Marketing The LP-MMM-PMSD Alliance

he Labour Party-MMM-PMSD alliance has been long in the making - almost three years since the time when rumours were afloat about a proposal to bring together these three parties in the wake of their debacle at the 2019 elections. What gave some substance to that rumour was the proposal made as early as 2020 by the leader of the Labour Party, who had canvassed the idea of a common boycott of the Presidential Address and the parliamentary debates on the Government Programme by the opposition parties in Parliament. A common stand could not be reached due to the divergent views of the MMM and the PMSD on that proposal. Nevertheless, the idea of a reunion of the three traditional Opposition parties did make some headway during further consultations with a common front floated during 2022 for the municipal elections that were later to be postponed again by government. But a common agreement towards the general elections made slow progress, leaving the door open to a number of Opposition voices, parliamentary and extra-parliamentary, to air their own agendas and ambitions.

The issue of whether or not to induct those other newly-formed parties, especially Roshi Bhadain's Reform Party and Nando Bodha's Rassemblement Mauricien, came in the way of the formation of the Alliance, and it has now been formally set up once the leadership of that alliance by Navin Ramgoolam has been resolved to the LP leader's satisfaction. Ramgoolam took the time that it required - almost three years - to get the MMM and the PMSD, two diminished parties relative to their early years, to accept ground reality of the LP's strength said some, to bend to his diktat said others. This also means that his leadership of the alliance and his eventual prime ministership for a full five-year term in case of electoral victory, already recognised during 2022 by MMM figureheads as an internal LP matter, would have also been confirmed.

Even if there might be broad consensus on the proposition that anything else would be better that the current dispensation in light of its misgovernance of the affairs of the country, what remains unknown in the absence of credible opinion surveys is whether the LP-MMM-PMSD brand is a selling proposition, or whether

another LP-PMSD might be a better option. Or, even whether Navin Ramgoolam himself represents a winning brand for the Labour Party. Marketing gurus contend that sometimes a brand can recover from a disaster, sometimes not, but that's for the LP to ponder. We'll get a better reading of the current *rapport de force* on the political chessboard this afternoon from the LP-MMM-PMSD first joint regional congress at Mare d'Albert.

A vibrant democracy requires a credible opposition. This has been lacking since the coming to power of the current government. The circumstances demanded that this lacuna be filled; this has now been done. Nothing else in terms of common programme - even in its broad terms -, the constitution of its front bench (which usually weighs heavily in electoral outcomes), the 'répartition des tickets' ... -- all these remain unknown to this day, and will be taken care of in good time, it would seem, although snippets may be gleaned from that first of a series of regional gatherings. The leaders of the LP, MMM and PMSD would surely not want their alliance to be perceived as one that is only in line with their own political ambitions, but one that will and can make a difference in the lives of their countrymen and that it will do things differently if elected - and not viewed as more of the same.

In the meantime, a lot of water will certainly flow under the bridge until the next elections, but it would not do any harm if the LP, MMM and PMSD could also start with rebuilding and reinventing themselves through internal reordering and democratization. By taking such a call they will be ensuring their future relevance on the political landscape. All Mauritian parliamentary parties have at some time or other been in political alliance, and it stands to reason that the population, despite growing discontent with the way things are being currently run, may take some time to be wooed that this is an alliance that is credible in offering a radical program going some way to meet popular pent-up demand for change in governance practices. This gathering marks therefore an important first litmus test for the three parties as it begins the roll-out process and will be keenly watched by the ruling party and extra-parliamentary forces and, we dare say, by much of the population.

Oppenheimer's warning lives on: international laws and treaties are failing to stop a new arms race

Lack of effective regulation means the risk of nuclear war is greater than at any time since the end of the Cold War. Other potentially existential military threats remain similarly uncontrolled



Robert Oppenheimer – the great nuclear physicist, "father of the atomic bomb", and now subject of a blockbuster biopic – always despaired about the nuclear arms race triggered by his creation.

So the approaching 78th anniversary of the Hiroshima bombing invites us to ask how far we've come – or haven't come – since his death in 1967.

The Cold War represented all that Oppenheimer had feared. But at its end, then-US president George H.W. Bush spoke of a "peace dividend" that would see money saved from reduced defence budgets transferred into more socially productive enterprises.

Long-term benefits and rises in gross domestic product could have been substantial, according to modelling by the International Monetary Fund, especially for developing nations. Given the cost of global sustainable development – currently estimated at US\$5 trillion to \$7 trillion annually – this made perfect sense.

Unfortunately, that peace dividend is disappearing. The world is now spending at least \$2.2 trillion annually on weapons and defence. Estimates are far from perfectly accurate, but it appears overall defence spending increased by 3.7% in real terms in 2022.

The US alone spent \$877 billion on defence in 2022 – 39% of the world total. With Russia (\$86.4 billion) and China (\$292 billion), the top three spenders account for 56% of global defence spending.

Military expenditure in Europe saw its steepest annual increase in at least 30 years. NATO countries and partners are all accelerating towards, or are already past, the 2% of GDP military spending target. The global arms bazaar is busier than ever.

Aside from the opportunity cost represented by these alarming figures, weak international law in crucial areas means current military spending is largely immune to effective regulation.

Fault lines exposed in Manipur

n 3rd May violent riots broke out in the northeast Indian state of Manipur, bordering Myanmar (former Burma), in what to outsiders was a relatively quiescent, mountainous state of 3.5 million, mostly tribal and we have since been fed continuous coverage both of some shocking episodes, a BJP-run state lethargic reaction to stem such violence and a raucous storm from Opposition forces in New Delhi Parliament, demanding a full debate and querying PM Modi's stance.

It would seem that several fault lines that were always simmering between different ethnicities had suddenly erupted through the impact of separate measures that affected minority, generally poorer hill tribes in a predominantly Meiti-run state and policing authorities. Valley-dwelling Meitis form 53% of the total population and occupy 10% of the lands. Hill tribals Nagas and Kukis constitute some 40% of the population and control 90% of the hilly and mountainous regions, with remote access and minimal facilities, but to which they are deeply attached.

The Central government is reported to have acted swiftly. On 4th May, the Central government, invoking Article 355 of the Constitution, took over the security situation of Manipur and almost immediately deployed 10,000 army, para-military and airlifted 5 companies of the Rapid Action Force to the region. By 5 May, about 20,000 Kuki and other hill people had been relocated to safer locations under military supervision. As of 14 May, the total military build-up in Manipur stood at 126 army columns and 62 companies of paramilitary forces.

An internet blackout and curfew was imposed to avoid disinformation-fuelled violence (such as reports of shocking women molestations), yet episodic violence and mobs continued for a while and Manipur is still simmering in an uneasy truce, despite a visit by Home Minister Amit Shah and his as yet unsuccessful attempt to stage a multi-tribal peace forum.

By 25th May the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights Volker Turk had issued a statement that the violence in Manipur "revealed the underlying tensions between different ethnic and indigenous groups", urging the authorities to "respond to the situation quickly, including by investigating and addressing root causes of the violence in line with their international human rights obligations".

There did not seem a manifest lack of vigorous action by the Central Government to stem the horrors and violence but clearly there was some ground to be mystified why the reasons for rising discontent of hills tribes were not picked up earlier and prevented from degenerating into outright violence. The root factors and their combined impact are now generally known and have to be addressed by New Delhi working closely with the BJP-run state government.

Among those factors of fear and resentment of the 1 million or so hill tribes are land, ethnic differences in government posts and resources in majority allocated to the Meitis, a long border with Myanmar (former Burma) with regular infiltrations increasing the fear of hillsmen being alienated by immigrants, and the ever-present poppy cultivation and trade in the hilly regions placed at risk. Matters came to a head with the Meiti request for



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similar Scheduled Tribe status as the hill tribes (which would be unfounded and illogical), approved by a single-judge local high court at the end of March but, as per previous Indian Supreme Court rulings, such a status and its privileges can only be granted by the Centre and Parliament.

Another major friction point came when hill tribe protesters gathered to hold a rally against "encroachment of tribal land in the name of reserved forests, protected forests and wildlife sanctuary". This raised fears of hill lands being acquired by non-tribesmen and a potential threat to the poppy cultivation activities in the region's mountainous lands.

Unequal societies and simmering resentment

here may be no direct relevance of such tragic events as happened in Manipur for the Mauritian polity to dwell on, but we should bear in mind that multi-ethnic situations with perceived disparities inside un-equal societies can be a recipe for simmering resentment.

Hate and venom disinformation and personal attacks spewed by manipulative forces abusing the Internet have to be clamped down rapidly and without fear that many of them emanate regularly from different channels including those that espouse government policies. Neither can unchecked policing resort to unacceptable tactics in what may look like a targeting approach that could turn ugly to smear opponents and harass their activities and even their families.

Mauritius has, we believe, evolved to a stage of maturity and tolerance that should normally preclude its peace and harmony being put at risk by well-connected apprentice fire-breathers, particularly as electoral times dawn closer.

Dubai and Singapore Poster boys of reference for our development narratives

ost old-timers would recall that our previous multi-cultural poster boy of reference for our development narratives used to be Singapore, the city state that gained independence and with similar GDP/ head as ourselves. It still ranks today as one of the cleanest, least corrupt and re-solutely transparent administrations with one of the most reputed world passports. It has however over the recent past been largely overshadowed by glitzy Dubai, its gilded tower properties, its thriving gold and jewellery markets and its secretive banks.

Point sur la situation politique

Une synergie positive du côté des leaders est primordiale à la mise en place d'une dynamique positive du côté des partisans

eux semaines après l'annonce de la finalisation de l'alliance PTr-MMM-PMSD, ces derniers organisent leur premier congrès en commun ce vendredi 28 juillet.

Ce premier congrès sera intéressant pour tâter la température de cette alliance. Pas tant du côté des partisans, que l'on imagine mobilisés, mais plutôt du côté de la capacité des différents leaders et des têtes d'affiche de ces partis à présenter un front unifié et aligné.

Bataille des foules à l'intérieur de l'alliance

En effet, une synergie positive du côté des leaders est primordiale à la mise en place d'une dynamique positive du côté des partisans. De ce point de vue, ce premier congrès devrait bien se passer puisque cette alliance a besoin d'un acte fondateur à partir duquel le travail de terrain, et la finalisation des conditions et des modalités de l'alliance peuvent avoir lieu.

En effet, il semble évident que rien n'est encore vraiment décidé. Nous avons juste appris que l'alliance a été conclue quelques jours après l'audience du Privy Council. Mais nous ne savons encore rien de la répartition des tickets, de la composition du front bench et du programme électoral pour la prochaine mandature.

Est-ce que ce vide est une stratégie de l'alliance de ne pas dévoiler ses cartes ? Ou bien est-ce la démonstration qu'il n'y a non seulement aucun accord sur ces sujets, mais que l'audience du Privy Council a forcé les trois leaders à annoncer une alliance dans la précipitation en vue de faire du 'damage control'?

On n'en sait rien à ce stade, et il faudra attendre pour savoir réellement où ils en sont.

Ce qui est certain, c'est que l'alliance se doit de démontrer qu'elle est crédible. Et sans programme commun annoncé à ce stade, elle se doit de montrer qu'elle est capable de mobiliser une foule conséquente, ce qui ne devrait pas être difficile. Deux des plus grands partis politiques du pays et le PMSD devraient pouvoir rameuter une bonne foule. Mais il faudra interpréter

cette foule et comprendre ce qu'elle signifie.

En effet, nous devinons facilement que chacun des trois partis soit en train de se mobiliser afin de démontrer sa force individuelle. Ainsi, il se pourrait bien que nous assistions à une bataille des foules à l'intérieur même de l'alliance, avec un MMM et un PMSD qui auraient pour impératif de montrer qu'ils sont capables de rameuter autant de partisans que le PTr.

- -- Une foule trop rouge et pas assez mauve ou bleue poserait problème et ce serait un embarras pour les deux wagons que sont les mauves et les bleus en face de la locomotive rouge.
- -- Bien plus même, une foule constituée de bien plus de mauves que de bleus, ou de bien plus de bleus que de mauves, pourrait également envoyer un signal fort à Navin Ramgoolam quant à la distribution des tickets et la composition d'un 'front bench'.

C'est en fait le rapport de force entre les trois partis eux-mêmes qui sera testé ce vendredi, dans une région de l'île où le MMM et le PMSD n'ont aucune assise électorale réelle. Cela signifie que les artisans de ces deux partis viendront surtout des autres régions de l'île, et leur mobilisation sera un enjeu crucial pour les deux leaders qui n'auront que très peu de marge de manœuvre en face de Navin Ramgoolam s'ils ne réussissent pas à démontrer qu'ils représentent encore des forces politiques nationales.

De son côté, le MSM et ses alliés sont particulièrement tranquilles depuis quelques semaines. Tout semble même s'être tassé concernant les récents scandales et nous percevons un temps mort qui risque de perdurer. En fait, il semble de plus en plus certain que l'audience du Privy Council a changé la dynamique politique à l'île Maurice.

D'un côté, le PTr, le MMM et le PMSD ont annoncé leur alliance juste après.

De l'autre côté, les scandales qui gangrènent le gouvernement ont pris un certain recul dans les médias et dans les conversations.

Ce calme avant la tempête peut s'expliquer par le fait que le verdict du Privy Council, attendu d'ici septembre, pourrait signifier le début de la course électorale.

Il semble donc que nous soyons dans un entre-deux où chaque parti jauge ses forces et ses faiblesses, et peaufine sa stratégie.

C'est exactement ce que semble faire le MSM depuis quelques semaines du reste. Il semble que les agents orange ont été extrêmement présents sur le terrain depuis quelques temps, et notamment celui des circonscriptions rurales. Les retours seraient mi-figue miraisin, avec un glissement certain pour l'alliance au pouvoir.

L'accumulation des scandales et le problème de la cherté de la vie s'additionnent pour produire une situation complexe pour l'alliance gouvernementale. Le récent budget aurait semble-t-il réussi à atténuer un peu cette situation, mais il n'a pas suffi pour faire taire les mécontents.

Est-ce que ce glissement se poursuivra pendant les prochains mois ou bien est-ce que le MSM réussira à renverser la tendance? Seul l'avenir nous le dira. Ce qui semble clair pour l'instant, c'est que ce glissement n'est pas en train de se faire au profit de l'opposition. Mais cette situation pourrait changer et les prochains mois seront déterminants pour le MSM.

Tout comme Navin Ramgoolam qui met en place sa stratégie pour les prochaines élections, Pravind

Jugnauth semble aussi avoir également une stratégie clairement définie en place. Et les sondages de terrain effectués récemment serviront à peaufiner cette stratégie.

Ce qui est sûr, c'est que les choses ne sont pas encore totalement en place, que ce soit du côté de la nouvelle alliance de l'opposition ou du côté du MSM. Et il faudra observer leurs différents positionnements dans les mois à venir afin d'avoir une meilleure indication des rapports de force qui s'affronteront lors des prochaines élections générales.

Ce qui est certain, c'est que le round d'observation a bel et bien commencé, et que les choses risquent d'aller très vite à partir de là.

Il semble ainsi clair que la Russie souhaite redéfinir ses objectifs de coopération avec le continent africain, ce qui est particulièrement pertinent actuellement. En effet, les autorités russes ont récemment affirmé que la milice Wagner allait être redéployée sur le continent africain, terrain où ils s'étaient fait connaître du reste.

Le dossier qui risque toutefois de se trouver au cœur de ce sommet est la conséquence du non-renouvellement de l'accord sur les céréales entre la Russie et l'Ukraine. Cette situation plonge potentiellement plusieurs pays de l'Afrique de l'Est, soit à peu près 60 millions de personnes, dans une situation d'insécurité alimentaire.

L'annonce de la non-reconduction de cet accord a d'ailleurs immédiatement fait grimper le prix des céréales de près de 25% sur le marché international. Vladimir Poutine a tenu néanmoins à rassurer certains partenaires de la Russie que cette dernière assurera les livraisons de céréales.

Ce sommet Russie-Afrique aura ainsi lieu dans un contexte extrêmement favorable à la Russie, qui se trouve dans une capacité de négociation puissante en face de plusieurs pays africains. Il faudra suivre de près les décisions prises lors de ce sommet, car elles risquent d'avoir des ramifications importantes quant aux jeux de pouvoirs de la géopolitique régionale.

Israël : amendement constitutionnel

près plusieurs mois de débats et de protestations, le parlement israélien vient de passer une loi qui permettra un amendement de la Constitution israélienne. Des amendements qui devraient permettre au gouvernement d'obtenir une plus grande autonomie d'action au prix de l'élimination de certains garde-fous.

La population israélienne est profondément divisée sur ce texte de loi avec, d'un côté, les nationalistes qui soutiennent l'amendement et, de l'autre côté, les progressistes qui y voient un danger pour l'avenir de la démocratie israélienne.

Ainsi Israël, un pays où les institutions démocratiques ont toujours été extrêmement fortes, s'approche un peu plus vers un régime autocratique. Ce phénomène n'est pas isolé, loin de là même, puisque plusieurs pays à régime démocratique sont sur une pente similaire.

Cet amendement, qui consolidera l'assise du Likoud (le parti conservateur mené par Benjamin Netanyahou), n'annonce rien de bon pour l'avenir d'Israël et la stabilité de la région.

Mais par-delà les implications politiques et géopolitiques, il est curieux de constater que cette tendance de certaines démocraties vers l'autocratie devient de plus en plus commune. Ainsi il est important de tenter de comprendre les raisons de cette tendance qui se profile, en réalité, depuis la fin de la Guerre froide.

Maurice, par exemple, n'est absolument pas exempte de ce phénomène comme l'affirme le V-Dem Institute, qui étudie les démocraties dans le monde.

Un tel questionnement doit reposer sur une analyse précise et fine des phénomènes politiques actuels. Mais il est intéressant de noter ici que les textes d'Alexis de Tocqueville peuvent s'avérer extrêmement instructifs pour les lecteurs curieux et avides de réponses à ces questions.

Tocqueville a analysé l'avènement de la démocratie au sortir des révolutions qui ont bouleversé le 18ème siècle. Son constat est simple. Le temps de régime démocratique était arrivé et ce même régime démocratique allait non seulement se généraliser mais allait également produire des formes diverses et variées de régimes politiques, allant du progressisme au conservatisme.

Or, c'est exactement cela qui semble aujourd'hui évoluer et il nous importe de nous poser une autre question que celle de Tocqueville : est-ce que le temps du régime démocratique est révolu et, si oui, vers quel autre régime de pouvoir nous dirigeons-nous?

L'Inde bloque l'exportation du riz blanc

e gouvernement indien a bloqué cette semaine l'exportation du riz blanc (non-basmati) jusqu'à nouvel ordre. Cette décision fait suite aux inondations qui ont plongé plusieurs régions du pays dans une situation d'urgence sanitaire et a pour objectif d'aider à stabiliser le prix du riz sur le marché local, prix qui se sont envolés à cause de l'inflation et des spécula-

tions qui ont suivi les intempéries.

Cette décision a tout de suite provoqué une réaction en chaîne dans le monde, avec une augmentation immédiate du prix du riz blanc indien sur les marchés mondiaux. Il s'agit là d'un mécanisme naturel de la loi de l'offre et de la demande. Lorsque l'offre diminue et que la demande reste identique ou augmente, alors le prix d'une marchandise augmente.

Par-delà l'inflation et l'augmentation des prix, cette interdiction à l'exportation pourrait produire une situation de pénurie sur différents marchés, augmentant encore plus l'insécurité alimentaire dans certains pays.

Il est clair que la priorité du **g**ouvernement indien est de s'assurer que le stock et le prix du riz blanc restent accessibles et abordables pour le marché intérieur. Mais ce même gouvernement doit faire attention à ne pas produire une situation où les pays importateurs du riz blanc indien se tournent vers d'autres sources d'approvisionnement. Néanmoins, cela semble peu probable car le Vietnam et la Thaïlande, les deux autres plus grands producteurs du riz blanc au monde, se trouvent également en posture délicate avec une augmentation du prix de leur riz.

En tout cas, le FMI a appelé le **g**ouvernement indien à lever ce blocus le plus rapidement possible afin de ne pas créer un vent de panique qui pourrait avoir des conséquences dramatiques sur le marché mondial du riz. Qui plus est, certains pays, comme le Canada, se sont mis à acheter le maximum de riz afin de constituer des réserves au cas où l'Inde ne débloque pas la situation rapidement.

Nous sommes dans une situation dont on pouvait se passer à Maurice, au moment où les prix semblaient se stabiliser pour la panier de la ménagère. Est-ce que le prix du riz augmentera à Maurice à la suite de cette décision du gouvernement indien?

Difficile à dire pour l'instant car nous ne savons pas si la fourniture en sera affectée. Il faut donc observer cette situation de près car il est clair que ce genre de débalancement est capable de produire des effets extrêmement néfastes sur le pouvoir d'achat des Mauriciens.

Nous devons également nous préparer à ce que d'autres denrées puissent se raréfier dans les semaines à venir, encore une fois à cause des inondations en Inde qui ont touché de grandes parties des terres agricoles.

o you want to be rich? A few years back this would have been

viewed as a stupid question. You could want to be a doctor, engineer, teacher, scientist, professor, agriculturist, politician, film star, singer, musician, or a businessman, but getting rich was never a vocation. Not so today - and it is not as difficult as you might imagine.

The world has changed and the laws governing business are no longer written by your elected representatives, they are written by the super-rich themselves. It is big money which boosts the nation's GDP and gives our leaders a place at the high tables of international relations, while also creating a semblance of development for domestic consumption. The path to getting rich has therefore already been laid out over the last two to three decades for aspirational people like you.

'Ease of doing business', 'too big to fail', 'trickle-down theory', 'liberalisation', 'globalised economy', 'private public partnership', 'disinvestment', right-sizing', etc., are all concepts created for you, which we have been made to believe are the bedrock of economic progress. Of course, the wealth you accumulate might not be rightfully yours, but then who cares. All you need to do is to stay focussed on exploiting the system to your advantage.

The first thing you need to understand is that education has no relevance in the world of the super-rich. I would not like to name people here but do take a couple of minutes to Google for the top five to ten richest men and women in the world. The results are unambiguous -practically all of the richest people are school or college dropouts. Higher education is for employees you will be hiring to work for you. In any case, once you are rich you can set up endowments at Colleges and Universities and buy all the qualifications you want.

The second thing to remember is that you must either know or work hard to cultivate friendship with a few powerful politicians. The higher they are placed the better. These friendships will be purely transactional, the 'take some give some' type. You need them to get off the block - to secure seed capital for your dream. With the right political backing, technical feasibility, economic viability, and due diligence can all be managed. No need to be anxious here. The few people who get caught up in scams, etc., are those who either did not have political backing or had run afoul of the powers that be. Choose your friends carefully and, if possible, in more than one

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camp.

Path to Riches

So you want to be rich? A few years back this would

have been viewed as a stupid question. Not so today -

and it is not as difficult as you might imagine

You also need to relocate some brothers, sisters, cousins, etc., in a few countries where they can set up shell companies to siphon out the wealth you will be making in your country. This is where you need to cultivate some tax officials also. After all you don't want regulatory authorities making things difficult for you.

ducts. If you want to be wealthy your realised capital gains should remain a tiny fraction of the returns from the capital held by you.

Again, you must minimise the dividend payouts and thus minimise the distribution of profits among the stockholders. Profits distributed as dividends have to be reported as personal income and hence invite tax liability for the recipient. In contrast, reinvested profits reduce the tax obligation and raise the value of equity, resulting in hefty tax-free capital gains. You could also arrange for a part of the dividend income to be received indirectly in the accounts of financial intermediaries like limited liability partnerships and keep them away from individual accounts. Do you see the opportunities which have been created for you in modern taxation systems? These are there for you to exploit.

Do not be worried about failure, in fact it might be worth your while to let your company go down under. The system will take care of it. Every year banks write of billions of dollars as non-recoverable bad loans. This is justified as a bookkeeping exercise to clean up the accounts

been taught about ethics, morality, honesty, and other similar high-sounding words, which will no longer belong to your new world. Let naive people debate about the importance of such values for a fair society, you are here to corner wealth.

Wealth and tax regimes

Let us start by understanding the financial ecosystem you aspire to be a part of. According to the 2023 World Inequality Report, the poorest 50% of the population own just 2% of the total net wealth, while the richest 10% own 76%. Of these top 10%, the top-most 1% have cornered more than 40% of the wealth. The remaining is shared amongst the middle 40%. The remaining gets made good from low returns on deposits, public money, or tax recoverable from banks. This should reassure you.

Also at this stage, quickly identify an accounting company which can audit your books and produce your annual reports just the way you want them to be done. Your tax consultants and auditors, if they are worth their fees, should be able to show you many more well-established options. After all you pay them well, just as you pay well to your top CEOs and financial officers, for keeping your secrets and doing some creative accounting for you. To sum up, the world has been reconstructed for you since the early 1990s.

The richest in the world had learnt about these facts early on in life and instead of wasting their time on education, they quickly moved on to cash in. You should too!

How to move ahead

All right, now let us look at how to move ahead. Let us start with manufacturing, infrastructure, and international trade. First draw up a super ambitious business plan. Whether it is practical or not is immaterial, it should involve large numbers and massive capital investments in land, plant, and machinery. It should also promise job opportunities for a large number of unemployed. The key word is promise, whether we realise, or even intend to realise, the promise or not is not important.

The word here is 'big ticket' investment.

other contraband, fictitious trade or trade in spurious goods and of course the age-old smuggling of anything in short supply.

Acquire a foreign citizenship

Europe heat wave likely to worsen global food crisis'

European summer with record-breaking temperatures has roiled cereal crops in the continent, which is likely to worsen a global food crisis, according to several recent reports. India's ban on rice export has already caused a rally in prices.

The World Meteorological Organisation has forecast that the current heat wave in the continent will linger and southern European locations this past week experienced record temperatures, such as Malaga in Spain, which hit 44.2°C on July 19.

Cereal production in southern Europe is expected to fall by up to 60% over last year in the wake of the

Charon heat wave currently gripping the continent, the Grocer website said in a report this week, quoting European farming organisation Copa Cogeca. Greek PM Kyriakos Mitsotakis warned this week that "the hard times are clearly not over yet", reports Hindustan Times.

On Tuesday, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) said it had urged India to lift its restriction on rice exports. Pierre-Olivier Gourinchas, IMF's chief economist, said the restrictions were likely to exacerbate volatility in food prices in the rest of the world.

Also, global wheat prices jumped after Russia withdrew from the Black Sea grain deal on July 17, under which it allowed Ukraine, a major breadbasket, to ship food and fertilisers.

Meghan Markle and Prince Harry's 'honeymoon in America' is over - Royal commentator

rince Harry and Meghan Markle's decision to step away from the royal family and settle in the United States seemed like the start of a new chapter in their lives. However, recent speculations suggest that their American dream might not be going as smoothly as anticipated.

Larscombe believes that the initial "honeymoon in America" for Prince Harry and Meghan Markle is now over. He expressed doubts about their ability to build a successful future without resorting to negative discussions about the royal family.

Niger military detains President, overthrows govt as 'coup' declared

oldiers claim to have overthrown Niger's government following an apparent coup in the West African nation on Wednesday when members of the Presidential Guard detained President Mohamed Bazoum.

Members of the elite guard sealed off access to the president's residence and offices in the capital Niamey, and after talks broke down, "refused to release" him, a presidential source said.

The soldiers said "all institutions" in the country would be suspended, borders were closed and a curfew imposed "until further notice" from 10 pm to 5 am, reports AFP.

Regional and global leaders have called for the release of Bazoum, who entered office two years ago in Niger's first peaceful transition of power since independence from France in 1960.

The president of neighbouring Benin, Patrice Talon, will head to Niamey for mediation efforts,

the head of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) said.

One of a dwindling group of pro-Western leaders in the Sahel, Bazoum was elected in April 2021, taking the helm of a country burdened by poverty and jihadist insurgencies.

In a message on Twitter, which is being rebranded as X, the president's office said "elements of the Presidential Guard (PG) had a fit of temper... (and) tried unsuccessfully to gain the support of the national armed forces and the national guard".

Hours after his detention, Bazoum's supporters had tried to approach the official complex, but were dispersed by members of the Presidential Guard who fired warning shots, an AFP reporter saw.

The parties of Niger's ruling coalition in Niamey denounced "a suicidal and anti-republican madness" in a statement, saying that "certain elements of the presidential guard sequestered the President" and his family, as well as the interior minister.

Condemnation also poured in from beyond the nation's borders.

ECOWAS and the African Union both decried what they called an "attempted coup d'etat".

The European Union said it "associates itself" with the ECOWAS statement and attacked "any attempt to destabilise democracy and threaten the stability" of Niger.

Poverty and jihadism

The nation of 22 million is two-thirds desert and frequently ranks at the bottom of the UN's Human Development Index, a benchmark of prosperity.

Niger is struggling with two jihadist campaigns — one in the southwest, which swept in from Mali in 2015, and the other in the southeast, involving jihadists from northeastern Nigeria.

Israel's top court to hear petitions against controversial law curbing its power

srael's highest court said Wednesday that it would hear petitions in September against a divisive law weakening its power that the country's parliament passed earlier this week.

Israeli civil society groups and others have filed petitions asking the Supreme Court to strike down the law enacted Monday — the first major piece of legislation in Prime Minster Benjamin Netanyahu's broader program

to overhaul Israel's judiciary, reports AP.

The far-right government's plans to limit judicial power have plunged Israel into its worst domestic crisis in years, unleashing widespread unrest and exposing the country's deep social fissures.

'Blow to democracy'

Critics of the overhaul describe it as a blow to democracy, arguing that Israel's judiciary represents the primary check on the powers of the par-

liament and prime minister. Netanyahu's supporters say the law will prevent liberal, unelected judges from interfering with the decisions of elected lawmakers.

Hundreds of thousands of Israelis have poured into the streets to protest against the plan for the past seven months. While protests

continue, opponents are also taking their fight to the Supreme Court — the very target of Netanyahu's overhaul plans - hoping that justices will intervene.

The law passed Monday specifically strips the Supreme Court of its power to block government actions and appointments on the basis that they are "unreasonable"

US hiding information on alien craft, says ex intelligence officer

e are not alone — and American authorities are covering up the evidence, a former US intelligence officer told a congressional committee on Wednesday.

David Grusch testified that he "absolutely" believes the government is in possession of unidentified anomalous phenomenon, or UAPs — which has replaced UFO in official parlance — as well as remains of their operators.

Pressed for details in the course of the hearing, Grusch said the US government is hiding information on UAPs not only from the public but from Congress, and that he "personally interviewed" people with direct knowledge of non-human craft. US Representative Tim Burchett supported the idea that the government was concealing information, saying at the opening of the hearing — which also featured testimony from two former Navy officers who said they witnessed UAPs — that "we're going to uncover the cover-up."

But the head of the Pentagon office set up to identify UAPs that pose a potential threat told lawmakers earlier this year it had not identified signs of alien activity.

The All-domain Anomaly Resolution Office "has found no credible evidence thus far of extraterrestrial activity, off-world technology, or objects that defy the known laws of physics," Sean Kirkpatrick testified in April.

The US government has however begun taking the issue of UAPs more seriously in recent years.

NASA held its first public meeting on UAPs in May, calling for a more rigorous scientific approach to clarify the origin of hundreds of mysterious sightings.

The Pentagon also began paying closer attention after a slew of inexplicable sightings from US Navy and Air Force pilots.

fter President Xi Jinping removed Qin Gang from the post of State Councillor and Foreign Minister on Tuesday, Wang Yi is now the most powerful diplomat in China with powerful brief spread across the party as Director, Central Foreign Affairs Commission as well as the government as State Councillor, Special Representative for India-China boundary talks and Foreign Minister of the Middle-Kingdom.

Since the removal of Qin, there has been a series of speculations surrounding his ouster including his serious foreign policy differences with Wang Yi and some salacious gossip about his extra-marital affairs. Some experts attribute Qin's removal to his "wolf warrior" diplomacy with the US.

After talking to diplomats based in Beijing, New Delhi and the US, the Hindustan Times has learnt that no one

really has any idea why the once trusted aide of President Xi Jinping was removed. And whether he will be rehabilitated or sent to the dog house permanently.

What is known that Qin has been replaced by Wang, who can be both a charmer and blunt talker when he wants to be, with special interest in India, Japan and Asia. Qin on the other hand had served as China's ambassador to US for two years and



allen star Qin Gang, emperor Xi Jinping and rising star Wang Yi P - SCMP stoutly defended Chinese aggressive policies in Xinjiang region and against Taiwan.

Despite Qin being absent from public engagements since early July, neither India or any western power has any firm idea about the politics behind his removal. While the secret of Qin's removal is now locked up in the vaults of Communist Party of China, one can only marvel at the opaqueness of the system as no one really has any real answer to Qin's removal with only considered speculations doing the media rounds.

Singapore to hang two drug convicts, including first woman in 20 years



Singapore to execute 45-year-old woman for drug trafficking. P - New Telegraph

Singapore is set to hang two drug convicts this week, including the first woman to be sent to the gallows in nearly 20 years, rights groups said Tues-day, while urging the executions be halted.

Local rights organisation Transformative Justice Collective (TJC) said a 56year-old man convicted of trafficking 50 grams (1.76 ounces) of heroin is scheduled to be hanged on Wednesday at the Southeast Asian city-state's Changi Prison, reports AFP..

A 45-year-old woman convict who TJC identified as Saridewi Djamani is also set to be sent to the gallows on Friday. She was sentenced to death in 2018 for trafficking around 30 grams of heroin. If carried out, she would be the first woman to be executed in Singapore since 2004 when 36-year-old hairdresser Yen May Woen was hanged for drug trafficking, said TJC activist Kokila Annamalai.

Singapore imposes the death penalty for certain crimes, including murder and some forms of kidnapping.

It also has some of the world's toughest anti-drug laws: trafficking more than 500 grams of cannabis and 15 grams of heroin can result in the death penalty.

At least 13 people have been hanged so far since the government resumed executions following a twoyear hiatus in place during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Rights watchdog Amnesty International on Tuesday urged Singapore to halt the impending executions.

Singapore insists that the death penalty is an effective crime deterrent.

Interview: Kugan Parapen, Economist

"Ousting Jugnauth is necessary but not sufficient.

The current system also needs to be ousted"



ugan Parapen is forthcoming as usual in sharing his views concerning both the economic state of the country and the political necessity for change from an MSM government. The former should give real cause for worry as the electoral war-chest spending in the next budget is likely to leave the country high and dry with depleted reserves, persistent inflation and few new economic pillars. As for the necessity of political change at the next general elections, Resistans ek Alternativ has pleaded for a unified Opposition front and a real program of reform of the economy.

Mauritius Times: What's more disquieting about the situation prevailing in the country presently? Is it politics and its habitual villains, or is it about the mis/management of the economy?

Kugan Parapen: In view of what is happening in the country, one would have to say both. In any case, both are intertwined and, to some extent, interdependent. However, while the political arm is hurting opposing forces, the

failing economy is hurting everyone, both pro-government and pro-opposition camps. All in all, each and every citizen of our country has something to worry about at the moment and that certainly does not add up to a feel-good factor.

* More precisely, how do you see the Mauritian economy doing right now, and where will that lead us to?

If, as the Minister of Finance and his acolytes, we take a short-term view of the economy, then there are definitely a few reasons to be positive. Granted that Mauritius has had one of the strongest economic growth periods in its history, is that a sufficient reason for the Minister to indulge in such a pathetic self-glorifying act? Would a boxer who has been knocked out be ecstatic about the fact that he has been able to stand back on his feet? Or would he have been relieved?

By all accounts, Mauritius is slowly but surely getting back on its feet. It's a relief, not an accomplishment! The strong economic rebound witnessed in recent months has to do with the recovery the country has experienced, especially since the tourism industry has reopened. Do you know that the country has still not fully recovered from the Covid-19 related shock? Indeed, the economic output in real terms (i.e., adjusted for inflation) is still below the peak we were at the beginning of 2020.

As per the June 2023 edition of the World Economic Prospects by the World Bank, global economic growth stood at 6.0% in 2021, and halved to 3.1% in 2022. The

forecast for 2023 is only 2.1%. This clearly shows that the post-Covid-19 recovery growth rate is unsustainable. One might argue that the growth rate for Mauritius for 2022 was much higher than the global one and hence Mauritius might be going through some miraculous exceptionalism. The long-awaited economic miracle may be? Unfortunately, that is simply not going to be the case. We need to remember that social restrictions, especially the closure of the country's aerial space, were in place for significantly longer in Mauritius than in most countries. As such, the economic recovery in Mauritius was unsynchronised and delayed.

Which brings us to the budget and Padayachy's whimsical forecasts. While most international institutions forecast a return to trend growth as from the second half of 2023, the Minister of Finance is predicting the same rate of annual economic growth for the financial year 23/24. Could he be right?

We had warned that the MSM was building a political war chest when they raided the coffers of the Bank of Mauritius post-Covid 19. And that has indeed proven to be the case. A significant chunk of the funds transferred from the Central Bank to the central government have not yet been used and have now been earmarked in the last budget to be deployed for significant infrastructural undertakings by the government in the next twelve months. Interestingly, these funds are being deployed as we close in on the end of the mandate of the incumbent government.

While we do not expect the economic growth for the forthcoming year to be anywhere close to the projected rate by the Minister of Finance, we do see a case for growth to remain above trend in the next twelve months if the government manages to execute its projects in time. But the more interesting and pertinent question on our mind remains unanswered - what happens when the political war chest of the MSM is emptied?

While the 2014-2019 budgetary largesses of the MSM were financed by foreign countries, mostly India, the 2019-2024 ones have the footprint of the Bank of Mauritius all over it.

What will be the immediate and long-term consequences, keeping in mind that Agalega and the renegation of the DTAA with India were the price the Republic paid for the 2014-2019 extravagance?

* What about the inflationary outlook? And what does it tell us about the future?

The inflationary outlook for Mauritius is less benign than the rest of the world. In other words, given the recent actions from both the Central Bank and the government, the country could have a long-term inflation overshoot and that is not good news at all. The thing about inflation is that once it becomes unanchored, it is very difficult to bring it back under control. And unfortunately, given the current respective monetary and fiscal stance adopted by the authorities, we see that the risks for inflationary overshoot are very much real.

From a monetary standpoint, we note that the Bank of Mauritius is adopting a rather nonchalant approach to inflation. While most central banks around the world have become very aggressive in their fight against inflation, the

BoM seems to be taking a more relaxed approach. Granted the central bank has hiked interest rates in recent years, but this has been nowhere close to what other central banks have been doing, especially in the developing world.

The prevailing real interest rate in Mauritius is still deeply negative when economic theories posit that the real interest rate should be positive in inflationary times. Under the current situation, the value of all savings in the economy is being eroded and this, consequently, is fueling further economic activity. Is that how you bring inflation under control? No, unless you are a disciple of Erdoganomics.

The Bank of Mauritius views inflationary pressures as being mostly imported and while this is partially true, it should not completely overlook the domestic side of things. If the economy overheats, you can be sure that inflationary pressures will radiate from domestic activities as well.

Talking of overheating, we certainly cannot overlook the role of the central government. The government is

> going all out when it comes to government spending. As we approach the end of the current governmental mandate, Padayachy has taken out his monetary bazookas - the funds usurped from the Bank of Mauritius. As the MSM splurges helicopter money in a bid to get re-elected, the monetisation of the BoM reserves will surely spur inflation even higher than most realise.

> They are hosing the flames of inflation with helicopter money and negative interest rates. How do you think this is going to end?

* The rate of inflation has ebbed considerably in other Indian ocean islands, yet stays high in Mauritius. Isn't our inflation also due in large part to the continuous depreciation of the Rupee against the dollar as chief import currency?

The depreciation of the Rupee has obviously played an important part in stoking inflationary pressures. However, while this was particularly true in the aftermath of the pandemic, when the Mauritian Rupee depreciated significantly over a short period of time, the same cannot be said over recent times.

The Rupee has somewhat stabilised, albeit at very low levels. As such, the base effect of the depreciation is behind us, and the depreciation of the Rupee has currently not much to do with inflationary trends. Should the Rupee depreciate further over coming months/years, then obviously it will contribute to a further erosion in the purchasing power of the local economy.

* Given the high rate of our currency depreciation, how does our economy rate in real terms when that depreciation is accounted for?

The economic growth numbers put forward

66 While we do not expect the economic growth for the forthcoming year to be anywhere close to the projected rate by the Minister of Finance, we do see a case for growth to remain above trend in

by economists are usually always quoted in real terms, that is after adjusting for inflation. The impact of the currency depreciation is also already accounted for. For example, when the Rupee depreciates, the revenue of exploring companies operating in the Mauritian jurisdiction will be positively impacted as these companies earn in foreign currencies. A weaker local currency will hence boost revenue for these exporters as we should not forget that these companies report in local currency terms.

It has typically been implied that a weaker currency helps our economy - while this might have been valid in the past when sugar exports made up the bulk of our exports and our trade balance was positive, this is not the case anymore.

Given that we inevitably import more goods than we export (resulting in a recurrent current account deficit), it follows that a weaker currency has a net negative impact on the economy. However, the burden is far from shared. On the one hand, the exporters reap the benefits of increased revenues in local currency terms, while the consumers, who generally do not own any capital, are made worse off as the cost of imported products increases.

In the absence of local substitutes for many of the imported products/services, the expected rebalancing of the trade imbalance does not materialise and the trade deficit is, at best, unchanged. However, for a country like Mauritius, the terms of trade have significantly deteriorated over time and hence the trade deficit has ballooned, resulting in further erosion of the purchasing power.

One eye-opening exercise is to actually calculate the real growth rate of the Mauritian economy in a hard currency, for example in US Dollars or the Pound Sterling. Having done such an exercise, we have seen that the long-term growth rate of the country when measured in such terms is only around half of what it comes out to when measured in Mauritian Rupees. The notion of a Mauritian miracle gets very flimsy.

* There are also the issues of the liberalisation of the labour market, and the ongoing gentrification amid Smart Cities. What are your thoughts on those issues?

The so-called 'Smart Cities' were never mentioned in any political manifesto. Some may argue that they are private-led enterprises and that, as such, they did not need any popular ratification.

That may be partly true, but let's not forget that these new burgeoning cities are underpinned by major fiscal concessions and an increasingly lax immigration policy. Surely, in any democratic society, the people should have a say on the fiscal and immigration system they desire.

Many say the Budget Speech is only the trailer and that the real deal is the Finance Bill. This assertion has been proven right again. In a budget qualified as of socialist nature by the government, we are left with a very capitalist aftertaste after a careful assessment of the Finance Bill.

Padayachy should explain the socialist rationale behind the liberalisation of the labour market which will allow employers to recruit as many foreign workers as they wish at cut-throat prices because we fail to see how this is in the interest of the general population.

It would also be forthcoming for him to explain the lowered thresholds with respect to the allocation of residence and occupation permits. With respect to the occupation permit, the threshold has gone from USD 250,000 to USD 18,000. At this rate, it is only a matter of time before anyone can come and work or reside in Mauritius.

Let us not forget that Pravind Jugnauth wanted to commodify the citizenship of the Republic in the recent past. While his plan was thwarted after broad disapproval, the underlying philosophy behind the sale of the Mauritian passport is slowly and surely becoming a reality.

The country is undergoing one of its most important transformations. The medium- to long-term ramifications are multiple and will eventually run very deep. Invariably, it will be at the expense of the majority of Mauritians who will increasingly be priced out of the housing market and will experience a more and more onerous life under the tropics. Feel-good factor?

* There's is increasing concern voiced by different commentators about the issue of "mass" emigration of our youth. There may not be available fairly reliable emigration statistics, but it's certainly on the rise. Do we know the real reasons as to why more young people are going away? And should we be worried about that?

awaiting a judgement of the Privy Council in the matter of an election appeal challenging his election

in 2019 for alleged unlawful election promises, and the other who will have to go back for a retrial of his alleged money-laundering case before the Financial Crimes Division. That these two politicians should also be prospective prime ministerial candidates should be very disquieting, isn't it?

Anyone should be allowed to stand as a candidate at an election as long as they are eligible to do so. So, I do not necessarily think that the fact that these two politicians stand for elections as prospective prime ministerial candidates is necessarily disquieting.

What I do find peculiar though is that significant sections of the population will support these two candidates in their quest to become the next Prime Minister no matter what. And this is where the real issue is. Achieving real change in such circumstances is quite a challenge.

* There's more: there are also the cases of a former and a sitting minister as well as a PPS - the first allegedly involved in "forgery of private writing", and the other one together with a PPS subjected to a private prosecution in relation to whatever happened at a Black Label Stag Party. Both are presumed innocent, but what we are being given to witness in various instances is far removed from what governance indicators by international agencies tell us about how we are doing. What do you think?

Taken separately, each case has its particularities and intricacies. But taken collectively, they bear testimony to one of the worst, if not the worst, governments that have ever ruled independent Mauritius. It highlights the dangers of giving absolute power to one political party without appropriate checks and balances.

If we assess the different governments over the last twenty to thirty years, we will see that most of them were led by one dominant party - especially in terms of seats at the National Assembly. Such occurrences seem to provide a fertile breeding ground for all sorts of excesses by majority members. It is high time to rethink the balance of power.

* What's your take on the new opposition alliance that has brought to date the Labour Party, the MMM and the PMSD together? Will that be sufficient to win the next elections?

Such an alliance would likely have walked over any election in the past, but my gut feel is that it will not garner enough adhesion as it stands this time around. The electorate is hungry for a real change and I do not see how a PTr-MMM-PMSD alliance actually delivers the profound change desired. It remains to be seen what they have to offer in terms of policy making but the electorate is today so divided that it is near impossible for this alliance to rally behind it the kind of support it would have done in the past.

This is why Rezistans ek Alternativ has called for a unified opposition front for the upcoming elections. The reasoning behind this proposal is two-fold. First and foremost, to oust Jugnauth and its MSM from power. And second, to deliver the profound democratic changes sought by the electorate. Ousting Jugnauth is necessary but not sufficient. The current system also needs to be ousted.

The Black Man's Burden?

Under the caption, 'We don't want another Mauritius here', the *Sunday Post* of Nairobi of the 25th of January, carried an article in reply to Mr Jamal Din's, by Mr A.J. Simpson, a European farmer, in which he argues, in a most indecent, vitriolic, and vituperative language, that the Asians' claim for land for their growing population should not be granted. His arguments can be summed up as follows: only granted the Asian unrestricted immigration but gave him full rights in the land and in the Government."

"It would appear that Mauritius is on the verge of utter poverty, squalor and disease — if the Asian were given rights in the European Land Reserve in Kenya, in a short space of time the same conditions would be produced with falling living standards and gradual decadence, so that they would be a liability to the state."

Asians were not "allowed" to go to Kenya. Rather, they allowed themselves to provide **cheap labour** for

(a) Asians were only allowed to come to Kenya and should now either go back to their homeland or cut down their population by means of birth control - Mr Simpson had observed "over the many years in the past" the "enormous hordes of children in schools and playgrounds and the "innumerable indications of many more on the way." The Asians "are about to suffer for their folly, and, on the pretext that land cultivation is the main occupation that this country has to offer them, they think that the solution to the problem of their daily increasing numbers and of their excess population is to seek some method of sneaking into and encroaching upon the 'European Land Reserves', well-knowing that these reserves will be fully required by the steadily increasing European population who have been tending them for years past."

(b) Asians would lower the living standard as they have done in Mauritius where they are now driving out the Europeans. — "If Asians were allowed into the 'European Reserve' or grazing area, it would reduce Kenya to the same sorry state as Mauritius. There the British Government, not realising the great danger not the Europeans who have made money and grown fat at their expense - at the expense of their blood, tears, toil and sweat. Now that the Asian, through his own human efforts, has made a position for himself, he is told to go back home. Why should he? If he has to go, so has the European got to go back to Europe! What right has he to stay there as in any other places in the whole world where he is known to have gone, and always as a master, never as a manual worker. Might is no longer Right not in this enlightened world of the 20th century. There is no more jungle law whereby the "survival of the fittest" is apathetically tolerated: there are human rights. But let us quote a great European in Africa who understood the problem clearly and correctly: "It is not the vices of the Indians (Asians) that Europeans in this country fear but their virtues."

But Mr Simpson proceeds further to say that he too wants his land for his **steadily growing population**. So where is the harm in an Asiatic wanting space? Is a European more human, and must he have **more human rights** than the Asiatic? Well, one should mind one's glass house, don't you agree?

Let us turn to the Asians in this tiny little island of ours. We must inform Mr Simpson that no European has as yet been driven out of Mauritius. How can Asians do so when Mr Simpson's kind own all the big sugar factories and almost all the land, the banks and all the big business of the island? Asians are the jackals slaving for the lions here. We admit that there is poverty and disease — Asians are not intransigent, but tolerant and humble enough to admit — but these are the direct outcome of oppression through cheap labour for which the British government is responsible.

This island, as Mr Simpson ought to know, is a **British colony**. And where else can jackals live but in squalor! Doesn't the lion inhabit the cleaner parts of the forest and isn't he always so conscious of his superiority? Mr Simpson, unwittingly - or is it deliberately? — , lets it out that **he believes in the superiority of his** race in saying that the British Government here gave full rights to the Asian both "in land and in the government". He definitely thinks he has to have more rights, perhaps because he is a white man, and **less burden**, much as he would like to show (to the black or brown man, of course) that he shares the "white man's burden".

It's now the in-place where world Expos or other Meetings, Incentives, Conferences, and Exhibitions (MICE) events will attract a full posse of our Ministers unabashedly riding there in first-class Emirati flights, generous per-diems and posh hotels we pay for in every ounce of VAT extracted from even the poorest at gas stations and supermarkets.

One wonders what our ruling political class and our Attorney-General would make of news emerging from the city-state where a senior minister, Subramaniam Iswaran, Singapore's Minister for Trade and Industry, was forced to resign after being arrested and charged last week in a corruption probe, the first in four decades to be implicated in such an investigation. And, heaven forbid, that on this Monday, two lawmakers - one of them once tipped as a potential prime minister and current Speaker of Parliament Tan Chuan-Jin, 54, and fellow lawmaker Cheng Li Hui, 47, resigned from the party and the legislature over their "inappropriate relationship" after it was revealed they were involved in an extramarital affair!

"We will be upfront and transparent," Deputy Prime Minister Lawrence Wong responded quickly. "We will not sweep anything under the carpet, even if they are potentially embarrassing or damaging." The island is scheduled to hold a general election by 2025, though polls could be held earlier. Dr Michael Barr, an Australia-based international relations professor who has written several books on Singapore's politics pointed out to the BBC : "Without extraordinary levels of public trust, the Singaporean government must rely on one of two things to win elections: either repression and other measures that subvert democracy, or a high level of performance-based legitimacy. Their record in recent years is such that we can forget about performance legitimacy."

As possible co-participants in some future international event, maybe PM Pravind Kumar Jugnauth could share some valuable snippets with Singaporean PM Lee Hsien Loong on how to tackle that tricky election or for that matter, how his MSM government treats blatant corruption, nepotism, incompetence, governance under our shores...

virst I would like to offer my sympathy to Nicolas, Chloé and to all those grieving the loss of a brother, a brother-in-law, an uncle, a friend, a colleague, the poet, the long time contributor to Mauritius Times, the engaged citizen who cared enough to share in black and white relentlessly ideas and hopes.

In the late 1950s, more than sixty decades ago a young Father Henri Souchon launched the movement of 'L'Entité mauricienne' calling to unite the diverse ethnic communities of the island. Whither Meritocracy & **Honesty in Civil** Service?

n a recent newspaper interview, former Senior Chief Executive Asha Burrenchobay talks about the extent to which nepotism, sinecure, over-manning, waste and corruption have become rampant and have contributed to balloon the 2023/24 budget to some Rs 200B. Given the prevailing situation, couldn't the administration be run with a 25% budget reduction without compromising the quality of services? Many think it is possible to do so.

To run the colonial administration, the British had recourse to UK-trained locals. (In India, the East India Company recruited top graduates from a select few British universities to run the administration.) Later, they set up Royal Colleges and other universities manned by qualified British citizens to inculcate European standards among the native recruits. They succeeded in creating in the Indian sub-continent a level of service they copied from Britain. Mauritius too had mandarins of the calibre of Simpson and other foreign-trained local talents who excelled during the transition from colonial rule to independent Mauritius.

However, a few decades after independence, the rot started to penetrate the service. With regime change in 1982 the country started witnessing a backsliding of meritocracy in favour of nepotism where merit was thrown out by the window. Many with top qualifications and who had passed the competitive entry exams with flying colours were side-lined or fired in alleged public interest to be replaced by others for political or ideological reasons.

When meritocracy is thrown out of the window, isn't 'honesty' the logical collateral victim? It's no wonder that reports of fraud and corruption have become commonplace today, and perhaps reaching d its zenith during the Covid-19 pandemic which turned out to be a godsend for a few, as evidenced by the subsequent scandals and dilapidation of public funds (Pack & Blister and Molnupiravir scandals.

Downscaling meritocracy is frustrating, counterproductive and against the public interest. In Singapore ever since Lee Kwan Yew's time, emphasis has been laid on meritocracy irrespective of ethnicity. This, coupled with rewards and punishments, has made Singapore the envy of the rest of the world. In Mauritius, the scourge of corruption has become so frustrating that many of the younger generation are seeking greener pastures overseas.

After the departure of the SSR government in 1982 and the ensuing state capture of institutions that followed, the service has been in decline; witness the squandering of scarce public resources with impunity despite recurrent Audit Reports. Salvation lies in the promotion of accountability, efficiency, meritocracy and honesty if we want to raise the standard of the service and put a stop to the recurrent waste of resources. Non-disclosure of information in Parliament would suggest that the authorities do not want to let the cat out of bag.

The new nuclear arms race

Although the world's nuclear powers agree "a nuclear war cannot be won and must never be fought", there are still about 12,500 nuclear warheads on the planet. This number is growing, and the power of those bombs is infinitely greater than the ones dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

According to the United Nations' disarmament chief, the risk of nuclear war is greater than at any time since the end of the Cold War. The nine nuclear-armed states (Britain, France, India, Pakistan, North Korea and Israel, as well as the big three) all appear to be modernising their arsenals. Several deployed new nuclear-armed or nuclear-capable weapons systems in 2022.



The US is upgrading its "triad" of ground, air and submarine launched nukes, while Russia is reportedly working on submarine delivery of "doomsday" nuclear torpedoes capable of causing destructive tidal waves.

While Russia and the US possess about 90% of the world's nuclear weapons, other countries are expanding quickly. China's arsenal is projected to grow from 410 warheads in 2023 to maybe 1,000 by the end of this decade.

Only Russia and the US were subject to bilateral controls over the buildup of such weapons, but Russian president Vladimir Putin suspended the arrangement. Beyond the promise of non-proliferation, the other nuclear-armed countries are not subject to any other international controls, including relatively simple measures to prevent accidental nuclear war.

Other nations – those with hostile, belligerent and nuclear-armed neighbours showing no signs of disarming – must increasingly wonder why they should continue to show restraint and not develop their own nuclear deterrent capacities.

The threat of autonomous weaponry

Meanwhile, other potential military threats are also emerging – arguably with even less scrutiny or regulation than the world's nuclear arsenals. In particular, artificial intelligence (AI) is sounding alarm bells.

Al is not without its benefits, but it also presents many risks when applied to weapons systems. There have been numerous warnings from developers about the unforeseeable consequences and potential existential threat posed by true digital intelligence. As the Centre for Al Safety put it: Mitigating the risk of extinction from AI should be a global priority alongside other societal-scale risks such as pandemics and nuclear war.

More than 90 countries have called for a legally binding instrument to regulate AI technology, a position supported by the UN Secretary General, the International Committee of the Red Cross and many non-governmental organisations.

But despite at least a decade of negotiation and expert input, a treaty governing the development of "lethal autonomous weapons systems" remains elusive.

Plagues and pathogens

Similarly, there is a fundamental lack of regulation governing the growing number of laboratories capable of holding or making (accidentally or intentionally) harmful or fatal biological materials.

There are 51 known biosafety level-4 (BSL-4) labs in 27 countries – double the number that existed a decade ago. Another 18 BSL-4 labs are due to open in the next few years.

While these labs, and those at the next level down, generally maintain high safety standards, there is no mandatory obligation that they meet international standards or allow routine compliance inspections.

Finally, there are fears the World Health Organization's new pandemic preparedness treaty, based on lessons from the COVID-19 disaster, is being watered down.

As with every potential future threat, it seems, international law and regulation are left scrambling to catch up with the march of technology – to govern what Oppenheimer called "the relations between science and common sense".

Novel school improvement program can raise teaching quality while reducing inequality

A multi-national European study, looking at over 5,500 students, has found that a novel school intervention program can not only improve the mathematics scores of primary school children from disadvantaged areas, but can also lessen the achievement gap caused by socioeconomic status.

Known as the Dynamic Approach to School Improvement (DASI), the program is based on the latest findings in educational research.

Rather than a one-size-fits-all, topdown approach, DASI works by first assessing a school to identify the specific teaching areas that could be improved and then implementing targeted measures to improve them. This process involves all members of the school community, including teachers, pupils and parents, with support from a specialized Advisory and Research Team.

Several studies have already shown that DASI can improve student learning progress and academic outcomes, but this latest study, published in 'Educational Research', is the first to have been conducted on schools in disadvantaged areas.

Furthermore, DASI was specifically designed to enhance both academic quality and equity, by countering non-



school factors that can influence pupils' academic outcomes, including socioeconomic status, gender and ethnicity.

The effectiveness of this aspect of DASI had also not been tested before until this new study, led by a team of researchers from Cyprus and the Netherlands, led by Prof Leonidas Kyriakides at the University of Cyprus.

After enrolling 72 primary schools, including some 5,560 pupils from disadvantaged areas in four countries --Cyprus, Greece, England and Ireland -the researchers randomly assigned the schools to experimental and control groups. Those in the experimental group made use of DASI for an entire school year, while those in the control groups were offered support to develop their own improvement programs.

Pupils aged between nine and 12 at the schools were given mathematics tests at both the start of the school year and the end to assess the effect of DASI over that time. The researchers chose to assess mathematical ability because previous studies have shown that mathematics tends to respond better than any other subject to school improvement programs. The researchers also recorded the socioeconomic status, gender and ethnicity of the pupils.

At the beginning of the year, all the pupils in the 72 schools achieved a similar range of scores on the mathematics tests, and showed similar achievement gaps based on socioeconomic status, gender and ethnicity. In contrast, at the end of the year, pupils in the schools that received DASI achieved better results on the mathematics test than those in the control group, and this was seen in all four countries.

Furthermore, the achievement gap based on socioeconomic status reduced in the schools that received DASI but stayed the same in the control group, although DASI didn't have any effect on the achievement gap based on gender or ethnicity.

However, despite the fall in the achievement gap for socioeconomic status, the authors admit that DASI appears to be more effective at enhancing quality than equity. They suggest that more research needs to be done to identify policies and actions that address equity in a more comprehensive way, so that DASI can lessen the achievement gap based on gender and ethnicity as well.



What happens when you flush a toilet on a plane?

Unlike our toilets at home, plane toilets have to 'suck' the waste with a vacuum system. But don't worry, it doesn't get released into the air.

Live to be the sever system along with a blue chemical that cleans and removes odours every time you flush.

A smelly tank

The waste and blue cleaning fluid ends up in a storage tank under the floor, in the very back of the cargo hold of the aeroplane. With so many people on the plane using the toilets, you can imagine how big the storage tank is!

The system is designed very much like the vacuum cleaners we use around the house to remove dirt and dust from our floors. This dirt and dust ends up in a container that we empty into a garbage bin. Similarly, the aeroplane's toilets need the vacuum pressure system to move all the waste from the toilet into the plumbing pipe that connects the toilet to the storage tank, and finally into the tank.

There is a valve on the storage tank that opens when a toilet is flushed and closes when the toilet is not in use – to prevent odours from leaving the tank. This helps to keep the smell down from so many people using the toilet during a flight. The blue chemical helps to keep the smell down as well.

Where does it go once the plane lands?

A special truck comes to the aircraft after it lands and connects a hose to remove the waste and blue cleaning chemical into a storage tank on the truck. The truck plugs



a hose into the airplane's waste tank valve and removes all of the waste into the tank on the back of the truck.

The truck then takes the waste to a special area at the airport reserved for the waste from all aeroplanes, and the toilet waste is emptied into the sewer system for that airport. The training to operate the truck takes three days.

Watch out for blue ice

It has also been reported that sometimes, particularly on older planes, the valve where the waste truck connects to the aeroplane can leak a small amount of the waste and blue chemical. This turns to ice as the temperature at normal cruising altitude of 30,000 feet is normally around -56°C and the chemical turns to "blue ice". This blue ice remains attached to the plane as long as the temperature remains below freezing.

Once the aeroplane begins to descend to land at the destination airport, the blue ice begins to thaw and may even fall off. There have been several occasions reported in the news where people have witnessed this flying poo!

In case you were wondering, the captain of the plane doesn't have a button to release the waste from the storage tank while the plane is flying. Any waste that might leak out of the plane would be totally accidental.

Some people do think aeroplane contrails (the white lines planes sometimes leave in the sky) are either a special mind-control chemical or toilet waste. This is not true! What you are actually seeing are water vapours coming from the engine becoming ice crystals – like a thin cloud in the sky.

Smiling also helps lower heart rates faster once your stressful situation ends.

Sniff Some Lavender: Certain scents like lavender may soothe. In one study, nurses who pinned small vials of lavender oil to their clothes felt their stress ease, while nurses who didn't felt more stressed. Lavender may intensify the effect of some painkillers and anti-anxiety medications, so if you're taking either, check with your doctor before use.

Tune In: Heading into a stressful

situation? Music can help you calm down. In one study, people had lower levels of the stress hormone cortisol when they listened to a recording of relaxing music before doing something stressful (like doing math out loud or giving a speech) than when they listened to a recording of rippling water.

Reboot Your Breath: Feeling less stressed is as close as your next breath. Focusing on your breath curbs your body's "fight or flight" reaction to pressure or fear, and it pulls your attention away from negative thoughts. Sit comfortably in a quiet place. Breathe in slowly through your nose, letting your chest and lower belly rise and your abdomen expand. Breathe out just as slowly, repeating a word or phrase that helps you relax. To reap the most benefit,

repeat for at least 10 minutes.

Be Kind to Yourself: We all have a constant stream of thoughts running through our heads, and sometimes what we tell ourselves isn't so nice. Staying positive and using compassionate self-talk will help you calm down and get a better grip on the situation. Talk to yourself in the same gentle, encouraging way you'd help a friend in need. "Everything will be OK," for instance, or "I'll figure out how to handle this."

Write Your Stress Away: Jotting down your thoughts can be a great emotional outlet. Once they're on paper, you can start working out a plan to resolve them. It doesn't matter whether you prefer pen and notebook, a phone app, or a file on your laptop. The important thing is that you're honest about your feelings.

Tell a Friend: When you're feeling overwhelmed, seek out the company of a friend or loved one. Have a friend who's dealing with the same worries as you? Even more reason to open up. You'll both feel less alone.

Get Moving: When you work up a sweat, you improve your mood, clear your head, and take a break from whatever is stressing you out. Whether you like a long walk or an intense workout at the gym, you'll feel uplifted afterward.

take flight mentally and experience new insights when we rise above our habitual ways of thinking.

As earthbound beings, humans have always had a fascination with winged creatures of all kinds. The idea of being able to spontaneously lift off from the earth and fly is so compelling to us that we invented airplanes and helicopters and myriad other flying machines in order to provide ourselves with the many gifts of being airborne. Flying high in the sky, we look down on the earth that is our home and see things from an entirely different perspective. We can see more, and we can see farther than we can when we're on the ground. As if all this weren't enough, the outof-this-world feeling of freedom that comes with groundlessness inspires us to want to take flight again and again.

Metaphorically, we take flight whenever we break free of the gravity that holds us to a particular way of thinking or feeling or being. We take flight mentally when we rise above our habitual ways of thinking about things and experience new insights. This is what it means to open our minds. Emotionally, we take flight when the strength of our passion exceeds the strength of our blockages; the floodgates open and we are free to feel fully. Spiritually we take flight when we locate that part of ourselves that is beyond the constraint of linear time and the world of form. It is in this place that we experience the essential boundlessness that defines the experience of flight.
