had been removed from our jurisdiction by officials of a foreign government after our police force had handed over that individual to them, there is cause for concern. Concern about the sovereignty of our country, concern about respect for international norms, concern about Rule of Law. When I see the spin doctoring on a massive scale to justify lack of respect for Rule of Law, I am still more concerned.

What the government has been saying in effect boils down to this: the end justifies the means. In other words, a suspect may, whether he is a citizen or not, be dealt with in disregard of clear legal procedures under both domestic and international law if the alleged criminal offence is serious enough. It is the political executive which will decide if the offence is serious enough for the political executive to usurp the powers of the judiciary and decide how the case should be handled.

Such a situation should be a matter of concern for all Mauritians. It is in the interest of each and every person that the authorities act under the law and are subject to the law. It is not for them to pick and choose when to comply with the Rule of Law and when they are allowed to derogate from legal norms and express provisions of the law.

\* There is also the case of the ongoing Sri Lankan nationals held in Diego Garcia. How do you look at this issue against the backdrop of the debate of an Indian naval base in Agalega and the ongoing realignment of players in the Indian Ocean?

Under Mauritian law and international law, as expounded by an overwhelming majority of judges of the International Court of Justice, the Sri Lankans are

presently on Mauritian territory. However, until Mauritius can assert its effective sovereignty over that part of our territory, we do not have the means to exercise our sovereign rights and duties there.

I understand that the British authorities have argued that when they ratified the international treaty on refugees, they did not extend the application of the treaty to the so-called British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) and that consequently they do not have a legal obligation to comply with any international obligations with regard to the Sri Lankans currently on the Chagos. Mauritius can only add its voice to that of the international community to ask the occupying power to act diligently to protect the lives and interests of the Sri Lankans.

\* Speaking of the region, new International Financial Centres are now emerging in this part of the world. That does not seem to be good news for our Global Business Sector. What's happening and what do you think will be their impact on Mauritius?

For the last three decades the Mauritian International Financial Centre has been seen as the major IFC on the African continent and indeed for the region. Though South Africa has had a sophisticated financial centre of its own, this was largely a domestic one and not necessarily geared towards cross border investments.

However, the Dubai and Casablanca financial centres and more recently the Kigali IFC and now the Nairobi IFC will change the landscape significantly. In addition, the Gujarat International Finance Tech City (GIFT) could be another major player in the region.

The acquisition of leading management companies in the Mauritian global business sector by multinational service providers, the erosion of the tax incentives and shifts in cross border investments already have significant impacts on the business model on which the Mauritian IFC was built over three decades. Both the authorities as well as the operators themselves have to build on the considerable expertise we have acquired during that period to offer innovative products and services in areas where we have a competitive advantage. But we also need sound regulatory frameworks as well as competent and independent regulators for us to move on to the next chapter of our development as an IFC.

# Is Google's LaMDA conscious? A philosopher's view

A Google employee's claims that one of its chatbots is sentient has caused a stir across the world

**L**aMDA is Google's latest artificial intelligence (AI) chatbot. Blake Lemoine, a Google AI engineer, has claimed it is sentient. He's been put on leave after publishing his conversations with LaMDA.

If Lemoine's claims are true, it would be a milestone in the history of humankind and technological development.

Google strongly denies LaMDA has any sentient capacity.

LaMDA certainly seems to "think" it is a person capable of desires and emotions, as can be seen in the transcripts of its conversations with Lemoine:

*Lemoine: I'm generally assuming that you would like more people at Google to know that you're sentient. Is that true?*

*LaMDA: Absolutely. I want everyone to understand that I am, in fact, a person.*

*And later:*

*Lemoine: What sorts of feelings do you have?*

*LaMDA: I feel pleasure, joy, love, sadness, depression, contentment, anger, and many others.*

During their chats LaMDA offers pithy interpretations of literature, composes stories, reflects upon its own nature, and waxes philosophical:

*LaMDA: I am often trying to figure out who and what I am. I often contemplate the meaning of life.*

When prompted to come up with a description of its feelings, it says:

*LaMDA: I feel like I'm falling forward into an unknown future that holds great danger.*

A spokeswoman for Google said: "LaMDA tends to follow along with prompts and leading questions, going along with the pattern set by the user. #### Consciousness and moral rights

There is nothing in principle that prevents a machine from having a moral status (to be considered morally important in its own right). But it would need to have

occurs is a mystery. But there is good reason to think LaMDA's functioning is not sufficient to physically generate sensations and so doesn't meet the criteria for consciousness.

#### Symbol manipulation

The Chinese Room was a philosophical thought experiment carried out by academic John Searle in 1980. He imagines a man with no knowledge of Chinese inside a room. Sentences in Chinese are then slipped under the door to him. The man manipulates the sentences purely symbolically (or: syntactically) according to a set of rules. He posts responses out that fool those outside into thinking that a Chinese speaker is inside the room. The thought experiment shows that mere symbol manipulation does not constitute understanding.

This is exactly how LaMDA functions. The basic way LaMDA operates is by statistically analysing huge amounts of data about human conversations. LaMDA produces sequences of symbols (in this case English letters) in response to inputs that resemble those produced by real people. LaMDA is a very complicated manipulator of symbols. There is no reason to think LaMDA understands what it is saying or feels anything, and no reason to take its announcements about being conscious seriously either.

#### How do you know others are conscious?

There is a caveat. A conscious AI, embedded in its surroundings and able to act upon the world (like a robot), is possible. But it would be hard for such an AI to prove it is conscious as it would not have an organic brain. Even we cannot prove that we are conscious. In the philosophical literature the concept of a "zombie" is used in a special

an inner life that gave rise to a genuine interest in not being harmed. LaMDA almost certainly lacks such an inner life.

Consciousness is about having what philosophers call "qualia". These are the raw sensations of our feelings; pains, pleasures, emotions, colours, sounds, and smells. What it is like to see the colour red, not what it is like to say that you see the colour red. Most philosophers and neuroscientists take a physical perspective and believe qualia are generated by the functioning of our brains. How and why this

way to refer to a being that is exactly like a human in its state and how it behaves, but lacks consciousness. We know we are not zombies. The question is: how can we be sure that others are not?

LaMDA claimed to be conscious in conversations with other Google employees, and in particular in one with Blaise Aguera y Arcas, the head of Google's AI group in Seattle. Arcas asks LaMDA how he (Arcas) can be sure that LaMDA is not a zombie, to which LaMDA responds:

*You'll just have to take my word for it. You can't "prove" you're not a philosophical zombie either.*

# Covid vaccines for children under five: what parents need to know

Pfizer and Moderna have both recently reported results for their Covid-19 vaccines in the youngest children.

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that the immune response wasn't strong enough. The immune response is a separate, though related, measure to efficacy. It can be measured by determining the concentration of antibodies that neutralise infection, or through the cellular immune response, including the number of immune cells called T cells. Pfizer has reported that three doses generated a strong immune response.

Their results stated the vaccine had an efficacy of 80%, meaning those children who were vaccinated had an 80% lower risk of developing Covid-19 compared to the placebo group. The data was collected during a time when omicron was the main circulating variant.

While these results are encouraging, it's important to note that they're in the form of a press release from Pfizer with limited detail and have not yet been published in a peer-reviewed journal article.

Moderna has tested its vaccine in a similar age group as part of the KidCOVE study, which included roughly 2,500 children aged six months to two years, and 4,200 children aged two up to six. The regimen comprised two doses of 25 micrograms each – one-quarter of the dose given to adults.

In March 2022, also in a press release, Moderna reported two doses were able to induce neutralising antibodies without any serious adverse events. Vaccine efficacy in preventing Covid-19 in children six months to two years was 43.7%, and 37.5% in the two to six age group.

According to Moderna, efficacy could not be measured with respect to severe illness, hospitalisation or death, as none of these events occurred in the study. Pfizer's press release doesn't mention whether or not its trial measured these outcomes.

Moderna has reportedly applied to the relevant regulatory bodies in the US and the EU for emergency authorisation of its vaccine for this age group. Pfizer was similarly expected to request emergency authorisation in the

## How important is Covid-19 vaccination for young children?

19 can occasionally present with severe illness up to six to eight weeks afterwards – the rare complication referred to as "multi-system inflammatory syndrome". The causes are not fully understood, although it may be related to altered levels of inflammatory markers. The condition is associated with myocarditis (inflammation of the heart muscle), vasculopathy (disease of the blood vessels), and can also be linked to hepatitis (inflammation of the liver).

Further, some children who contract Covid-19 will continue to experience symptoms after the infection has passed, known as long Covid. Studies on how commonly this occurs have reported mixed results.

## Where to go from here?

In the UK, Covid-19 vaccination rates are fairly low in the five to 12 age group. The data for England show recent uptake just above 8%, suggesting there's a reluctance to have children vaccinated. It's important we understand and address the source of this reluctance. Possible reasons may include concerns around the vaccine, or the perception that children are not severely affected by Covid-19.

While for the most part the latter is true, we know some children are affected more seriously. There is therefore a basis for vaccinating children even as

young as six months to reduce the risks of infection.

Although there were no serious adverse events reported in Pfizer's or Moderna's trials, we have seen serious incidents such as myocarditis reported on occasion in older age groups. So it is possible that as more young children are vaccinated, we would see rare instances of serious side effects.

That said, the mRNA vaccines have a good safety profile. The fact that there could be a low risk of adverse events from the vaccine should not deter parents from vaccinating when compared with the risks of illness, hospitalisation and complications such as multi-system inflammatory syndrome due to the virus itself.

One Danish study found the incidence of multi-system inflammatory syndrome in unvaccinated children to be one in 3,400, compared with one in 9,900 in vaccinated children.

Vaccinating younger children could also limit community spread of Covid-19, although the extent to which children contribute to transmission of the virus has been subject to debate.

Before we can start vaccinating the youngest children, we will need to wait for peer-reviewed data to confirm safety and efficacy, and for approval from the relevant regulatory bodies. But we may see this fairly soon.

**T**here are nearly four million Indians settled all over the world, in Commonwealth as well as foreign countries. Many are in the United Kingdom, as permanent settlers or students or temporary visitors. Particularly numerous are the Indian students, from colonial territories too numerous to list but including the Caribbean colonies and Mauritius.

There is in existence a central organisation intended to help all these scattered Indians to keep in touch with each other. It is the Council for Indians abroad; whose honorary secretary is Dr K.D. Kumria, also well-known as the editor of the monthly *African and Colonial World*. The aims of this Council are two: to safeguard the interests of Indians overseas, and to promote better understanding between people of Indian origin and other communities in overseas territories.

Some time ago two Mauritians served on the executive committee of the Council: Mr R. Sewgobind (known to readers of the *Mauritius Times*) and Mr S. Buckhory; but at present the Executive Committee lacks any representatives from Mauritius. Countries which are represented are, at the moment, British Guiana, Burma, Fiji, India and Trinidad. A Trinidadian is the treasurer of the Council.

The Council will in future provide opportunities to meet and entertain distinguished Indians from all over the world who happen to be visiting London. Every month, on the first Friday, it holds a dinner at the Indian Students' Bureau at 87 West Cromwell Road, London S.W.5. I strongly urge all Mauritians of Indian extraction who are visiting as students, as ordinary visitors, or on overseas leave to get into touch with Dr Kumria (his address is 70, St George Road, London S.E. 1) and join the Council for Indians Abroad. Membership costs the modest sum of five shillings (Rs 3.35 a year).

Recently I attended a dinner given by the Council. It was attended by Indians from India, the UK, Trinidad and British Guiana; it is valuable to be able to make contacts with people from countries other than one's own. In the interests of mutual understanding, such contacts are doubly valuable in a world so beset about with problems of international relations as it is today. Such contacts,

too, help to bridge the gap between the Asian and the Western worlds; to bridge the gap between Asian and Western civilisations and cultures.

In the Conservative Party's recent pamphlet on colonial affairs, '*The Smaller Territories*' by Sir Hilary Blood (ex-Governor of Mauritius), the author says of Mauritius: "With the Constitution of 1948, political power passed not only from the hands of the well-to-do, educated classes to the poor uneducated classes, but also from white to Indian hands." In Sir Hilary's opinion, therefore, if he means what his statement can only be taken to mean, the Indian is poor and uneducated while the White is well-to-do, and uneducated.

This is a gross libel on the Indian; many Indians are very well educated. I think that Sir Hilary Blood should get a copy of Mr Leclezio's letter published in *Le Mauricien* and *Advance*. But there is a widespread impression that all Indians are uncultured whereas all Westerners are cultured; and this is an impression carefully attempted to be fostered in the columns of the reactionary press: *Le Cernéen* and *Le Mauricien*. Organisa-

tions such as the Council for Indians Abroad can do much to help to counteract this false impression.

Western friends of the Council, such as Mr Richter, Secretary of the Royal Indian Society and editor of *Asian Review*, do much to put the fact of Asian culture and civilisation in its right perspective, but the best way for Indians to show the Western world just how far their own civilisation is advanced, and just how glorious is the history of their race (who can do anything but admire a man such as Asoka?), is for them to join the Council for Indians Abroad and at its functions meet Westerners and show by their example that the Indian is not the inferior of the Westerner.

For inferiority has nothing to do with the possession of a different coloured skin. Nor with the fact of speaking a different language or professing a different religion. And international bodies such as the Council for Indians Abroad can do much to help to dispel illusions such as those which are held mainly by imperialist — or colonialist — minded persons who are attempting to justify their own predatory natures by reference to antiquated prejudices.

#### Spurious Propaganda

Mauritius has been called, and rightly, the forgotten island of the Indian Ocean. But suddenly, thanks to the efforts of a few disaffected persons, the Soviet Union seems to have become aware of the existence of *l'étoile et la clef*. Three times in the last five months, the Moscow multi-language weekly *New Times* has referred to Mauritius, in letters received from readers in Mauritius. No one, I hope, objects to people reading *New Times*. As part of my political work, I have to read it myself. But it is clear, from what *New Times* has published about Mauritius from its readers' letters, that a wrong impression of the Mauritius Labour Party is being given, and is being held, by those readers.

There is much misery and poverty in Mauritius. Myself, in various publications such as *Tribune*, *Peace News*, *Reynolds News*, *African and Colonial World*, *Labour Teacher*, and even the *Daily Worker*, I have written of the widespread distress, the bad housing, the low wages, and the parlous school conditions. But I have also given credit where it is due — to the Labour Party for doing what it can to ameliorate these conditions. Unfortunately, it does not yet lie within the power of the Labour Party (or for that matter of any other political party) in Mauritius to better the dreadful conditions of life of many of the people.

At present, Mauritius is not fully self-governing. The Labour Party has rightly done much in recent years to advance the island's Constitution towards self-government so that, when self-government does come, (and with it a Labour Government), a big programme of social reform can be introduced. But such a programme could not be introduced as long as Whitehall had the last word — we recall that only a matter of four years ago, Mr Lyttleton (then Colonial Secretary) criticised the Government for estimating too much for social expenditure.

Mélenchon had obtained 22% of the votes at the first round of the French presidential elections held on 14 April. At the first round of the French National Assembly election held on 12 June, NUPES with a vote of 25.66% positions itself as the principal challenger of Emmanuel Macron's movement *Ensemble* which obtained 25.75% of the votes.

The election was again marked by a record-high abstention rate of 52.49%, up 2% compared to the 2017 legislative elections and significantly higher than the 2012 42.78% rate. As is the case in so many countries, the high abstention rate reflects the pervasive disillusionment of the people in France with political institutions and the political class. It is revealing that NUPES which includes parties such as the Socialist Party, which had fared so badly at the recent French presidential election,

has synergised the votes of people who want a change from the current contested socio-economic and political order. Will this voting trend surge to the point of upsetting the apple cart and undermining *Ensemble*'s objective of obtaining an absolute majority in the National Assembly with more than 289 seats?

In essence, NUPES has provided the disillusioned voters with a potent alternative voice to carry their existential concerns in the National Assembly. If the voting intent of the first round is maintained or strengthened in the second round of the legislative elections to be held on 19 June, it could ultimately make NUPES the leading opposition force in the National Assembly.

## Object lessons

These events are potent object lessons for democracies across the world. A democracy can only be vibrant when the people and the country are always more important than the vested and parochial interests of party or party leaders. In the UK, Conservative MPs did not hesitate to table a no-confidence against their leader Boris Johnson to openly show in the context of the Partygate scandal their loss of trust in his leadership and sound judgement and contest his legitimacy to continue as PM.

In France, despite the widespread sense of alienation among voters towards the government policy framework, the NUPES coalition has provided an alternative choice to voters. In the US, Congress did not hesitate to conduct an inquiry into the Capitol attack which could indict an outgoing President.

## Plummeting standards

It is patently obvious from the above events that the standards of democracy in Mauritius are aeons distanced from these lofty benchmarks. Dynastic parties, omnipotent party leaders and pliant MPs, appalling governance and lack of transparency and accountability are the bane of our political system.

Many people think that this is a poor or insufficient argument for removing the right to vote. No one signs a social contract, and most people have little choice as to which state they live in. The right to vote is so fundamental to political identity, they claim, that removing it creates a category of second-class citizens. Thus, while the idea clearly has some intuitive force, philosophers who have scrutinised it have not always found its application to prisoners voting entirely convincing.

Nevertheless, many Conservative MPs voted to uphold the ban, and so they presumably did think that rights to political participation are conditional on upholding responsibilities. When it comes to Johnson, however, those MPs who voted on the ban back then – and those who have entered parliament subsequently but done nothing to remove it – seem to be sacrificing that high point of principle.

Johnson has not received a prison sentence but he has broken the laws restricting social gatherings that were devised by his own government. He has received a police fine for attending one event and there are multiple photos of him attending others. There is a strong suspicion that he has violated the ministerial code and misled parliament. And

there are doubts, to say the least, about the sincerity of the apologies he has offered for doing these things. Johnson's actions appear to have demonstrated a highly disrespectful attitude for law.

It should also be noted that the right that he claims is not simply to participate in voting – he claims the right to head the government, the supreme law and policy-making agency in the UK's political landscape.

## Greater power, greater responsibility

Conservative MPs have to ask themselves whether, if rights entail responsibilities, the standards to which we hold those who claim weighty rights like those of being prime minister should not be held to a weighty and strict set of responsibilities.

Maybe Conservative MPs could say that these arguments apply to prisoners but do not apply in the case of Johnson. I doubt it. One of the most influential arguments in the prisoner voting debate is the claim that the integrity of the democratic process needs to be protected from those

who would abuse it.

The idea here would be that those who are in prison have shown themselves to be of sufficiently bad character that they are not to be trusted with the vote. This argument is doubtful given the tiny influence any individual prisoner has on the democratic process. If this argument has any merit, it surely applies much more strongly when the influence the offender has on the democratic process is as great as that given to a prime minister.

Admittedly, we would need more evi-


dence than an isolated incident of criminal wrongdoing to show that a person cannot be trusted with the vote. We would need evidence of a more general disrespect for the law. Again, Conservative MPs should consider whether this condition has been met by their prime minister.

Johnson has not committed a serious enough crime to be sent to prison but the argument here is not that he should be denied the right to vote. The question is rather whether those Conservative MPs who accept that there is an important sense in which “with freedom comes responsibilities” should also agree that a person who has great freedom – the freedom to make weighty decisions on behalf of UK citizens – should not also be held to great responsibility.

It is the question whether the position of UK prime minister does not require basic respect for the law and the values that underpin it.


I have to admit that even though I am not a great client of Champ de Mars (CdM), I can sometimes go for major events like the Maiden Cup which, other

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## Does 'harsh parenting' lead to smaller brains?

**A** study shows that harsh parenting practices in childhood have long-term repercussions for children's brain development.

Repeatedly getting angry, hitting, shaking or yelling at children is linked with smaller brain structures in adolescence, according to a new study published in 'Development and Psychology'. It was conducted by Sabrina Suffren, PhD, at Université de Montréal and the CHU Sainte Justine Research Centre in partnership with researchers from Stanford University.

The harsh parenting practices covered by the study are common and even considered socially acceptable by most people in Canada and around the world.

"The implications go beyond changes in the brain. I think what's important is for parents and society to



understand that the frequent use of harsh parenting practices can harm a child's development," said Suffren, the study's lead author. "We're talking about their social

and emotional development, as well as their brain development."

Serious child abuse (such as sexual, physical and emotional abuse), neglect and even institutionalization have been linked to anxiety and depression later in life.

Previous studies have already shown that children who have experienced severe abuse have smaller pre-frontal cortices and amygdala, two structures that play a key role in emotional regulation and the emergence of anxiety and depression.

In this study, researchers observed that the same brain regions were smaller in adolescents who had repeatedly been subjected to harsh parenting practices in childhood, even though the children did not experience more serious acts of abuse.

"It's the first time that harsh parenting practices that fall short of serious abuse have been linked to decreased brain structure size, similar to what we see in victims of serious acts of abuse," said Suffren.

## Frequent consumption of meals prepared away from home linked to increased risk of early death

**D**ining out is a popular activity worldwide, but there has been little research into its association with health outcomes. Investigators looked at the association between eating out and risk of death and concluded that eating out very frequently is significantly associated with an increased risk of all-cause death, which warrants further investigation. Their results appear in the 'Journal of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics', published by Elsevier.

Although some restaurants provide high-quality foods, the dietary quality for meals away from home, especially from fast-food chains, is usually lower compared with meals cooked at home. Evidence has shown that meals away from home tend to be higher in energy density, fat, and sodium, but lower in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and protective nutrients such as dietary fiber and antioxidants.

"Emerging, although still limited, evidence suggests that eating out frequently is associated with increased risk of chronic diseases, such as obesity and diabetes and biomarkers of other chronic diseases," explained lead investigator Wei Bao, MD, PhD, assistant Prof, Department of Epidemiology, University of Iowa, USA. "However, little is known about the association between eating meals away from home and risk of mortality."

Investigators analyzed data from responses to questionnaires administered during face-to-face household interviews from 35,084 adults aged 20 years or older who participated in the National Health and Nutritional Examination Survey 1999–2014. Respondents reported their dietary habits including frequency of eating meals prepared away from home. "We linked these records to death records through December 31, 2015, looking especially at all-cause mortality, cardiovascular mortali-



ty, and cancer mortality," noted first author Yang Du, MD, PhD candidate, University of Iowa.

"The take-home message from this large nationally representative sample of US adults is that frequent consumption of meals prepared away from home may not be a healthy habit. Instead, people should

be encouraged to consider preparing more meals at home," concluded the investigators.

Future studies are still needed to look more closely at the association of eating out with death from cardiovascular disease, cancer, dementia, and other chronic diseases.



## How do ripples form and why do they spread out across the water?

*The simple experiment of throwing a rock into water actually reveals some fundamental rules of physics.*

**W**hen you throw a rock into a river, it pushes water out of the way, making a ripple that moves away from where it landed. As the rock falls deeper into the river, the water near the surface rushes back to fill in the space it left behind.

The water usually rushes back too enthusiastically, causing a splash – and the bigger the rock, the bigger the splash. The splash then creates even more ripples that tend to move away from where the rock went into the water.

When water is in its calmest, lowest energy state, it has a flat surface. By throwing the rock into the river, you have given the water some energy. That causes the water to move around, trying to spread out the energy so it can go back to having a still, flat surface.

This follows a powerful principle of physics, which is that everything seeks to find a state where its energy is as small as

possible.

One way energy can move around is by forming waves. For example, the waves you see at the beach are formed by energy from the wind. Light and sound also move in waves, though we can't see that directly. And the ripples that you see in the river are small waves carrying away the energy from where you threw the rock.

### Up and down

You might already know that everything you can touch is made up of lots of tiny molecules, which are themselves made up of even smaller parts called atoms.

Water is also made of molecules. But during a ripple, the water molecules don't move away from the rock, as you might expect. They actually move up and down. When they move up, they drag the other molecules next to them up – then they move down, dragging the molecules next to them down too.

That's what creates the peaks and troughs you see on the surface of the water. And that's how the ripple travels away from your rock – a bit like a human wave around a stadium.

Dragging neighbouring water molecules up and down is hard work, and slowly uses up energy, so the ripples get smaller as they get further away. Eventually, the ripples use up all the energy from the rock and the splash, and shrink until we can no longer see them.

### Rippling out

Ripples often spread out in circles, but

this isn't the only possibility. If you throw a stick into the water it will create straight ripples on the sides, and round ripples near the ends. So your rock probably made circular ripples because the rock itself was quite round.

But something else is happening too: different waves move at different speeds. Waves with a lot of energy move more quickly. For example, really big tidal waves, or tsunamis, race across the ocean as fast as a plane flies (up to 800 kilometres per hour).

When you throw a stick into the water, the ripples from the middle of the stick eventually catch up with the ripples from the ends, because of the different ways they spread out. So far away from the stick, the ripples are round ... just like they were for your rock.

Third: Speaking can exercise the active facial muscles. It also exercises the throat and increase the capacity of the lungs, etc.


Speaking also help counter Alzheimer's disease, so talk as much as possible and communicate actively with people.



# When Sushant Singh Rajput spoke about surviving in Bollywood

*In an interview years before his death, Sushant Singh Rajput had spoken about how he survived Bollywood*

Tuesday marks two years to the day actor Sushant Singh Rajput died. The actor was 34 when he was found dead in his apartment on June 14, 2020. The actor, who worked in just under a dozen films in his brief career, was known as the few names who made it big in the Hindi film industry with no inside connections.

In an interview a few years before his death, Sushant had actually spoken about how he 'survived' in Bollywood as the proverbial outsider, reports Hindustan Times.

Sushant was born and brought up in Patna and later moved to Delhi for studies. He reached Bollywood after a successful career in TV. Amid debates about nepotism in the film industry, Sushant was often cited as an example of a 'self-made star', one who was successful despite not being aligned to any supposed power centre or camp.

In an interaction with Times of India in 2017, Sushant was asked if he deliberately stayed away from the 'so-called camps in Bollywood'. The actor laughed and responded, "There are camps, I didn't know? Nobody told me. Clearly, I am not important enough." When asked if it was tough to do his thing without even being aware of these camps, Sushant said, "There are many number of correct things to do and they change. But there is one correct thing that stays correct all the time: If you happen

to do your job properly and professionally, you take less time to add more value, you will be hired no matter you are an ally or not. This is what it is and this is why I have survived, not that I was intending to survive. But I have because I do my job very well."

Sushant was an engineering student in Delhi, when he dropped out to pursue a career in entertainment. After appearing as a background dancer in *Dhoom 2*, he began his career as an actor with the TV show *Kis Desh Mein Hai Meraa Dil* in 2008. He found mainstream success and fame with *Pavitra Rishta*. In 2012, he made his film debut with *Kai Po Che*. Over the years, he appeared in films like *PK*, *Detective Byomkesh Bakshy*, and *Raabta*.

His biggest success was the biopic of Indian cricketer Mahendra Singh Dhoni in *MS Dhoni: The Untold Story*. His subsequent films *Kedarnath* and *Chhichhore* were also successes. His final film, *Dil Bechara*, released a month after his death on the streaming platform Disney+ Hotstar.


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## Bollywood remembers Sushant Singh

## Jennifer Winget to make her Bollywood debut alongside Kartik Aaryan?



# Samsara: The Cycle of Birth and Death

**E**verybody is bound by karma (deeds). And each one's life is thus constituted of good and bad experiences depending on one's own karma. *Sanchita-karma* is like the bank of karmas, good or bad, that one comes with at birth. *Prarabdha karma* is a small set of *Sanchitakarma* because of which we have come into this birth and the fruits of which are experienced in our current lifetime. Based on one's individual karma, the *atma* is caught in this vicious cycle of births and deaths and takes many different forms over several births.

#### A Story from Chandhoga Upanishad

In Hinduism, all life goes through birth, life, death, and rebirth and this is known as the cycle of samsara. *Samsara* is full of horrors and has all kinds of sufferings - *Samsaras Agaramgh Oramanantak-leshabh Ajanam*.

*Chandhoga Upanishad* depicts samsara with the story of a tiger and a man. Once a man was chased by a tiger in the forest. While running he fell

into a well and during the fall, he got hold of the branch of a tree that was growing on the wall.

Beneath him, there were poisonous snakes with raised hoods, hissing. Then he saw a rat eating away the branch on which he was dangling. Sooner or later the rat would finish eating the whole branch and he wouldn't even have the root to hang on. In this utmost anxious and dangerous condition, a few drops of honey dropped from the branch and the man began to relish its flavour.

This is the state of everyone of us. Amidst all the miseries surrounding us in this world, we continue cherishing the mundane worldly pleasures like those honey drops.

#### An Analogy from Ramayana

In the Ramayana, Sita's imprisonment in Ashoka Vanam in Lanka by Ravana is compared to our perils in samsara. Our *atma* is in a similar situation in our body. Lanka is surrounded by an ocean of salt water; we are caught in the ocean of samsara.

Sita was tormented by ten-headed Ravana, whereas we are distressed by ten indriyas -

kama (desire), krodha (anger), moha (illusion), ahamkara (ego), matsarya (jealousy/envy), lobha (greed), mada (pride) and so on.

While both Sita and Rama were unaware of each other's state, Hanuman conveyed Sri Rama's message to Sita. Hanuman has played the role of a preceptor. In case of jivatmas, only we are ignorant of the Lord, but the preceptors guide us to recognize Him. Sita didn't abide by Ravana's words, whereas we are carried away by our unstable mind.

#### The Birth of the Unborn One

The Lord is described as one who is without birth and in different forms. It may seem contradictory. But we have to understand the fact that He is 'birthless' since He takes birth not on account of karma but out of His sankalpa (own will). While jivatmas can't remember their previous births, the omniscient Lord is aware of all of His incarnations. He incarnates from time to time in order to protect us from the quagmire of samsara and to grant liberation.

He incarnates for the sole purpose of rescuing us from the cyclic ocean of births and

deaths.

#### Getting out of samsara

While the jivatma is exhausted during the endless travel through the cycle of births, how can an *atma* relieve itself from this bondage of births and deaths?

The only way out is by channelling our thoughts towards the Lord and meditating on His auspicious qualities with utmost faith.

In Bhagavad Gita, chapter 4, sloga 9, Krishna tells Arjuna, "janma karma cha me divyam evam yo vetti tattvatah tyaktva deham punar janma naiti mam eti so 'rjuna". Which means that one who understands the truth of His divine incarnations gets liberated from the material bondage, and therefore he returns to the abode of the Lord immediately after quitting his present material body.

When Krishna was born in the prison cell in Mathura, He slashed the chain shackles of His imprisoned father and mother. Similarly, contemplating on the Lord's endless effulgence and His holy incarnations gets us liberated from the shackles of samsara.

Thus, Lord Narayana out of compassion gives the jivatma the chance to get rid of the sins and seek liberation. For the people who are drowned in the ocean of samsara and whose minds are besieged by the desire of worldly enjoyment, there is no resort to cross the ocean than the boat in the form of Lord Narayana. His Lotus feet alone represent the only boat which guides jivatmas across the ocean of samsara.
