



Opaque Veil

ost people will agree that trust in government and in politicians has reached an all-time low. This is not a phenomenon confined to a few countries only. Democracies around the world are distrusted by a majority of their citizens, according to the Edelman Trust Barometer. The trust deficit locally is evidenced by the rising abstention rate at most elections. If that trend were to continue, fewer Mauritians will trust their politicians and political institutions.

The present government was elected by only 37% of the voting electorate - an electoral victory that should not have given great comfort to its leaders, and one that it should have set out to fix since its early days in power. Unfortunately, the government's credibility has been damaged by its governance of the country marked by a series of scandals involving members of the government and their protégés that it could have done without. Three ministers (Yerrigadoo, Collendavelloo & Sawmynaden) have been forced to vacate their offices since 2017 for different reasons. Whether it was the Bet365 affair, or the Emergency Procurements of medical supplies and equipment from dubious suppliers in some cases, to the St Louis Gate affair which led to the revocation of the former Deputy Prime minister, and to so many cases, the ICAC and the police have been ineffective to bring to book the culprits. Worse still, despite a judicial inquiry concerning the murder of MSM political activist Soopramanien Kistnen, police failure to pursue the inquiry effectively, all have piled up to undermine the government's credibility in the eyes of a large majority of Mauritians.

The latest major crisis that has come up relates to the allegations of the ex-CEO of Mauritius Telecom (MT) about instructions he would have received from the Prime Minister to allow a team of Indian technicians access to the Baie Jacocet Landing Station for the purpose of installing device/equipment to monitor internet traffic to and from Mauritius. As it could be expected, an association is already sought to be made in local media with the PM's instructions to have a "security survey" conducted at the landing station with espionage operations conducted by all the major players in this part of the world and so vital for their security interests. The second relates to the political ends that might potentially be achieved through such interference in the internet network for the monitoring and control of social media communications.

Here as well, a report by 'The Wire' (usually

critical of the Bharatiya Janata Party), last January 2022, about the alleged use of Tek Fog, an application software, by the information technology cell of the BJP as part of their social media campaigning mostly during pre-election periods was dug out to give credence to what could be the real intentions behind the "security survey" conducted here. This has been helped by the earlier attempt in April 2021 by the government as announced in its 'Consultation Paper on proposed amendments to the ICT Act', which recommended "not only legal but also technical enforcement measures" to intervene upstream with a view to screen, analyse and identify online content deemed illegal and harmful before taking action to curtail such content.

Concerning the more recent MT saga, in reply to the PNQ put by the Leader of the Opposition on 5 July 2022, the Prime Minister stated "in the most unequivocal terms" that there has been "at no point in time any installation or any attempt by my Office to install whatsoever device and or equipment at any of the Submarine Cable Landing Stations to monitor internet traffic to and from Mauritius". He did not give any details about any security threat that compelled a "security survey", which is quite understandable since it is unlikely that any Prime Minister would make public such details - whether such or any security threat did exist or not. Sherry Singh, who would surely be aware that he would have to face the music if he cannot substantiate his allegations, has countered the Prime Minister's version with the assertion that he is in possession of proofs that interference with the internet network at the landing station did take place.

That remains to be seen, but all that has become quite ugly. It's not only the government's credibility in the eyes of Mauritians that could be seriously undermined, but also its credibility in the eyes of shareholders of the SAFE Consortium and stakeholders in the world who might be following the widely mediatised affair. The government should come forward with a strong defence that the allegations are unfounded, since violation of any contractual obligation with the international Consortium, as stated by the MT ex-CEO, may indeed leave the country in an uncomfortable situation regarding future upgrade or evolution of the cable networks that link us so vitally to the rest of the world. Definitely there is a need for more openness and for giving the right information and answers that would lift the opaque veil that is surrounding this whole incident.

The Uber Files

Leaked documents reveal a strategy of chaos – has anything changed?



ber has had a controversial history since its founding in 2009, from violent conflicts among drivers to a secret software allegedly used to evade law enforcement. Now, a leak of over 124,000 documents dubbed the Uber files shows the extent to which the firm under co-founder and former CEO Travis Kalanick capitalised on that chaos to expand across 40 countries.

My research explores the relationship between Uber and the state. The company's strategy to grow at all costs has been uneven, shaped and slowed by varying regulations in different markets. In recent years, Uber appears to have toned down its approach and stop some of the more aggressive activity detailed in the leaks. But in my view, the strategy at the heart of the company's success means it will always be in battle with the laws where it operates.

The Uber files reportedly show the company had a deliberate strategy of breaking or ignoring the law and was very much aware of it. Uber's original service – citizens driving other citizens in their private cars without permits or licenses of any kind – was mostly in a grey legal area. In emails, executives joked about being "pirates" and the company's model being "just fucking illegal", when it faced legal opposition in entering new markets.

The leaked documents also reveal the role that lobbying and relationships with friendly politicians played in Uber's success. The company hired powerful lobbyists, many of them former members or associates of national governments who promised to end revolving doors between politics and industry. Meetings with politicians included figures like France's then-economy minister (and now president) Emmanuel Macron and then-mayor of Hamburg (and now chancellor of Germany) Olaf Scholz.

Embracing the chaos also allegedly included endangering the company's drivers. Almost wherever Uber landed, taxi unions organised protests that could sometimes turn violent. Messages in the Uber files show that Kalanick considered that Uber drivers going to a taxi drivers' protest in France was "worth it" as "violence guarantee[s] success".

he basis of Western values of liberalism was liberty, equality before the law, and democratic consent of the governed. This broad idea was buttressed by humanist themes which gave meaning to life in a fraternal society, such as civil and human rights, gender equality, freedom of speech and religion, and the separation of state from church. Not far was probably the fear that the unbridled quest for profitability by corporations could well spell misery for the majority of the populations either left by the wayside or forced to struggle for the bare essentials of daily living, forsaking often the ability to enjoy growingly privatised health, education, a decent pension or the multiple cultural awakening opportunities in their countries growing wealthier by GDP standards.

This is precisely what neo-liberalism has brought about, say many concerned economists as they watch the social and economic costs and damages. Privatisation was the World Bank/IMF mantra for years forcing us even here to the deregulation of electricity production and the Independent Power Producers contracts. Deregulation of administrations and permits (Ease of Doing Business) was pushed even further by the Economic Development Board a few years ago at about the same time as their top rungs imagined the hair-raising scheme of selling passports to any wealthy selected oligarch wishing for the convenience of a third or fourth passport and perhaps back-door access to the European Union (EU).

With the push for liberalising capital and financial flows and use of the World Trade Organization to maximize corporate profits for assumed consumer benefits, China inexorably became the world's factory and has amassed colossal reserves that enable it to be the primary challenger to US hegemony and interests, today in



the Far East, the South China Seas, the Indo-Pacific and tomorrow on the wide world seas and markets. Jobs and skills, investments and massive profits were so rapidly transferred that large swathes of industries in the US and Europe and their working populations suffered unknown impoverishment. The quest for entrepreneurship and well-earned gains or profits is not at issue but in these eras, some have benefited immensely from the mammoth changes.

Through the IT and social media revolutions. several US mega corporations were becoming empires in their own right, sometimes challenging individual countries or even the EU to reign in their intrusive power or their mega-profits without paying a fair share of taxes in any one of them. During the Covid pandemic, we have heard of the bonanza made by big pharma corporations accompanied by corruption at massive scales in broad daylight. Corporations with healthy profitability and dividends pre-pandemic were often blithely allowed to socialise the temporary crosswinds, that is, under threat of job losses, pass on the bill to the population. Today it is the Russia-Ukraine war that has created conditions for oil majors like Shell or Total and food and grain speculators to rake in exorbitant profits, again with only a trickle percolating to consumers and taxation authorities.

In short, it is now an accepted fact that in most nations that have followed those precepts of neo-liberal thought, wealth accumulation has been so widely skewed that a tiny fraction owns several times more than 90% of the population. To avoid uprisings and chaos, governments typically resort to some piecemeal handouts (relief on fuel prices in France and elsewhere, food rationing or some temporary subsidies), but sometimes these are not enough to contain the sufferings and anger of populations in countries crippled by debt as Sri Lanka.

Here, as in more notorious destinations elsewhere, money and wealth, however acquired seem to have displaced what liberal and humanist values might have been inculcated over previous decades. Economic freedoms are restricted to traditional and legacy corporations and those who gravitate around the spheres of power. Weak institutions have littered our landscape, and even weaker "crowns in the jewel" where occasional billions escape to unknown winds are no longer unusual. Education, particularly at lower levels, remain trapped in the competitive mould that reforms have failed to dent and, more worryingly, a large proportion of tertiary students who head overseas have little intent to

return to an island where political allegiances rather than merit condition their future and presumed affinities for opposition political parties can see them condemned in their recruitment and career opportunities. Cooking Oil Relief

mong the many ruins and human casualties of eastern Ukraine as the war drags on with its concomitant risks for a worldwide recession, was a global food crisis with prices for cooking oils, grains, fuel, and fertilizer soaring. Russia and Ukraine accounted for nearly a third of global wheat supplies. Russia is also a fertilizer exporter and Ukraine was a major exporter of corn and sunflower oil. Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February choked supplies of grains and sunflower oil from the Black Sea, worsening exis-

ting shortages caused by extreme weather in some countries and supply chain chaos.

Since the invasion Ukrainian grain shipments from its Black Sea ports have stalled and more than 20 million tons of grain are stuck in silos, while Moscow says the damping effect of Western sanctions imposed on Russia has hurt its fertilizer and grain exports. Speculation from investors on higher future prices added more pressures on the market for cooking oil, wheat, corn, and related agri-food items. This sparked fears of a

global food crisis, which would hit poorer nations across Africa and Asia especially hard.

World prices are now easing back, it seems, to levels before the invasion. It will be a major relief around the globe that palm oil prices tumbled by as much as 40% over the past two weeks, as top producer Indonesia ramps up exports after lifting its ban. Stocks and inventories have also risen in Malaysia and production enters the seasonal high cycle. While palm oil is rather a "hard oil" not much used for cooking, that marker heralded a similar trend in a variety of cooking oils, namely US corn and soya or even groundnut.

66Although there may still be many issues to resolve (crude oil shipments from Black Sea ports to refineries, Turkish blockades or the humanitarian corridor and/or comfort letters proposed to shipping and insurance companies by the US) and some volatility may still be expected, our own STC-imported oil should benefit from latest price easing in world markets and in quick succession, from Asian refineries. With the added benefit of some temporary subsidies from government coffers, the retail price should be far more affordable, possibly in the Rs 60-65 range, we would venture, within weeks...?

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In addition, at current prices, Health and Consumer Protection departments may have considered the risks of some roadside fritter-friers to undesirably overextend their cooking oil usage life. We trust both the STC and Finance have the wherewithal to activate matters for a rapid relief to badly battered consumers.

The SAFE Security Survey Saga

n a reply in this Tuesday's Parliamentary sitting, providing more details about the sniffing allegations of Sherry Singh, the PM stated that two letters had been despatched (presumably by PMO) during the second half of 2021 about a "security survey" requested by "the Security Division" at his office and that these were replied to by the former CEO on 24th December 2021. It may be apposite to note that copies of these correspondences were not tabled by the PM at the National Assembly.

Either the MT reply was judged unsatisfactory by the "Security Division" or other issues cropped up since, as the PM continued his narrative: "On 12 April 2022, the CEO of Mauritius Telecom was informed that a threemember technical team from India would field a survey mission to Baie Jacotet, Bel Ombre between 13 and 15 April 2022 and he was requested to extend all necessary assistance to the team during the survey visit." According to that latest version from the PM, as access to the restricted site Baie Jacotet was not forthcoming, he phoned Sherry Singh personally on the 15th to have that access for a survey conducted in the presence of the Chief Technical Officer of MT.

He pursued that the ex-CEO allegations were sufficiently grave that despite waiting ten days or so, "I have accordingly given a statement to the Police on 11 July 2022. I have requested the Police to initiate an enquiry into the matter forthwith." The population still had to hear the ex-CEO side of the story with any public evidence that might substantiate his earlier claims regarding the PM's request that "sniffing" equipment be allowed to be installed by a foreign third-party at the MT SAFE landing site of Baie Jacotet. It is fair to say that the grave allegations and the public rift between two former comrades and close partners in the highest spheres of the Sun Trust inner circles, have gripped the population waiting for clear answers from either or both protagonists.

The Sherry Singh version came the same afternoon on a scheduled talk show on a private radio and web station (Radio One) which dovetailed with the PM's version on dates but differed on the real intent of the "security survey" called for verbally and pressed for personally by the PM as from mid-April 2022. What the former CEO highlighted was the fact that SAFE was the property of an international consortium, whose technical management was assigned not to MT but Telkom (SA) and any intervention, even worse in the case of verbal instructions, would have been illegal unless proper notice had been

given to SAFE authorities and Telkom (SA) as per our contractual obligations.

His second thrust was the alleged admission by the foreign team leader that the "survey" was a dimensioning prerequisite to the future installation of an internet traffic capture device. That would be tantamount to doing the essential groundwork prior to another illegal operation, internet, mail and social media "sniffing" with potentially damaging international repercussions for the country, he said. Despite the gravity of the Sherry Singh statements and his assurance of having enough material evidence, as the PM has registered a police case, there was no way Sherry Singh's legal advisors would not have cautioned him against public delivery of those materials and evidences that should be presented elsewhere. * A whistle blower is defined as one person who comes forward and shares his/her knowledge on any wrongdoing which has happened or is happening in an institution or in a specific department. Would Sherry Singh qualify as a whistle blower in light of the allegations he made public about instructions received from the Prime Minister to allegedly allow a "third party" to access the Mauritius Telecom network with a view to installing equipment which would enable "sniffing" of internet traffic to and from Mauritius?

In a short article published by the Temple Group on 14 April 2020, whistle blowing is explained as follows: The term "whistle blowing" does not have a precise and universal legal definition. A commonly used interpretation is that it refers to the denunciation by an employee or any person of corruption, fraud, and other wrongdoings which could harm public interest. However, many employees do not denounce illegal activities as they are usually in a vulnerable position and fear reprisals.

Transparency International defines whistle blowing as 'the disclosure of information about a perceived wrongdoing in an organisation, or the risk thereof, to individuals or entities believed to be able to effect action.'

Yes, Sherry Singh is a whistle blower in the sense that he has denounced what he felt is an intrusion on fundamental rights of individuals to privacy by an attempt at sniffing and possibly an invasion of national security by a third party.

* One would presume that Mauritius Telecom employees, especially the ones in the higher hierarchy, are bound by the confidentiality clauses clearly stated in their contract of employment given the highly sensitive nature of their jobs. In light of information publicly available at this stage, does it appear that Sherry Singh might be booked for breaking the confidentiality agreement with Mauritius Telecom?

uccessive governments have failed to come up with either a Freedom of Information Bill, even with necessary safeguards, or a legal protection for whistle blowers, who may be ostracized for daring to raise a wrongdoing of consequence that they have been made aware of. There may be good reasons in the current context of the average Mauritian's capacity to adapt to such a novel culture or ingrain the usage of such a Freedom. On the other hand, Mauritius is signatory to two UN Conventions enjoining each state to provide legal protection to whistle blowers but as yet we have none, says Lex.

rules. But if an employee feels or has an information that wrongdoing by way of corruption, money laundering, espionage and the like is being perpetrated, he cannot and should not remain silent. Confidentiality is a relative concept. Even in the courts of law, confidentiality must give way in the interest of a fair trial to which an individual is entitled in a democratic country.

* Some employees may reasonably believe they are acting in the public interest by whistle blowing a matter that they consider is so crucial for the public to be made aware of. If we take it that the public interest is about the common good - what benefits society or citizens in general - it should not be difficult for the courts to determine whether the whistle blower acted in good faith or not, isn't it?

Public interest is a nebulous principle. Governments will hide behind the notion of public interest in order to

withhold documents or information from the public. In courts of law, when information which is considered confidential is required to establish whether an accused party is guilty or not, governments resort to what is known as public interest immunity. Judges or magistrates are not bound by a certificate of confidentiality, but they peruse the information in confidence and decide whether the information should be released.

Public interest is not a one-way traffic. It cuts both ways. One strand is that public interest would be against the release of secret information. The other strand is that the information should be released for the public good.

* There are confidentiality obligations that come under different laws, like the Banking Act, for example. It seems the Official Secrets Act imposes more constraining obligations, but does it apply to all citizens, not only civil servants,

who might have access to confidential information?

The Official Secrets Act apply to all.

Section 3 of the Act states: (1) Any person who, for any purpose or in any manner likely to prejudice the safety or interests of Mauritius - (a) approaches, inspects, enters, passes over, or is in the neighbourhood of a prohibited place; (b) makes any plan that is calculated or intended to be, or might be, directly or indirectly, of use to a foreign state or disaffected person; (c) obtains, receives, collects, retains, records, makes use of, publishes or communicates any code word, plan, article, document or information which is calculated or intended to be or might be, directly or indirectly, of use to a foreign state of disaffected person, shall commit an offence.

* Is there a distinction that has to be made between confidential and secret information?

There is no difference in practice or in law as regards the use of these two terms. Both have one aim, namely to protect information that is considered to be sensitive and the release of which may be damaging to the national security of a State or to business or to the private life of an individual.

* In 2013, United States federal prosecutors filed a criminal complaint against Edward Snowden - perhaps the most famous whistle blower in history - charging him with theft of government property and two counts of violating the Espionage Act of 1917. Snowden, a former computer intelligence consultant, had leaked highly classified information from the National Security Agency when he was an employee and subcontractor. Could an employee of Mauritius Telecom be criminally charged for divulging sensitive information?

Yes, depending on the nature of the information and the damage if any caused or damage that may potentially be caused.

* There is also the issue of protection for whistle blowers. Very few people will come forward to denounce any wrongdoing or corruption/fraud if they do not obtain some form of protection from reprisals. Do our laws provide for any kind of protection?

the United Nations Convention against Corruption, and the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime and its protocols. Both conventions request states to 'provide effective protection from potential retaliation or intimidation for witnesses', as pointed out by Transparency International.

In an article titled 'Whistle blowers crave sunshine', published in the daily *l'express* on 29 August 2008, the author refers to what the current Attorney General once stated on whistle blowing. This is what Mr Maneesh Gobin stated:

'Whistle blowing and whistle blower protection go hand-in-hand. Becoming a whistle blower is one of the loneliest and most difficult choices one can make in life. Those who come clean on the wrongdoing they witness in the corporate suite or in government risk immediate ostracism.'

Nonetheless there is still no legislation for the protection of whistle blowers.

* It does not seem that the Prevention of Corruption Act 2002, which provides the legal framework for the fight against corruption in the civil service, provides sufficient protection to informers and witnesses who provide information to the ICAC on possible acts of corruption besides non-disclosure of that information in proceedings before any court as well as the identity of the informer. Would that amount to sufficient protection for whistle blowers?

The Office on Drugs and Crime has expressed the view that - 'Promoting

integrity, transparency and accountability in the public sector is an important aspect of UNCAC Chapter II that is related to the prevention of corruption. In particular, Articles 7 and 8 of the Convention address in detail questions related to transparency and accountability in the public sector. The systems and measures States are required to introduce or consider may require new legislation or amendments to existing laws, in accordance with the fundamental principles of their legal systems.'

On the other hand, Transparency International recommends the following: 'Developing and adopting comprehensive legislation on whistle blower protection and implementing comprehensive strategies would be a clear signal from the Mauritian government that the declarations to rid the country of corruption carry weight.'

* All the parties that have been in power have not made good on their electoral promises to introduce a Freedom of Information Act/Right to Information Act. In the absence of such a law as well as one to protect whistle blowers, it's the culture of secrecy that will get perpetuated. What do you think?

Indeed, no government has dared come up with a Freedom of Information Act. The present government, which has been in power since 2014, expressed the will to come up with such a legislation and this was mentioned in the President's Address to the National Assembly.

A Freedom of Information Act would give citizens the right to access information held by public authorities. The principle behind such a legislation is to try to make a government more transparent and to increase public confidence in political institutions and the governance of a country. But then would such a legislation open the floodgates to a sort of mass spying of government ministers and public officials or would a judicious use be made of such a law?

In Mauritius these days the culture is to vilify and criticise. Until we get a population more versed in cultural and other values of courtesy and responsibility there would be a danger in having such a law. It is understandable why successive governments have not done anything about this.

Tony Blair, the former British Prime Minister, regretted having enacted the Freedom of Information Act. In his autobiography 'A Journey', he writes: "Freedom of Information. Three harmless words. I look at those words as I write them and feel like shaking my head till it drops off my shoulders. You idiot. You naive, foolish, irresponsible nincompoop. There is really no description of stupidity, no matter how vivid, that is adequate. I quake at the imbecility of it."

Employees are bound by confidentiality rules. But if an employee feels or has an information that wrongdoing by way of corruption, money laundering, espionage and the like is being perpetrated, he cannot and should not remain silent. Confidentiality is a relative concept. Even in the courts of law, confidentiality must give way in the interest of a fair trial to which an individual is entitled in a democratic country..."

Sri Lanka riots: how the tiny Indian Ocean island nation got into such a mess

Corruption, mismanagement and financial pressure all contributed to Sri Lanka's economic turmoil



The chaos in Sri Lanka has deepened after the country's president, Gotabaya Rajapaksa, fled to the Maldives. The president and his family left Colombo on a military jet just hours before he was due to resign in the face of massive popular protests which culminated on July 9 with crowds of demonstrators storming the presidential palace.

Rajapaksa is believed to be headed for the United Arab Emirates where it is thought he will resign his office. Ranil Wickremesinghe, the country's prime minister, has taken over as acting president and has declared a state of emergency. It is thought likely he will also resign under pressure from the Sri Lankan people who are blaming the country's deep economic crisis on mismanagement and corruption among Sri Lanka's political elites.

Over the past three months, the tiny Indian Ocean nation has sunk deep into economic malaise. Inflation is running at more than 50% and is expected to continue to rise. There are shortages of food and fuel and the country defaulted on its foreign debt in May.



There is also political turmoil. In this situation, the role of the army will come into sharp focus. There have been reports that troops fired on protesters as they stormed the presidential palace, but army chiefs insisted they had only fired in the air in an effort to maintain order. But many are asking whether the army will step in to run the government, at least until order can be restored and a new government formed.

Will the army take over?

But while military intervention might restore order to the streets, it's unlikely army chiefs will want to take a direct hand in government.

There are two reasons for this. The first is cultural. There have been occasions when the country could have buckled to the rule by the military. These were the ethnic civil war years between 1983 and 2009. Many hold the view that it was the army which kept the nation from

breaking up during this period before winning a decisive albeit controversial victory against the separatists.

Yet, despite the oversized role played by the country's military establishment, years of hardship, war and human rights abuses, Sri Lankans have steadfastly held on to their democratic civilian government. There were coup attempts in 1962 and 1966 and again in 1991, but these were all thwarted by the civilian government.

The other reason is economic. The main problems facing Sri Lanka are a result of economic mismanagement and corruption. A new administration will need to quickly secure international loans or some other form of support to stabilise the economy and resume the importation of food and fuel. This can only be possible with a civilian leader at the helm of such negotiations.

The problem a military government would face is that the army is still discredited in the eyes of the international community as a result of mass human rights abuses committed during the civil war against the country's Tamil separatists. If an army general were to take power now, Sri Lanka will become a pariah — and would find it almost impossible to raise the foreign investment it so desperately needs.

The importance of choosing someone who is able to negotiate loans from international institutions such as the IMF, the World Bank and the ADB was underlined when Rajapaksa appointed Wickremesinghe, the prime minister, to the finance portfolio. Wickremesinghe had already announced a package of reforms designed to stabilise the economy and

planned to present a debt restructuring plan to the IMF by August.

In hock to Beijing

Sri Lanka's economic woe can largely be blamed on corruption among the country's political elites as well as government mismanagement: unaffordable tax cuts and grandiose infrastructure projects have emptied the treasury, while an enormous trade imbalance has drained the country's foreign reserves.

The problem has been made worse by the decision to repay debts rather than restructuring. China has been one of Sri Lanka's biggest creditors and has baulked at any concessions, because it fears that cutting Sri Lanka's debt – racked up mainly as a result of Belt and Road projects – would prompt other debtor nations to do the same and put the Belt and Road programme into jeopardy.

In 2017, when Sri Lanka failed on its loan repayment for the US\$1.1 billion (£920 million) Hambantota port development on Sri Lanka's southern coast, it was forced to sign the port – and thousands of acres of land around it – over on a 99-year lease. China already owns 43% of the massive Colombo Port City development on another 99-year-lease.

Delhi-based think-tank, Red Lantern Analytica, said on July 9 that China had "employed its devious 'Debt Trap Diplomacy' to gain a strategic edge over the nation and hold its economy hostage". This should be a wake-up call to any other non-western countries who have borrowed heavily from China. Beijing should also take some responsibility for Sri Lanka's dire financial straits. But there is little sign, so far, that it will.

wo candidates were knocked out ■ of the race to replace UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson on Wednesday, leaving six lawmakers battling to lead the Conservative Party and the country.

Former health secretary Jeremy Hunt and treasury chief Nadhim Zahawi failed to reach the threshold of 30 votes by Conservative lawmakers needed to stay in the contest, reports agencies.

Former finance minister Rishi Sunak scored 88 votes, ahead of junior trade minister Penny Mordaunt on 67 and foreign secretary Liz Truss

Lawmaker Kemi Badenoch received 40 votes, Tom Tugendhat received 37 and Suella Braverman received 32.

The 358 Tory lawmakers had crammed into a humid corridor at Parliament on Wednesday afternoon to line up and cast their ballots in a grand room hung with oil paintings. Security staff made them hand over their phones to ensure secrecy.

Further rounds of voting took place yesterday and, if needed, next week, until just two candidates remain.

The final two contenders will face a run-off vote by about 180,000 Conservative Party members across the country. The winner is scheduled to be announced on September 5 and will automatically become prime minister, without the need for a national election.

Penny Mordaunt new favourite

The Independent on the other hand reports that Penny Mordaunt is the new favourite to be the next Torv leader and prime minister, after a stunning surge in support among party MPs and members that left her rivals floundering.

The little-known former defence secretary was defeated by Rishi Sunak in the first leadership ballot by 88 votes to 67 - but is the candidate with momentum behind her, as the race hots up.

Mrs Mordaunt leapfrogged Liz Truss into second place, ahead of a second ballot on Wednesday, and is also the overwhelming choice of the Tory grassroots who will pick the next leader, according to a bombshell poll.

Italy govt in crisis, may fall after ally backs out of trust vote

talian Prime Minister Mario Draghi's coalition government appeared close to collapse on Thursday after the 5-Star Movement, one of its members, said it would not take part in a parliamentary confidence vote.

Other coalition parties have warned that they will quit the government if 5-Star boycotts the vote in the Senate which is due later in the day, while Draghi himself said this week that he would not head an administration without the 5-Star on board.

The 5-Star decision plunges Italy into political uncertainty, risks undermining efforts to secure billions of euros in European Union funds, and could lead to early national elections in the autumn, reports Reuters.

Italy is due to vote by the first half of next year and tensions have been rising between members of a coalition in place since early 2021 and straddling both sides of the political

The prospect of a political crisis was felt in financial markets where Italian bond yields rose sharply, indicating investors demanding a higher premium to hold its debt, and shares

After a day of intense party discussions, 5-Star leader Giuseppe Conte announced late Wednesday that it would not support the confidence motion, saying the government should be doing more to tackle growing social problems in the euro zone's third largest economy.

Sri Lanka crisis: Soldiers empowered to use force to stop loss of property, life

The Sri Lankan army on Thursday authorised the I members of the armed forces and the police to exercise their force to prevent destruction of life and property. This comes after the military establishment refused Acting President Ranil Wickremesinghe's directive to use force on the protesters.

The Sri Lankan army statement comes in wake of the anti-government protests which continue amid the exit of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa from Sri Lanka. In its statement, the Sri Lankan army said that all the heads of the armed forces and the police during meetings with the Acting President and Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe, the Speaker and political leaders requested them to accelerate the issues pertaining to the political instability and the crisis through constitutional provisions, reports Hindustan Times.



The army said it was unanimously maintained that the 'peaceful protests should not anyway be dealt with full force, but with minimum force as long as those protesters do not resort to violence or damage the public property.'

"Irrespective of those assurances, it has been unfortunately observed that a certain section of the protesters, purposefully deviating from its proclaimed 'non-violent' approach continued to breach law and order as of Wednesday (13) afternoon and resorted to violence by trying to place the Parliament complex as well as the Speaker's official residence under siege while destroying police barricades through heavy machinery brought in

vehicles on the streets of Colombo to deal with any emergency situation. Ranil Wickremesinghe, the Acting President and Prime Minister, had asked the security forces to use force against the protesters to quell the protests. But the Sri Lankan military establishment declined it as they did not want to be seen as antipeople.

The protesters who had taken control of the government buildings and offices have vacated it, while continuing their demand of Rajapaksa and Wickremesinghe's resignation. The former has left Maldives and has reportedly headed to Singapore.

China's Shanghai issues red alert over heat conditions for 3rd time this summer

s China reels under extreme heat conditions, Shanghai - the city of 25 million residents - has issued its highest 'red alert' for extreme heat for the third time this summer on Thursday.

Reportedly, the temperatures are expected to rise to at least 40 degrees Celsius over the next 24 hours. In the last five days, Shanghai has issued three alerts over the heat conditions.

On Wednesday, Shanghai's temperature went up to 40.9 degrees Celsius - matching a record set in 2017. In Zhejiang province, a record high temperature of above 42 degrees Celsius was reported on Wednesday. The coastal provinces of Jiangsu and Fujian have also witnessed high temperatures, reports Hindustan Times.

Reportedly, several people have died in China due to flooding and extremely high temperatures. In Henan, Sichuan, and Heilongjiang, several people have been hospitalized due to heat-

The Yangtze River basin - encompassing megacities from Shanghai to Chongqing in the heartland - has suffered heat waves over the past week, reported news agency Reuters.

Meanwhile, due to the higher heat conditions, the demand for electricity has also risen - leading to a load on the power grids. As per National Development and Reform Commission, China's maximum power load hit an all-time high of 1.22 billion kilowatts on Tuesday, reports Reuters.

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North Korea backs independence of breakaway regions in Ukraine

North Korea has become one of the few nations in the world to recognize the independence of two Russian-backed separatist regions in eastern Ukraine in support of Russia's war against its neighbor.

Ukraine's Foreign Ministry cut off diplomatic ties with North Korea in response and condemned Pyongyang's decision as undermining Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity.

North Korea has repeatedly blamed the United States for the crisis in Ukraine, claiming the West's "hegemonic policy" justified Russia's offensive in Ukraine to protect itself, reports AP.

North Korea's state media said Thursday that the country's foreign minister, Choe Sun Hui, sent letters to leaders in the breakaway regions of Donetsk and Luhansk a day earlier to convey the North's decision to recognize their independence and its willingness to develop diplomatic relations with both.



Donetsk separatist leader Denis Pushilin acknowledged North Korea's decision Wednesday.

Luhansk and Donetsk together make up the Donbas region, a mostly Russian-speaking region of steel factories, mines and other industries in Ukraine's east. Separatists have controlled parts of both provinces since 2014, but Russian President Vladimir Putin recognized their independence only shortly before the invasion began in February. Syria has since recognized their independence as well.

Ukrainian Foreign Minster Dmytro Kuleba said Russia's appeal to North Korea for support shows Moscow has "no more allies in the world, except for countries that depend on it financially and politically." Ukraine had already suspended its political and economic contacts with North Korea because of international sanctions imposed on the North over its nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles program.

Thailand on verge of using voluntary chemical castration for sex offenders



Thailand is close to introducing chemical castration as a means of tackling sex crime after lawmakers approved a bill that will give some offenders the right to choose the procedure in return for a reduced prison sentence.

The bill, which the lower house passed in March, was approved late on Monday by 145 senators, with two abstentions. It still requires another house vote, then royal endorsement.

Of 16,413 convicted sex offenders released from Thai prisons between 2013 and 2020, there were 4,848 who reoffended, according to corrections department figures, reports Reuters.

Under the bill, certain sex offenders deemed at risk of re-offending may be given the option to receive injections that

reduce their testosterone levels, in return for shorter jail time, providing they have approval of two doctors.

The offenders would be monitored for 10 years and be required to wear electronic monitoring bracelets, according to the bill.

If approved, Thailand would join a small group of countries that use chemical castration, among them Poland, South Korea, Russia and Estonia, plus some US. states.

Jaded Chouwilai, director of the Women and Men Progressive Movement Foundation, a non-governmental organisation that addresses sexual violence, among other areas, said use of chemical castration would not tackle sex crime.

12U2 Summit to unveil \$2-bn initiative to tackle food security

The new grouping of India, Israel, the UAE and the US (I2U2) is set to unveil a \$2-billion food security initiative, which envisages setting up agricultural parks in India with funding from the UAE, during its first virtual summit on Thursday.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi will join his Israeli counterpart Yair Lapid, United Arab Emirates President Mohammed bin Zayed al-Nahyan and US President Joe Biden for the I2U2 Summit. The meeting is being held during Biden's first visit to West Asia since becoming president.

The I2U2 Summit will focus on the current food security challenge and "a \$2-billion project, which the UAE is helping to fund, for agricultural parks in India," and some other measures will be announced at the meeting, said a senior US administration on Wednesday, reports Hindustan Times.

Israel will lend technological expertise for the initiative, and there will be some support from the US private sector, the official said.

US National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan also told reporters on Wednesday that there will be a "significant announcement around food security and agricultural technology" at the summit. This is an area "where all four countries can come together to help deal with an immediate crisis facing the entire world", he added.

Asked what the US is hoping to achieve by bringing India into arrangements such as the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework and I2U2, Sullivan said: "So, first, India plays a critical role in the Indo-Pacific. And it's one of the largest, most significant, most strategically consequential countries in the Indo-Pacific, and so it should play a central role in our strategy, including through the Quad."

India, Sullivan noted, also has very longstanding ties and engagement with the Middle East, and relationships with the Gulf countries and Israel.

Bringing together Israel, India, the UAE and the US, which have unique capacities for agricultural technology, can lead to greater food production and an alleviation of the food security challenge, Sullivan said. This also fulfills Biden's vision of a "more integrated, more globally engaged Middle East" that isn't just focused on issues such as terrorism and wars, he said, adding I2U2 can "become a feature of the broader region, just as the



Quad has become a central pillar of the Indo-Pacific strategy of the United States".

The senior US administration official said India and Israel will serve as innovation and entrepreneurial hubs that will facilitate I2U2's efforts to tackle the food security challenge.

I2U2 was established as an international forum for economic cooperation at a

virtual meeting of foreign ministers of the four countries last October. These countries have said there is no military angle to their cooperation and they are pushing a constructive agenda focused on the economy, especially infrastructure projects.



Mauritius Times: The suspense around the Sherry Singh v Pravind Jugnauth has not ended and it's likely we'll get to see more twists and turns in the days ahead. Do you feel however that the main protagonists have already stepped on the eggs and that it might get nasty and embarrassing?

Dharam Gokhool: We are witnessing the unravelling of what appears to be a murky and sinister political serial, with shocking and disturbing revelations, presumably of alleged spying against the interests of the Republic of Mauritius, and with the avowed blessings of the head of government himself.

We are at the very first phase. Political observers, analysts, media pundits as well as the common citizens are trying to figure out the precise nature, the full-scale implications of these terrible revelations, and connect the dots. Is this a stand-alone event or is it the tip of a huge iceberg that will trigger a political tsunami?

With the second radio interview of Sherry Singh and the laborious and often seemingly controversial statements of the Prime Minister, the doors of further twists and turns are wide open. More on the side of the corridors of power than Sherry Singh who has so far been more coherent in his pronouncements.

Unless a miracle happens (it is often said that in politics everything is possible), the two protagonists are now already on the battlefield and the fight will take place. It's not eggs they have stepped on: they are now on a live minefield and every move from either side has the potential of destruction. In the process, it is the country that will pay the heaviest price.

* There might be scores of reasons that militate in favour of the ouster of the present government, but the impact of the allegation picked up by Sherry Singh can be potentially embarrassing on the diplomatic and geopolitical fronts. What's your assess-

ment of its spillover impacts?

Indeed. With a string of scandals like the Covid-19 related corruptions cases, the high-profile cases of the unresolved alleged murder of Kistnen and the Angus Road saga, together with the inclusion of Mauritius in the Black list (European Union) and Grey list (FATF), the rather muddled Mauritian diplomacy being followed by the present government, our historical and traditional allies and partners must be wondering about the real agenda of this government.

The oblique reference made by Sherry Singh in his first radio interview to a foreign country being involved in the alleged "sniffing" project, was unfortunately followed up by some prime ministerial explicit and inept public statements that inadvertently dragged one of our privileged traditional partners into our local political controversy. A serious and damaging diplomatic impair and a glaring example of lack of diplomatic finesse. There is lot of speculation about the alleged "sniffing" project. Where did the initiative come from?

* We are clearly in a case where there are no real precedents, no other PM having faced such accusations. We are also navigating in troubled waters with the potential for serious geopolitical implications... As such, what do you think should be the course of action for the Prime Minister and the government, especially as regards our international partners?

Unfortunately, we do not have a full-fledged, full-time Minister of Foreign Affairs with time-tested diplomatic skills to navigate the present storm. The Prime Minister is in the eye of the storm. He is caught in a web of controversies and his credibility has suffered a serious blow. No other Senior Minister is forthcoming to help the country in these difficult times. The damage has been done and, as I see it, damage control initiatives cannot come from this government. Has our Head of State abdicated his role and responsibility as the guardian of our Constitution at this crucial juncture? His silence is eloquent and incomprehensible. So far Sherry Singh has come up with circumstantial evidence. These can help to draw inferences but not prove what he is claiming. For that, he has to put before the population concrete and solid evidence which he has repeatedly stated he has in his custody.

His task has been rendered quite easy by the incomplete, uncoordinated and contradictory statements by the Prime Minister in and out of the National Assembly.

The Prime Minister is running out of time, (unless he has a move up his sleeve to check-mate Sherry Singh). The mood of the people is changing and the younger generation - the digital natives - sees in the "alleged sniffing" attempt a frontal attack on their liberty, their way of life and "their technology". Many have not yet forgotten the aborted attempt to control internet traffic through the ICTA consultation paper.



Sensitive files could be thrown to the public. It is going to be tough and rough for Sherry Singh. But at this moment, he has an edge over the Prime Minister in public opinion. On the other hand, the government seems to be going through a very bad phase with the economic crisis hurting the people real hard. If the Opposition joins together to support Sherry Singh, the ground reality may shift against the government.

* The Opposition seems to have to have seen in the Sherry Singh v Pravind Jugnauth spat a golden opportunity to go for the kill - everything else attempted to rock the MSM's boat earlier having



failed. Do you also see in that spat the ultimate weapon to finish off the current government?

If Sherry Singh succeeds in proving his allegations, the government will be cornered. The Prime Minister will be held responsible for tampering with the security of the state and public pressure will call for the resignation of his government. Sherry Singh's initiative to take on the Prime Minister head-on, single-handed, and his assertion that he is imbued with a sense of mission and patriotism has the resonance of a bold act, at a time when the country is at a cross-roads.

After having tried unsuccessfully to unseat the government in the past, the Opposition seems to have found in Sherry Singh a catalytic element to unite their forces against the Prime Minister and his government. Singh's move could be the spark that the Opposition forces need to recalibrate their electoral strategy and raise their chances of winning the next general elections.

* With Bruno Laurette on one side of Sherry Singh and a Labour MP on the other and railing against the presence of Indian nationals at the level of the Security Division of the PMO and at the head of the National Coast Guard, 'c'est bien parti', as the French would say, for the Opposition's forthcoming electoral campaign, in particular for the Labour Party's in the constituencies where it matters. What do you think?

Short-term expediencies should not jeopardise our long-term interests, through inadvertent criticisms.

The Opposition forces cannot take the risk of having to deal with an India bashing campaign, which could be an unnecessary distraction, and stoke communal sentiments. Both in the short- and long-terms, this will be counterproductive and runs the risks of straining our special ties with India and hurting our long-term strategic interests. It may also impact on our social fabric.

Lord Palmerston, the British Prime Minister had this to say about essence of diplomatic relations: "We have no eternal allies, and we have no perpetual enemies. Our interests are eternal and perpetual, and those interests it is our duty to follow."

General Rejuvenation of the Labour Party cannot be limited to a few new faces. Along with a quantitative change, it also needs a qualitative change, people with new thinking, new ideas who are in tune with the changing aspirations of our people, in a global context. Internal party processes must be democratised to avoid concentration of power in the hands of a few..."

If there are issues that need to be dealt with, the diplomatic channels should be resorted to instead of public platforms.

* Speaking of the Labour Party, there is again talk of the proposed rejuvenation of the party cadres in the months ahead. In other words, the old boys should make way for the young lads - possibly for new kinds of leadership and political action. What do you think of that?

Sometime back you asked me about Labour Party's way forward, and I said Labour has a strong, capable and ethnically diverse and geographically representative Parliamentary Group which can be leveraged to give Labour a competitive edge over other political forces.

Rejuvenation of the Labour Party cannot be limited to a few new faces. Along with a quantitative change, it also needs a qualitative change, people with new thinking, new ideas who are in tune with the changing aspirations of our people, in a global context. Internal party processes must be democratised to avoid concentration of power in the hands of a few. People want to have a say. Mechanisms should be put in place for the party to set up a functional Secretariat to keep in touch with the people. These are a few ideas to define the new architecture of the Labour Party.

In the days to come, will it be business as usual with some cosmetic changes for Labour or will Labour come forward with a transformational agenda that will define the contours of a modern political organisation? This is the real challenge for the Labour leadership.

that many people would like know is: how many unemployed persons are there in Mauritius? It is no use going to the Labour Department: its figures showed, in 1955, unemployment figures ranging from 1950 in September to 3049 in February. Yet the difference in the labour force on the estates between crop and intercrop was 10,717 — a difference clearly not reflected in the Department's figures of unemployment.

Labour Problems

Why does the Labour Department not know the number of unemployed persons? Because not every unemployed person registers every week at a Labour Exchange. And why not? Because there is no incentive for him to do so. There are no jobs anyway, so why should an unemployed person spend half a day every week, as well as his bus fare, in travelling to a Labour Exchange just in order to be told what he already knows? There is no social insurance; so weekly attendance at a Labour Exchange is unnecessary.

But failing exact figures relating to unemployment, how can the Government accurately work out a social insurance scheme? How can liabilities be estimated when all the facts (or even an approximation to all the facts) are not known? Unemployment benefits are sorely needed; at present people are starving during the intercrop because they have no money to buy food. And unemployment benefits for the great army of unemployed workers would give them something in their pockets and thus benefit the shopkeepers and trade generally.

Social insurance, contributory of course, would help all round. Workers would pay a small weekly sum and stamps would be stuck on their insurance cards. When their employment ended — when, for example, they were sacked — their employer would have to give them their cards to be handed in at the Labour Exchange. When they got a new job — through the Labour Exchange of course — they would be given their cards back to hand to their new employer for regular weekly stamping.

A necessary corollary of unemployment insurance and unemployment benefits is, of course, that workers shall be recruited by employers only through a Labour Exchange. At present many employees do not use the Labour

Exchanges; certainly many prefer instead to make use of the Parti Mauricien's private employment bureaus and the iniquitous ONE RUPEE CARD system. One reason advanced for the preference of employers for private bureaus is that these employers fear that if they use the Government Exchanges they will have to pay the minimum wages, but if they use private bureaus they can safely get away with paying lower-than-minimum wages!

Another abuse which unemployment insurance would help to check is the practice of giving a bisoin chanter, a "little present", to someone who can help in getting a job. The bisoin chanter system works this way. A labourer is employed in a gang working for the Public Works Department for example. After he has been working for two months, his sirdar sacks him. Two weeks later, he goes back to ask the sirdar to re-engage him. If he pays, say, ten rupees "entry fee", the sirdar will agree to take him back into the gang but each week thereafter the labourer must also pay the sirdar a rupee out of his weekly wage to ensure not being sacked again.

The job contractor also takes his "little present". "Find me 50 men to work at Rs 3.00" says the employer to the job contractor, who goes off and finds the requisite 50 men, telling each, however, that the employer is offering only Rs 2.75 — he pockets the odd 25 cents per man per day for himself. Then, when the employer pays the job contractor the total sum of wages to be distributed among the gang of 50 workers, he of course adds the customary 5 or 10 per cent commission for the job contractor... so that the job contractor gets his cut from the employer, as well as his cut from the workers. Only, of course, the cut from the workers is a little bit of chicanery on the part of the contractor. In addition, of course, a really unscrupulous job contractor

will say to his gang: "Unless you give me a little present, I shall not remember your name for future work with me. *Bisoin chanter* with a vengeance! Yes if the Labour Exchanges were properly used by the employers, especially by the estates at crop times, the need for the parasitic job contractor (with all his possible ways of making money) would disappear.

Many employers pay under the minimum agreed wage. Many employers do not scrupulously adhere to the letter of trade and wage agreements and wage ordinances. Labour inspectors are supposed to find out abuses of the labour laws, but in practice they are often unable to do so.

Trade union leaders are forbidden access to the sugar estates except by prior notification to, and permission of, the manager — so that it is thus impossible for a trade union leader to make an on-the-spot immediate check of any of his members' complaints. And unfortunately conditions in the Labour Department itself are not always what they should be. There is much public suspicion that certain high-up personages in the Department find a conflict of loyalty between their duty to the Department and their relationship to wealthy members of their social community. In other words, between their duty to protect the workers and their instinctive loyalty.

These problems confronting the Labour Department are spotlighted by the necessity of appointing a successor to Mr James Sterling, O.B.E., as Labour Commissioner. Certain names have been mentioned as possible successors: Mr A. H. Vaudin, the Deputy Labour Commissioner; Mr Lane, a former Civil Commissioner (North); Mr Pickwood, who before he left Mauritius some years ago was Assistant Labour Commissioner — that was in the days when the Assistant Labour Commissioner was the post corresponding to the present Deputy; and Mr Carpenter, Civil Commissioner (Moka-Flacq) to name only a few.

Workers all over Mauritius have a great interest in this matter of Mr Sterling's successor. Just as it is important that justice should not only be done, but should clearly be seen to be done, it is important to have as Labour Commissioner a man who not only is impartial, but also is clearly seen be impartial.

The Labour Commissioner must be someone whom the workers can trust; therefore someone unconnected with the estates; unconnected with the capitalists. He must be someone whose impartiality cannot, even by implication, be called into question. He must not be a man who is known to have but little faith in trade unionism, or whom report states to have but little faith in trade unions. And his appointment must be 100 per cent free from suspicion that nepotism is in any way involved, either in the appointment itself or in the manner in which the Commissioner carries out his duties.

The choice of a Labour Commissioner to succeed Mr Sterling is vitally important to the workers; and to the Labour Party. For it is Mr Sterling's successor who will be in at the birth of the projected social insurance system, so that it is essential to have a man who is utterly sympathetic to such a scheme and who is familiar (as all Britishers are) with social security systems.

It will be the Labour Government, surely due to be elected at the next General Election, which will bring in the social insurance scheme; that is why I say that the choice of the Labour Commissioner is vital to the Labour Party.

Let us hope that wisdom will prevail when Mr Sterling's successor is chosen.

Sweet Poison



Bollywood and Its Global Impact

ndia's film industry, popularly known as Bollywood, is the largest in the world, with production of films in more than 20 languages going up to over 2000 films annually. The Economic Diplomacy Division of the Indian Ministry of External Affairs estimates its valuation in 2018 at around US\$2.5 billion, and that is expected to grow to US\$3.2 billion by 2023. The yearn for Bollywood, it says, is not recent. 'Dharti Ke Lal' was the first Indian film to have

a commercial release overseas. It was released in the Soviet Union in 1949. 'Aan', was the first Indian film to have a worldwide release in 1952. With subtitles in 17 languages, the film was released in 28 countries and earned big revenue overseas.

Decades hence, Indian films continue to pull crowds around the world. Movies like 'Mughal-e-Azam', 'Guide', 'Sholay', 'Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge', 'Kabhi Khushi Kabhie Gham' to more recent films like 'Dangal' and 'Uri' reflect the aspirations of an evolving society. But more than its global outreach and commercial success, Bollywood's impact on the lives of Indians and more across the world, especially its diaspora as well as its role as ambassador of India's soft power have been tremendous.

This is what Dr Ouma Seebaluck has attempted to explore in her book 'Bollywood and Its Global Impact' launched recently. Describing herself as the grand-daughter of an Indentured labourer, born and bred in Mauritius, Ouma says she as well as most of her friends looked up to India for inspiration in every sphere of life: 'Our main contact with the country of our forefathers was rare (during our growing up years), and our main link with 'Mother India was through films. I grew up in Mauritius with Hindi movies and Hindi songs... Indian films forged my identity and indeed to some extent that of Mauritius itself.'

A personally rewarding experience for Ouma, 'Bollywood and Its Global Impact' poignantly captures, as Dr Salman Ayaz puts it, 'the multifaceted phenomenon and global force that is Bollywood... it provides the reader with the critical insight needed to understand the relationship between Bollywood and the diaspora, its burgeoning economic and touristic appeal outside of India'.

Ouma has worked as an airline executive for over 25 years, following which she went on to do a PhD in International Studies at JMI University, New Delhi.

Uber also allegedly had in place a "kill switch", a technological tool to prevent authorities from accessing Uber's data when they raided its offices.

The company has made an effort to distance itself from the allegations in the Uber files. A statement issued by the company attributes the content of the leaks to the Kalanick era, and stresses the change in leadership and values.

Meanwhile, Kalanick's spokesperson has said that Uber's approach to expansion was not his own doing, but was instead "under the direct oversight and with the full approval of Uber's robust legal, policy, and compliance groups".

What has (and hasn't) changed

This chaos strategy arguably worked. Uber is now a US\$43 billion (£36 billion) company, and its drivers make around 19 million journeys a day. Yet, it still struggles

In 2017, Kalanick stepped down and was replaced as CEO by Dara Khosrowshahi. Most of the leadership has also changed since then. Accusations about a workplace culture of harassment and sexism appear to have dried up.

The company has generally moved away from its original service towards one where licensed drivers use vehicles with specific permits to hail passengers (in other words, a taxi for the smartphone era), and introduced a food delivery wing. Uber Eats. It has also taken a calmer and more polite approach to expansion --- moving slower, breaking less stuff.

Let me give you two examples: Uber entered Madrid in 2014 in disregard of a



Spanish law requiring companies and drivers to have a specific license. It entered Berlin the same year, in violation of German competition laws. The company was banned. left both cities and returned later in compliance with existing regula-

And yet, some things have stayed the same. The company faces multiple lawsuits, most of them around whether its workers are classed as employees, and its profitability remains an open question. As I explain in my research, these two things can be explained by the company's fundamental strategy: that of "contentious com-

Uber adapts to existing rules, but only as little as necessary to provide its services. Meanwhile, it continues to fight legislation everywhere - spending billions on lobbying and in crafting political connections - to push existing rules closer to its preferences.

Uber's executives know their business model might not be sustainable, and even less so if they are forced to classify workers as employees and pay for related rights and benefits. Fighting regulations is a survival strategy.

They have a preferred model in mind as close as possible to their original one. Though they are not openly breaking laws anymore, they continue to push for their preferred regulations through the courts or by finding legal loopholes.

In a memo recently sent to employees and leaked to the press Khosrowshahi wrote: "We will be even more hardcore about costs across the board." The company knows that if it is forced to re-classify drivers as workers (as, for example, the UK supreme court has ruled) the financial situation will be even worse.

Beyond another stain in its reputation, Uber has very real problems. Profitability might be the most urgent one for the company, but for our society there is a far more important one.

Apps like Uber and the hundreds that followed promised innovation. Instead, they have brought a barely-disguised version of the exploitation and corruption that has always characterised capitalism. Given the allegations in the Uber files, one also has to wonder if there will ever be consequences for tech entrepreneurs with a taste for rule breaking.



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Music as medicine? 30 minutes a day shows benefits after heart attack

Daily music sessions found to reduce anxiety, pain and subsequent heart problems

Listening to music can be enjoyable, but is it also good for your heart? Patients who suffered episodes of chest pain soon after a heart attack, known as early post-infarction angina, had significantly lower levels of anxiety and pain if they listened to music for 30 minutes a day, according to a study.

Nearly 700,000 people survive a heart attack in the U.S. each year, and it is estimated that roughly 1 in 9 heart attack survivors experience subsequent episodes of chest pain and anxiety within the first



48 hours. The new research suggests music, combined with standard therapies such as medications, could be a simple, accessible measure that patients can do at home to potentially reduce these symptoms and help prevent subsequent cardiac events.

The researchers recruited 350 patients diagnosed with heart attack and early post-infarction angina at a medical center in Serbia. Half were randomly assigned to receive standard treatment while half were assigned to regular music sessions in addition to standard treatment. For most patients, standard treatment included a variety of medications such as nitrates, aspirin, clot-preventing drugs, beta blockers, statins, calcium channel blockers, blood pressure-

lowering medications and the anginareducing drug ranolazine.

At the end of seven years, music therapy was found to be more effective than standard treatment alone in terms of reducing anxiety, pain sensation and pain distress. The patients with music therapy. on average, had anxiety scores one-third lower than those on standard treatment and reported lower angina symptoms by about one-quarter. These patients also had significantly lower rates of certain heart conditions, including an 18% reduction in the rate of heart failure; 23% lower rate of subsequent heart attack; 20% lower rate of needing coronary artery bypass graft surgery; and 16% lower rate of cardiac death.

'Toxic,' but still successful professionally?

Toxic personality is a term used to describe people who behave greedily, immodestly and unfairly and take the truth very lightly. Dr Mareike Kholin, Bastian Kückelhaus and Prof Dr Gerhard Blickle from the Department of Psychology at the University of Bonn found out why such people can still succeed in their careers. The trick that leads to the top is social skill. The results are presented in the journal 'Personality and Individual Differences'.

Social skills are in themselves a good

thing in the workplace. They can open locked doors and help to cope with daily stress. But they can also be used to deceive others, abuse trust or construct a façade of harmlessness beyond which actually lurks deceitfulness. Dr Mareike Kholin and the research team determined that toxic personalities who are considered socially adept by their colleagues were considered more capable by their superiors and occupy a higher hierarchical position. "We have to get used to the idea that social skills can be a double-edged sword," says Kholin.

In personality tests, "toxic" persons have low scores in the categories "honesty" and "modesty." "Such personalities tend to focus on themselves all the time," says Blickle. "Good social skills enable them to deceive others." On the other hand, those who are distinctly

honest and modest are a real joy for their team: Such individuals behave fairly and allow colleagues to share in their successes.

Low values for the characteristics "honesty" and "modesty"

Psychologists from the University of Bonn investigated the phenomenon by interviewing various work teams. The results showed that workers with low values for

honesty and modesty can nonetheless succeed in their careers if they balance the toxic parts of their personality with social skills. Bastian Kückelhaus: "Trickery, disguise and deception are the dark side of social skills."

How can toxic personalities be



assessed more accurately? But how can companies and teams respond to these findings? "In order to slow down the ascent of toxic personalities, more attention should be paid to actual performance and less to the good impression when selecting staff and making assessments," advises Prof Blickle.

How do voices come out of our mouths?

The sound comes from our lungs and our voice box, which is at the front of the throat. Here's how it works.

We can all communicate in lots of different ways – using our hands to

lots of different ways – using our hands to gesture or sign, writing letters, typing text messages, drawing pictures or even sending emojis.

But if we want to communicate by speaking then we need to use our voice.

Our voice makes sound when we use air from our lungs to vibrate our vocal cords, which sit inside your voice box.

To find your voice box, feel for the bony lump at the front of your throat. We sometime call this an "Adam's apple" in men.

The air from the lungs causes the vocal cords to move really quickly. This is called vibration and feels a bit like buzzing.

See if you can vibrate your vocal cords, like this boy in the photo. Try saying "ahh" – then, gently place your fingers on your throat

You should be able to feel the vibration of your vocal cords.



Another way to think about this process is to imagine your lungs are a balloon, full of air.

Now imagine the opening of the balloon is your vocal cords.



When the balloon is tied up, vocal cords are closed and no air escapes.

When the balloon isn't tied, the vocal cords are open, and all air comes out. That's like breathing out.

But if you stretch the opening of a balloon sideways, you can control the amount of air that escapes. The opening vibrates, and it makes a noise.



That's similar to what your vocal cords do when they vibrate.

Then what happens?

The voice continues to vibrate as it travels up through your throat and into your mouth and/or your nose.

You can then control the flow of air using your lips, tongue, teeth, and the roof of your mouth to make different sounds.

When you say "ahh", for example, you're making your vocal cords vibrate with your mouth wide open and using the roof of your mouth to stop air escaping out through your nose.

If you say "eee" or "ooo", the air still vibrates in your mouth but because you change the shape of your mouth, you make a different sound.

Some sounds are different

Some sounds that we use to produce speech don't use the voice from our vocal cords

Compare the sounds "sssss" to "zzzzz", for example.

The shape of the mouth and position of tongue, lips, teeth and roof of the mouth are the same but the "s" sound doesn't use our voice, and the "z" sound does.

Try saying "sssss" and then "zzzzz" out loud and feel the difference in vibration on your throat.

We also use our voice differently when we whisper. We don't vibrate our vocal cords at all, we just use air from our lungs and move our mouth, tongue and lips.







Deep within things do not change...

Straggling clouds move raggedly towards the last rays of winter sunset glowing in the sky. The balcony of the two-storeyed house at Pointe-aux-Piments offers a panoramic view of the fields nearby, the

RES project and the seaside lined up by filao trees where sparrows, mynas and pingos or condés noisily hover around their nests before a night's sleep. A small, old concrete house with corrugated-iron roof stands idly in the yard; it is rather used like a shed for poultry and for storing tools. Chilli and bringel plants are still grown in the fertile soil of the plot of land. One can figure out that the old house used to be a straw-thatched hut fifty years ago. Like many other houses in the island, the twostoreyed house started off like a simple concrete house decades ago, and the two storeys piled up following the good fortune of the owner over decades. In summer, pieces of cotton cloth with colourful designs, and sometimes plastic tablecloths are randomly used as curtains on the balcony to keep the glaring sunrays at bay.

Three generations live together with dada and dadi occupying the second floor. Bhai is the dada of the family and friend of the neighbourhood. If you are looking for the perfect man with everlasting love for his sweet wife he married at a very young age, this is the place. Bhai is all praise for the one he calls his best friend on earth, the ieevan saathi he looks up to as a goddess. A frequent visitor from Ninth Mile Triolet, a dark-skinned woman wearing a long skirt, a blouse and a horni covering her head relates her week's occupations. Besides being a part-time labourer, she is also a dhai who massages mothers and their new-born babies. Luckily, women have kept the ancestral know-how of providing care to other women. A shining pouli and gold earrings lit up her dark complexion. She looks much like the ancestors who walked down the steps of Aaparvasi Ghat in the 1850s.

"Should we start preparing pickles and *koutcha*?" Jaya asked me. "Do you want to take some back?"

"Oh no!" It is getting late; darkness falls suddenly and we have already started to unpack the briyani take-away I brought along. We all agree that take-aways are worthless and we'd better cook our own food. Most members of the household are

vegetarian except Bhai who occasionally goes for meat. The veg briyani is okay despite lacking the right flavour depending where you purchase it, the best ones being from one of ISKON's outlets. The chicken briyani is a fool's trap folks fall into whenever they forget about being cautious and selective in purchasing habit. The *dhall* and vegetables Manisha, Bhai's wife, has been preparing would have made our day.

"Let us do it next time I am visiting. Didi." I thanked Jaya for her kind proposal. We also postpone our intention to talk about wedding songs in Bhojpuri, which I think any anthropologist in Mauritius should be interested in, the songs of separation or departure, rather of the bridegroom and the bride for a new life, and the song welcoming the bride in her new home. I guess Sarita Boodhoo must have gathered some valuable texts on the topic from research work done by her asso-ciates. The point is to be aware of the fact that from times immemorial Hindu civilisation has explored and thought about every major life events of its members and celebrate these events with prayers and songs, including soothing songs for the baby elephant snatched from its mother and trained to be tamed and to carry out a few tasks for human society.

"Whoever told you to do this? Are you crazy?", Bhai gets down the stairs and stops one of the boys from cutting the branch of a mango tree. For someone who

never raises his voice, he is really outraged at the sight of the boy bringing down an axe on the tree.

Crime number one: the boy is mutilating a tree without any prayer for forgiveness.

Crime number two: He is doing it after the sunset when trees, plants and the whole world of vegetation goes for a night's rest, and he has not even asked the tree's permission before taking the life out of it.

Kreol sounds out of place in an environment where the family, neighbours and guests are 100% Bhojpuriphone. I feel like I am sort of polluting the place, the odd person out there speaking approximate Bhojpuri now and then. Shreya, the grand-daughter, who has taken up a job after university studies, is a fervent Shivyog follower and totally vegetarian. Not the sort of young lady who goes crazy over Facebook, friends and physical appearance.

On the following day a ceremony was held at a relative's place to mark 40th day of the mourning period in the wake of the demise of a cousin. The 40th day memorial ceremony is common to different civilizations since millennia much before the advent of 'religions' in the modern sense of the word. The pundit recited prayers in Sanskrit after placing the leaves in the four corners of the *havan kund* to evoke different planets. Conversation among the men folk in the row behind centres on Hinduism in India and the cultural assaults on it across centuries and still going on today.
