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Cyber Warfare and Mauritius' Strategic Interests

o government appears to have been so weakened during these last 50 years as the current one in the wake of the revelations made by the former CEO of Mauritius Telecom about the alleged "sniffing" operation conducted by a team of Indian technicians at the Baie Jacotet Submarine Cable Landing Station (BJLS). Weakened, but not on its knees yet, the more so since the "tsunami" predicted by Sherry Singh that would lead to the collapse of the MSM-led government has not materialized despite the daily media and opposition blitzkrieg. If there are good reasons to militate for the ousting of the government from power as we have highlighted in these columns on numerous occasions, the blatant anti-India sentiments -- as evidenced on social media platforms and in the selective media attacks and parliamentary questions - are paradoxically what will comfort the MSM leadership that its continuation in office until the end of its current mandate will be ensured by those in the electorate who feel indirectly targeted by such attacks.

No wonder therefore that the Prime Minister has in his public statements and in Parliament stuck to his guns as regards his decision to allow the "survey" conducted at the BJLS. Not a whimper of protest has been heard from the SAFE consortium, nor from the diplomatic enclave here – though one would expect the necessary reports and briefings are being regularly despatched to their respective governments back home. The only official comment so far has been from the official spokesperson of the Indian Ministry of External Affairs, Arindam Bagchi, in response to a question from a journalist of 'The Wire' during the Ministry's weekly media briefing, that the statement of Prime Minister Pravind Jugnauth (in response to the first PNQ on this matter) was "good enough from India's perspective".

As matters stand, no tangible proofs have been forthcoming locally, whether from former CEO of Mauritius Telecom or from the opposition, about any "sniffing' operation having been conducted, except for "data capture" as indicated by the former Chief Technical Officer of Mauritius Telecom in his report to the acting CEO following Sherry Singh's resignation. However, some details have filtered from sections of the Indian media, in particular from 'The Print', about the alleged involvement of India's external intelligence agency, Research and Analysis Wing (RAW) with the survey conducted at the Baie Jacotet Landing Station. In fact, there has been growing concern about the potential for Huaweiinstalled equipment to conduct espionage for the Chinese government. There have been concerns in India since early last year about the People Liberation Army using internet infrastructure built by Huawei in Mauritius to conduct digital espionage against India and Western targets across the Indian Ocean, reported 'The Print' yesterday. It adds that 'the push to install Huawei surveillance equipment in Mauritius was part of a larger effort that saw similar systems being set up by China in

73 cities across 52 countries, including France, Germany, Pakistan, Tajikistan, and Mexico. Numerous countries also allege that the company's products may purposely contain security holes that could be used for spying purposes. But this has been denied by the company, which says that the decision by some EU countries to ban Huawei from supplying 5G infrastructure is based on "political motivation".

Whether Mauritius has played a role in India's and other Western powers' efforts to counter China's alleged espionage activities in the Indian Ocean, by facilitating the Indian IT technicians' access to the Baie Jacotet Landing Station, for the purpose of tapping the submarine cable landing points and collect data for analysis, is unlikely to come out in public now or in the future. This however appears to be viewed as a normal and necessary practice in the intelligence community. As pointed out by 'The Print', the British communications-intelligence service GCHQ, as well as the United States National Security Agency, are known to have tapped submarine-cable landing points to collect vast amounts of data for analysis.

Is more likely to come out from the audit ordered by the new Board of Mauritius Telecom into the "transactions" made under the direction of ex-CEO Sherry Singh during his tenure, who we assume reported to the Chairman/CabSec and the previous MT Board? There are also indications, or at least pressure from certain guarters to have a review of the integrity of the Safe City Huawei-installed equipment. Some Middle-East states have invited Huawei to enhance their CCTV surveillance systems with features to enable tracking and keeping close check on their own local populations. The total absence of any form of judiciary or independent oversight over the Safe City CCTV operations here had previously been questioned when such cameras or the storage capacity of the whole system were found wanting in the unsolved Kistnen murder case.

Independently or whether we are or have been dragged into a cyber warfare and espionage situation on scales that go beyond our shores, we can be concerned about whether the extensive Safe City program at a cost of near Rs 20 billion, has the only objective of preventing or catching occasional thieves on the run. Barring as yet unexplained national security considerations, every citizen is entitled to some degree of privacy, his or her bank accounts or mail exchanges respected as confidential and protected from the prying eyes of any Big Brother.

More importantly, all this matter should bring to the fore the issues relating the country's long-term strategic interests and our diplomatic agenda to serve those interests. Are we shifting from our time-tested equidistant diplomacy in view of the new realities taking shape in the world, in particular in the region? Advancing Mauritius' long-term strategic interests should prevail over other considerations.

3 reasons why women leaders actually matter for women

Four different female presidents led three Asian nations in recent decades. What does their legislative record tell us about the impact women leaders can have on women's lives?

There are currently just 30 female presidents and prime ministers worldwide. Moldova and Barbados are the only two countries where women occupy both the positions of president and prime minister, while Bangladesh is the only nation where a woman has led for more years than a man over the last half century.

Clearly, women leaders matter as a question of gender equity, but as my research shows, they may also matter to women in other ways.

I looked at four different female presidents in three different political systems: the Philippines' first female president, Corazon Aquino (1986–1992) and its second female leader, Gloria Macapagal Arroyo (2001–2010); Indonesia's first and only female president, Megawati Sukarnoputri (2001–2004); and Sri Lanka's Chandrika Bandaranaike Kumaratunga (CBK).

CBK, who was Sri Lanka's fifth president from 1994 to 2005, followed in the footsteps of her mother, Sirimavo Bandarnaike, the world's first female elected head of government in 1960.

I was interested in the difference these women leaders made on women's lives through the law. However, I did not want to blindly place a positive spin on the impact women have as presidents.

My research used the Gender Legislative Index, which relies on human evaluators and machine learning to determine how well laws advance women's rights. The index indicated whether the laws enacted during these leaders' tenures were "good" for women.

Of course, "women" are not a monolithic category with the same interests and needs. And nor are women leaders all the same. But there are three reasons why women leaders may matter more to women.

1. Bringing women up the ladder

Appointment powers are central to presidential leadership. President Macapagal Arroyo herself acknowledged to me that President Aquino had "paved the way" for her, in multiple ways.



week, have offered no explanation and comment on this unacceptable government interference to enable access in a highly protected area of a private sector company to survey a high security international communications cable. They have ordered a forensic audit of MT.

The truth cannot be buried. The detailed technical report of the Chief Technical Officer submitted to the previous Board of MT, revealed in the press this week, confirms the extent and volume of data capture at the MT high security Baie Jacotet Submarine Cable Landing Station. Any computer scientist can explain to Ministers blindly parroting a lot of bunkum that the volume of data detailed in the technical report can be downloaded in a laptop. In the light of the grave public revelations made regarding data capture, people expected prompt explanations and clarifications from the PM to allay their legitimate apprehensions and the pervasive angst in the country.

More questions

The long-awaited PM's statement this week and the related TV programme on the survey/sniffing affair raises new questions. What has been the result of the analysis of the data samples obtained from the survey? Was there

evidence of any security risks or breach? Which sovereign country outsources its national security issues? Going forward, we need, as a sovereign nation, to train MT engineers to carry out regular security surveys and sampling of data inhouse and have the required software to analyze the data collected.

During the TV programme focusing on the survey/ sniffing affair, there were contrary to our diligently built strong diplomatic ties and goodwill with China and other countries having diplomatic missions in Mauritius unwarranted innuendos and unsubstantiated comments by a newly-appointed member of the MT Board on Huawei. Orange SA (France Telecom), the 40% shareholder of MT, does not seem to have had such reservations on Huawei equipment.

We should remember that the common stance of the US and the EU on China, considered as a competitor and a systemic rival, and the sabre-rattling over Taiwan are part of a larger tug of war for geopolitical, commer-

SAFE: Have the authorities brewed a storm?

ach week brings new developments in the SAFE survey imbroglio that has spelled an immense cloud of suspicion around the country's leadership and its standing. For once, the head of government was caught in the frontline when the allegations of Mauritius Telecom's ex-CEO of 1st July failed to elicit a proper response or even a counter-strategy despite a coterie of advisors. Was it about "security" as he initially said or national security we may never know, neither who briefed the PM about such security issues nor when or at what level were such highly technical issues raised or discussed at his national security levels before sending PMO's request for technical information in October 2021.

In his various snippets of information after some functions, the PM clumsily dragged the Indian PM Modi's name into the saga of Baie Jacotet Landing Station (BJLS). The public statements about exchanges reportedly between himself and PM Modi is rarely witnessed, particu-

larly if security issues were at sake and this protocol gaffe has quite predictably opened a can of worms that has Mauritius Inc inflamed. If the Chief Technical Officer Report on the Indian tech mission leaked in the press is to be trusted, the "survey" was in real fact a more substantive data capture of internet traffic on the MT ports to SAFE-BJLS for purposes yet to be clarified. Neither is it known at this stage who on the Indian side (public or private sector) will analyse the captured data, uploaded onto laptops or pen drives, and the destinatories of whatever report should be expected after such analysis from the Indian technical team that had been commissioned by the PM.

We also have to wonder whether Orange appointed MT Board members,

probably not our variant of political nominees, would have failed to sniff out such security issues or the disquiet that had been relayed to the PM and subsequently to the ex-CEO of MT since October 2021. It is a somewhat tall order to believe that their social, professional or other antennae over several months would not have tuned in to major issues or planned happenings at MT and if so, would they have failed to keep France Telecom headquarters or the French diplomatic mission and/or the French Foreign Affairs ministry abreast of developments in the pipeline?

Curiously, neither the SAFE consortium nor its Operational Command in South Africa have as yet seen fit to lodge a request for information about the whole BJLS affair from the local authorities. It is

doubtful whether the full light will ever be shown on matters which may be related to international espionage or were meant to serve other purposes using the global internet highways and whether the authorities have been trapped into a cyber affair with implications far beyond our shores and from which disentanglement may prove tricky. It has been reported that the Mauritian Attorney General has hot-footed it to New Delhi, officially for grain and food purchases, but, in all likelihood, to consider how best to limit repercussions or prevent further da-mage to the national interests, reputation and security partnership of both countries in this SAFE saga.

Meantime the CCID inquiry, being concerned with breach of ICTA Act or criminal defamation by the ex-CEO Sherry Singh, will have a tough time deciding who was cognizant of the "survey" operation at the Baie Jacotet Landing Station and what was the chain of command for such an operation. The revoked Chairman and Mauritian Board members of MT may be invited by CCID to provide their version of events and what they really knew of the security issue raised by the PM reportedly since October 2021.As a collateral damage, the whole affair, now reported in overseas media, could place heavy interrogation marks on future consortium-led international optic cable upgrades or developments transiting through Mauritius, particularly if the current underwater SAFE cable itself may be nearing the end of its useful life.

Security concerns: Western nations crack down on Huawei

here have been over the past decade numerous concerns raised in many Western capitals about the role of Chinese Corporate Entities (CCEs) and the likes of Huawei, ZTE (a partially state-owned technology company that specializes in telecommunication), Vivo or TikTok, in potential industrial or espionage on behalf of the People's Liberation Army government in Beiiina

Huawei, in particular, now the world's biggest backoffice supplier of telecoms and internet equipment and software, has been accused essentially on two fronts: (a) leaving surreptitious back-doors open for their maintenance personnel or for malicious software to offload data of interest, and (b) the use of software "patches" with malicious and often sophisticated self-destruct features to achieve the same objectives. These patches would come as regular part of their maintenance agreements after

commissioning of a "clean" system that passes all of a country's security tests.

It would seem serious concerns began in all Western national security circles ten years ago when Australian intelligence officials detected a sophisticated intrusion into their country's telecommunications systems, through an apparently legitimate software update from Huawei that was allegedly loaded with malicious code that reprogrammed the infected equipment to record all the communications passing through it before sending the data to China.

Both the Chinese government, Huawei and their supporters in much of Africa or Asia, many of whom cannot afford more expensive alternatives, or some who like the Huawei software enhancements that enable their governments to monitor their populations rather closely, have systematically denied the Western concerns as lacking substance or as forming part of a trade war on China.

What particularly angered the Chinese authorities was that Australia decided to share that 2012 security breach with most Western security services, and both countries have since locked horns consistently.

Huawei dominates the more than \$90 billion global telecommunications equipment market, where it competes against Sweden's Ericsson and Finland's Nokia

and there are obviously major trade and security issues at stake as the next generation of 5G networks are being considered. As matters stand, the US. Australia, Sweden and the UK have all banned Huawei from their 5G networks, and about 60 countries signed on to a US Department of State program where they've committed to avoiding Chinese equipment for their telecommunications systems.


The extent to which Huawei is involved in our telecoms network or the CCTV cameras in the context of the Safe City project with undisclosed features (facial or voice recognition for instance) has not been a matter of concern here to date. There is no reason as yet to suspect that it might be of interest to our national security as both Mauritius and China have always strived to maintain cordial and trusting relationships.

Increasingly insecure world



wo days ago, I met a young couple who live in San Diego, California, who are here for a brief holiday. The husband is Mauritian and his wife is American, and they have a daughter who is in 9th grade. On completing 12th grade, she will be joining university. Mum is keeping the options open but has a preference for Europe, because she feels that it is no longer the same America that she has known in her younger days.

She is concerned about safety in civilian life, because 'there are far too many guns. Far too many young people possessing guns.' She mentioned the 18–24-year-old boys, who somehow or the other pick up or get involved in a fight, and will pull out a gun. And you can't prevent them from possessing one, or two, or several – because the law allows them.

Sometime before they flew down, there was shooting in a locality - 'downtown' - where they have often gone for meals, known to be a quiet place. For whatever reason, there was a shoot out, and two decent people who had come from out of town for a conference were killed as they were having lunch in a restaurant.

'It takes place at random,' she continued, 'but random can be anywhere, anytime.' And who knows that you or one of yours may be at the right place, but at the wrong time?

Violence is endemic in our world, but in civilian life it is now more common. Or perhaps we feel so because communication has expanded so much and become so easy that every incident around the world is reported, so it seems more frequent. Nearly 35 years ago, I was doing a last-minute shopping at Galeries Lafayette in Marseille on the evening of my departure from there. When I reached back to the doctors' residence, I learnt that there had been a terrorist explosion at Galeries Lafayettte in Paris! What if... I shuddered to think!

Fast forward to about 10 years ago and I am at the Sandton Centre in Johannesburg, at the bank during a lunchtime break. Suddenly there's commotion and noise heard further away in the Centre: there's been an attack. We hurry back to our conference venue.

ast week in San Diego the lady stepped out of the house to be whacked in the face by a heat wave of 41 degrees Celsius: *du jamais vu*, temperatures so high, a phenomenon that has become common only recently, over the past few years. Mauritius been shivering for the past several weeks in the continuous, unusually cold and rainy weather that had gripped us? he Immigration Bill, which supersedes the previous Act, has been passed this week in Parliament granting, in one of its clauses, an absolute discretionary power to the head of government to deprive any citizen by naturalisation of his citizenship status. Since no reason would need to be given either, this could restrict severely the deprived person's ability to have legal recourse. Lex opines whether this clause and the absolute powers granted to any executive officer meets our

constitutional provisions, comparable UK/UE practices or our international obligations.

* The Immigration Bill (No. XII of 2022), whose main object is "to consolidate and strengthen the law with regard to the admission and stay of noncitizens in the country" is being criticised in some quarters for the discretionary power it gives to the Home Affairs minister (usually held by the Prime Minister) to "deprive (in his absolute discretion and without giving any reason) any person of his citizenship of Mauritius, if he has reliable information and is satisfied that it is in the interest of defence, public safety or public order". How do you react to what would amount to sweeping and unaccountable powers that are being vested in the Prime Minister?

Decision makers, whatever their status, cannot and are not allowed by law to possess absolute discretion. Absolute discretion does mean that the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court is ousted. The decision of the man, who believes he holds absolute discretion to deprive an individual of his citizenship, is reviewable by the judiciary.

* Given the way the it has been drafted and the discretionary powers being vested in the Prime Minister, do you think the amended law would pass the test of constitutionality?

The law may stand the test of constitutionality with the caveat that the decision emanating from the exercise of absolute discretion is definitely reviewable by the courts.

* There are however some freedoms that are or may be restricted by law in the interests of defence, public safety or public order. Which consideration is likely to prevail in the Mauritian context: the interests of justice or those of defence, public safety, public order? What has been the general trend in that regard?

Absolute freedom does not exist anywhere. All freedoms are subject to derogations. Our Constitution provides that the fundamental rights are subject to such limitations of that protection as are contained in those provisions, being limitations designed to ensure that the enjoyment of those rights and freedoms by any individual does not prejudice the rights and freedoms of others or the public interest. All the freedoms may be derogated from provided they are justifiable in a democratic society.

* If a Prime Minister were to come forward and state that he cannot in the interests of defence, public safety, public order or national security divulge the reasons behind an executive decision - be it in relation to immigration or any other issue, will our Courts go along with that?

Certainly not. Confidentiality would in many instances give way to human rights considerations. For example, if a citizen has been deprived of his citizenship and he is given no reasons, how on earth will he be able to access the courts of law to challenge that decision? By not giving reasons, the Prime Minister would be denying or putting severe limits on the right of access to a court of law that an individual has and this a fundamental right.

* Does this mean that had the Prime Minister refused to divulge any details about the survey carried out at Baie Jacotet Landing Station in the interest of national security, that would have been the end of the story?

The most sensible thing the Prime Minister should have done right from the word go was to make a statement in Parliament or to the nation on TV that the survey was ordered as he had received reliable information that there might be a cyber attack or a terrorist attack on Mauritius without giving the details that would compromise any investigation or national security. He should also have alerted the partners of the Consortium about his action. All this would have been perfectly in order.

Unfortunately, the whole incident has been turned into a political storm.

By refusing to give any clue of any possible cyber or terrorist attack, the Prime Minister has opened wide the avenues of speculation and insinuations.

* To come back to the Immigration Bill, Section 39 (4) of the Bill proposes to amend the Passport Act, the subsection (2) of which states: 'A stateless person, or, where regulations are made under subsection (1), a national or citizen of a country specified in the regulations shall not be allowed to enter Mauritius unless he has obtained a visa.' What happens to those that are rendered stateless resulting from the application of the amended Passport Act? What avenues of redress do they have?

A stateless person is a citizen of nowhere. Without a nationality, stateless persons are without the recognition or protection of any country. There are two UN Convention on Statelessness: first, the UN Convention of 1954, and second the 1961 Convention. Mauritius is not a party to any of these Conventions.

As explained by the UNHCR: "The 1954 Convention is designed to ensure that stateless people enjoy a minimum set of human rights. It establishes the legal definition of a stateless person as someone who is "not recognized as a national by any state under the operation of its law."

Simply put, this means that a stateless person is someone who does not have the nationality of any country. The 1954 Convention also establishes minimum standards of treatment for stateless people in respect to a number of rights. These include, but are not limited to, the right to education, employment and housing. Importantly, the 1954 Convention also guarantees stateless people a right to identity, travel documents and administrative assistance."

Monkeypox: Europe, US worst hit; account for 95% of the diagnosed cases. savs WHO

Europe and the Americas have been affected the most by the monkeypox outbreak, said Director General of the World Health Organization (WHO) Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus on Wednesday.

These two regions have reported 95% of the diagnosed cases, he said, warning against stigma and discrimination in monkeypox messaging.

Over 18,000 monkeypox cases have been reported to the WHO from 78 countries. More than 70 per cent of these came from the European region and 25 per cent from the Americas, reports ANI.

He said that 98 per cent of the reported cases have been among men who have sex with men, stressing that stigma and discrimination can be "as dangerous as any virus and can fuel the outbreak."

"As we have seen with Covid-19 misinformation," it can spread rapidly online, he said, "so we call on social media platforms, tech companies and news organizations to work with us to prevent and counter harmful information."

Last Saturday, the WHO officially declared monkeypox a

public health emergency of international concern (PHEIC). A PHEIC is the highest level of alert that the United Nations (UN) health body can give.

The WHO has been urging countries to take the monkeypox outbreak seriously by taking the steps needed to stop transmission and protect vulnerable groups. "The best way to do that is to reduce the risk of exposure and make safe choices," he said.

Meanwhile, Canada, the European Union and the US have already approved the vaccine called MVA-BN (Modified Vaccinia Ankara - Bavarian Nordic) for use against monkeypox, and two other vaccines are also being assessed. However, due to the lack of data on the effectiveness and dosage of the vaccines, the WHO currently does not recommend mass vaccination against monkeypox. It also urges all countries that are administering such vaccines to collect and share critical data on their effectiveness.

Singapore, US, Mauritius, Netherlands and Switzerland emerge as top five countries for FDI equity inflows into India



Singapore, USA, Mauritius, Netherlands Sand Switzerland have emerged as top five countries for Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) equity inflows into India in the financial year 2021-22, an official Indian release said on Thursday (28 July).

Around 27.01 per cent of the FDI equity inflows in India were from Singapore, followed by USA (17.94 per cent), Mauritius (15.98 per cent), Netherlands (7.86 per cent) and Switzerland (7.31 per cent).

Top five sectors receiving highest FDI Equity Inflow during FY2021-22 are Computer Software and Hardware (24.60 per cent), Services Sector (Fin., Banking, Insurance, Non Fin/Business, Outsourcing, R&D, Courier, Tech. Testing and Analysis, Other) (12.13 per cent), Automobile Industry (11.89 per cent), Trading (7.72 per cent) and Construction (Infrastructure) Activities (5.52 per cent).

Top five states receiving highest FDI Equity Inflow during FY2021-22 are Karnataka (37.55 per cent), Maharashtra (26.26 per cent), Delhi (13.93 per cent), Tamil Nadu (5.10 per cent) and Haryana (4.76 per cent), the ministry said.

During FY2021-22, FDI has been reported from 101 countries, whereas, it was reported from 97 countries during previous FY 2020-21, it added.

According to the ministry, the Indian government has implemented several reforms under the FDI policy regime across sectors such as insurance, defense, telecom, financial services, pharmaceuticals, retail trading, e-commerce, construction and development, civil aviation, and manufacturing etc.

Despite the ongoing pandemic and global developments, India received the highest annual FDI inflows of \$84,835 million in FY21-22 overtaking last year's FDI by \$2.87 billion. Earlier, FDI inflows increased from \$74,391 million in FY19-20 to \$81,973 million in FY 20-21, the ministry said.

Rishi Sunak says Liz Truss risks tipping millions into 'economic misery' in acrimonious head-to-head debate

Rishi Sunak has warned Liz Truss risks tipping millions economic misery" and fueling inflation with her economic proposals, as the pair trashed each other's policy platforms in an acrimonious debate.



Hitting out at the foreign secretary's £30bn-plus tax cut plans, the former chancellor claimed there was "nothing Conservative" about her approach, with the

party having "absolutely no chance" of winning the next election, reports The Independent.

Ms Truss accused Mr Sunak of "scaremongering" and "Project Fear" - a term Brexiteers used to dismiss the economic warnings of the Remain camp in 2016.

She also criticised Mr Sunak over his stance on China, saying that the Treasury was just last month calling for closer bilateral and economic ties with the country.

Both candidates also ruled out a role for Boris Johnson in their future government. They were asked about the potential of a political comeback for Mr Johnson after The Telegraph reported that the PM had told Lord Cruddas on Friday that he "wants to fight the next general election as leader of the Conservative Party."

Scores of Sri Lankans, on boats, flee to Tamil Nadu amid economic crisis

Scores of Sri Lankans, fleeing their Seconomically distressed nation, arrived in India's Tamil Nadu, including at least six people from two families on Wednesday, officials were quoted in a report. Sri Lanka's parliament has extended the state of emergency imposed earlier in July as protests continued to grow amid months of a financial crisis that led to a food, fuel and power shortage.

Of the six people who escaped to Tamil Nadu the previous day, three of them were children, according to news agency PTI. The families had left their hometown of Jaffna in Sri Lanka and reached India by a boat, reports Hindustan Times.

Officials then rescued them from an islet and took them to the Mandapam refugee camp, PTI stated.

Over the past few months, many Sri Lankans – most of them Tamils – have left the island nation to enter India through Tamil Nadu as they were unable to survive the crisis, with prices of essential commodities and fuel skyrocketing there.

They were dropped near Rameswaram island by boatmen and

rescued by the Indian Coast Guard and brought to Dhanushkodi to be handed over to the police.

Last week, seven people belonging to two families in Lanka arrived in the state.

State of emergency in Sri Lanka

The 'emergency' was declared on July 18 by Ranil Wickremesinghe, who was still the acting president at the time, under the Public Security Ordinance in the interests of public security, the protection of public order and the maintenance of supplies and services essential to the life of the community, according to

reports.

With Wednesday's parliamentary sanctioning, the state of emergency will now be in force until August 14.

During a debate in Sri Lanka's Parliament, the Opposition lawmakers accused Wickremesinghe of ordering a crackdown on the peaceful protesters by using the state of emergency. The government was blamed for unleashing a crackdown on protesters who had forced the resignation of the Rajapaksa family.

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North Korea's Kim Jong Un threatens US, S. Korea with 'nuclear war deterrent'



North Korean leader Kim Jong Un warned he's ready to use his nuclear weapons in potential military conflicts with the United States and South Korea, state media said Thursday, as he unleashed fiery rhetoric against rivals he says are pushing the Korean Peninsula to the brink of war.

1950-53 Korean War was apparently meant to boost internal unity in the impoverished country amid pandemic-related economic difficulties. While Kim has increasingly threatened his rivals with nuclear weapons, it's unlikely that he would use them first against the superior militaries of the U.S. and its allies, reports Hindustan Times.

Kim's speech to war veterans on the 69th anniversary of the end of the

"Our armed forces are completely

prepared to respond to any crisis, and our country's nuclear war deterrent is also ready to mobilize its absolute power dutifully, exactly and swiftly in accordance with its mission," Kim said in Wednesday's speech.

He accused the United States of "demonizing" North Korea to justify its hostile policies. He said U.S.-South Korea military drills targeting North Korea show the U.S.'s "double standards" and "gangster-like" aspects because it brands North Korea's routine military activities an apparent reference to its missile tests — as provocations or threats.

Kim also alleged the new South Korean government of President Yoon Suk Yeol is led by "confrontation maniacs" and "gangsters" who have gone further than previous South Korean conservative governments. Since taking office in May, the Yoon government has moved to strengthen Seoul's military alliance with the United States and bolster its capacity to neutralize North Korean nuclear threats including a preemptive strike capability.


What are the long-term consequences of our increased alcohol intake during lockdown?

housands of extra alcohol-related deaths and hospi-L tal admissions are set to be reported over the coming 20 years as a result of increased drinking habits acquired during the pandemic, new research suggests.



A study from the University of Sheffield, commissioned by NHS England, found that while lighter drinkers cut their consumption during lockdown, heavier drinkers drank more and may never return to where they were, leading to serious health complications for many.

The research examined how alcohol-related hospitalisations and deaths are likely to increase post-Covid. It found that, in a worst-case scenario, there will be 972.382 additional hospital admissions and 25.192 additional deaths, at a cost of £5.2 billion to the NHS, in the next 20 years.



Kyiv says Russian forces have captured Ukraine's second largest power plant

Russian forces have captured Ukraine's second biggest power plant and Moscow is undertaking a "massive redeployment" of troops to three southern regions, a senior adviser to President Volodymyr Zelenskiy said on Wednesday.

Russian-backed forces had earlier announced the capture of the Soviet-era, coal-fired Vuhlehirsk power plant, reports Reuters.

"They achieved a tiny tactical advantage - they captured Vuhlehirsk," presidential adviser Oleksiy Arestovych said in an interview posted on YouTube.



Asia's richest woman's \$24 bn net worth plunges by half

sia's wealthiest woman lost more than half her for-Atune over the past year as China's real estate sector was rocked by a cash crunch, a billionaire index showed Thursday.

Yang Huiyan, a majority shareholder in Chinese property giant Country Garden, saw her net worth plunge by more than 52 percent to \$11.3 billion from \$23.7 billion a year ago, according to the Bloomberg Billionaires Index.

Yang's fortune took a major hit on Wednesday when the Guangdong-based Country Garden's Hong Konglisted shares fell 15 percent after the company announced it would sell new shares to raise cash, reports AFP.

Yang inherited her wealth when her father -- Country Garden founder Yang Guoqiang -- transferred his shares to her in 2005, according to state media.

She became Asia's richest woman two years later after the developer's initial public offering in Hong Kong.

But she is now barely holding onto that title, with chemical fibres tycoon Fan Hongwei a close runner-up with a net worth of \$11.2 billion on Thursday.

Chinese authorities cracked down on excessive debt in the property sector in 2020, leaving major players such as Evergrande and Sunac struggling to make payments and forcing them to renegotiate with creditors as they teetered on the edge of bankruptcy.

China's banking regulator has urged lenders to support the property sector and meet the "reasonable financing needs" of firms as analysts and policymakers fear financial contagion.

The property sector is estimated to account for 18-30 percent of the country's GDP and is a key driver of growth in the world's second-largest economy.

Analysts have warned that the industry is mired in a "vicious cycle" that would further dampen consumer confidence, following the release of dismal Q2 growth figures that were the worst since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Les Mauriciens ne sont pas dupes et vaquent plutôt avec calme à leurs propres préoccupations du moment. Rabin Bhujun, journaliste, nous en parle.

Mauritius Times: L'affaire du 'survey' à la station d'atterrissage du câble SAFE de Baie Jacotet est très complexe. Mais il semble qu'on commence à y voir un peu plus clair et que cela dépasserait les intérêts de la petite île Maurice et aurait un lien vital dans un contexte géopolitique particulier. Quelle lecture faites-vous de cette affaire trois semaines après les révélations de l'ancien CEO de Mauritius Telecom?

Rabin Bhujun : Vous avez raison de dire qu'on y voit «*un peu plus clair*» et j'insiste sur le« peu». A vrai dire, nous sommes toujours dans une séquence de communication habilement dirigée jusqu'ici par Sherry Singh et son cercle de soutiens.

Reconnaissons le talent de l'ancien patron de Mauritius Telecom pour le *storytelling*. Il y a eu le timing de sa démission ; sa première interview à Radio Plus qui a mis le feu aux poudres, ses éléments de langage (*«third party»*, *«sniffing»*) largement repris tels quels dans la presse et par les politiques; ensuite l'interview ratée de *l'express* qui l'a conduit à faire un exercice de rattrapage de nouveau chez Radio Plus.

Il est évident que c'est Sherry Singh qui a fourni, directement ou indirectement, aux journalistes les différentes pièces du puzzle dont on parle depuis trois semaines. Nous sommes donc dans sa phase de communication - dépasser le «*narrative*» - qui lui sied.

* Justement, qu'est-ce qu'il y a au-delà de ce «*narrative*» dont vous parlez?

Il y a bien évidemment la géopolitique. Un «*narrative*» local et politique est déjà bien installé à ce sujet : Il présente l'Inde de Narendra Modi comme une puissance colonisatrice et hégémonique à l'égard de Maurice. Sherry Singh a, avec raison, choisi de construire sa version autour cette menace indienne en présentant Pravind Jugnauth comme un vassal du Premier ministre de la Grande Péninsule. Cette prémisse convainc déjà de nombreux Mauriciens, ils n'ont donc eu aucun mal à conclure que les Indiens nous espionnent pour leur propre compte ou pour le compte du gouvernement mauricien.

C'est toutefois un tableau simpliste qui ne tient pas compte du fait que nous nous trouvons dans une région avec des enjeux géopolitiques et géostratégiques considérables. L'océan Indien est une ère d'influence et de conquête au sein de laquelle l'Inde et la Chine se livrent à une âpre rivalité. La Chine possède toutefois un atout dont l'Inde ne dispose pas: ses géants de la télécommunication et des réseaux. Un d'eux, Huawei, a fourni une très large part des solutions télécoms aux opérateurs privés et publics à Maurice. Mauritius Telecom est très lourdement dépendante de ce géant chinois pour son fonctionnement quotidien. Ce qui a conduit le Royaume Uni, le Canada, l'Australie ou encore les USA à adopter une ligne très agressive à l'égard des géants chinois des télécoms.

Ce lundi, Rishi Sunak, qui brigue le poste de leader

du Parti conservateur britannique et donc de Premier ministre en Grande Bretagne, a tenu des propos peu diplomatiques à l'égard de la Chine. Dans une publication sur sa page LinkedIn, il a signifié son intention de «*build a new international alliance of free nations to tackle Chinese cyber-threats and share best practice in technology security*» s'il se retrouve à 10, Downing Street.

Certains stratèges peu futés pensent que le traditionnel tandem PTr/PMSD pourrait faire l'affaire face à Pravind Jugnauth. C'est un pari risqué, même fou car la seule vraie chance de l'opposition réside dans sa capacité à s'unir pour affronter l'alliance que dirigera Pravind Jugnauth lors des prochaines législatives. Si le chef du MSM affronte une opposition dispersée, il pourra toujours prétendre obtenir 35 ou 37 sièges... »

* Où se situe donc Maurice dans tout cela ?

La Grand Péninsule dispose d'alliés objectifs qui estiment que l'entrisme technologique de la Chine est au service d'un axe Chine-Russie-Pakistan-Corée du Nord. Par opposition donc, l'axe Inde, USA, Royaume-Uni, Australie s'est constitué son propre réseau d'alliés.

On n'a aucun mal à imaginer dans quel camp Maurice a choisi de se ranger.

Tout comme on peut aisément conclure que le chef du gouvernement s'est sans doute retrouvé face à une requête, d'un ou de plusieurs membres de cet axe, pour qu'un audit soit effectué afin d'évaluer le niveau de sécurité de l'ensemble du réseau télécom de Maurice à partir du moment où le câble Safe touche terre à Baie du Jacotet.

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Enfin, je ne m'étonne pas que le Premier ministre ait laissé une équipe indienne, externe à Mauritius Telecom, conduire cet audit. Mieux vaut tard que jamais, car il a peut-être dû se rappeler des «*serious concerns*» très diplomatiques qui avaient été communiquées, il y a plusieurs années au sujet de la menace d'entrisme technologique. Il n'y avait eu aucune réaction du gouvernement à l'époque. Il faut dire que Huawei était alors un «*trusted partner*» de Maurice, pour reprendre les mots prononcés par Pravind Jugnauth lors de sa visite chez le géant chinois en septembre 2018.

* Avez-vous l'impression que le gouvernement et, en particulier, le Premier ministre sont en train de reprendre les choses en main après ce qui apparait comme une gestion maladroite depuis l'éclatement de l'affaire?

Pas du tout. Vous êtes même indulgent quand vous dites que la gestion de cette affaire a été maladroite. Elle a été calamiteuse! La ligne de défense du gouvernement, tenue par quelques députés et ministres complètement dépassés, a été ridicule. Notre ministre de l'Intérieur et Premier ministre a jusqu'ici choisi la solennité d'une déclaration à la nation, ce mercredi, à la radiotélévision nationale pour admettre qu'il y a un *«problème»* lié à la *«sécurité nationale»*, ce qui a nécessité un audit d'une équipe externe, et donc indépendante de Mauritius Telecom. L'Attorney General et un des membres du nouveau conseil d'administration de Mauritius Telecom se sont ensuite chargés d'en dire un peu plus. En pointant notamment du doigt la dépendance de Maurice sur les solutions réseaux et équipements de Huawei.

Ces atermoiements et cette manière de verser dans la demi-mesure explique le malaise bien réel qui s'est installé au gouvernement suite à la démission et aux accusations de Sherry Singh. En fait, des élus – des simples députés aux ministres – ne comprennent rien à ce qui s'est passé ni ne savent quoi répondre face aux interrogations légitimes. Jugnauth ne leur dit rien, ou si peu, se contentant de quelques formules éculées pour signifier sa volonté d'en découdre avec Sherry Singh, comme il l'a fait de nouveau à la télévision nationale ce mercredi.

* Faut-il toutefois reconnaître que ce qui est apparu comme une gestion maladroite au départ s'explique par le fait que le Premier ministre ne peut pas, pour des raisons évidentes, tout dire?

Il est certain que le Premier ministre a sans doute une marge de manœuvre limitée par rapport à ce qu'il peut dire sur une question avec deux dimensions aussi sensibles: la sécurité nationale et les relations diplomatiques.

Il faut aussi rappeler que Sherry Singh a fait partie du premier cercle de Pravind Jugnauth depuis qu'il est revenu au pouvoir en 2014. A ce titre, il est certain que Sherry Singh et Pravind Jugnauth ont collaboré étroitement sur une série de sujets sensibles dont celle des télécommunications qui a conduit à la position hégémonique de Huawei à Maurice.

Nous vivons à l'ère du spectacle numérique, caractérisée par une confusion généralisée, même dans les médias d'information, par rapport à ce qui est important ou trivial. A quoi accorder davantage d'importance? Au nombre de *views* et de personnes connectées pour regarder un *live* sur Facebook? Le feuilleton Sherry Singh a deux dimensions. D'une part, c'est un phénomène médiatique en soi, dans lequel les *social media engagement metrics* sont roi, car ils engendrent des revenus publicitaires sonnants et trébuchants pour les médias qui arrivent à négocier un «*live*» avec le repenti de service.



President Murmu: A Poor Tribal Girl Becomes President of India

6 It is the power of India's democracy that a girl born in a poor tribal home could reach the topmost constitutional post," said Ms Droupadi Murmu, aged 64, after she was sworn in as the 15th and the youngest President

of India on 25 July 2022. This statement highlighted her journey from a hamlet in Odisha's Mayurbhanj district, one of the most underdeveloped in India, to the imposing Rashtrapati Bhavan (President's Mansion) on New Delhi.

After she signed the formal oath of office, she closed her eyes for some seconds and remained still as hundreds of VIPs in the huge hall wondered what was happening. She went into deep meditation. This is the bedrock of her tempestuous life which brought her to this position.

During a tumultuous period in her personal life after she was defeated in a crucial election, she lost three of her closest family members in six years; her eldest son, Laxman Murmu, in 2009; her younger son, Sippun Murmu, in 2013; and then her husband, Shyam Charan Murmu, in 2014 in a series of unfortunate incidents. Deeply involved in her political career at that time, she struggled with severe depression. Then she took time off to meditate with Brahma Kumaris to restore her balance and face life again.

"Look no further for your Monday Motivation. Above all else, she is a person of extraordinary courage and a commitment to serve. Her inner strength has enabled her to withstand all the challenges life has thrown at her. I join in saluting her. A moment of intense pride for India," tweeted Anand Mahindra, the Mahindra Group Chairman.

All tribes in the seven North East state are elated by President Murmu's rise to the highest constitutional post and people belonging to the tea-tribe community are optimistic that Murmu will take steps to ensure granting of the Scheduled Tribe status to them. They also live in Bihar, West Bengal, Odisha and Jharkhand. Many watched her oath taking ceremony on national television and celebrated this achievement with boisterous song and dance by traditional folklore dancers in no less than 130,000, yes, a hundred and thirty thousand villages. This has immense political significance in the coming general election in 2024 because most, if not all, tribes may well vote for the ruling party.

The tribes look forward to getting their constitutional rights and economic uplift. "Besides being an *adivasi*, a

woman and the youngest President, she's also a person with great insights on education and rights of the downtrodden and has a career fighting for that," tweeted Srijanpal Singh, former advisor to Dr APJ Abdul Kalam.

Draupadi Murmu was born on June 20, 1958, in Uparbeda village of Mayurbhanj district in Odisha in a Santali tribal family to Biranchi Narayan Tudu. Bot her father and grandfather were village heads under the Panchayati Raj Systems. The Santhals are one of the largest tribes mostly living in West Bengal, Odisha, Bihar, Assam and Jharkhand. She started school in her village Uparbeda in Odisha's Mayurbhanj district. She later went to a high school in the neighbouring town and obtained a degree from the state's prestigious Rama Devi University. Before entering politics, President Murmu worked as a teacher at Sri Aurobindo Integral Education Centre, Rairangpur where she taught school subjects. Later she became a junior professor and a researcher. Then she was appointed a junior assistant in Odisha Irrigation Department.

Murmu joined the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in 1997 and was elected as the councillor of the Rairangpur Nagar Panchayat. In 2000, she became the Chairperson of Rairangpur Nagar Panchayat and also served as the National Vice-President of BJP Scheduled Tribes Morcha. Elevated to a minister in 2000, she had different portfolios until 2004. In 2009, she contested the Lok Sabha election from Mayurbhanj constituency but lost.

On May 18, 2015, Murmu became the Governor of Jharkhand, as the first woman Governor of Jharkhand and also the first female tribal leader from Odisha to be appointed as a Governor of the Indian State. She remained the Governor of Jharkhand until July 2021. In June this year, she was declared as the candidate for the President of India by the ruling BJP party and went on to win with a thumping majority with extensive cross voting.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi described President Murmu's swearing-in as a watershed moment for India. "The entire nation watched with pride as Smt. DroupadiMurmu Ji took oath as the President of India. Her assuming the Presidency is a watershed moment for India especially for the poor, marginalised and downtrodden. I wish her the very best for a fruitful Presidential tenure," he tweeted.

In her first tweet as President, Murmu greeted the country with "Johar, Namaskar" and said Indians' wishes would give her strength to fulfil her duties in the country's highest office. "Johar" is a traditional greeting among tribals. She has not forgotten her tribal roots and is expected to uplift their lives.

ur Constitution has at long last been approved by the Secretary of State. Soon it will have the Royal assent and after the passage of local legislation. It will have the force of law. The registration of electors will then take place and finally the election will be held — perhaps to the satisfaction of

"impatient" future candi-

dates and perhaps also to the dislike of some who are well satisfied with what and where they are.

Our new Constitution is far from being the ideal one. If we are not altogether happy about the ministerial system it inflicts upon us, we are certainly happy that it gives every adult Mauritian the right of participating in the political life of the island. For over two centuries the toiling-moiling class has been agitating for the recognition of its rights and when today every adult Mauritian finds himself with the right to vote placed in his hands, he cannot but feel that he is witnessing the consummation of an epic struggle. At this glorious moment it would but be the peak of ingratitude to forget those who fell in the struggle and those who are today carrying the torch of freedom alight.

At the risk of appearing a wee bit commonplace we aver that a Constitution is not an end in itself but a means to an end — a glorious end indeed. Adult suffrage and semi-responsible government are not all what

we have been clamouring for. We want better wages, better housing, better health and better education. Ballot papers have never assuaged the hungry. Nor have they ever cured the sick. But they can be instrumental in securing a happier life. It remains to be seen whether a change in our status will be followed by a fruitful change in our standard of living.

At the Health Department

The 1958-59 budget provides for three new posts of Chief Executive Officers for the Health Department. It appears that Government in concurrence with the Head of the Health Department intends placing a Chief Executive Officer at each of the three largest hospitals viz., Civil, Victoria and Mental. These Chief Executive Officers are going to assume the purely administrative duties of the hospitals — duties carried out quite efficiently since the very establishment of those institutions up to now by senior officers of the nursing profession.

The nursing profession as a whole rightly resents the changes contemplated by Government for the simple reason that these changes do imply that the Senior dressers now performing most of the administrative duties in the hospitals are much below the mark — which is certainly a fallacy. What, then, can be Government's motive in now introducing clerical officers in the administration of hospitals?

We do not in the least suggest that the Senior dressers are perfect models of hospital administrators

and that the way they are performing their jobs does not leave room for improvement. On the contrary, we are of opinion that much can and should be done to ameliorate the administration of hospitals and one of the surest ways of doing it is to relieve the Stewards of a multitude of extraneous duties such as preparing paysheets of the whole personnel of the hospitals, keeping account of revenue, directly controlling the stores and so many other insignificant and cumbersome duties. We feel that if the Senior dressers who are now performing the administrative duties are elevated to a rank equivalent to that of Chief Executive Officer in the respective hospitals and assisted with competent junior clerical officers the administration of hospitals is bound to improve.

What we advocate sounds better in two respects. First, if a member of the nursing profession is appointed to the post of CEO in a hospital, the hospital is going to benefit from a continuity of policy because, being a member of the nursing profession, the officer will not be subject to frequent transfers to other departments. Moreover, the CEO at the top of the administration of a hospital should know to a certain extent the ins and outs of the nursing profession.

Secondly, the elevation of the post of Senior dresser to the level of a CEO within the nursing profession will give more incentive to the profession as a whole. And incentive is something which is glaringly lacking in that profession. The importance of the nursing profession cannot be underestimated, and it will certainly be in best interest of the public at large that members of that profession are not frustrated of their legitimate aspirations. Nor should their merits go unrecognized.

Safeguarding our own interests

On the sidelines of the serious survey/sniffing affair, there have been many glib pontifications and loose speculations about the geopolitical designs of countries in the region. We need to have the intellectual rigour and independence to have an objective take on crying ground realities and geopolitical game plans. We should remember that war planes from the military base on Diego Garcia were used to bomb Afghanistan and Iraq.

The proxy war in Ukraine is having dire consequences on fuel and food prices across the world and causing tremendous hardships in Africa and developing countries in general. Unlike the Indian Sepoys and the Senegalese Tirailleurs who had to fight the wars of the colonial powers in World War I and World War II and in Algeria, we need as free citizens of independent countries not to align ourselves with any bloc or country but to above all fight for and safeguard our own interests in a world which is patently multipolar. Hungary is not applying EU sanctions on Russia because this would be extremely damaging to its economy.

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In an article which appeared in the website Devex last week, it is reported that Europe and Africa are increasingly split over the war in Ukraine and EU diplomats posted in Addis Ababa in a candid assessment have recognized that the EU is losing the battle for hearts and minds in Africa over the conflict. The head of the European Union delegation to the African Union and other European diplomats based in Addis Ababa have therefore argued in a confidential document for a more 'transactional" approach to foreign aid that would tie funding for African countries to their willingness to work "based on common values and a joint vision.' Past colonial shenanigans and arm twisting ploys die hard.

New leadership

The current political upheaval requires clarity about what we want as a nation for the future. The status quo is untenable. The key question is: Is a nondescript hotchpotch coalition of ideologically diverse political parties a credible alternative for the future in the face of the array of daunting challenges faced by the country in terms of fixing the economy, overhauling the economic model, implementing long overdue reforms, re-establishing good governance, transparency and accountability, meritocracy, bridging inequality, promoting work ethics and assuring the independence of institutions and regulatory bodies, etc.? In view of their past record, who and which party can have a meaningful role to play in a new dawn for the country?

At a time when the British Conservative Party is having an exemplary leadership race from a refreshingly diverse initial field of 10 candidates, is it not high time for the major parties aspiring to play a national role to open up to the wide pool of highly qualified and bright young Mauritians having the expertise and competence to tackle today's multiple and diverse challenges and organize a leadership race to respond to the clamour of the people for a new beginning for the common good? The country and the people would not have it any other way.

Though Mauritius is not a party to the UN 1954 Convention, nonetheless the authorities would be under an obligation to provide all necessary assistance to a stateless person in view of the fact that Mauritius has ratified other international conventions on human rights. There is also the Declaration on the Human Rights of Individuals who are not nationals of the country in which they live and adopted by the UN General Assembly in 1985 that requires States to respect the human rights of such persons.

* There appears to be generally no disagreement on the need to check any abuse that

was possible under the previous Immigration Act for the purpose of contracting 'marriages of convenience'. Do the amendments meet the need of the hour or is there potential for executive abuse therein?

This is correct. There are individuals that seek to obtain the citizenship of this country by contracting a marriage of convenience. That particular amendment is salutary and necessary. It is also universally well known that the so-called brides and bridegrooms contract such marriages for monetary gains. Contraction of marriages of convenience has become a flourishing business.

* How do these proposed amendments stand with regard to legislation or jurisprudence in the UK or the EU generally or with respect to any international covenants we may have subscribed to?

The European Courts abhor the idea of absolute discretion. Our courts have

> endorsed the European jurisprudence in this field. If ever a citizen who has been deprived of his citizenship, the courts will no doubt follow the European case law on the matter.

> * If families are broken up through these powers, what possible recourse do the Mauritian partner and children have? Do they face the dilemma of having to follow their spouse overseas in a form of consequential expulsion if they wish to maintain their family unit?

> Family life includes the right to have and maintain family relationships. It covers your right not to be separated from your family and to maintain contact if your family is split up. To decide if a relationship is covered by family life, what matters is the closeness of the relationship rather than the legal status. This right, which also covers the protection of the privacy to life, is protected by the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights to which Mauritius is a party.

3 reasons why women leaders actually matter for women

Aquino had invited Macapagal-Arroyo to join her government as Assistant Secretary of the Department of Trade and Industry.

Cabinet members directly influence what bills are introduced into the national legislature. Yet women have traditionally held fewer ministerial posts. Those held were often positions with discernible "feminine" characteristics or "low-prestige" portfolios, such as ageing, children and the family.

Of the four women I studied, like female leaders in Latin America, three appointed more women to their cabinets than the male leaders who preceded them. President Megawati, whose female appointees matched her predecessor, was the exception.

Aquino was known for appointing empowered political women to her administration such as Dr Lourdes Reynes Quisumbing, the country's first female Secretary of Education and Miriam Defensor-Santiago, appointed head of the Bureau of Immigration and Deportation. Defensor-Santiago later ran for president (unsuccessfully) and was the first Southeast Asian elected to the International Criminal Court.

Among Kumaratunga's seven female appointees, one was responsible for housing, construction and development, a significant portfolio in Sri Lanka.

Arrovo appointed a remarkable 12 women cabinet members (compared to two under her predecessor). Such female appointees potentially (although not necessarily) open the door to better representation of women's interests.

2. Legislating for women

Few women leaders in history have been acknowledged as advocates for women. Yet in certain fields, laws may be enacted at a faster pace when women's aroups mobilise more resources to exploit a window of opportunity.

Indonesia's Elimination Violence of in the Household Act, signed into law by President Megawati in 2004, took seven years to enact. As a point of contrast, Indonesia's Marriage Law (Law No. 1/1974), which regulated polygamy and forced marriage and better protected women's assets, was debated for 75 years before passing.

In Sri Lanka, CBK managed the Asian tsunami at the tail-end of her tenure. In the post-tsunami recovery, she focused on widows, livelihood assistance for women and the appoint-

ment of women in disaster management committees at all levels.

President Macapagal-Arroyo was a senator when she authored a bill to combat violence against women. It was eventually re-tabled and expanded into the Philippines' Anti-Violence against Women and their Children Act, which she signed into law in 2004. Yet Macapagal-Arroyo's role in the law's enactment is often brushed over by women's groups.

3. The significance of 'Madam' President

The role model effect is hard to prove but everywhere I turned, informants noted the significance of having a woman lead. As the first female presidents of their nations, Aquino, Kumaratunga and Megawati shifted norms around politics, which had been seen as a place exclusively for men and inappropriate for women.

The utterance of "She" or "Madam" means far more than a simple shift in gender pronoun. Sri Lanka's "motherdaughter duo" as president and prime minister was a stark contrast to Sri Lanka today. Male leader, President Rajapaksa, recently fled the country after severe economic mismanagement, only to be replaced by another man, the former prime minister (Ranil Wickramasinghe) hardly a new beginning.

While comparisons have their limitations, the 11 years of leadership under CBK were a period of relative stability for a nation that has been plagued by increasingly repressive (male) leaders in recent years.

But the role mode effect of a female leader can only last so long. For women leaders to be part of a nation's future and not just its history, parties need to invest in enabling women currently engaged in politics to rise and successfully contest for the top job.

Not just a question of gender

There is something distinct about women's leadership. Yet, in the

words of one of Sri Lanka's leading female Muslim activists, "the choice of leaders, their capacity and their leadership, depends on many gualities which are more human than women or men".

t is important to acknowl-Ledge that there were setbacks for Filipino women's reproductive health under Presidents Aquino and Macapagal Arroyo, such as the latter promoting nonscientific natural family planning.

In Indonesia meanwhile, a gender equality quota whereby 30% of a party's

candidates must be women - was described as the most important law introduced during President Megawati's tenure. However, she was its primary opponent and only signed the bill into law when she feared the loss of the "women's vote" in 2004. (An election which she did, in fact, lose.)

It remains to be seen what the current crop of female leaders will mean for millions of women

Finland's Sanna Marin, who leads a five-party coalition all headed by women,

Why uncertainty makes us change our behaviour -- even when we shouldn't

People around the world dramatically changed their shopping behaviours at the start of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Faced with new uncertainty, shoppers began stocking up on basic household items -- especially toilet paper -to account for the new unknown. This buying frenzy led to shortages, even though, in most cases, there would have been enough to go around if people only purchased what they needed.

According to a study led by UNSW Sydney, reactive behaviour like this isn't unusual, but a common way to handle unexpected uncertainty.

In fact, unexpected uncertainty is such a powerful motivator for change that it often prompts us to adjust our behaviour -- even when it's not good for us.

"When people experience an unexpected change in their environment, they start looking for ways to lessen that uncertainty," says lead author of the study Dr Adrian Walker, who completed this research as part of his PhD in psychology at UNSW Science. "They can change their behaviour and decision-making strategies to try and find



a way to regain some sense of control.

"Surprisingly, our study found that unexpected uncertainty caused people to change their behaviours even when they would have been better off sticking to an old strategy."

The behavioural study, published in 'The Journal of Experimental Psychology: Learning, Memory, and Cognition', is the first to show the type of uncertainty we experience -- that is, whether it is expected or unexpected -- plays a key role in our reaction.

Dr Walker says the pandemic -- and our different responses to it -- is a large-scale example of unexpected uncertainty.

"Everything changed very suddenly at the start of Covid-19," he says.

"Many of us were suddenly all working from home, changing how we shop, and changing how we socialise. The rules we were living by beforehand no longer applied, and there was -- and still is -- no clear answer about when or how the pandemic will end.

"Different people tried all sorts of things -- like panic shopping -- to reduce this new uncertainty and return to 'normal'. But as we've seen, not all of these reactive strategies were good in the long run."

Too much time on a computer, watching TV or other sedentary activities raises stroke risk

Adults younger than age 60 whose days are filled with sedentary leisure time (which includes using the computer, TV, or reading) and little physical activity have a higher stroke risk than people who are more physically active, according to new research published today in Stroke, a journal of the American Stroke Association, a division of the American Heart Association.

According to American Heart Association statistics, U.S. adults spend an average of 10.5 hours a day connected to media such as smartphones, computers or television watching, and adults ages 50 to 64 spend the most time of any age group connected to media. Data also indicate that stroke-related deaths decreased in 2010 among adults 65 years and older. However, death from stroke appears to be on the rise among younger adults, ages 35 to 64 years -- increasing from 14.7 in

every 100,000 adults in 2010 to 15.4 per 100,000 in 2016. Previous research suggests the more time adults spend sedentary, the greater their risk of cardiovascular disease including stroke, and nearly 9 in 10 strokes could be attributed to modifiable risk factors such as sedentary behaviors.

"Sedentary time is increasing in the United States and Canada," said study author Raed A. Joundi, M.D., D.Phil., a stroke fellow in the department of clinical neurosciences at the Cumming School of Medicine at the University of Calgary in Canada. "Sedentary time is the duration of awake activities that are done sitting or lying down. Leisure sedentary time is specific to the sedentary activities done while not at work. It is important to understand whether high amounts of sedentary time can lead to stroke in young individuals, as a stroke can cause



premature death or significantly impair function and quality of life."

What do plants do all day? Though you might not think so to look at them, plants have a busy day.

It is easy to think that the daily life of a plant is a simple one. They seem to just stand there and sunbathe. However, plants are very busy all the time doing many things. This activity is aimed at surviving the day and planning for the future.

Plants need food to survive. Being rooted in the ground means that they can't move around to find food, so they must make their own.

They do this by taking water from the soil in through their roots and a molecule in the air, carbon dioxide, into their leaves. They then use the energy from sunlight which they absorb into their leaves to combine the water and carbon dioxide to make complex sugar molecules – food.

This process, called photosynthesis, is one of the most amazing chemical reactions on the planet.

The plant then does one of two things with these sugar molecules. It can use them in respiration. This is a process that releases the energy of the sugar molecules to allow the plant to do its daily activities. It can also convert the sugar molecules into other more complex chemicals to build other plant parts, such as new leaves or flowers.

However, the chemicals that are used to make up plant parts need more than just the input of sunlight, water and carbon dioxide. They also need additional chemicals that they take from the soil. It is the same as humans needing a healthy diet.

So, the plant spends all day mining the soil for useful chemicals such as nitrates, phosphates and various metals. These must then be moved to the part of the plant where they are needed.

Measuring light

Every day, plants must measure the amount of daylight they are getting. In particular, they need to know whether the hours of daylight are getting less or more from one day to the next. Measuring this change allows the plant to recognise what time of year it is. If daylight is increasing, then it knows that it is spring and time to start producing flowers.



If daylight is getting less then the plant knows that winter is coming. It can put food into storage ready for next spring's growth. For example, daffodils produce bulbs, and the potato plant makes tubers – which are the potatoes that we eat.

It can also get rid of things it will not need in the winter. Oak trees do not use leaves to make food during the winter, as there isn't enough light. So, the leaves fall off its branches and grow again in spring.

While a plant is always keeping track of how much of the 24-hour period is daylight, a term scientists call light quantity, it also monitors any changes in light quality.

This is the type of light falling on the plant. It might be full sunlight, or it might be light that is filtered through the leaves of other plants. If the plant is not getting the right light quality, it means it is being shaded by other plants. It must either start growing taller to find the full sun again, or produce larger leaves to gather in more light.

Staying healthy

The plant also monitors its own health. If a plant is being eaten by insects, it can produce a set of chemicals to make its leaves less tasty.

We also know that plants that have detected they are being eaten can release chemicals into the air to warn its neighbours, and let them know that they should start making their leaves less tasty.

The same applies if fungal disease strikes the plant. The plant produces chemicals to attack the fungus and seals off parts of the plant that are damaged too much to be repaired.

So, every day, plants are making food, extracting minerals so they can grow, working out what season it is and whether they are getting enough light, and protecting themselves from animals that want to eat them – as well as warning their neighbours. It makes for a busy day, although one that is largely invisible to humans.



<u>Fitness & Exercise</u> **Top Tips for Fitness Newbies**

You're trying to get in shape after years of sedentary living. Maybe you're not going to be a superstar athlete. But you can still set a big fitness goal for yourself, even if you've never tried a sport before. Get expert advice from WebMD on how to start a fitness routine you can stick to safely.

Start with small goals

You might have a big goal you want to reach one day, like a marathon. The best way to get there is to set a series of smaller goals that lead to your big goal. For example, before you sign up for a marathon, set goals to do a few 5K races first. And before that, work up to running a mile. Fitness apps can help you keep track of each great thing you do on your way to your big goal.

Mix things up

You may get bored doing the same workout every day. And after you do the same activity all the time for 6 to 8 weeks, your muscles adapt to it. You burn fewer calories and build less muscle. Try interval training: Step up your pace for a minute, then slow down, and repeat. Try strength training and cardio activities like swimming, indoor cycling, and kickboxing.

Get your doctor's OK

If you're not active now, talk to your doctor before you start exercising if you're over 45 (men) or 55 (women). It's also a good idea to get a doctor's OK if you have a health problem or take regular medication. To avoid injuries and burnout, start working out slowly: 3 days a week for 10-



15 minutes. Then gradually add time and intensity. **Eat and drink for fuel**

Exercise burns extra calories and raises your metabolism. So, eat every couple of hours -- three meals plus healthy snacks. Before a workout, snack on carbs (juice, fruit, or yogurt) for fast energy. After a long, tough workout, replenish with a carb/protein mix, like a peanut butter sandwich or a smoothie. Otherwise, keep your meals and snacks light: Try an apple and peanut butter, yogurt and nuts, or an egg on whole wheat toast.

Drink enough water

Unless your workout is really long or tough, you don't need a special sports drink with electrolytes. Water works just fine. Drink plenty: If you're dehydrated, your muscles may cramp, and you raise your risk of heat exhaustion and heatstroke. Two hours before you exercise, drink about 2 to 3 cups of water. During your routine, drink about 1 cup every 10-20 minutes. Keep drinking after you're done exercising, too.

Do strength training

Even if your goal -- a marathon, for example -- might center on cardio, you should practice strength or resistance training, too. Strong muscles burn more calories, help prevent injuries, and build stronger bones. Work muscles on weight machines, with hand-held equipment like free weights, kettlebells, or resistance bands, or by doing exercises like pushups. Rest each muscle group, such as biceps and triceps, at least 2 days between strength workouts.

Dress for comfort

You need the right clothes and shoes when you work out. It's not about looking good (although that can't hurt) -- it's about

Countries across the world had hardly started to pick up the pieces and recover from the Covid-19 devastating effects on their economies when the insane shenanigans of USled NATO, backed by spineless EU leadership, pushed Russia into a merci-

If their citizens are not fully brainwashed by Western media to believe in the democracy versus dictatorship rhetoric, they can only pin the blame for all the hardships on the foolish and reckless stance taken by their leaders. How will inflation and recession in two robust economies like China and the US impact the world in a near future and how long the price of gas, oil and cereals will depend on the Russian President Putin's moves are two swords of Damocles hanging on all of us.

Where do small countries like Mauritius stand? As regards its role in geo-strategic alliances amid tensions between shifting international blocs heading dangerously towards military clashes, it seems that media spokespersons and social activists are deluding the public into believing in the demand for total sovereignty and transparency. No major democracies can boast of these simply because international diplomacy requires a degree of secrecy to keep rival countries in check, and deems it convenient not to divulge everything to the public. In particular, this is so when part of the public is driven by selective hostility towards a major country with which a small island like Mauritius has strong ties of shared values of free societies and peaceful settlement of geo-political tensions.

Right now, what can dedicated patriots, social activists and media outlets do to enhance public awareness on relevant issues? Demonstrating in front of the European Parliament at Strasbourg as an outspoken social activist in Mauritius intends to do can be productive if his grievances are directed against the foolishness and irresponsibility of the EU and NATO in the ongoing crisis that all other countries are paying a heavy price for. But this kind of protest requires a backbone and guts. It is much easier to harangue and arouse low instincts of ignorant social media warriors and constantly create an atmosphere of uprising on private media outlets.

What relevant issues can be tackled efficiently at the local level irrespective of the international energy and food crisis and international diplomacy? What we mean is freedom of speech does not mean yelling at the authorities on a permanent basis to keep a high level of adrenaline in the targeted audience for questionable goals.

There are more critical issues that require public awareness to address hardships engendered by public irresponsibility and ignorance. The main ones are food and health. What about education and our language policies that need urgent reviews if ever we have the ambition to avoid the debilitating vulgarity in Kreol that is splashed endlessly on social media? Swear words, cheap attacks by all and sundry, name calling by seasoned journalists are turning some media publications absolutely repulsive. Other sections of the population need to be more vocal and represented in a civilized manner in the media and gear their efforts towards participating and contributing positively to the general upliftment of the people.
