candals usually come to the surface following whistleblower tip-offs – which in the case of the St Louis Gate scandal led to the investigation by Burmeister & Wain Scandinavian Contractor (BWSC) into allegations of misconduct; or following government splits in the wake of which the public will be gratified with a volley of mutual insults and accusations by the two sides which have parted company. The St Louis Gate scandal might never have surfaced, had it not been for the African Development Bank's communiqué of 8 June 2020, wherein its Office of Integrity and Anti-Corruption concluded that BWSC had financially rewarded members of the Mauritian administration and others, for providing access to confidential tender-related information. The responsible Minister was made to step down even before ICAC could start its own enquiry. Potential scandals would otherwise be swept under the carpet, and the public kept in the dark. Ultimately it is the same public which has in the long term to pay the price for questionable decisions and corruptive practices in the public sector in connivance with private sector operators, local or international.

If we go by the long list of scandals that have hogged the headlines over the last few years, it would seem that we are well on our way to touch the bottom. Among others are the Dufry scandal, the Alvaro Sobrinho scandal, the Yerrigadoo/Bet 365 and Glen Agliotti affairs, later the purchase by Government of a private hospital which was revalued barely weeks after it had known an initial valuation which went on to swell up disproportionately the acquisition price for the government and taxpavers. There was also the earlier Bel Air Sugar Estate IRS affair which came to the forefront on a suspected case of bribe taking. All these are blatant examples of questionable practices usually resulting from departures from pre-established norms - such departures being shielded from public scrutiny or made possible thanks to the absence of public information on sensitive public matters and decision-taking.

It should have been the normal practice, in all such cases generally, for departures from pre-established norms to be duly documented in files in such a manner as to make them tamper-proof. This would allow for subsequent inquiries to gather sufficient corroborative evidence to successfully indict one or more persons for actions contrary to law. For long, it has been suspected that ministers or some top bosses in the public sector give verbal instructions so as not to record embarrassing facts. Where public servants act on such verbal instructions, they do so at their own risk and peril. The lessons leant from the many cases in the past should have made them alive to the dangers of acting outside an established order just to please so-and-so who are usually not available to give support when investigators or auditors close in on actions taken contrary to establishment rules.

It would appear that we also have some serious

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problems with the public procurement process. There are allegations of irregularities having been unearthed at the level of the Central Procurement Board with the discovery of fake bid securities repeatedly submitted in the past by some bidders in relation to the construction of schools and infrastructure works at the airport, etc. What is unknown to this day is what police inquiries would have established in these cases. There are also the pending cases before the ICAC. The outcome of many of its inquiries therein remain unknown to this day. As if the frailty of our public procurement processes was not bad enough, the pandemic and its associated emergency procurements particularly for in-sourcing ventilators, vaccines and various medical materials and pharmaceuticals have been rife with allegations of impropriety yet no inquiry has been completed yet.

Such aberrations as are evident in these cases have been going on most probably because of arbitrary discretion exerted by certain persons who are in a position to take or influence decisions. In most cases where questionable dealings are suspected, there is one common factor: the absence of transparency. This is a practice that successive governments have been bequeathing to each other for a long enough time without redressing the situation.

We have been promised a Freedom of Information Act by successive electoral alliances, which could have acted as an important deterrent against abuse. True, there may well be good reasons (e.g., commercial, national security or other) where disclosure may actually hamper the public sector, but surely there has been ample time to reflect and formulate a Bill that deters corrupt practices without endangering government workings on sensitive issues. Why then is it not materialising? In a reply to the PQ by the Honourable Second Member for Stanley and Rose Hill (Mr Nagalingum), on 23rd May, the PM repeated essentially his previous stance since 2021 in Parliament that "I did in fact bring out the far-reaching implications of such a piece of legislation, especially its negative impact on public service delivery and on our public finance, particularly at this juncture, and the apprehended unintended negative consequences of such a piece of legislation" adding further that "the provisions [of such an Act] would inevitably have huge impact not only on Government recurrent budget but also on public service delivery."

We fail to understand the argument of the PM about the prohibitive cost of an FOI Bill while public monies are currently being spent on a variety of less worthy projects and the Minister of Finance is painting at the same time a rosy picture of our economy. As a parallel thought, government makes use of public funds to commission reports, studies or fact-findings of clear public interest that are then kept away from the public sphere. That can only breed a culture of impunity and demoralise honest staff in all institutions. The time has perhaps come for all body politic to stop kicking the can down the road.

As a political scientist who has, among other topics, followed corruption and kleptocracy, this book ranks among the more informative.

De Ruyter (or his ghost writer) delivers a pacey, racy adventure thriller. Chapter after chapter reads like a horror story about Eskom, whose failure to generate enough electricity consistently for the past 15 years has hobbled the economy.

The book is also a sobering indication that parts of South Africa now fester with organised crime.

This book merits its place alongside 'How to Steal a City' and 'How to Steal a Country'. These two books chronicle how corruption undermined respectively a city and a country to the level where they became dysfunctional.

Brazen looting

Another take-away is the devastating indictment of De Ruyter's immediate predecessors as CEO, Matshela Koko and Brian Molefe. They appear as incompetent managers who ran into the ground what the Financial Times of London had praised as the world's best state-owned enterprise as recently as 2001. Both Koko and Molefe have been charged with corruption - at Eskom and the transport parastatal Transet, respectively.



Provisional Charges - DPP vs Police

This week, the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) in its courageous legal stand has reprimanded the Office of the Police in court about any abusive usage of the provisional charge (PC), in this case against lawyer Rama Valayden. «The DPP urges the police to close the enquiry at the earliest. The DPP strongly recommends the CP not to resort instantly to the lodging of PCs invariably in all cases» summed up Jacques Panglose, chief legal counsel for the lawyer as the case was dismissed in Court.

Lawyer Rama Valayden, as Opposition activist and former journalist Harish Chundunsingh, arrested and bailed out the week before (as we reported here), are both known for their forthright publicly aired views on radios and in various venues about the government's actions or inactions. The ability to criticise publicly is part and parcel of a functional democratic state that respects and guarantees freedom of expression and beliefs without unbecoming or slanderous terms. There are no reasons why that constitutional right should raise hackles on the necks of a few police grandees, and specifically those who take it upon themselves to arrest, charge, then enquire for unending months before sending any file directly to Court or to the DPP for advice. The image of a police force, in high-profile or politically exposed cases, that is either struggling to find its bearings or perceived to be acting at the beck and call of politicians in power, may even be construed as a downhill slide that should be hemmed in urgently. The police force has evidently an arsenal of considerable powers to maintain law and order but the greater those powers, the more caution needs to be exercised.


Need we recall that several laws including those on ICTA or the IBA are open to abuse without some common sense and legal aptitudes from police forces or that free criticism of Ministers or government actions can hardly be qualified as obstructing or perverting the course of justice in a democratic set-up. Regular allegations of «drug planting» have already soured people's faith in the even-handedness of some sections of the police force. The fact that many Opposition voices and activists, including lawyers, feel necessary to watch their cars and homes for unwanted intrusions by lurking agents is an unprecedented development. Needless to say how much the population and the country depend on a police force that is credible, independent and professional.

A flashback to a June 2016 exchange in Parliament, as reported in News on Sunday, sets the scene about how far we have progressed or regressed on the paths laid out by late Sir Anerood Jugnauth, a past PM and President of the Republic, but also a QC with legal upbringing that the MSM respects. To a PQ of Opposition MP Reza Utteem, SAJ avowed that since January 2015, under the new political regime, some 14,700 PCs had been brought about by Police of which only some 9,500 were taken to court under a firm charge. Having 5,200 PCs dropped or dismissed by courts, many for frivolous and vexatious reasons, was explained away by SAJ, who basically implied that the police have to use their discretion and judgement in weighing the nature of the case, the necessary investigations carried out and are satisfied of the evidence available justifying the reasonable grounds to act. He also announced that a new Police and Criminal Evidence Bill

(PACE) would be shortly on the table with appropriate safeguards including the prevention of police officers from arresting third parties without those necessary investigations, the time limits for concluding enquiries relating to PCs and that handcuffs not be used to humiliate suspects.

Soopramanien Kistnen's murder - Will the police act?

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Monseigneur Jean-Michaël Durhône, nouvel évêque de Port-Louis

Voyons-nous un processus d'émancipation se mettre en place à Maurice?

a nouvelle est tombée en fin de semaine dernière: Monseigneur Jean-Michaël Durhône est le nouvel évêque de Port-Louis et remplacera Monseigneur Piat.

Cette nomination est un évènement à bien des égards. Tout d'abord, c'est la première fois depuis que l'Église catholique est implantée à Maurice - soit depuis le début de la colonisation française - qu'un évêque ne sera pas issu de la communauté franco-mauricienne. Et ce n'est absolument pas anodin.

Les prises de position récentes de Monseigneur Piat à l'encontre du gouvernement parlaient ouvertement d'inégalités structurelles qu'il fallait résorber, et la nomination de Monseigneur Durhône doit se comprendre comme s'inscrivant directement dans cette ligne de pensée. En effet, Monseigneur Piat avait surpris plus d'un en prenant position ouvertement alors que les questions d'inégalités structurelles hantent aussi l'Église depuis des siècles. Après tout, ne faudrait-il pas mettre de l'ordre dans sa propre maison avant de critiquer les autres? entend-on les échos ici et là...

Est-ce que c'est maintenant chose faite? Le symbole est certes moderne et envoie un message fort, mais il faudra attendre de voir comment Monseigneur Durhône s'y prendra pour moderniser l'Église catholique à Maurice. Monseigneur Piat avait parfaitement raison lorsqu'il parlait d'inégalités structurelles, et toute personne qui s'intéresse un peu à l'histoire de l'esclavage sait parfaitement bien que le rôle de l'Église fut ambiguë.

D'un silence éloquent au début, cela a pris plusieurs décennies de traite esclavagiste afin que l'institution romaine commence à réagir, avant de se ranger du côté des abolitionnistes. Mais ce processus fut long et le rôle central de l'Église pour l'incorporation des esclaves dans la hiérarchie de la société plantocratique (à travers l'évangélisation requise par le Code Noir) fait partie intégrante de la constitution des rapports de pouvoir entre les dominants et les dominés à Maurice. Rapports de pouvoir qui perdurent toujours aujourd'hui par la division du capital et la division du travail à Maurice.

Ce constat se traduit de manière simple: jusqu'à la nomination de Monseigneur Durhône, l'évêque de Port-Louis n'était pas représentatif de la majorité des fidèles de l'Eglise catholique à Maurice. Cela constituait une anomalie profonde dans un pays obsédé par la représentativité, et le fameux "malaise créole" trouvait tout autant sa source dans ce défaut de représentation au sein de l'Église, que dans les inégalités socio-économiques présentes dans le pays.

Processus d'émancipation

Monseigneur Durhône se trouve donc en face d'une immense responsabilité : celle d'être le premier évêque de l'île Maurice indépendante qui ne soit pas issu de la classe des dominants mais de celle des dominés. Voyonsnous un processus d'émancipation enfin se mettre en place à Maurice? Seul le temps le dira, surtout que nous ne savons en réalité pas grand-chose de Monseigneur Durhône.

Contrairement à un certain nombre de prêtres extrêmement vocaux et revendiquant la théologie de la libération, Monseigneur Durhône est connu pour être un homme timide et discret. Et, contrairement à d'autres prêtres, Monseigneur Durhône n'a jamais pris position sur des questions sociales ou économiques à Maurice. Nous verrons donc bientôt ses positions et ses combats, au fur et à mesure que nous apprendrons à connaître l'homme.

À Monseigneur Durhône, toutes nos félicitations pour sa nomination et tous nos vœux de courage et de résilience pour l'immense tâche qui l'attend.

Le DPP recommande l'inculpation de Yogida Sawmynaden

lors que la deuxième *private prosecution* de Simla Kistnen avait été rayé le 27 mai 2021, le bureau du DPP n'est pas resté inactif dans l'affaire de l'emploi fictif. En effet, le DPP a recommandé depuis novembre 2022 la mise en inculpation de Yogida Sawmynaden dans cette affaire.

Cette demande d'inculpation pose un problème quant à une arrestation possible d'un membre de l'Assemblée nationale. Bien qu'il bénéficie actuellement de la présomption d'innocence, une arrestation changerait la donne pour le colistier de Pravind Jugnauth.

L'article 34 (h) de la Constitution indique, par exemple, qu'aucune personne ne pourrait être qualifié pour siéger au Parlement s'il se trouve dans une situation délictueuse par rapport aux lois lui permettant de siéger au Parlement. En d'autres termes, si Yogida Sawmynaden est jugé coupable dans l'affaire de l'emploi fictif, alors cela entraînerait sa disqualification en tant que membre du Parlement, appelant naturellement à une élection partielle dans la circonscription numéro 8.

Nous ne sommes pas encore dans ce cas de figure, mais cette affaire vient s'ajouter au cas de Suren Dayal contre le Premier ministre lui-même et qui pourrait voir une disqualification de ce dernier à l'issue de la décision du *Privy Council* attendue en juillet.

Que ferait alors le chef du gouvernement? Serait-il dans l'obligation d'une dissolution de l'Assemblée nationale, avec des élections générales anticipées? Ou bien sortira-t-il un autre lapin de son chapeau? Avec le renvoi des élections municipales, il semble clair que Pravind Jugnauth se prépare à toute éventualité. Il sait que le terrain est actuellement glissant pour lui, avec les affaires qui s'empilent. Il navigue ainsi en eaux troubles, et - de mémoire - il n'y a pas de précédents réels à la situation politique actuelle.

En effet, un échec du MSM aux élections municipales pourrait sonner le glas du gouvernement s'il devait tout de suite se lancer dans une bataille électorale nationale. Mais ne pas organiser les élections municipales, cela envoie également le message que le gouvernement prépare les élections générales anticipées, si la séquence qui le mènera au mois de juillet devait être négatif pour lui.

Le gouvernement semble donc jouer son va-tout sur les prochains mois, qui s'annoncent compliqués, et la fenêtre de tir n'a jamais été aussi opportune pour l'opposition. Mais est-ce que cette dernière est prête à relever le défi d'une séquence qui pourrait se dérouler à vitesse grand V, ou bien resteront-ils dans les *starting blocks* quand les courses seront lâchées?

Ce qui est sûr, c'est que l'alliance des partis de l'opposition tant attendue continue à se faire attendre, ce qui permet au Premier ministre de naviguer comme bon lui semble et sans aucune pression politique réelle.

Élections présidentielles en Turquie: Sacrée gymnastique politique d'Erdogan

Recep Tayyip Erdogan brigue actuellement un troisième mandat à la présidence de la République de Turquie. C'est la première fois qu'il n'a pas été élu au premier tour de l'élection présidentielle, devant batailler pour un deuxième tour, depuis 2014. Mais le président sortant reste en position de force même s'il n'a pas passé la barre des 50% au premier tour de l'élection présidentielle.

Cela constituait déjà un évènement dans la sphère politique turque, démontrant une érosion du pouvoir d'Erdogan. Mais les choses ne sont pas aussi simples que cela. Déjà, le parti du président sortant a été reconduit avec une majorité confortable au parlement turc, ce qui laisse à penser que les Turcs ne prendront pas le risque d'une cohabitation entre gouvernement et présidence. De plus, le candidat d'extrême-droite Sinan Ogan a appelé à un report de ses voix en soutien à Erdogan.

Tour laisse donc penser que le président sortant sera reconduit pour un troisième mandat ce dimanche, ce qui relève d'une sacrée gymnastique politique.

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Le pays se relève à peine d'une série meurtrière de tremblements de terre qui ont exposé les limites de la gestion publique en matière de catastrophes naturelles. Et le régime d'Erdogan est perçu comme étant gangrené par la corruption et le népotisme clanique.

Et pourtant, sauf accident, Erdogan se dirige relativement facilement vers un troisième mandat. Comment expliquer ce phénomène, notamment dans un pays connu pour sa tradition politique laïque et démocratique?

En fait, l'exemple d'Erdogan démontre un certain changement de culture politique où les enjeux chers au peuple ne sont pas ceux que les partis de l'opposition brandissent comme des armes contre le pouvoir.

Recep Tayyip Erdogan porte une vision de son pays et tient une rhétorique qui touche les masses et les classes populaires, quelle que soit la situation économique ou sociale. Il a réussi à capter l'imaginaire d'une partie importante de la population quant aux projets actuels du pays et quant au positionnement idéologique et identitaire de la Turquie dans le monde. De ce point de vue, il s'inscrit directement dans la lignée des gouvernants comme Modi ou Netanyahou qui utilisent des outils similaires: un nationalisme jouant sur la frontière entre la démocratie et l'illibéralisme.

Ce positionnement parle au peuple et répond à ses aspirations de puissance et de progrès, même si les faits de la gouvernance politique ne suivent pas forcément. Ainsi Erdogan a compris quelque chose que ses adversaires ont toujours du mal à saisir: ce n'est pas dans la rationalité que se trouvent les avenues de la prise du pouvoir, mais dans l'émotion et l'affectivité de l'électorat.

Et Erdogan est passé maître dans ce domaine, ce qui explique qu'il sera sans doute réélu à la présidence de la République de la Turquie ce dimanche, et ce, malgré une opposition qui aura su se mobiliser et faire front.

Est-ce que cela vous fait penser aux prochaines élections à Maurice?

Dette chinoise et crise économique

e cas du Sri Lanka avait interpellé, il y a quelque temps de cela. Ce pays s'était endetté à des niveaux inouïs auprès de la Chine afin d'investir dans d'immenses projets d'infrastructures (port, autoroutes, facilités sportives grandioses, etc) sur son territoire. Tout avait très bien commencé et la coopération avec la Chine fut vantée comme une alternative enfin crédible face au FMI et aux pays occidentaux. Mais le pays connut un glissement économique qui le mena vers une crise économique et politique sans précédent depuis maintenant plus de deux ans.

Se retrouvant dans l'incapacité d'honorer son *loan servicing*, le gouvernement sri-lankais a dû abandonner la gestion de son port à la Chine et le pays se retrouva plongé dans la spirale infernale de devoir augmenter les taxes pour pouvoir honorer ses dettes. Cela avait produit un impact immédiat sur le niveau de vie de la population sri-lankaise, en faisant basculer les classes populaires dans une pauvreté immédiate.

Ce cas aurait pu sembler isolé, mais c'est loin d'être le cas. En effet, de plus en plus de pays ayant contracté des dettes auprès de la Chine se retrouvent dans une situation

extrêmement délicate, et notamment le Pakistan, le Kenya, la Zambie, le Laos, la Mongolie, la Serbie et le Monténégro. La Chine a commencé à rappeler certains de ses prêts auprès de ses pays, ce qui les force à réorienter leurs dépenses budgétaires vers leur *loan servicing*, ainsi que des coupes budgétaires sur leurs dépenses domestiques (dépenses énergétiques, sociales, alimentaires, etc).

C'est exactement comme cela que la spirale d'un effondrement économique rapide peut se mettre en place et mettre des populations entières à genou. Mais pourquoi un rappel des dettes maintenant?

Belt and Road Initiative

Il faut comprendre le contexte dans lequel la Chine prêtait de manière aussi généreuse, mais avec des conditions extrêmement dures. C'est la mise en place du projet des nouvelles routes de la soie (Belt and Road Initiative - BRI) qui poussa le gouvernement chinois à pratiquer une politique de coopération internationale importante.

Il était essentiel pour la Chine d'élargir sa sphère d'influence diplomatique afin de négocier l'implémentation de mégaprojets permettant l'acheminement du "Made in China" sur une partie de plus en plus importante du globe. Autoroutes, aménagements portuaires, chemins de fer... Tout était pensé pour permettre une accélération de la circulation des biens et des personnes. Mais l'accélération des biens et des personnes n'est possible que dans le cadre d'une accélération des capitaux eux-mêmes. Il s'agit là du fondement même du principe de la mise en place des outils de la mondialisation.

Car c'est bien cela qui est en jeu pour la Chine: construire une alternative à la mondialisation occidentale. Une nouvelle voie au monde unipolaire de l'après-guerre froide en quelque sorte. Pour cela, la diplomatie chinoise a su profiter de la montée d'un sentiment anti-occidental de plus en plus palpable, notamment sur le continent africain, dans le Golfe arabe, dans les Balkans et l'Asie Mineure et dans certaines régions d'Amérique latine. Certains de ces pays, comme le Sri Lanka, se sont même jetés à corps perdu dans le projet chinois, en y voyant un moyen d'accélérer leur développement.

Sauf que les choses, qui pouvaient sembler idylliques au début, ne l'étaient absolument pas. Et au fur et à mesure de l'avancée des projets du BRI, les problèmes ont commencé à surgir. Retard de chantier, projets mal aboutis (voire même à l'arrêt), corruption importante des élites politiques, postures extrêmement dures de la Chine dans les contrats... Il serait possible de comparer cela à un piège qui commencerait à se refermer sur certains des pays qui avaient contracté le plus de dettes. Et il est maintenant temps de passer à la caisse, sans que les projets du BRI soient viables, économiquement.

Est-ce que cela signifie que le BRI tant vanté par la Chine est un immense éléphant blanc qui ne fonctionnera jamais de la manière qui était promis? Il est difficile de le dire à ce stade, mais il est certain que nous sommes loin de cette nouvelle mondialisation heureuse que voulait nous vendre Xi Jiping.

Quant à Maurice, avec le recul des années, il est clair que ne pas être signataire du BRI était une décision sage et courageuse. Imaginons nous un moment dans la même situation du Sri Lanka...Voilà un fait qu'il faut signaler dans un pays où on a parfois l'impression que toutes les décisions nationales relèvent de la catastrophe.

keeps turning, that is, no one can escape from the universal law of cause and effect. Every action as a cause has a consequence or effect, which in turn can itself act as a cause. Some

consequences, as we know by experience, can be immediate, others can manifest later. Either way, good or bad, results of actions undertaken are inevitable.

It would be recalled that in the 1970s the President of Uganda, Idi Amin, brutally drove the hardworking Ugandans of Indian origin out of the country. They were given little time to wind up their enterprises, properties and belongings and prepare themselves to leave. There was looting and killing, and they were forced to run away in a hurry clutching preciously whatever little they could carry

admitted that they have wronged Fijians, particularly the Indo-Fijian community', who left Fiji to seek a better living elsewhere - Australia, New Zealand, the US where I have had the opportunity to meet some of them and appreciate commonalities in language, food, and other customs.

Unique welcome to PM Modi in Papua New Guinea

But PM Rabuka did not stop there. As if to make fur-ther amend, on Monday last he conferred Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi with the highest civil honours of Fiji, during the latter's visit to attend the third India-Pacific Islands Co-operation Summit - FIPIC, held in Papua New Guinea (PNG). This caught my attention for an issue of medical interest in PNG (see below). On the same occasion, PM Modi was also conferred the highest honours of PNG (the Logohu) by its Governor-General.

> According to Indian press reports, Modi is the first Indian PM to visit the country. The welcome he was given at the airport by the Prime Minister James Marape has gone viral, because it was unique for two reasons. Papua New Guinea generally doesn't give a ceremonial welcome to any leader coming after sunset, but an exception was made for Modi. Secondly, Marape bent down to touch the feet of Modi, as is the Indian custom to show respect to an elder or a guru.

> > Speaking at the Forum for India-Pacific Islands Cooperation (FIPIC) summit in Port Moresby, PNG, Modi told the leaders of 14 Pacific Island nations that India would be a 'reliable' development partner, pointing out that 'Those we considered trustworthy, it turned out they were not standing by our side in times of need. During these challenging times, an old saying has proven true: "A

Friend in need is a friend indeed". I am glad that India stood with its Pacific Island friends during this challenging time [the Covid pandemic]. Whether it was vaccines or essential medicines, wheat or sugar; India, in line with its capabilities, has been assisting all partner countries.'

The FIPIC summit was launched during Modi's visit to Fiji in 2014. In 2015, the second FIPIC summit was held in Jaipur. This is the third summit. India is trying to boost ties and cooperation with the Pacific Island nations, which include, apart from Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands, Cook Islands, Fiji, Kiribati, the Republic of Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Niue, Palau, Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, and Vanuatu. To this end India has outlined a 12-step action programme that will be implemented in the region in, amongst others, the fields of education, IT and cybersecurity, healthcare that will include building a 100-bed super-specialty hospital in Fiji and sea ambulances. These will complement the other ongoing development assistance projects that are ongoing. There are about 3000 Indians who are present in PNG and they turned out in massive numbers to greet Modi at the airport.

ne of my favourite quotations is a line from a text I used in medical school, Harrison's Principles of Internal Medicine: 'To the doctor, as to the anthropologist, nothing human is unusual.'

I remembered it when in the final year Dr J.D. Spillane from London who was an expert in Tropical Neurology, gave a lecture at my medical college in Calcutta in 1970 on kuru disease, which he was researching. In fact, he was on his way back to the UK from Papua New Guinea, where the disease was first described among the Fore people and had been proven to be the consequence of their practice of funerary cannibalism. Children and women in particular were fed the cooked brain of dead relatives which contained the infective particles or prions. Children who became infected developed encephalopathy, leading to weakness, tremors, and impairment of walking. Often the disease was fatal. The physician who was teaching us neurology, Dr Chaudhary, had apparently trained under Dr Spillane, whom he introduced.

This discovery by Dr Spillane's team was an example of successful field epidemiology. Health education and promotion led to the elimination of the practice and the eradication of the disease.

Leading by example

From President-philosopher Radhakrishnan to Prime Ministers Indira Gandhi, Manmohan Singh, Atal Bihari Vajpayee and now Modi, Indian leaders have walked tall on the world stage gaining much respect and being listened to. It is widely accepted that Modi has taken this dimension of Indian leadership to a higher level, witness the almost reverential manner in which he has been received as a quest at the recently concluded G7 meeting in Hiroshima Japan, and then in Sydney where he began a visit to Australia.

The Bhagavad Gita teaches that people tend to imitate what their leaders do, and hence the supreme responsibility of the latter to be exemplary in their behaviour when fulfilling their role in their country. Wherever they have settled in the world, Indians have been perceived as being accommodative and living in peace and harmony, contributing through their hard work to the national weal, emulating the best that their thinkers and leaders have bequeathed.

Unfortunately, in our country for some time now we are having to suffer the darker aspects of some of our leaders, who instead of being examplars have preferred a lifestyle based on the instincts, giving primacy to lust, arrogance, ostentatious living, with scant concern if any for what awaits the upcoming and future generations. In other words, instead of 'high thinking and simple living' as the adage goes, it's corrupted thinking and lowly living which, alas, tends to be aped by those who have a similar mindset.

This is in contradiction to their citations from the scriptures during haranguing at cultural functions where this shouldn't have any place. As at date, there is no indication of any attempt to change for the better before it is too late. Such a great disservice, and a shame, to the community, the people, and the country!

The majority fled to England, and in due course with the same zeal for hard work, savings, education, and driven by hope and optimism, they were able to replicate what they were best at in Uganda: wealth creation for their newly adopted country.

China ends the rules-based order without firing a shot

Beijing's signal is that America no longer dictates what is acceptable and what is not

n May 24, 2023, the Rules-Based Order, at least as defined by America and its western allies, if it ever existed, suffered a mortal blow. Russia's Prime Minister chirped that the bilateral ties between his country and China are at an unprecedented high level, as the two countries signed a set of agreements on trade and cooperation.

China rejects Western criticism of its ongoing embrace of Putin and Russia, insisting the relationship does not violate international norms. The declared position is that China has the right to collaborate with whichever country it chooses, and their cooperation is not targeted at any third countries.

The not-so-subtle message is that China rejects the West's characterization of Russia as a pariah state out of step with the values that all nations must recognize and respect. China has not distanced itself from Putin's invasion and has pointedly rejected the idea that sanctions are warranted or will be respected by China. The only exception is that China does not wish to see secondary sanctions imposed on its companies.

China's embrace of Russia is not new. In February 2022, just three weeks before Russia's invasion of Ukraine, with Russian troops amassed on Ukraine's borders, President Xi Jinping hosted President Putin at the opening of the Olympic Games in Beijing. Even as President Biden was saying that US intelligence assessed that an invasion was imminent, Presidents Xi and Putin released a declaration that their bilateral partnership is greater than a traditional alliance and that their friendship would know no limits.

It is ironic that just a week ago, China was promoting itself as a neutral peacemaker between Russia and Ukraine. This latest bilateral signing with Russia puts the lie to any claim of neutrality. But, of course, no one should have been fooled by such claims. China presented no peace plan of any substance, and its approach would essentially validate Russia's invasion and territorial gains.

China's lean toward Russia has been transparent

In March this year, President Xi visited Russia and referred to Putin as a "dear friend." Meanwhile, since the invasion of Ukraine, China has increased its imports of Russian oil and trade with Russia is at \$70 billion, up 40%.

China's assertion that its cooperation with Russia is not targeted at any third countries is, of course, nonsense. China's actions are clearly targeted at the US

and are part of a broader and ongoing Chinese effort to dilute and diminish America's geopolitical influence, standing, and even relevance.

Russian Prime Minister Mishustin got no blowback when he declared that the relationship between Beijing and Moscow is "characterized by mutual respect of each other's interests, the desire to jointly respond to challenges, which is associated with increased turbulence in the international arena and the pressure of illegitimate sanctions from the collective West."

The Chinese representatives did not object to that characterization. China has, of course,

ignored western sanctions in continuing to import Russian oil as has India. And to be fair, NATO countries as well as the US also continued to import Russian oil after sanctions were first imposed. President Xi emphasized that China and Russia should find ways to "upgrade the level of economic, trade and investment cooperation." Locking up Russian energy supplies is one obvious strategic maneuver for China.

President Xi's approach emphasized that the strategy behind President Nixon's opening to China is a failure. Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger who was Nixon's point person in the approach to China described the advantage of the rapprochement to China thus: "Well, it set up a triangular relationship between Russia, the United States and China, in which we attempted to be closer to each of them than they were to each other." So much for that.

There is something more important at stake here. The accord with Russia is another notch in President Xi's belt as he seeks to diminish America's relevance on the world stage. In March, China was indeed a peacemaker as it brokered a truce between Iran and Saudi Arabia, bringing an end to decades of hostilities between the two Middle East countries.

The deal is significant in two respects. First, it was done without the involvement or blessing of the US, long the power broker in that region. Second, it puts Beijing's stamp of legitimacy on both Iran and Saudi Arabia. Iran is on the threshold of having nuclear weapons. Both countries have come under fire for human rights abuses. Beijing's signal is that America no longer dictates what is acceptable and what is not.

A positive side benefit of the rapprochement between Iran and Saudi Arabia has been the effort to bring the proxy war between those two countries to an end.

President Xi's broader goal is to recast the so-called rules-based order that he sees as unfairly advantaging the West. One might recall the meeting in Anchorage between Secretary of State Blinken and his Chinese counterpart when the Biden administration first came to office. China insisted that it has its own form of democracy. China's embrace of Russia and its approach to

Saudi Arabia and Iran emphasize the rejection of America's right, along with its allies, to define what it means to be a democracy and their right to demand respect for human rights. It is also a rejection of the West's power to impose economic sanctions. Sub silentio, President Xi is holding himself out as the savior of smaller nations the world over. The message is that America is not the only player on the world stage.

What can we expect next? Perhaps an agreement to trade Saudi, Russian and Iranian oil in Yuan rather than US dollars? That would further upend America's influence in world markets. For those who don't think this could happen, consider that the Republican Speaker of the US House of Representatives is threatening to let the US default on its bond obligations rather than raise the debt ceiling. If the Republicans do allow such a default to occur, what reason would any country have for accepting payment in US dollars?

And perhaps President Xi will see this as an opportunity to pressure Taiwan to come into China's fold. A Chinese naval blockade of the island is not out of the question. China's declaration that it seeks a reunion with Taiwan through peaceful means perhaps indicates that it hopes to annex that island nation without firing a shot.

The dilemma for America and the West is this: how do you respond to the shot that has not been fired?

Bangladesh vows to hold free, fair elections after US threatens visa curbs

Bangladesh will take steps to tackle and prevent unlawful practices or interference in its elections, authorities said on Thursday, a day after the United States threatened curbs on citizens of the South Asian nation who undermine them, reports Reuters.

Concern flared after accusations of vote-rigging and

the targeting of the political opposition marred national elections in 2014 and 2018, charges denied by the government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken has said the United States is adopting a new policy to restrict visas for Bangladeshis who undermine the democratic election process at home.

"The government apparatus will take necessary measures to prevent and address any unlawful practices or interference ... to compromise the smooth and participatory conduct of the elections," the Bangladesh foreign ministry said in response.

Hasina, who has kept tight control of the South Asian nation since coming to power in 2009, has been accused of human rights violations, obliteration of press freedom, suppression of dissent and the jailing of critics, including many supporters of the main opposition Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP).

The BNP has been calling for Hasina to step down and for the next election, due in January 2024, to be held under a neutral caretaker government, a demand her government has rejected.

"This new visa policy proves once again that the international community is certain that a free and fair election is not possible under this government," said a senior BNP leader, Zaheeruddin Swapan.

Buckingham Palace rejects request to return Ethiopian prince's remains

Buckingham Palace has declined a request to repatriate the remains of Prince Alemayehu, an Ethiopian royal who was buried at Windsor Castle in the 19th century, reports allAfrica.com.

Prince Alemayehu was taken to England following the Battle of Maqdala in 1868 when British soldiers looted his father's imperial citadel.

According to the BBC, Queen Victoria took an interest in Alemayehu and arranged for him to study at

elite schools before he was sent to the military training academy at Sandhurst. He left after less than a year for the English city of Leeds, where he died of pneumonia, an inflammation of the lining surrounding the lungs, at age 18 in 1879. He was buried at St George's Chapel in Windsor Castle at the request of



Queen Victoria.

The Ethiopian government had previously asked the British royal family for his remains to be returned to his homeland, and his family told the BBC that they too had requested the repatriation.

However, Buckingham Palace has released a statement indicating

that the removal of the prince's remains could disturb the resting place of numerous others in the catacombs of St George's Chapel. The palace spokesperson emphasised the need to preserve the dignity of the departed while acknowledging the responsibility to honor Prince Alemayehu's memory. The statement also mentioned that the royal household had previously accommodated Ethiopian delegations' requests to visit the chapel.

Thousands of treasures, sculptures, and other artworks - many of them dating from the 16th to the 18th centuries - were looted by British colonists and remain in the British Museum. The return of artifacts that were looted in the colonial era has become an increasingly pressing issue for some Western nations.

UK website advertises military job for Africans, Middle East to join Ukraine War for Shs93 Million Salary

A UK job site dubbed Adzuna is advertising vacancies for Africans and citizens of Middle East States to join the military voluntary program that is aimed at assisting Ukraine in its war with Russia.

Adzuna is a job aggregate and search engine that operates in over 20 countries and is visited by at least 10 million visitors per month.

In one of their job postings, a European Union Citizenship Program needs permanent staff mostly from African and Middle East countries to join a "High Contract" payment program.

The advertising company for the job vacancies is located in Sands End, London, United Kingdom.

"We invite citizens from the Middle East and North Africa to participate in a voluntary program to assist Ukraine on a competitive basis," the job advert reads in part.

As part of the requirements, those who intend to apply should be military specialists with good health and psychological ability.

The qualified candidates will be deployed to participate in the Ukrainian Counteroffensive.

"Participants must understand all risks and sign a waiver of claims," the advert states.

The contract of the job will fetch at least Shs93 million (US 6000 dollars) in payment.

However, as part of the conditions, after the contract expires and compliance with requirements is verified, accelerated citizenship in the UK or EU is guaranteed.

The United Kingdom is the second largest donor of Ukraine having committed £4.6 billion in military assistance to Ukraine so far.

The UK is also hosting a training programme (Operation Interflex), which is supported by several allies, with the aim of training 30,000 new and existing Ukrainian personnel by the end of 2023.

Germany, which had long been heavily reliant on Russian energy imports, was left particularly exposed following the Russian invasion.

Germany slips into recession with negative first quarter

Germany fell into a recession around the turn of the year, official figures published Thursday showed, as Europe's largest economy contracted by 0.3 percent over the first three months of 2023.

The poor performance was the second consecutive quarter of negative growth, following a 0.5-percent contraction in the last three months of 2022, as Germany battled an energy crisis unleashed by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, reports AFP.

The dwindling of energy supplies from Russia following the outbreak of the war sent prices soaring,

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Saudi Arabia, Canada end 2018 human rights dispute; to restore ties

Caudi Arabia and Canada will restore full diplomatic Trelations, the kingdom said Wednesday, following a 2018 dispute over human rights that saw Riyadh expel Ottawa's ambassador and freeze new trade.

The decision, also announced by Canada's foreign ministry, came after talks last year between Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman and Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau on the sidelines of the summit of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Forum in Bangkok

In 2018, the Saudi government expelled Canada's ambassador and recalled its own envoy to Ottawa, while freezing all new trade over vigorous calls for the release of activists jailed in the kingdom.

The reconciliation was based on "the desire for both sides to restore diplomatic relations between the two



countries on the basis of mutual respect and common interests," Canada's foreign ministry said.

The latest announcement follows a frenetic stretch of high-stakes Saudi diplomacy triggered by the kingdom's surprise Chinese-brokered rapprochement deal with Iran announced in March.

Since then, Saudi Arabia has restored bilateral ties with Syria and ramped up a push for peace in Yemen, where it leads a military coalition against the Iran-backed Huthi rebels.

Saudi Arabia is also hosting representatives of Sudan's two warring generals, and, with the US, brokered a seven-day humanitarian ceasefire that took effect Monday

The 2018 row erupted in the wake of a Saudi crackdown on women's rights activists.

Canada at the time said it was "gravely concerned" over the new wave of arrests of rights campaigners, including award-winning women's rights activist Samar Badawi, and called on Riyadh to "immediately release them."

Even as Saudi Arabia instigates sweeping social and economic changes as part of its "Vision 2030" reform agenda, human rights remain a concern to critics.

In recent months, Saudi Arabia has been criticised for decades-long prison terms handed down to two women who tweeted and retweeted posts critical of the government.

In 2022, Saudi Arabia executed 147 people in total -more than double the 2021 figure of 69, according to an AFP tally.

One in four young men in UK agree with influencer Andrew Tate's views on women

/ouGov data seen by The Independent reveals that 26 Per cent of men in the UK aged between 18 and 29 who had heard of the misogynistic influencer agreed with his opinions on women.

Some 28 per cent of men between 30 and 39 who had heard of Mr Tate, a former kickboxing world champion turned "success coach", back his outlook on women.

Three in 10 men aged between 30 and 39 who were aware of him agreed with his views on masculinity and what being a man involves, while a quarter of men in the 18 to 29 age bracket backed Mr Tate on this.

Campaigners told The Independent the influencer is a "legitimising force" for misogynistic ideas and his luxurious lifestyle is "a dangerous mask" for "violent and misogynistic content" which is "drip-fed" to his audience.

Mr Tate, who has more than 6 million Twitter followers, was arrested in Romania in late December alongside his brother Tristan Tate and two other suspects. They are accused of human trafficking, rape and forming a criminal gang to sexually exploit women.

The influencer was released from jail with his younger brother at the beginning of April after they won an appeal



to be held under house arrest - with the influencer

seeing his house arrest extended for an additional 30 days last month. All four deny the allegations and none have been charged.

YouGov provided those surveyed with a list of some of his most controversial views about women:

- The influencer has suggested rape victims "bear some responsibility" for being assaulted
- He has referred to married women as "property" that their husbands own
- The influencer has said in a heterosexual relationship the woman should remain at home
- Tate has argued it is wrong for women to have lots of sexual partners but men are allowed to

Rosie Carter, director of policy at 'Hope not hate', told The Independent: "Tate is hinting at things that bring out people's worst instincts," she said. "Tate's content can open the door to young men encountering more extreme content. If the extreme misogyny appeals to them, it can become more extreme. They could potentially end up exploring far-right forums."

The Independent previously reported on research by the Centre for Countering Digital Hate (CCDH) which unearthed 47 videos of Mr Tate pushing what it describes as "extreme misogyny".

The report uncovered adverts on videos where Mr Tate discusses fighting women, saying "grip her up by the neck" in a video, which has been viewed 1.6 million times, as well as referring to putting his "imprint" on 18 to 19-year-old women in footage viewed 8.4 million times.



"Le peu d'empressement de Ramgoolam à conclure les négociations d'alliance est suspect"



'Un jugement défavorable du Privy Council à Pravind Jugnauth déstabilisera profondément le MSM et le gouvernement'

Mauritius Times: Le troisième renvoi des élections municipales pour deux ans, ce qui fait que les prochaines élections pourraient se tenir au plus tard en juin 2025, est une autre indication que le leader de l'alliance gouvernementale entend se donner le temps, sauf imprévu émanant du *Privy Council*, de compléter son mandat et de présenter un bilan solide (avec l'augmentation de la pension de vieillesse, projets infrastructurels, etc.) afin qu'il soit beaucoup mieux armé pour affronter les prochaines législatives. La tenue d'élections anticipées parait donc improbable dans ces circonstances?

Jean Claude de l'Estrac: Ce nouveau renvoi est surtout une nouvelle confirmation de la dérive autocratique du régime. Si cela était nécessaire, le *Privy Council*, qui est notre ultime Cour constitutionnelle, vient de rappeler dans un cas similaire (Trinidad-et-Tobago), la portée antidémocratique du renvoi des élections au-delà des termes fixés intéresse beaucoup de citoyens et d'observateurs politiques de longue date comme Jean Claude de l'Estrac. Il se penche sur la situation politique locale, notamment le troisième renvoi des élections

municipales, la popularité du gouvernement de Pravind Jugnauth, le charisme du leader du Parti Travailliste (PTr) sur un électorat plus jeune et plus généralement sur l'échiquier politique. C'est grave, mais ce n'est pas une première. Par ailleurs, l'électorat que cultive le MSM de Pravind Jugnauth est plutôt imperméable aux dénonciations des médias. Mais le rôle des médias n'est pas sans impact non plus. Il y a, à mon sens, deux explications à cette léthargie que vous constatez.

La première est due à la passivité, l'égoïsme, la veulerie d'une partie de l'électorat. Il est occupé à ses petites affaires, il s'accommode de la corruption à son niveau, et sauf pour une petite minorité, surtout des jeunes, il s'en contrefiche des valeurs, des vertus, de l'honneur.

Pour contrer cette descente aux enfers, il eut fallu des leaders, des hommes et des femmes politiques, capables de dire leur fait aux électeurs, capables d'éveiller les consciences, de leur montrer une autre voie, celle de l'effort, de la discipline, de l'ambition. Pour en mesurer l'ampleur, il faudra attendre de connaitre le libellé du jugement dans ce cas.

* A voir ses réactions vis-à-vis de la personne et ses révélations sur sa vie privée, ce qui semble inquiéter Pravind Jugnauth le plus, ce n'est pas les affaires qui entachent le gouvernement mais bien plus le leader du Parti Travailliste. Navin Ramgoolam jouit donc, à ses yeux, d'un important capital de sympathie et de soutien politique, et il faut l'abattre politiquement - à n'importe quel prix?

La séquence de ces «révélations» de Pravind Jugnauth pourrait être considérée comme une forme d'orgasme premier ministériel en direct. Il faudra que Ramgoolam dise merci à Jugnauth. A le harceler ainsi, en voulant à tout prix et en toutes circonstances le diaboliser, il a effectivement suscité un courant de sympathie à l'égard du leader du Parti Travailliste.

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Est-ce suffisant pour qu'il retrouve son électorat perdu? Toutefois, il ne semble pas qu'il soit disposé à officialiser cette alliance PTr-MMM-PMSD de sitôt. A quel jeu joue-t-il?

Je ne crois pas que la proposition de servir encore cinq ans au poste de Premier ministre à partir de 2024, comme offerte au septuagénaire Navin Ramgoolam, soit une idée électoralement très séduisante.

J'aurais estimé plus attractive la proposition d'un gouvernement de transition, Ramgoolam passant la main à un plus jeune leader, homme ou femme, au bout de deux ou trois ans.

Compte tenu des circonstances actuelles, Bérenger en position de numéro deux dans l'alliance et un Ramgoolam relativement âgé, le choix de l'éventuel successeur de Ramgoolam au Parti Travailliste est stratégiquement capital à la fois pour les Travaillistes et pour l'alliance, si cette dernière se concrétise.

* La présence de Paul Bérenger aux côtés de Navin Ramgoolam pourrait ne pas bien passer au sein d'une bonne partie de l'électorat travailliste, tout comme celle du leader du PTr auprès des militants. Pensez-vous que l'arithmétique électorale fera l'affaire lors des prochaines élections, ou accentuera-t-elle au contraire l'abstention comme notée en 2014 - même si les circonstances sont quelque peu différentes?

* Qu'en est-il d'une alliance PTr-PMSD? Les adversaires farouches des années 60 sont devenus au fil des années des "alliés naturels", et Xavier Duval passe mieux au sein de l'électorat travailliste. Un tandem Ramgoolam-Duval a-t-il de meilleures chances qu'un trio incluant Bérenger?

Ce scénario n'est pas à écarter. Le peu d'empressement de Ramgoolam à conclure les négociations est suspect à mes yeux...

* Par ailleurs, fait assez rare, mais intriguant toutefois: l'ambassadeur américain Henry Jardine s'est récemment déclaré préoccupé par les arrestations de quelques dirigeants politiques de l'opposition extraparlementaire. Qu'est-ce qui explique ce qui pourrait être perçu comme une ingérence dans les affaires intérieures de Maurice par l'ambassadeur américain?

Il n'y a pas que les Américains. Les chancelleries européennes sont également très préoccupées par le dépérissement de la démocratie à Maurice. De plus en plus, les Etats se donnent un droit d'ingérence, surtout lorsqu'il s'agit de défense de la démocratie et des droits humains. Ce n'est pas s'ingérer que de se dire préoccupé par des arrestations intempestives d'opposants politiques. Vous avez lu le communiqué du G7 sur la Chine...

Ce qui est autant préoccupant, c'est l'effet de toutes ces dérives sur l'état d'esprit de ces investisseurs dont nous avons tant besoin. Il ne faut pas croire que la dégringolade du pays dans tous les indices internationaux de bonne gouvernance sera sans effet sur l'économie. Jugnauth se tire des balles dans le pied.

* La démarche de l'ambassadeur américain intervient presque au moment où Washington aurait fait part de ses préoccupations, selon le quotidien britan-

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nique le *Daily Mail*, quant à l'avenir de sa base de Diego Garcia dans l'éventualité d'un transfert de souveraineté sur l'archipel des Chagos à Maurice. Est-ce juste une coïncidence?

Je ne crois pas que ces faits soient liés.

Les préoccupations géostratégiques et militaires américaines par rapport à Diégo Garcia sont anciennes. Hier elles étaient motivées par la présence de l'URSS dans l'océan Indien, aujourd'hui par celles de l'arrivée de la puissante marine chinoise sur ses voies de navigation. C'est la raison pour laquelle les Américains ne bougeront pas d'un pouce de Diégo Garcia, et je reste sceptique quant à un transfert de souveraineté mauricienne sur une base américaine même si Washington est conforté par la forte influence de son allié indien sur la diplomatie mauricienne.

La thèse du *Daily Mail* à l'effet que «*Xi Jinping has set his sights*» sur Diégo Garcia est infondée. Les Chinois se sont fait une raison à Maurice ; ils savent qu'ils ne peuvent pas damer le pion aux Indiens.

La FOI est-elle coûteuse?

e journal *L'express* du 24 mai 2023 rapporte que le chef du gouvernement a refusé au Parlement une demande d'introduire une *Freedom of Information Act* (FOI) parce qu'elle est "coûteuse" et que certains pays regrettent de l'avoir introduite.

L'argument du coût ne tient pas la route si l'on se

base sur l'expérience de certains pays développés, dont le Canada. Au Canada, la *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (FIPPA) existe à deux paliers de gouvernement: le gouvernement fédéral et le gouvernement provincial. La FOI est un outil démocratique formidable dans la mesure où elle permet aux citoyens d'accéder à des informations que possède le gouvernement sur les politiques publiques. Elle est fondée sur le principe de la transparence dans les affaires publiques. En principe, la FOI permet l'accès à des informations qui ne sont pas disponibles dans le domaine public (sites web, documents officiels).

Sous la FIPPA, toutes les informations qui ont un



intérêt public peuvent être divulguées sur demande. Évidemment, la loi prévoit certaines exceptions qui ne permettent pas de divulguer des informations de caractère sensible telles que les *Cabinet Papers*, les renseignements sur la sécurité nationale ou les informations personnelles comme les dossiers fiscaux des contribuables.

En général, le gouvernement fédéral et les gouvernements provinciaux au Canada s'acquittent bien de leurs obligations sous la FIPPA. Les citoyens, les médias et autres entités de groupe (partis politiques, cabinets de conseil, etc.) qui font des demandes d'informations sont servis dans des délais raisonnables et à un coût raisonnable.

Dans mon expérience de spécialiste fiscal au sein d'un gouvernement provincial au Canada, j'ai eu l'occasion de considérer des demandes d'information sur la fiscalité en provenance de citoyens ou d'autres parties privées. Je peux dire que toutes les demandes sont acceptées, sauf celles qui tombent sous les exceptions. Les clients ne se plaignent pas des frais qu'ils doivent payer pour recevoir une information quelconque.

Le gouvernement lui-même n'a pas de frais élevés à encourir pour traiter les demandes d'information sous la FOI. Tous les fonctionnaires concernés sont formés dans l'administration de la FOI et les réponses aux demandes passent au préalable par un contrôle rigoureux selon une hiérarchie de responsabilité et de décision déterminée.

En général, la presse fait un usage judicieux de la FOI pour accéder à des informations non-publiques qui leur permettent de mieux comprendre un dossier ou une politique publique en termes de contexte et de perspective.

En matière de transparence, la "default position" est de révéler autant que possible tout ce qui a un intérêt public, sujet aux exceptions réglementaires.

The standard joke about corruption is "Mr Ten Percent" – meaning a middleman who adds 10% onto the price of everything passing through his hands. Under Koko and Molefe, this had allegedly ballooned into "Mr Ten Thousand Percent".

For example, De Ruyter writes that Eskom was just stopped in the nick of time from paying a middleman R238,000 for a cleaning mop.

Corruption focused on the procurement chain. One middleman bought knee-pads for R150 (US\$7,80) and sold them to Eskom for R80,000 (US\$4,200). Another bought a knee-pad for R4,025 (US\$209) and sold it to Eskom for R934,950 (US\$48,544). The same applied to toilet rolls and rubbish bags. One inevitable consequence of corruption on such a scale was that Eskom's debt, which was R40 billion (US\$2.076 billion) in 2007 (the year that former president Jacob Zuma came to power), ballooned to R483 billion (US\$25 billion) by 2020 – which incurred R31 billion (US\$160 million) in annual finance charges.

De Ruyter reveals that the "presidential" cartel (meaning one of the local mafias) pillaged Matla power station, the "Mesh-Kings" cartel Duvha power station, the "Legendaries" cartel Tutuka power station, and the "Chief" cartel Majuba power station. He writes that the going rate for bribes at Kusile power station is R200,000 (US\$10,377) to falsify the delivery of one truckload of good quality coal. Kusile is one of the two giant new coal-fired power stations which Eskom is relying on to end power cuts.

The book says a senior officer at the Hawks, the police's priority crimes investigation units, tipped off De Ruyter how he was blocked in all his attempts to combat corruption at Eskom. Senior police officers, at least one prosecutor, and a senior magistrate, have also been bribed by the gangs.

Noncomformist

Eskom had 13 CEOs and acting CEOs in 13 years. Twenty-eight candidates, most of them black, rejected head-hunters' offers to become CEO of Eskom. De Ruyter who was previously CEO of Nampak, took a pay cut (to R7 million) to accept the job, in the hope of accelerating Eskom's transition from coal to renewables.

At the time of his appointment some commentators alleged that he was an African National Congress (ANC) cadre deployed to Eskom. The ANC's cadre deployment policy is aimed at ensuring that all the levers of power are in loyal party hands – often regardless of ability and probity. But De Ruyter came into conflict with the ruling party.

What caught De Ruyter out was the viciousness of the political attacks on him: smears of racism and financial impropriety. He had to devote many hours of office time to refuting them:

occupying that seat at Megawatt Park comes with political baggage.

Megawatt Park is Eskom's head office in Johannesburg.

The book's early chapters summarise how he was one of those Afrikaners with Dutch parents, who did not conform entirely to apartheid norms. The Afrikaner volk imposed the apartheid regime onto South Africa for 42 years. In his high school years, he

became a card-carrying member of the Progressive Federal Party, a liberal antiapartheid opposition party, antecedent of the Democratic Alliance, which is now the official opposition to the governing party.

Poisoning

De Ruyter's book mentions organising a routine Eskom stakeholders' meeting at a guesthouse in Mpumalanga province.

To save time, he ordered that food be served on plates to table places, instead of buffet arrangements. The guesthouse management refused, due to fear of facilitating poisoning one or more guests – only buffet arrangements could thwart that.

He says that in Tshwane (Pretoria), the seat of government, the National Prosecution Authority no longer orders takeaway lunches for delivery to their premises. Instead, standard procedure is that a staff member buys lunches for all at random take-away shops.

This sinister development culminated in De Ruyter himself being poisoned with



cyanide in his coffee in his office, demonstrating how mafia-type gangs had recruited at least one Eskom headquarters staff member.

Unintended consequences

In several places De Ruyter also touches on other issues. The unintended consequence of some government policies, such as localisation and preferential procurement, is that it costs Eskom two and a half times more to pay for each kilometre of transmission cable than it costs Nampower Namibia's power utility, just across the border.

What stands out from this memoir is that the success of a company demands that a CEO, managers, artisans, guards, and cleaners all take the attitude that the buck stops with them – seven days a week – and act accordingly.

Is the Constitution satisfactory?



Every day we are beginning to realise that the new Constitution is quite unsatisfactory. The only point about which there was some measure of disagreement was the constituencies. As far as the constituencies are concerned, the position is, to my mind, quite good. There are many who have

qualms of conscience in regard to the single-member system. Such things arise when one selfishly thinks of one's own chances. That cannot be the consideration. A system of this sort is tested by at least three successive elections. One election may even be disastrous. The second will tend to balance but the third will stabilise prejudices and tendencies and will produce the results it was destined to produce.

The other good is the suffrage. It is there that we can congratulate ourselves on a definite progress. The adult suffrage is not quite the same as universal suffrage. But it is a great step forward. The most unsatisfactory feature of the Constitution is the type of government it seeks to establish. Nobody can say that we have anything comparable to Responsible Government. This can be established only in one way: the Governor should, under the Constitution, be bound to call upon the leader of the majority party winning the elections to form a government. the leader may form a party government if he has a clear majority, or he can join some other parties to form a coalition. Such coalitions are formed after the parties have agreed to certain fundamental principles of government.

The advantage of a party or coalition government is that the initiative of the governance of the country is entirely in the hands of the representatives of the people. They can view things from the angle of the electorate and emphasise the results upon the life of the average man. The system has two other advantages. The leader of the majority party forming the government will be known as the Prime Minister, and by the very fact of this post and designation, on him devolve certain superior responsibilities of appointing the other Ministers and of keeping a vigilant supervision on the working in a compact and composite manner of all the ministries. This is what is known as collective responsibility. The Ministry, as a whole, pursues a well-laid policy, and all the Ministers are feverishly geared to further that policy and that ideal.

The present system cannot, in any manner, be called democratic in the sense that democracy is signalled by is institutions. The Government of Mauritius defies definition. It is neither even a diarchy nor a hybrid organism. In its very spirit lies the seed of its frustration; in its manner of composition lies the grave of my country.

It could he good as a too-temporary transient, apprentice measure, but the impossibility of cohesion and the seat of the initiative should kill all hopes of this country. How can it be otherwise when the Ministry is a queer patch, when people yoked together are not always prepared to see the same way or to speak the same language and when officialdom zealously reserves to itself the motive power of the government?

As a student of politics, I am acquainted with many twisted constitutions in history. I should, however, say that ours is by no means one with which the representatives of the people can continue to have sympathy if they want to serve the country and the people in accordance with their pledged words. I am glad that there is an ever-growing movement in the country, particularly among Left Labourites, to agitate to change the Constitution in so far as the structure of government is concerned so that we may for the first time have a taste of real Responsible Government. Today, legally and constitutionally, the responsibilities of government vest in the Governor in the same way that they vest in the Queen of England. But the analogy stops there. Here the Governor appoints Ministers in a manner that cuts across the essence of democracy.

The Governor asks the Council to elect a number of Ministers. In many cases it is bound, with the help of the unelected section of the Council, to upset the results of the polls. But that is not the only undemocratic process. The Satrap proceedsto nominate Ministers from other members of Council with a view not to satisfying the legitimate aspirations of the people but to satisfying diverging interests and sections. A Ministry of this kind can never work in cohesion and harmony when it comes to grips with fundamental issues. By the very nature of things, it is meant not to touch upon fundamental issues. It has to restrict itself to minor, flimsy matters and stand in stout defiance of commonsense as a vast makebelieve.

The initiative and responsibilities governance being in the hands of high officialdom, the appointment and dismissal of Ministers rest entirely in the hands of the Governor. The Ministry is not bound to resign following a defeat on certain important issues in Council. In this way we find that the entire democratic process completely falsified, and it cannot, by any manner or means, take us to the righteous fulfilment of our destiny.

We must make it quite plain to the government and to the country that we shall go to the polls with the declared policy of struggling in and outside the Council for Responsible Government as it is understood in civilized parlance. We shall leave no stone unturned until this rightful demand is granted. If there is lethargy or resistance, it may, in the interest of the people, be absolutely necessary to refuse to accept to be Ministers and to create a deadlock, a governmental vacuum.

The time has come to come to grips with some of the fundamental economic problems, including the problem of wages and employment. We would place this problem as a top-priority, and we shall demand results from the Ministry at the very start of the new session. It is problems like these that will reveal in its nakedness the utter helplessness of the new Constitution. If that problem is not sought to be solved in its top-priority, we shall consider it our duty towards the electorate to withhold our cooperation with the government. We place the people first, and then anything else afterwards, and nothing will deter us from our determination to fight ceaselessly towards the establishment of a Responsible Government.



How I read books



Books have enriched, upgraded, and saved my life.

I thought it might bring you reward if I walked you through my process around receiving the knowledge from books.

So here we go:

Step1: Continuous learning is the great battle proofer

The single-finest way to lead your field is to increase your skills relentlessly. You truly want to become so good at what you do that no one else in the world can do what you do. That's not about being naturally gifted. It's about reading every relevant book you can get your hands on, so you grow into a genuine master of your craft.

Step 2: Buy more books than you can ever read

Investing in a book is reaching for your promise. I buy more books than I know I will read in my lifetime. It makes me happy to get a book. Gives me hope. Activates my energy. And allows me to assemble a library that will be a legacy for my children.

Step 3: Go for range and challenge

Financial abuse of older adults by family members more common than scams by strangers

Despite numerous telephone, mail and internet scams directed toward older adults, relatives may perpetrate more financial elder abuse than strangers, suggests a new study by experts at the Keck School of Medicine of USC.

Using a unique source of frontline data -- instances of elder abuse reported to the National Center on Elder Abuse (NCEA) resource line, Keck School researchers were able to identify the most common types of elder abuse reported and profile the alleged perpetrators.

Of the nearly 2,000 calls logged for the study, more than 42% (818 calls) alleged abuse. Financial abuse was

the most commonly reported at nearly 55% (449 calls).

Family members were the most frequently identified perpetrators of alleged abuse at nearly 48% of calls in which relationship could be determined. The most common abuse perpetrated by family was financial abuse (61.8%), followed by emotional abuse (35%), neglect (20.1%), physical abuse (12%) and sexual abuse (0.3%).

Of the calls that alleged abuse by a family member, more than 32% reported more than one abuse type.

"We expected to find that financial abuse was the most common abuse reported," says Gali Weissberger, PhD, lead author of the study. "But despite the high rates of financial exploitation perpetrated by scammers targeting older adults, we found that family members were the most commonly alleged perpetrators of financial abuse. In fact, across all abuse types, with the exception of sexual abuse and self-neglect, abuse by a family member was the most commonly reported."

Elder abuse affects an estimated one in 10 older adults annually, but is often underreported. Aside from its physical, psychological and social impact on victims, their families and society, elder abuse attributes to more than \$5.3 billion in U.S. annual health care costs.

"The results highlight the importance of developing effective strategies to prevent future abuse," says Weissberger. "Our next step is to conduct more studies targeting high-risk individuals and to better understand additional risk factors."

Your heart's best friend: Dog ownership associated with better cardiovascular health

Owning a pet may help maintain a healthy heart, especially if that pet is a dog, according to the first analysis of data from the Kardiozive Brno 2030 study. The study examines the association of pet ownership -- specifically dog ownership -with cardiovascular disease risk factors and cardiovascular health. The results are published in Mayo Clinic Proceedings: Innovations, Quality & Outcomes. The study first established baseline health and socio-economic information on more than 2,000 subjects in the city of Brno, Czech Republic.

The study compared the cardiovascular health scores of pet owners overall to those who did not own pets. Then it compared dog owners to other pet owners and those who did not own pets.

"In general, people who owned any pet

were more likely to report more physical activity, better diet and blood sugar at ideal level," says Andrea Maugeri, Ph.D., a researcher with the International Clinical Research Center at St. Anne's University Hospital.

The study demonstrates an association between dog ownership and heart health, which is in line with the American Heart Association's scientific statement on

the benefits of owning a dog in terms of physical activity, engagement and reduction of cardiovascular disease risk.

Dr Maugeri says that the study findings support the idea that people could adopt, rescue or purchase a pet as a potential strategy to improve their cardiovascular health as long as pet ownership led them to a more physically active lifestyle.



Who was the first person to speak English?

Hundreds of years ago, people spoke Old English – but it is very different to English today.

The first speaker of English did not sound like you or me. That's because language changes all the time. You have probably noticed that the language of your grandparents differs from yours. You can imagine then how very different English was when it was first spoken in Britain many centuries ago.

The earliest speakers of English spoke Old English. I am using the word "speakers" because there must have been more than one speaker: after all, we use language to talk to others.


Old English developed in a turbulent period of British history. This was just after the Romans had left Britain, around 1,600 years ago. The Romans had colonised Britain but they abandoned the country in the fifth century because the Roman empire was collapsing all around them.

The Romans who ruled Britain spoke their language, Latin. But most of the people who lived in Britain when the Romans were there – and before that too – spoke a Celtic language. This Celtic language was rather like Welsh, but again much older than the present-day Welsh language.

After the Romans left Britain, Germanic tribes who were on the move throughout Europe in the fifth and sixth centuries invaded. These tribes were the Angles, the Saxons and the Jutes. The language they spoke is known as North Sea Germanic.

The first English speakers

Once they settled in Britain it became Old English, which is also sometimes called "Anglo-Saxon". From the Angles comes the word "English" and from the Angles and Saxons together comes the word "Anglo-Saxon". I teach Old English to students of English at university.



So Old English or Anglo-Saxon is the oldest form of the English language that was spoken and written in England in the early Middle Ages, the period from roughly 450 to 1050. Very few Celtic words were taken over into Old English. The word "brock" (meaning "badger") is one of the rare exceptions.

Do we know the names of the first speakers of Old English? Two names are mentioned in ancient legends that tell the story of how the Angles and the Saxons arrived in Britain.

According to these legends, the British (when they were still Celtic speakers) asked two Germanic leaders, Hengest and Horsa, to come to Britain to help protect the country after the Romans had left.

Hengest and Horsa arrived in Britain with lots of other people from their tribe and conquered the land. We have no way of knowing if these legends are true, but if they are we have here the names of the two chieftains who brought their language to Britain.

An Old English poet

There is one other name that deserves to be mentioned, and that is Caedmon. He is the first poet in English whose name is known. The story of his life is told by the monk and historian Bede, who lived in the north of England from around 673 to 735.

Bede not only tells the story of Hengest and Horsa, but he also tells us about Caedmon, who was a cowherd. Bede wrote that Caedmon could not read or write and received the ability to compose beautiful poetry as a gift from God. The first poem that Caedmon was inspired to create is a poem in praise of God. The first two lines of this poem will give you a taste of Old English:

Nu sculon herian	heofonrices Weard,
Metodes mihte	and his modgepanc

In modern English, this means: "Now we must praise the guardian of the heavenly kingdom, the Ruler's might and his plan".

You might think this is not really English at all. But we still use some of the words used in Old English – "and" and "his" are both in these two lines of poetry. Other words have survived too, though we often spell and pronounce them differently. See if you can spot the Old English words for "might" and "now" in these lines from Caedmon's poem.

Caedmon looked after the cattle in a monastery in Whitby in Yorkshire. One of my university students studying Old English comes from Whitby and she told me that her school is named after our first named English poet: Caedmon College. His legend lives on.

Suddenly, she sneezes, and a glass eye comes flying out of her eye socket. It hurls by the man, and he snatches it from the air and hands it back to her.



I don't mean you should be a pushover. You can be someone that doesn't take shit and be nice about it. Just don't insult people, think you're better than them, or act like an idiot.



Is your Smartphone Harming your Health?

Germs, texting and driving, an awkward neck position -- your phone may be doing you more harm than good

Your cellphone probably goes with you everywhere. Ever check it while you were in the bathroom? And when's the last time you cleaned it? Ever? It makes sense that there might be bacteria, viruses, or other germs on it. One study found 1 in 6 phones has E. coli bacteria on it, probably because people didn't wash their hands well. On the bright side, it's a hard surface, which usually makes it harder for germs to survive. Still, it's probably a good idea to wipe it down now then.

Text Neck Syndrome: Too much time looking down at your phone can strain your neck muscles and cause tightness or spasms. You might even get nerve pain that goes to your back, or to your shoulder and down your arm. Take breaks at least every 20 minutes to stretch and arch your back. Try not to hunch forward. It helps to hold your phone higher up when you text, too. Posture exercises from yoga or Pilates will help you stay strong and avoid neck pain.

Awkward Phone Calls: Ever pinch the phone between your shoulder and ear while you do something else? It's not a natural position. Do it for too long and you'll probably notice that your neck hurts. If you can't avoid it, take breaks and move your neck in other directions to keep it loose.

Text and Drive: Just don't do it. Sending a text takes 5 seconds of your attention. That seems so quick. But it's not harmless. At 55 mph, your car goes about length of a football field -- more than enough space to cause a

serious car wreck. Scientists figure this means you may be as much as 23 times more likely to crash. And the risk is the same whether you type or "voice text." You're 4 times more likely to crash when you talk and drive. If you really need to take or make a call, pull over.

Surfing at Night: Too much of any light after the sun goes down can mess up your sleep, which is linked to diabetes, obesity, heart disease, and other health problems. And the "blue light" your smartphone gives off is especially bad. Keep your bedroom dark for better rest. You can also help your nighttime sleep if you get lots of natural light during the day.

Walkin' or Talkin' -- Not Both: You're walking down the sidewalk and need to send a quick text. How long does it take? A few seconds? Enough time to trip and fall. Just stop for a moment. Those seconds aren't worth an accident. And it's not just outside: The most common injuries happen while talking on the phone at home -usually muscle and tendon strains, broken bones, and



There are two types of diabetes, where type 2 diabetes is more common than type 1 diabetes. Usually, people with high blood sugar often find it difficult to see the fine details of an object. This is because eye health and diabetes are linked. Diabetes can affect your eye health and lead to various eye-related complications. Here are four eye problems that can be caused by uncontrolled blood sugar.

Blurry vision

Diabetes can make your eye lenses swell, which can lead to blurry vision. So, if you are suffering from diabetes and suddenly notice your vision getting blurry you do not need to change your glasses immediately.

Get your blood sugar tested and make sure it's under the reference value torectify the blurry vision problem. It might take up to 3 months to get your normal vision back. Also, do not forget to discuss the issue with your doctor. Cataracts

Just like a camera, the natural lens of your eyes help you see and focus on an image. When the lens gets cloudy or dirty, it is an indication that a cataract has been formed. Anyone can get cataracts, but people with diabetes might get them earlier than people who do not have diabetes.

A cloudy lens cannot let

your eye focus the way it should. Surgery is required to remove the cataract. In the surgery, a cloudy lens is removed with an artificial lens.

Glaucoma

People suffering from diabetes are more likely to get glaucoma, which is of several types. In glaucoma, pressure builds up inside your eye as the fluid doesn't drain the way it should. This can damage the nerves and blood vessels, leading to changes in vision.

The most common form of glaucoma is open-angle glaucoma, which can be treated by medication. The medications lower the pressure by speeding up drainage and reducing the liquid inside your eye.

Diabetic retinopathy

A retina is a group of cells at the back of your eyes

The phones can even interfere with certain kinds of hearing aids. Talk to your doctor if you notice any problems with your medical device, especially if it happens when you use your smartphone.

Eye Problems: The shorter wavelength of the blue light that smartphones give off can tire your eyes very quickly and cause pain. It may even damage your cornea (the clear lens on the front of the eye) and harm your vision. If you notice these problems, it's best to limit your time with blue-light digital devices like smartphones and computers, or at least to take breaks often to rest your eyes.

Can You Hear Me Now? Even if you don't look at it, just putting a phone in plain view when you talk to someone can get in the way of making a strong connection. It's especially a problem in close relationships and when you're talking about something meaningful. Maybe save that social media update for later and focus on the person sitting right in front of you in real life.



Not so long ago a daily newspaper posted a photo of the wife of a most prominent minister having a drink at a cocktail party and smiling at the CEO of a parastatal body, and the title was 'La photo qui fait jaser' (the talk of the town photo). The online version of the newspaper kept

posting the photo for more than a year whether you wanted to see it or not on your screen. The ground reality is that it was neither the talk of the town nor the village simply because folks around have other priorities to attend to than interpret smiles and the private matters of public figures. Besides being a malicious attempt at sullying the reputation of the lady and her guest, it was a glaring invitation to arouse the base instinct of voyeurism in the local public and in the Mauritian diaspora across the world, and in the process reap financial profits from thousands of clicks.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, US President during the Great Depression in the 1930s called the journalists who hounded him to find out his womanizing habits: muckrakers. The President borrowed the word from John Bunyan's 1678 allegorical tale 'The Pilgrim's Progress' in which one character, called the Muckraker, is tasked to rake up trash and clean the way all along the pilgrimage. So, he smells trash all the way. Ever since, muckraking consists in finding and spreading scandal relating to public figures. In a society marked by Puritanism, the tactic of muckraking in smearing rivals during presidential campaigns has served the interests of both politicians and the media in the US for decades up to now.

How does the public react? It depends on cultural traits, doesn't it? Lying and cheating in whatever forms are unacceptable to Americans. Generally, the French treat sex issues casually and dismiss the infidelity of their male leaders with a shrug but will tear them apart in case of self-enrichment due to their high-ranking posts in the government. Had the Sofitel



scandal in New York, involving the former IMF director, happened in France, there would have been a cover-up. Dominique Strauss-Kahn remains a respected figure, continued to give courses in economics at the prestigious Institut d'études politiques in Paris. He has settled in a gorgeous villa in Marrakech, Morocco, and is far richer now as a consultant for governments of various African countries. The privilege of very bright people, no doubt.

Mauritian folks are more inclined to let the private lives of public figures remain private.... though they broadly expect a high standard of behaviour from political leaders who represent them. But they do talk it over at home, and their folks have the decency not to make the various incidents a matter of household gossip.




