



Reflections on the 189th Anniversary of Slavery Abolition

A Renewed Call for Social Justice

s Mauritius has commemorated the 189th anniversary of the abolition of slavery this week, it is imperative to reflect on the strides made towards truth and justice. The establishment of the Truth and Justice Commission (TJC) in April 2008 marked a significant step in investigating the historical injustices of slavery and indentured labour during colonial times. It's worth remembering that the institution of the Commission itself upset some quarters, as confirmed by historian Vijaya Teelock, who was one of its members.

In an earlier interview to this paper, she stated: 'We cannot reverse history, but we could at least have started implementing recommendations had the Truth and Justice Commission continued to carry on its work. But it was clear we had upset many people, and many wanted it shut down as soon as possible at the time. The proof is the almost immediate closure of access by public to the documents they require to build up their case. Who gave the orders at that time to shut down and block access and not even submit all 6 reports to the National Assembly? Why were the 100 copies printed never distributed to the public libraries and other institutions?'

Nevertheless, the TJC's report prompted discussions on the actions the government should take in response to its recommendations. While the report is voluminous and warrants careful examination, there was a collective hope that implementable measures would be pursued, particularly those aimed at improving the lives of those affected.

Acknowledging that not all recommendations may to this day be practical to implement, the government's focus on actionable items that can make a tangible difference is crucial. Already, steps have been taken in line with some of the Commission's suggestions. The introduction of the Equal Opportunities Act has been a significant stride towards fostering fair social justice in Mauritius.

However, the expectation of monetary compensations for descendants of slaves has been met with complexities. The Commission unearthed evidence of atrocities committed by the Church, the Chamber of Commerce, and the sugar industry, calling for public apologies. Yet, the response has been hesitant, with representatives using spokespersons to address the issue. The Commission refrained from recommending direct monetary compensations due to identification challenges in tracing descendants. While acknowledging the impracticality of pinpointing guilty parties, it empha-

sized the enduring moral and physical damage inflicted by historical slavery and indentured labour practices.

The Commission extended its call for justice to the colonial governments of Holland, France, and Britain, urging them to apologize for their roles in perpetuating inhuman practices. Importantly, these countries were also urged to provide material support for initiatives that directly enhance living conditions and social opportunities for the descendants of slaves and indentured labourers in Mauritius. This aligns with the broader goal of implementing a system of "social justice for all."

The task of restoring decent living conditions to affected communities necessitates empowering them through various means. This involves improved housing conditions and access to specialized technical training, and the contributions of some government agencies remain pivotal in translating these recommendations into tangible actions that uplift the socio-economic status of those historically marginalized.

One glaring issue highlighted by the Commission is and remains to this day the absence of dedicated leadership, particularly at the grassroots level. Leadership, extending beyond the political or ecclesiastical realms, must permeate the family unit, serving as the nucleus for cultivating enduring values. The family's role in shaping the future, guiding children purposefully and instilling discipline has to be emphasized. While government influence is indirect at this micro-level, individuals' direct efforts become essential for societal development.

Challenges persist, and some affected communities face obstacles in overcoming the lingering effects of historical exploitation. The need for a dedicated leadership that transcends political and ecclesiastical spheres is as valid today as ever. Families must serve as bastions of support, guiding the new generation towards a future where barriers are broken. A micro-level focus on adaptation and self-improvement is crucial for development.

As Mauritius reflects on the 189th anniversary of slavery abolition, the Truth, and Justice Commission's report, which brought to light the enduring impact of historical injustices, has to be revisited. Its call for truth, justice, and social empowerment resonates not only with affected communities but with the broader vision of a Mauritius that embraces social justice for all. It is through tangible actions, focused leadership, and an unwavering commitment to uplift marginalized communities that the island nation can truly embody well-being and prosperity for all its citizens.



Rebuilding of Ram Mandir: Welcome to Kalchakra

t has been no surprise that, in the wake of the rebuilding of the Ram Mandir at Ayodhya, there has been a flurry of arti-

cles in both the Western and Indian media from the pens of the left-illiberal cabal that is openly anti-Hindu, anti-India and anti-Modi. Their agenda is only too well-known and has not escaped the scrutiny of intellectuals and seasoned analysts both in the West (among others David Frawley, Jeffrey Armstrong, Maria Wirth) and in India who are equally sharp and vigilant and have countered with evidence-backed arguments the inanities that are spewed by the former.

The thoroughness of their reporting shows that the scribes of that cabal are very astute and are aware of all the facts and the evidence - e.g. the definitive verdict of the Supreme Court of India and the archaeological discoveries at the Ramjanmabhoomi site. However, prejudiced as they are by the malicious agenda embedded in their minds, they prefer to ignore facts, distort them, add falsehoods: classic misinformation and disinformation. The Indian sleuths who track them, especially their compatriots who collaborate with foreign counterparts, have exposed how generously rewarded the former are for colluding to propagate a narrative that portrays everything about India in a negative light.

They are not succeeding.

Because they have nothing new and substantial to propose. In their playbook are the repetitive, old, and tiresome clichés: multiculturalism/secu-

larism, majoritarianism, lynching and oppression of minorities especially Muslims, Hindu fundamentalism, Hindutva, right-wing, autocracy — all meant to create communal tension and civil unrest by inventing faultlines. For good measure they throw in the disproved Aryan Invasion myth and the North-South divide premised on the so-called Dravidian theory, equally debunked by intellectuals and experts, both old and young, such as Dr Subramaniam Swamy and Constitutional lawyer J. Sai Deepak who are from South India.

These two concepts suited the British rulers who weaponised them to divide and rule over Indians. Thus, race was substituted for adjective and geography: arya meaning noble, and Dravida referring to South India. Dr Subramaniam Swamy has explained how of the four South Indian states, Kerala, Karnataka, and Andhra Pradesh rejected it, but that Tamil Nadu fell victim to it during British rule. Its latter-day form is the Marxist DMK, which is now being seriously and vigorously challenged by a fine and articulate young intellectual and activist, K. Annamalai. dence days, and that never came to be. In fact, several thinkers in India feel that there is no need to formalize a Hindu Rashtra, which already exists de facto. Because of which India is what it is: a stable democracy (the largest and possibly the oldest in the world), Bharat Mata which harbours innumerable communities of all religious persuasions, speaking over 800 languages and dialects, with a unifying spiritual thread upon which are strung a bewildering diversity of cultures, that has been in existence for millennia and survived numerous barbaric onslaughts including the one that demolished the existing Ram Mandir in 1528/29 (hence its re-building and

Dépossession des terres : un problème non résolu

n cette période où nous célébrons le 189e anniversaire de l'abolition de l'esclavage, il est essentiel de se pencher sur une question cruciale qui demeure irrésolue à Maurice: celle de la dépossession des terres. Alors que nous commémorons cet événement historique, il convient de se rappeler qu'une Truth and Justice Commission (Commission Vérité et Justice - CVJ) fut instaurée en avril 2008, avec pour mission de révéler les réalités de l'esclavage et du travail sous contrat des immigrants indiens à Maurice pendant la période colo-

Le rapport de cette commission fut soumis au Président de la République à la fin de novembre 2011, suscitant une attente quant aux actions que le gouvernement allait entreprendre à la lumière de ses recommandations. Face à une question posée par l'opposition en décembre 2011 sur les mesures envisagées, la réponse fut que, le rapport étant volumineux, il était souhaitable d'en examiner le contenu avant d'entreprendre des actions jugées nécessaires.

Cependant, depuis lors, peu de progrès ont été accomplis, à l'exception de la création d'un comité interministériel présidé par le vice-PM et ministre des Finances d'alors, Xavier-Luc Duval, chargé d'examiner la mise en œuvre des recommandations de la CVJ. Le comité interministériel était aussi composé des ministres Abu Kasenally (Terres et Logement), Sheila Bappoo (Sécurité sociale), Nicolas Von Mally (Rodrigues), Mukesh Choonee (Arts et Culture), SurenDayal (Intégration so-ciale), Mireille Martin (Egalité des Genres) et Yatin Varma (Attorney General).

La question se pose alors: quelles avancées concrètes ont été réalisées dans la poursuite de la justice sociale et de l'équité, telles que préconisées par la commission?

La CVJ a mis en lumière les souffrances des anciens esclaves, des travailleurs indiens sous contrat et de leurs descendants, mettant en évidence le rôle d'individus sans scrupules tels que des notaires, des arpenteurs et d'autres intermédiaires qui ont arraché les biens de ceux qui ne pouvaient se défendre contre la machine légale et commerciale.

Pourtant, malgré ces révélations, la commission n'a pas recommandé de compensation monétaire en raison

de la difficulté d'identifier les descendants des esclaves aujourd'hui. De plus, la complexité de prouver la culpabilité de ceux qui détiennent d'immenses fortunes héritées de pratiques douteuses complique davantage la situation, surtout avec le changement de propriété légale des terres

Bien que la question puisse être qualifiée de complexe sur le plan juridique, il est impératif que les gouvernements respectent leurs obligations constitutionnelles et morales en faveur de la justice, de l'équité et de l'éqalité. Ignorer cette responsabilité risque de pousser les victimes de la dépossession des terres à des mesures extrêmes, comme l'ont fait par le passé certains individus, dont Clency Harmon, qui ont entamé des grèves de la faim pour attirer l'attention du gouvernement.

L'actualité a remis sur le devant de la scène la question de la dépossession des terres, avec des actions en justice contre certaines grosses entreprises opérant dans l'industrie sucrière. Les familles, comme celle des Kisnorbo, allèguent avoir été dépossédées des terres qui appartenaient à leurs ancêtres. Ce problème, souligné dans le rapport de la CVJ, continue de hanter la conscience collective, appelant à une réparation et à une justice qui tardent à se manifester.

D'autres cas, tels que celui de la famille Kisnorbo, témoignent des difficultés rencontrées dans la recherche de réparation pour les injustices passées. La question de la prescription, qui limite le temps pendant lequel une action en justice peut être intentée, est un obstacle sup-

"L'année dernière, nous avons exprimé une inquiétude accrue en déplaçant l'horloge à 90 secondes avant minuit, le plus proche de la catastrophe mondiale qu'elle ait jamais été", a déclaré Rachel Bronson, PDG du groupe Bulletin. "Les risques de l'année dernière persistent avec une véhémence inchangée et continuent de façonner cette année."

À partir de 1947, le groupe de défense a utilisé une horloge pour symboliser le potentiel, voire la probabilité, que les gens fassent quelque chose pour mettre fin à l'humanité. Après la fin de la guerre froide, elle était aussi proche que 17 minutes avant minuit. Au cours des dernières années, pour faire face aux changements mondiaux rapides, le groupe est passé du compte à rebours des minutes avant minuit au compte à rebours des secondes.

Le groupe a déclaré que l'horloge pourrait être reculée si les dirigeants et les nations travaillaient ensemble, notant spécifiquement les pays puissants ayant la capacité de le faire, notamment les États-Unis, la Chine et la Russia

Cette déclaration du "Doomsday Clock" met en lumière les menaces graves qui pèsent sur notre planète, notamment la guerre nucléaire, les catastrophes climatiques et les risques liés à l'intelligence artificielle. Les références à la guerre en Ukraine et aux événements au Moyen-Orient soulignent la nature mondiale de ces menaces. La mention spécifique des États-Unis, de la Chine et de la Russie souligne la responsabilité des grandes puissances mondiales dans la résolution de ces problèmes cruciaux pour l'avenir de l'humanité.

Indice mondial de la corruption 2023 de Transparency International

Maurice devance avec un score de 51, tandis que Madagascar obtient 25 et les Seychelles obtiennent 71

ransparency International a dévoilé l'Indice de Perception de la Corruption (IPC) de 2023 mardi dernier, révélant une liste des pays les plus corrompus au monde. Le rapport a souligné des progrès minimes dans la lutte contre la corruption dans le secteur public, la moyenne mondiale de l'IPC restant inchangée à 43 pour la douzième année consécutive.

Le rapport indique ceci: «L'Indice de Perception de la Corruption (IPC) de 2023 publié par Transparency International montre que la plupart des pays n'ont fait que peu ou pas de progrès dans la lutte contre la corruption dans le secteur public.»

Plus de deux tiers des 180 pays classés ont obtenu un score inférieur à 50 sur l'échelle, indiquant une préva-

lence de la corruption. L'IPC évalue les nations en fonction de leur niveau perçu de corruption dans le secteur public, allant de zéro (très corrompu) à 100 (très propre).

Le rapport ajoute: «Selon l'Indice de l'État de Droit. le monde connaît un déclin du fonctionnement des systèmes judiciaires. Les pays obtenant les scores les plus bas dans cet indice obtiennent également des scores très bas sur l'IPC, soulignant une connexion claire entre l'accès à la justice et la corruption. Les régimes autoritaires et les dirigeants démocratiques qui sapent la justice contribuent à accroître l'impunité pour la corruption et,

dans certains cas, l'encouragent même en supprimant les conséquences pour les contrevenants.»

Quels sont les pays les moins corrompus?

Pour la sixième année consécutive, le Danemark occupe la première position du classement avec un score de 90 en raison de ses «systèmes judiciaires bien fonctionnels».

Suivent de près la Finlande et la Nouvelle-Zélande aux deuxième et troisième positions avec des scores respectifs de 87 et 85.

Cette année, les 10 premiers pays du classement incluent la Norvège (84), Singapour (83), la Suède (82), la Suisse (82), les Pays-Bas (79), l'Allemagne (78) et le

Luxembourg (78).

Quels sont les pays les plus corrompus?

Occupant les dernières places du classement figurent la Somalie (11), le Venezuela (13), la Syrie (13), le Soudan du Sud (13) et le Yémen (16). Ces pays sont tous touchés par des crises prolongées, principalement des conflits armés.

Le Nicaragua (17), la Corée du Nord (17), Haïti (17), la Guinée équatoriale (17), le Turkménistan (18) et la Libye (18) sont les suivants dans le bas du classement.

Pays ayant décliné et progressé dans le classement

Depuis 2018, les scores de l'IPC de 12 pays ont notablement diminué. Parmi eux se trouvent des pays de divers niveaux de revenus, y compris des nations à faible et moyen revenus comme le Salvador (31), le Honduras (23), le Libéria (25), le Myanmar (20), le Nicaragua (17), le Sri Lanka (34) et le Venezuela (13). De plus, des économies à revenu intermédiaire supérieur et élevé telles que l'Argentine (37), l'Autriche (71), la Pologne (54), la Turquie (34) et le Royaume-Uni (71) ont également connu un déclin de leurs scores de l'IPC.

Pendant la même période, huit pays ont vu une amélioration de leurs scores à l'Indice de Perception de la Corruption. Ces pays incluent l'Irlande (77), la Corée du Sud (63), l'Arménie (47), le Vietnam (41), les Maldives (39), la Moldavie (42), l'Angola (33) et l'Ouzbékistan (33).

L'Inde occupe la 93e position avec un score de 39, selon le rapport de Transparency International. Le score global de l'Inde est resté relativement stable, étant de 40 en 2022, lui valant la 85e position.

Pendant ce temps, le Pakistan, avec un score de 29, et le Sri Lanka (34) ont lutté avec leurs fardeaux de dette respectifs et l'instabilité politique qui en a résulté, indique le rapport.

Parmi les voisins de l'Inde, l'Afghanistan et le Myanmar ont obtenu un score de 20, la Chine a obtenu 42, le Japon a obtenu 73 et le Bangladesh a obtenu 24.

Quant à Maurice, le pays a obtenu un score de 51, devançant Madagascar (25), alors que les Seychelles, dont le président Wavel Ramkalawan fut l'invité d'honneur des commémorations du 189e anniversaire de l'abolition de l'esclavage au Morne hier, ont obtenu un score de 71.

En tout cas, ces résultats soulignent la nécessité pour chaque nation de maintenir une vigilance constante dans la lutte contre la corruption, indiquant que même les pays les mieux classés ne sont pas à l'abri des défis persistants en matière de transparence et d'intégrité

Prix des carburants

La baisse du prix de l'essence, une pomme de discorde

es prix des carburants (essence et diesel) continuent de provoquer la grogne chez les consommateurs en ces temps d'inflation galopante (10% au moins). À compter du 28 janvier dernier, le prix de l'essence a connu une baisse de Rs 2,80 par litre, passant de Rs 69 à Rs 66,20. Toutefois, cette diminution de prix ne semble toujours pas satisfaire les consommateurs, qui la jugent trop faible par rapport à la tendance baissière des prix du pétrole sur le marché mondial depuis mi-2022.

En effet, comme les consommateurs le soulignent avec raison, et ce, depuis un certain temps déjà, il n'y a pas toujours de corrélation directe entre les prix locaux des carburants et les prix mondiaux du pétrole. Les prix locaux des carburants augmentent toujours suite à une hausse des prix mondiaux, ce qui indique une corrélation positive.

En revanche, les prix locaux ne baissent pas suffisamment souvent, voire ne baissent pas du tout parfois, en cas de baisse des prix mondiaux, ce qui indique une corrélation négative. Il est clair que l'évolution des prix locaux ne suit pas la logique commerciale du marché mondial où les prix augmentent ou baissent selon la loi de l'offre et de la demande.

Ainsi, sur le marché mondial, le prix de référence du pétrole (prix Brent) est passé de 118,10 \$ par baril le 28 juin 2022 à 70,79 \$ par baril le 22 janvier 2024, soit une baisse de 33%. Or, à Maurice, le prix de l'essence par litre est passé de Rs 74,10 à Rs 69 durant cette période, soit une baisse de seulement 7%.

En examinant la composition des prix des carburants, on constate une grande différence entre le prix d'importation CAF (Coût, Assurance, Fret) et le prix de

vente à la pompe. Le Tableau 1 montre les différents éléments qui entrent dans la composition du prix au détail. On constate que la valeur CAF est de Rs 30,46 sur le prix de vente de Rs 66,20 par litre, soit 45%. La différence est principalement représentée par des facteurs qui n'ont aucun rapport avec les coûts d'importation et d'exploitation de la STC.

Ces facteurs étrangers comprennent les taxes (Taxe d'accise et VAT) et les différentes contributions prélevées sur les prix de vente pour divers besoins de financement, tels que la contribution à la Road Development Authority (RDA), la contribution

aux frais de transport à Rodrigues, la contribution pour la construction de facilités de stockage, et la subvention sur les denrées de base (riz, farine, gaz naturel).

La dernière baisse de Rs 2,80 par litre d'essence représente une réduction du prix de vente de 4,1%. Comme indiqué au Tableau 2, cette baisse du prix de vente de 4,1% se compare défavorablement à la baisse de 14% du prix CAF (Coût, Assurance, Fret) de l'essence entre le 1er octobre 2023 (Rs 35,38 par litre) et le 27 janvier 2024 (Rs 30,46 par litre). Durant cette même période, le prix CAF du diesel a baissé de Rs 36,37 à Rs 30,84 par litre, soit une baisse de 15%, mais le prix de vente du diesel est resté inchangé. La raison en est le déficit de Rs 4,5 milliards dans le fonds de stabilisation du prix du diesel.

La State Trading Corporation (STC) prélève une contribution de Rs 5,56 par litre de diesel pour combler ce déficit. Il semble anormal que ce fonds soit autant déficitaire alors que la STC est censée recouvrer le prix CAF du diesel auprès des consommateurs. Si une politique de vérité des prix est pratiquée pour faire payer

aux consommateurs les prix du marché, il n'y aura aucune raison d'accumuler un déficit dans le compte de stabilisation d'année en année.

Comme l'indique le Tableau 3, les taxes et les contributions prélevées à la source totalisent Rs 30,97 par litre d'essence, soit 46,8% du prix de vente au détail. Il est évident que ces taxes et contributions diverses représentent une vache à lait que le Gouvernement entend traire pour longtemps afin de trouver les moyens de financer ses dépenses publiques, en sus des taxes directes (impôts sur les revenus, CSG sur les salaires) et d'autres taxes indirectes (TVA sur la consommation générale).

Selon le rapport annuel de la STC pour l'exercice financier 2021-2022, la taxe d'accise sur les produits pétroliers a rapporté Rs 4,1 milliards et la TVA a rapporté Rs 3 milliards.

Bien que les chiffres ne soient pas disponibles pour 2022-2023, on peut déduire que ces sources de revenu demeurent stables pour le Gouvernement. Cela est d'autant plus vrai que la demande de carburants est iné-

lastique dans le sens où toute hausse de prix ne réduit pas la demande. D'ailleurs, le nombre de véhicules sur la route (quatre roues et deux roues) utilisant des carburants continue de progresser, passant de 648 176 en 2022 à 674 138 en 2023 (jusqu'en novembre), selon les chiffres officiels.

A Confluence of Elections: Does Democracy End Here?

That the 2024 US presidential election just nine months away, the US Supreme Court is about to hear arguments on whether Donald Trump is disqualified from holding the office of President. A most frequently heard lament is that if Trump becomes President again, he will destroy America's democracy, assume dictatorial powers, fracture longstanding US alliances, and abandon Ukraine to Russia, Taiwan to China, and do little to stop Kim Jong Un.

Supporters of Trump counter that disqualifying the leading candidate for the opposition party is a sign of weakness on the part of Democrats and an undemocratic act of election interference.

Concerns about the health and viability of democracy and election interference are not just an American phenomenon. 2024 will be a year in which we see a confluence of elections.

The fact that elections are held does not, of course, mean that democracy is at work. In the US, Donald Trump declared even before the voting began in 2020, that if he lost it would be because the election was stolen or rigged. But Trump is a veritable juke box with a selection of dirges filled with accusations whenever he loses. The justice system is rigged against him, every case is a witch hunt or election interference, he doesn't even "know" the victims he has abused, and judges and prosecutors are "deranged" and sometimes, he even feigns innocence: "I did nothing

The presidential election in Guatemala was held in 2023, not 2024. The Public Ministry tried to suspend the President-elect's party and intimidate election authorities. The US State Department issued a Press Statement declaring that these actions undercut "the clear will of the Guatemalan people and is inconsistent with the principles of the Inter-American Democratic Charter."

In 2024, Taiwan's presidential election was held and Lai Ching-te, also known as William Lai, was elected President.

China dismissed the election as not representing mainstream public opinion because Lai's party did not win a majority of the votes. More importantly, China has vilified Lai as a separatist and "troublemaker through and through."

Lai, known for his dedication to Taiwan's independence, tried to soften things by saying that he aims to maintain the status quo. The Chinese retort from the Taiwan Affairs Office of the State Council was: "Taiwan is China's Taiwan."

Does this mean the end of democracy in Taiwan? We know that the Chinese Communist Party cannot abide the idea of free and independent states that it believes should be within its ambit. The lessons from Tibet and Hong Kong are clear.

What about the US in all of this? President Biden issued a somewhat tepid statement: "We do not support independence [for Taiwan]." This, from a President who has three times said that the US would come to Taiwan's defense if it were attacked by China is quite a shocker. Contrast this statement to the one about Guatemala referenced above.

India, sometimes referred to as the world's largest democracy, will also have a general parliamentary election this spring, with some one billion voters eligible. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Bhartiya Janata Party (BJP) is expected to extend its grip on control of parliament which has now run to ten years. The BJP won five regional state elections last year, so it seems a shoo-in to win again, although there are rumblings of dissent in the southern states. But perhaps not enough for an upset. The country generally seems accepting of the BJP. Throngs cheered Modi on at the consecration of the newly constructed temple believed to rest on the site of the birth of the Hindu god known as Lord Ram. That site was formerly a mosque that was razed by a Hindu mob. And that same site was formerly a Hindu temple that was razed on orders of the Mughal emperor Babur, some 800 years ago. The scars of religious wounds do not fade easily.

Although Modi's government and mainstream Indians dismiss concerns that he has inflamed tensions between the Hindus who make up the vast majority, and minorities, particularly Muslims, Christians and Sikhs, there has undeniably been a rent made in the cohesion of Indian society. Is this serious enough to put Indian democracy in jeopardy? Probably not, so long as a large majority of the majority Hindu population is comfortable with it. And to be fair, Modi has been successful in transforming India into a vibrant economy that has embraced technology and dragged India's populace into the 21st Century.

Russia too will hold an election. Why bother? Guess what? Putin is going to be reelected. His opponents have been shuttled off to prisons, their sentences extended, and the conditions of their confinement made harsher. In

December 2023, Yekaterina Duntsova, a former TV journalist announced a challenge to Putin, promising to run on a platform to end the war with Ukraine. She was promptly barred from standing. The electoral commission citing mistakes on her application form, rejected her candidacy. She said she would appeal the decision at the Supreme Court. Good luck. As former President Trump would say, the system is rigged. With some luck, Ms Duntsova will be a footnote in Russia's history and shuttled off to brave the

Another Russian challenger, Boris Nadezhdin has submitted a bid to run against Putin and, he too stands in opposition to the war against Ukraine. It is not clear whether he will just be rejected or also earn a one-way ticket to Siberia.

The summer will bring European parliament elections. Right now, polls suggest that right-wing groups and socalled European Conservatives and Reformists, will gain seats. It is likely that the European parliament will be fractionated into extremist groups at the margins and that cohesion at the center will be more difficult than ever. What this means for European support of Ukraine remains to be

Finally, the British will also have a general election. Having crowned a new King and found an Indian prince to be its PM, the country now seems doomed to be governed once again by the Labour Party, a hodgepodge of politicians who stand in opposition to the Tories but unsure why. Nor is it clear that they have any plan to lead Britain on any meaningful journey in this Century.

Getting back to Donald Trump, he seems assured of the Republican Party's nomination. But will the Supreme Court declare him ineligible to be on the ballot for having participated in an insurrection or having given aid or comfort to the enemies of the US and its Constitution? If he is elected, he promises not just to get rid of DEMOCRACY (he has promised to be a Dictator for one day) but to dismantle the Deep State, and to engage in a program of deportation of millions. Oh, and to drill for more oil, or at least dictate that others



Escalade des tensions entre la Russie et l'Europe

L'Allemagne se prépare à ce que la Russie déclenche la Troisième Guerre mondiale

L'Europe se prépare à une expansion de la guerre de la Russie en Ukraine et aussi à une attaque contre les pays alliés de l'OTAN l'année prochaine, révèlent des documents divulgués et publiés dans le journal allemand « Bild », rapporte Chris Nesi du « New York Post ».

Selon l'agence, qui a obtenu des informations militaires classifiées du ministère allemand de la Défense, les forces armées du pays se préparent à une attaque russe "hybride" en Europe de l'Est.

Le journal détaille comment plusieurs scénarios potentiellement alarmants pourraient se dérouler dans les mois à venir.

Un tel scénario, appelé "Défense de l'Alliance 2025", commencerait en février avec la mobilisation de 200 000 soldats supplémentaires par la Russie. Encouragée par la diminution du soutien financier occidental à l'Ukraine, la Russie lancerait une massive "offensive de printemps" contre les forces armées ukrainiennes.

Le scénario potentiel décrit comment la Russie pourrait commencer la guerre dans les pays baltes d'ici juillet en utilisant des "cyberattaques sévères" tout en attisant le mécontentement parmi les ressortissants russes en Estonie, Lettonie et Lituanie.

D'ici septembre, ces affrontements, selon les documents classifiés, pourraient être utilisés par la Russie comme prétexte pour déclencher "Zapad 2024", un "exercice" militaire à grande échelle qui rassemblerait environ 50 000 soldats russes à l'ouest du pays et en Biélorussie.

À partir de là, selon le scénario, la Russie pourrait déplacer des troupes et des missiles de portée intermédiaire vers Kaliningrad, un territoire russe de 86 milles carrés coincé entre la Lituanie et la Pologne, tous deux membres de l'OTAN.

Selon les documents, la Russie pourrait bombarder la région avec de la propagande avertissant d'une attaque imminente par les forces de l'OTAN, avec pour objectif ultime de conquérir une zone connue sous le nom de "Suwalki Gap", un corridor étroit polono-lituanien situé entre la

Biélorussie et Kaliningrad.

D'ici décembre, selon le scénario - un exercice de pire scénario - la Russie pourrait alors profiter de la période de transition suivant l'élection présidentielle américaine et utiliser la propagande, proclamant des "conflits frontaliers" ou des "émeutes avec de nombreux morts" pour inciter à la violence dans la région de « Suwalki Gap » et semer le trouble, rapporte « Bild ».

Suite à une réunion du Conseil de sécurité de l'ONU en janvier 2025, la Russie pourrait alors faussement accuser les alliés occidentaux de comploter contre le régime de Poutine, ce qu'il pourrait utiliser pour mobiliser des troupes en Biélorussie et dans les pays baltes d'ici mars 2025

Le document divulgué indique que, dans ce scénario, 30 000

soldats allemands seraient déployés pour la défense, tandis que quelque 70 000 forces russes se seraient regroupées en Biélorussie.

D'ici mai 2025, cette accumulation pourrait amener l'OTAN à mettre en œuvre des "mesures de dissuasion crédibles" pour empêcher une incursion russe ultérieure, ce qui se traduirait par des combats entre les troupes occidentales et les forces russes

Poutine et les responsables russes ont nié à plusieurs reprises qu'ils intensifieraient le conflit en Ukraine au-delà des frontières du pays. Bien que les plans obtenus par « Bild » soient un scénario potentiel préparé par des généraux de l'armée allemande, les alliés européens prennent au sérieux la menace de la Russie et se préparent en conséquence.

Dans la dernière guerre de la Russie avec l'Ukraine, qui a débuté en février 2022, environ un demimillion de soldats ukrainiens et russes ont été tués ou blessés. Ainsi, cette nouvelle soulève des inquiétudes quant à une possible escalade des tensions entre la Russie et l'Europe.

Il est essentiel de suivre de près les développements futurs et d'analyser la véracité des informations divulguées. La préparation des forces armées et des alliés européens suggère une prise au sérieux de la menace perçue, mais il est important de garder à l'esprit que les scénarios présentés peuvent être basés sur des évaluations de risques et ne garantissent pas nécessairement une réalité future.

La question des prix des carburants ne saurait être dissociée d'une problématique plus vaste, celle de l'utilisation des sources d'énergie renouvelables dans le cadre du développement durable. À l'ère du changement climatique provoqué par l'effet de serre dû à l'usage débridé des ressources fossiles, de nombreux pays ont mis en œuvre des moyens visant à réduire la consommation de carburants :

- (a) encourager les citoyens à utiliser des modes de transport moins polluants comme les véhicules hybrides ou électriques sur lesquels une remise de taxe est disponible ;
- (b) promouvoir l'utilisation des transports collectifs (train, autobus, tramway) pour réduire le nombre de véhicules sur la route;
- (c) promouvoir le covoiturage entre amis faisant le même trajet;
- (d) introduire la taxe sur le carbone pour encourager les consommateurs à se tourner vers des sources d'énergie plus propres.

Faute d'une taxe sur le carbone, les taxes indirectes sur les carburants à Maurice sont suffisamment lourdes pour inciter les consommateurs à diminuer leur empreinte écologique (carbon footprint). Toutefois, la politique de fournir des facilités hors taxe pour l'achat de véhicules roulant au carburant pétrolier aux employés du secteur public et aux chauffeurs de taxis est en contradiction avec cet objectif.

David Snoxell, Coordinator - The Chagos Islands All-Party Parliamentary Group

Chagos: "Negotiations, supported by the **US and India, continue with Mauritius"**


n an email interview this week, with David Snoxell, Coordinator of The Chagos Islands All-Party Parliamentary Group, we delve into the recent controversy around the apparent shift in policy regarding the resettlement of former inhabitants of the Chagos Islands, as announced by Foreign **Secretary David Cameron during a Foreign** Affairs Committee hearing on January 9, 2024, and subsequently reported by The Guardian on January 26, 2024. 'There has been no change in policy towards resettlement. Mr Cameron's brief answer to a question at his appearance before the FAC has been misinterpreted and taken out of context,' reassures Snoxell. The former British High Commissioner to Mauritius also elaborates on the importance of the Diego Garcia military base and suggests potential compromise solutions that could balance security interests with Mauritian sovereignty.

* What do you think could explain the recent change in policy regarding the resettlement of former inhabitants of the Chagos Islands, as announced by Foreign Secretary David Cameron during his testimony to a Foreign Affairs Committee (FAC) hearing on 9 January, as reported by The Guardian on Friday, 26 Jan 2024?

There has been no change in policy towards resettlement. Sadly, British governments have always been opposed to Chagossian resettlement. Mr Cameron's brief answer to a question at his appearance before the FAC has been misinterpreted and taken out of context.

The Guardian report omitted to point out that the Foreign Secretary in no way suggested that he wanted to stop the current UK/Mauritius negotiations on the exercise of sovereignty over Chagos though he remained sceptical about resettlement.

66 Both sides need to come to a compromise on security aspects which respects international law and Mauritian sovereignty and builds confidence in the West that the base remains secure and effective for as long as it is needed. This could be done by creating a short-term temporary UK sovereign base area lasting for a defined term, say until 2036 when the UK/US 1966 agreement terminates, with a review at the halfway point in 6 years' time. In the meantime, the 55 Outer Islands, surrounding sea and the marine protected area would be returned to Mauritius..."

The Guardian's report, which itself stated that Cameron sharply differed from his predecessor, James Cleverly, who conveyed a contrasting perspective in a written ministerial statement issued on November 3, 2022. Therefore, we would assume that the perceived major reversal of policy would have been approved by the British Cabinet, including the Prime Minister, before it could be announced by the Foreign Secretary.

As I just stated, there has been no major reversal of policy. I doubt Lord Cameron's rather tentative response to the FAC question was discussed beforehand either by Cabinet or with the PM.

It seems to me that the FS was simply reinforcing the need to come to a conclusion on how to ensure the security and continuation of the base which enables the US and the UK to have confidence in its future opera-

* Should we, therefore, conclude that Cameron's statement does not reflect any broader shift in the UK's foreign policy approach?

There has been no shift in foreign policy or in the UK's approach to the future of the Chagos Islands. Negotiations, supported by the US and India, continue with Mauritius.

* Are there historical or other factors that might be influencing the UK's reluctance to transfer sovereignty of the Chagos Islands to Mauritius?

The opposition of a right-wing think tank, Policy Exchange, and its attempts to discredit Mauritius and others to transferring control of BIOT to Mauritius has been building over the last few months. This is clearly a factor of which the FS is conscious. Hence the emphasis on ensuring the security of the base.

* David Cameron highlighted security requirements and the importance of the Diego Garcia military base. Do you believe there could be alternative solutions that address both the UK-US's security interests and the rights of Mauritius over the Chagos?

Both sides need to come to a compromise on security aspects which respects international law and Mauritian sovereignty and builds confidence in the West that the base remains secure and effective for as long as it is needed.

This could be done by creating a short-term temporary UK sovereign base area lasting for a defined term, say until 2036 when the UK/US 1966 agreement terminates, with a review at the halfway point in 6 years' time. In the meantime, the 55 Outer Islands, surrounding sea and the marine protected area would be returned to Mauritius.

* The Guardian's report stated that Cameron had ruled out the resettlement of former inhabitants of the Chagos Islands. Would this also imply that it's unlikely for Britain to transfer sovereignty of the Chagos Islands to Mauritius anytime soon, and that a lease agreement with the US for its continued occupation of Diego Garcia for its military base should also be ruled out?

Resettlement will become the responsibility of Mauritius. Clearly it is in the interests of Chagossians to support Mauritian sovereignty as under British control they will not be allowed to return whereas they will under Mauritian sovereignty.

Olivier Bancoult and the CRG, who represent the large majority of Chagossians support Mauritian sovereignty.


A lease agreement over the Diego Garcia base area may not provide sufficient confidence to the UK and US since a lease could be set aside by a future government.

* In light of policy shifts of successive British governments regarding the Chagos issue, there's a feeling down here that the British have dragged their feet for more than 40 years regarding the sovereignty issue, and things are unlikely to change in that regard. What's your take on that?

It is true that British governments have strung Mauritius along since I became British High Commissioner in Sept 2000.

There has always been another foreign policy issue or conflict that is given priority. There could have been a settlement in 2001 but 9/11 got in the way.

What else will work to resolve matters, or will the issue be left hanging by both UK and the US due to rising threat perceptions of China in the Indian Ocean?

If the negotiations were to fail, I would expect Mauritius to take the issue back to the UN General Assembly to seek another ruling from the ICJ.

* How do you think the UK's refusal to accept the findings of international court rulings might impact its standing in the international community, especially considering accusations of crimes against humanity over its treatment of the Chagossian people, including 'persecution on the grounds of race and ethnicity' as voiced out by Human Rights Watch?

It seems to me that by entering into negotiations, based in international law, with Mauritius, the UK implicitly accepts the relevant findings of international courts. His Majesty's Government is acutely aware of the diminished standing of the UK in the international community.

The UK, a permanent member of the Security Council, no longer has experts elected to any of the ten UN Human Rights Treaty Bodies or the 176 UN expert groups. That sends a subliminal signal about the UK's standing.

The UK will be able to restore its reputation when there is a settlement with Mauritius which includes Chagossian resettlement.

Why the US Govt warns Americans to reconsider travelling to Jamaica

ramaica, a popular tourist destination in the Caribbean, is facing a surge of violence that has prompted the U.S. government to issue a Level 3 travel advisory, advising Americans to reconsider travelling to the island "due to crime and [unreliable] medical services."

The State Department made the announcement just days after it also warned about the Bahamas, another Caribbean nation that has seen a series of murders, but kept its Level 2 travel advisory, which advises Americans to "exercise increased caution."

Crimes are common in Jamaica

The U.S. Embassy in Jamaica said that the island is plagued by "violent crimes, such as home invasions, armed robberies, sexual assaults, and homicides, are common. Sexual assaults occur frequently, including at all-inclusive resorts."

It also said that the Jamaican police are often ineffective in responding to serious criminal incidents. The advisory added that the medical services on the island are not always dependable and some private facilities may demand payment in advance, reports Hindustan Times.



The State Department pointed out that Jamaica has one of the highest homicide rates in the Western Hemisphere for several years.

The Jamaica Constabulary Force, the national police force, published statistics that showed that the island, which has a population of about 2.8 million, had 65 homicides from Jan. 1 to Jan. 27 of this year. This was a significant decrease from the same period last year, when there were 81 homicides, but the number of shootings and people wounded in crimes went up this January compared to last.

The data also showed a big decline in the number of rapes recorded in January 2024 compared to the previous year.

The Jamaica Gleaner, the oldest newspaper in the nation, reported on Monday that out of the 65 murders this month, 19 happened in the previous week alone.

In the Bahamas, the U.S. Embassy in Nassau said in a message on Jan. 24 that there had been 18 murders in the capital city since the start of the year, which had taken place "at all hours including in broad daylight on the streets."

It said that most of the recent killings were related to gang violence and urged travellers to be very careful in the eastern part of New Providence Island (Nassau), especially if walking or driving at night.

"Do not physically resist any robbery attempt," the embassy cautioned, and suggested that visitors should review their "personal security plans."

Tourism is a vital sector for Jamaica's economy, and the Minister of Tourism Edmund Bartlett told the country's lawmakers in December that he expected the impressive growth trend seen in 2022 and 2023 to continue.

Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg accused of having 'blood' on his hands in Senate hearing



Meta CEO proposed legislation regulating app store owners, emphasising the need for parental consent for app downloads.

"My understanding is Apple and Google, or at least Apple, already requires parental consent when a child does a payment with an app. So it should be pretty trivial to pass a law that requires them to make it so that parents have control anytime a child downloads an app," Meta CEO said.

Section 230 scrutiny: Senator Graham emphasised the need to reconsider Section 230, the federal law providing immunity to tech platforms for content moderation decisions. Graham's call to repeal Section 230 resonated with the audience, triggering applause and cheers.

Internal warnings from senior Meta executives: Newly released internal documents revealed that senior Meta executives had expressed concerns about the company's handling of youth safety, warning Zuckerberg in 2021. The documents indicate internal disagreements and highlight potential underinvestment in user safety.

Recent safety measures for teens by Meta: In response to the lawsuits and accusations, Meta asserts it has numerous tools to ensure teen safety and support parents on its platforms. Meta rolled out a series of youth safety policies and features weeks ahead of the hearing. These include hiding inappropriate content, expanding search restrictions, introducing a "nighttime nudge," adjusting default privacy settings for teens, and partnering with the Center for Open Science for privacy-preserving data sharing.

TikTok CEO vows to spend \$2b to protect kids using platform



The CEOs of top social media platforms like TikTok, Meta, and X also appeared at the Senate Judiciary Committee hearing on the safety of children online. On Wednesday, top executives of widely used social media apps- CEO of X, formerly Twitter, Linda Yaccarino, Snap CEO Evan Spiegel, and Discord CEO Jason Citron testified before Congress alongside TikTok CEO Shou Zi

Ahead of the Senate hearing, Shou Zi Chew has vowed to spend \$2 billion to protect the children who use the popular video-sharing platform TikTok. According to Bloomberg, Chew is planning to spend a hefty amount on trust and global safety at his company, which consists of a team of over 40,000, reports Hindustan Times.

Chew is expected to unveil the details of his plans to protect 170 million users on his platform. The outlet adds that he is also planning to bring into focus various policies around teenagers on TikTok. Among those policies is that those under the age of 16 will be prohibited from sending messages.

Moreover, the videos shared by teenagers under 16 will not be able to be downloaded. Such videos will also not be recommended to users they aren't already connected with on the platform. For those aged 17 and under, TikTok will have a pre-set screen limit time of 60 minutes, after which a password will be required to use the platform.

Per Bloomberg, Chew's testimony revealed that TikTok uses a special technology to review public content, which monitors and filters out prohibited sexual imagery, including those of children. The company also uses third-party applications like PhotoDNA and Take It Down to moderate direct messages.

In a Senate Judiciary Committee hearing, Republican Senator Lindsey Graham didn't hold back, accusing Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg of having "blood" on his hands. The hearing, titled "Big Tech and the Online Child Sexual Exploitation Crisis," witnessed intense exchanges and a spotlight on youth safety.

Senator Lindsey Graham's Strong Words: Senator Lindsey Graham didn't mince words, directly telling Zuckerberg, "Mr. Zuckerberg, you and the companies before us, you have blood on your hands. You have a product that's killing people."

Graham highlighted the tragic story of South Carolina State House Rep. Brandon Guffey, whose son fell victim to a scam on Instagram, leading to devastating consequences. To which the Meta CEO said, "That's terrible. I mean, no one should have to go through something like that." Graham questioned Zuckerberg about Guffey's ability to sue Meta, to which Zuckerberg responded, "I think that they can sue us.

Responsibility Shift: Zuckerberg suggested that Apple and Google, not social media companies, should bear the responsibility of checking users' ages to prevent underage access to apps. The

Indian-American Anuj Christian waging a war on United State's discriminatory country cap on immigration



nuj Christian, a seasoned DevOps engineer residing Ain the United States for over 14 years, is on a mission to challenge the discriminatory country cap on employment-based immigration, particularly impacting Indian foreign workers. In a recent interview to hindustantimes.com, Anuj shared his insights and experiences, shedding light on the challenges faced by individuals like him. To campaign for the cause he has visited 45 states across the country to promote his views and garner sup-

"I have been to 45 states at the time of writing this. I got chance to speak to many Americans about the issue and I have yet to run into someone who is in favour of country cap after hearing how unfair they are."

Based on rules defined by United States, country cap on legal permanent residency punishes immigrants from India and the wait for the coveted Green Card for Indians runs into 200 years. Many have termed it "discrimination" as "inconsistent" with the principles of a merit-based immigration system, reports Hindustan Times.

Green Card, known officially as a Permanent Resident Card, is a document issued to immigrants to the US as evidence that the bearer has been granted the privilege of residing permanently.

Discussing the hurdles foreign workers encounter, Anuj highlighted the difficulties faced by people on work

visa, regardless of nationality, stating, "They can't change jobs easily, don't qualify for many jobs, and if they lose a job, they only have 60 days to find another job willing to transfer their work visa, or they must leave the country."

"Work visa typically needs to be renewed every 3 years. If your visa is expired, then you can't travel outside the country and come back without renewing your work visa first. Work visa can be renewed only at consulates abroad and it's not always easy to get visa appointments. Many workers miss important family events because it's not possible to renew work visa without much advance

However, for Indian workers, the challenges are more profound. Anuj elaborated, "Now all the above challenges are temporary if you are a worker from any country other than India, but they are permanent if you are a worker

Country Cap on employment-based immigrationn employment-based immigration

Explaining the root of discrimination, Anuj delved into the history, noting, "This country cap on employmentbased immigration was put in place back in 1990. Back then lawmakers didn't put much thought into it that the skills the US might have a shortage of can come from very few selected countries."

Anuj emphasized the unintentional exploitation of Indian talent, stating, "So, the discrimination against Indian probably wasn't intentional, but intentionally or unintentionally they have found a system which benefits many people, even though it's pure exploitation of Indian talent.'

Emphasizing on the need to remove country cap, Anuj stated, "Removing country cap means US will be able to hire the best of the best workers regardless of where they come from '

Anuj underscored the immense contribution of Indian workers to the U.S. economy, stating, "There isn't much I need to say on Indian workers' contributions to the US economy. Most number of foreign-born Fortune 500 CEOs are from India. Removing country cap on skill-based visa is not a policy in favour of India. It's a policy in favor of the United States."

Malaysia's new king owns Boeing 737, private army

ohor Sultan Ibrahim Iskandar was on Wednesday sworn in as Malaysia's new king . He took the oath of office in a ceremony held at the national palace in the country's capital Kuala Lumpur. The ceremony was witnessed by other royal families, prime minister Anwar Ibrahim and cabinet members.

Malaysia has a unique system of monarchy under which the heads of Malaysia's nine royal families take turns to be the king, every five years. Ibrahim has succeeded Sultan Abdullah Sultan Ahmad Shah, who is returning to lead his home state of Pahang having completed his five-year tenure as the king, reports Hindustan Times.

About Malaysia's new king: 65-year-old Ibrahim is a billionaire who has an extensive business empire ranging from real estate to telecoms and power plants.

His wife Raja Zarith Sofiah is an Oxford graduate and a prolific writer who has authored several children's books. The royal couple have five sons and a daughter.

Details about Ibrahim Iskandar's enormous wealth: Ibrahim has a fleet of jets, including a gold and-blue Boeing 737. The new king also has a huge collection of cars and motorcycles. He has a private army as well.

He owns \$4 billion worth of land in Singapore, reported NDTV. Ibrahim has an investment portfolio of \$1.1 billion with substantial cash flow from share and real estate transactions. He has a stake in the multibillion-dollar Forest City development project in Johor.

Powers of the king in Malaysia: Malaysia's king plays a largely ceremonial role, as administrative power is vested in the prime minister and the parliament. The king is highly regarded as the protector of Islam and Malay tradition.

He is the nominal head of the government and the armed forces. All laws, cabinet appointments and the dissolution of parliament for general elections require his assent. He has the power to proclaim an emergency and pardon criminals.

The Mayor Leaves

he Municipality of Port Louis recently had to take the unpleasant decision of reducing its labour force. About 300 employees were retrenched. This decision was prompted by an indisputable fact: the works undertaken by the Municipality had been completed; it could not keep on its payroll more workers than was actually required. Funds were running low. As was expected this decision was exploited by the anti-Labourites and everything was done to run belittle Mayor Guy Forget, and the Labour administration. But the fact of the matter is that Labour's administration has turned out to be one of the best that the town of Port Louis has ever had. And Guy Forget's contribution has been outstanding.

In 1956, soon after the Labour Party was returned, he tabled a motion which sought to:

- re-establish the shorthand course which had been dropped.
- 2. start a training course in drawing and painting.
- grant substantial prizes to poor parents with a view to encouraging them to devote greater care to their young children.
- 4. increase the number of scholarships awarded to deserving students of Port Louis.
- ensure that the inhabitants of Port Louis get at least two public musical recitals per month.
- devise ways and means to increase the number of inmates at the Crèche Municipale or to create a new crèche in another region of Port Louis.

The motion was subsequently voted and today when Guy Forget leaves the mayorship he has enough ground to feel proud that each and every of the above-listed measures have been implemented. But that is not all.

Upon his personal initiative the Municipal Corporation has built in different regions of Port Louis five washing stands for the taxis of the capital. The Pleasure Ground has been embellished and renamed after that great, truly Mauritian writer, Robert Edward Hart. The Artillery Square has been named Guy Rozemont Square and it

has been beautifully laid out. Guy Forget hopes that in the very near future a statue of the late Guy Rozemont will stand in the square where a place has already been provided for it.

Did you ever know that there was a statue of the great Rémy Ollier in the Company's Gardens, Port Louis? Many people don't — and why? The statue stands opposite Mr Damoo's shop on Chaussée Street, and it was concealed from the public by the hanging roots and branches of the huge, towering banyan tree (La

Fourche tree) standing near Rémy Ollier's statue. Guy Forget felt that the memory of such a great Mauritian should not be allowed to fall in disgrace. The place was cleared up and the Company's Gardens have now been given a new lay-out so that anyone can see Rémy Ollier's statue properly.

Today, if the poor man's house or his workshop happens to be destroyed, it is certain that he will be assisted by the Municipal Corporation just as is the case with destitute labourers who are assisted by the Sugar Industry Labour Welfare Fund. This is possible because Guy Forget created a new chapter, WELFARE, in the Municipality's annual budget. Under his personal guidance the Municipal Library has been re-organised. 1,000 new volumes have been purchased.

And one of the greatest feats of the Municipality under the Labour administration is the amelioration of the water supply. Since the creation of the town of Port-Louis the water supply has been a problem. But Guy Forget says that as from February or March next the inhabitants of Port Louis will have a continuous supply of water, day and night.

Guy Forget leaves the mayorship not because of the carping outbursts of ill-mannered critics but because he feels having completed his task. He was Mayor of Port Louis for seven months only.

Dental Medicine: Exploring the Health Dimension

ierre Fauchard (1679 -1761), a French physician, is credited as the 'father of modern dentistry.' His ground-breaking book detailed oral anatomy, pathology symptoms, operative methods for decay treat-

ment, orthodontics, tooth transplantation, and more. Fauchard was remarkably ahead of his time.

The first dental surgery college opened in Baltimore, USA, in 1840, founded by Horace H. Hayden (1769-1844) and Chaplin Harris (1806-1860). This marked a departure from traditional barber-surgeon practices. In Europe, the initial dental school opened in London in 1859, followed by Paris in 1879.

Today, the journey to becoming a dental practitioner involves a 5- to 6-year full-time course with stringent academic requirements. Prospective students must excel in sciences and mathematics, and admission to well-established universities is highly competitive and expensive.

Dental practitioners require an in-depth knowledge of psychology, as many patients experience pain and dentophobia. The medical procedure starts with a comprehensive medical and dental history, extra and intra-oral examinations, and mandatory oral cancer screenings in the UK. X-rays and, occasionally, blood tests may also be necessary.

Following these initial steps, treatment plans, options, consent, costs, and prognosis are explained to patients. Thorough documentation is crucial for medico-legal purposes. It is essential to ensure the patient's mental capacity to comprehend the treatment.

A fully qualified, competent, and experienced dental surgeon needs precise manual dexterity, knowledge of human anatomy, physiology, pathology, and pharmacology. Communication skills, analytical and critical skills, along with empathy, probity, and ethics, are paramount to achieve the gold standard.

While prescribing medications related to dental surgery, all medical details of patients need to be checked to avoid allergies, drug interactions, and side effects. Dosage, strength, frequency, and duration of medications must be clearly written on the prescription.

Maintaining a delicate balance between the medical and business aspects of dentistry is crucial. Patients should be treated with kindness, respect, compassion, and dignity, free from judgment. Although practitioners have no legal obligation for results, they must leverage their knowledge, skills, experience, and the latest technology to achieve optimal outcomes.

The dental profession's reputation can suf-

fer from malpractices, lack of clear explanations, and working beyond one's competency. The patient's best interest should always take precedence, sometimes necessitating referral to a more experienced colleague or specialist. The successful management of stress and pain in a dental surgery is a practice builder through word of mouth.

In the UK's 'Bolam Test,' practitioners must demonstrate adherence to a responsible body of medical opinion to avoid negligence, providing protection for the patient. Treating patients with various comorbidities and mental health issues can be very challenging, and ignoring or untreated severe dental infections may lead to lifethreatening conditions like sepsis.

Returning to Mauritius after completing studies in 1987, I found that societal misconceptions about dentistry were apparent. I met a banker in Port Louis who asked me: 'Quand to pou ouvert to l'atelier?'.

Some months later, I attended a safran (wedding eve ceremony) and while having dinner with the relatives in Chemin Grenier, a man explained to his friend that he would not go to queue up for a dental extraction at the hospital. 'To neque ena pou fou li Rs 40.00 et li pou tire to lédent dans privé'. The tasty food did not go down very well. A complete lack of respect for the dental surgeon!

In my surgery in Curepipe, while filling the medical questionnaire, a man shouted at me: 'Couma dire pe faire l'enquête la police!' Little did he know that this was to prevent any mishaps affecting his general health.

An eye-opening incident worth mentioning happened in my surgery when a hospital doctor (my patient) asked me about my thoughts on sending her brilliant QEC-educated daughter to a new local dental school which closed down later. I explained the importance of infrastructure, syllabus, and the CV and experience of the professors. Her answer was, 'Have you met any poor dentists?' An appalling and frustrating response where earning money was prioritized over medical training, exposing how materialistic society had become.

We have had dentists in parliament, and I am unsure if issues like patient complaints, illegal practice of dentistry, and delivery of substandard treatments have been adequately addressed.

Finally, we have a duty to maintain an updated list of drugs in our medical emergency kit for dental procedures: Adrenal crisis, Syncope, Cardiac pain or Stroke, Seizures, Hypoglycemia, Anaphylactic shock, and Asthma attack. It is mandatory by law to have regular CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) courses for the entire dental staff. Oxygen needs to be available, and an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) can save the life of a patient with cardiac arrest.

Obituary

Dr Anil Purran - Former Chief Medical Officer Mauritius

r Anil K Purran passed away on December 20, 2023, aged 86, after a short illness. He was born at Chemin Grenier as the second child of a family of nine children. After his secondary schooling at St Andrews College, Rose Hill, he worked there as a teacher for three years before proceeding to Osmania University, Hyderabad, India, for his medical studies. He graduated with an MBBS degree in 1965 and took up employment at the Ministry of Health upon his return.



Like several colleagues at the time, he specialized in anaesthesia in Liverpool, UK, obtaining the Fellowship

of the Faculty of Anaesthesia of the Royal College of Surgeons (FFARCS) in 1970.

He was posted along with other newly returned specialists at the recently commissioned SSRN Hospital, Pamplemousses. I had joined the hospital in 1972 and like him and Dr K. Gajadharsingh, the general surgeon with whom I was working, we were staying in the hospital quarters, where also resided the first Medical Superintendent of the Hospital, Dr Jugdish Mohith. This gave all of us an occasion to socialize, besides interacting in the Operation Theatre at the hospital where he used to do Dr Gajadharsingh's operation list.

There were other colleagues too on the campus, among whom the late Dr Laval Appapoulay whose son David and Dr Purran's daughter Saloni, used to play together. When I returned as specialist in 1980, again as SSRNH, Dr Purran was then the Medical Superintendent, but thorough clinician that he was he could not stay away from practising his art - administering anaesthesia when his skills were required. I recall a complex case of surgery of the lumbar spine in an 18-year-old boy whom he anaesthetised, and as we were about to begin, he told me, 'Don't worry, I have all the time in the world,' knowing as he did that this was going to be a long case — almost four hours when I was finally done.

He was later appointed as Principal Medical Officer (PMO) responsible mainly for Planning and Human Resource Development and became involved in the setting-up of various major Health Programmes namely, Primary Health Care services, cardiac surgery SSRNH with the assistance of Prof Raffa, Prof Céréne, and Prof Saxena from Saudi Arabia, France, and India respectively.

Appointed as Chief Medical Officer (CMO) in 1989, he played an important role in the planning, design, and construction of the Jawaharlal Nehru Hospital (JNH) at Rose Belle as well as the introduction of haemodialysis service in the public hospitals. He was also a member of the Senate of the University of Mauritius and a member of the first Medical Council of Mauritius.

After retirement in 1997, he was awarded OSK for his contributions in the medical field. Later on, he successively acted as Commissioner at the Public Service Commission and as member of the Central Procurement Board, as well as of the Senate of the University of Mauritius. He had also been President of the medical and dental union, GMDOA.

He will be fondly remembered as a self-made man and man of culture (being a life member of Arya Sabha). He was passionate about orchids which he cultivated along with other plants and flowers.

He and his wife Indira (born Manraj), who was a teacher, had the pain of losing their son Ashwin in a tragic road accident in 1996.

We offer our deep condolences to the bereaved family and relatives, and their near and dear friends.

We are living in a 'digital dark age'

Here's how to protect your photos, videos and other data

If you have grown up with social media, chances are you have taken more photos in the last couple of decades than you will ever remember. When mobile phones suddenly became cameras too, social media turned into a community photo album, with memories kept online forever and ever. Or so we thought.

In 2019, MySpace lost 12 years' worth of music and photos, affecting over 14 million artists and 50 million tracks. If Instagram or the entire internet suddenly disappeared, would you be able to access your precious memories?



We are living in a "digital dark age", a term popularised by information and communication specialist Terry Kuny. Back in 1997, Kuny warned we were "moving into an era where much of what we know today, much of what is coded and written electronically, will be lost forever".

He argued that, like monks from the Middle Ages who preserved books (and therefore, knowledge), we must preserve digital objects of today. Otherwise, future generations will be left with gaps in knowledge about our present-day lives.

People often say the "internet is forever", but digital artefacts like photos and videos are actually unstable and non-permanent. You've likely encountered "linkrot", when a URL to an important source leads to a now-deleted webpage. Hardware becomes obsolete, degraded and upgraded over time. Bit-rot (also called data or file rot, or data degradation) means we may have no physical means to access our past data.

Many people already find it hard to use technology and software that has reached its "end of life". With the lack of backwards compatibility (when updated technology or software cannot support older versions), how will future generations access old data stored in obsolete formats?

We are also seeing issues emerge related to ownership of data, particularly when controlled by private corporations. Families have faced legal difficulties accessing the social media accounts of deceased loved ones. Similarly, if Spotify or Netflix shut down tomorrow, you wouldn't own any of the songs or films you stream on a daily basis.

Protecting and preserving your old data

If you misplaced your phone, could you remember important phone numbers, or navigate streets when lost? If the answer is no, you may want to think more carefully about data preservation.

This is something we should all think about, and not just leave it to digital archivists and preservationists. When organised efforts are made to preserve data, who decides

what should be preserved can become a political issue as much as a technological one.

When it comes to your own digital memories, there are services you can use and steps you can take to preserve data from being lost to history:

- * Keep multiple copies (and formats) of important data across different devices: SD cards, USB thumb drives, DVD/Blu-ray discs, external hard drives and NAS (network attached storage) boxes. This has to be coupled with ensuring you regularly migrate important data to the newest device or format (remember, avoid bit-rot).
 - * Try (re)discovering analogue trends board games

alongside video games, vinyl records over streaming music, or celebrate the resurgence of Polaroid cameras. Many services are available to convert digital photos into printed photos, albums and physical artwork.

- * Embrace the ethos of the FAIR principles findable, accessible, interoperable, and reusable– so that you and others can locate and access any important data you wish to preserve easily.
- * Finally, if you come across a rotten link or other missing data, you can explore data preservation initiatives like the Long Now Foundation's publicly accessible Rosetta Project or the Internet Archive, a non-profit library of free digital books, movies, software, music and websites.

Financial Assistance to Employers: Payment of National Minimum Wage and Salary Compensation 2024

The Mauritius Revenue Authority (MRA) informs eligible employers that the facility to apply for financial assistance for the payment of the increased **National Minimum Wage and Salary Compensation 2024** will be available shortly on MRA website: www.mra.mu.

The MRA draws the attention of employers that they are required to pay the wages of their employees in accordance with the applicable legislations, including the increased National Minimum Wage and Salary Compensation 2024.

Eligible employers are required to apply for financial assistance using the facility available on the MRA website by inserting their Employer Registration Number (ERN) and password to access the system. The MRA will provide the financial assistance by crediting their bank account after processing their application.

Eligible Employers

The financial assistance is applicable to the categories of employers mentioned below, in respect of their **full-time employees** and is available for the calendar year 2024;

- 1. Export Oriented Enterprises (EOEs);
- 2. Manufacturing Enterprises (MEs) with an annual turnover not exceeding Rs. 500 million;
- 3. Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) with an annual turnover not exceeding Rs. 100 million; and
- 4. Registered Charitable Institutions and Religious Bodies.

For the purpose of the financial assistance, an SME is an enterprise whose turnover for the year of assessment 2022-2023 did not exceed Rs. 100 million.

Manufacturing Enterprises and SMEs would be eligible to the financial assistance where the enterprise has incurred a loss or where its profits for the Year of Assessment 2022/2023 would be reduced by more than 50% or by more than 10%, as applicable, if the payment of the increased National Minimum Wage and Salary Compensation 2024 are factored in

Amount of Monthly Financial Assistance

The amount of financial assistance applicable depends on:

- the category of employer; and
- ii. the impact of the payment of increased national minimum wage and salary compensation 2024 on the profits of the employer, where applicable.

Eligible employers will benefit from a financial assistance of either Rs. 500 or Rs. 1,000 or Rs. 2,000 monthly in respect of each full-time employee drawing the national minimum wage.

Additionally, the employer will benefit from a financial assistance of an amount equivalent to either 100% or 50% of the salary compensation payable to each full-time employee drawing a basic salary not exceeding Rs. 50,000.

People love the billionaire, but hate the billionaires' club

People exhibit a paradoxical relationship with billionaires, admiring individual successes like Oprah Winfrey or Bill Gates while harbouring disdain for the collective "top 1%," according to new research.

Conducted through eight interconnected studies, the research reveals that individuals are more accepting of news about the immense wealth of specific billionaires, attributing their success to talent and hard work. However, this sentiment sharply contrasts with a general perception that it is unfair for billionaires as a group to wield disproportionate influence and affluence.

Jesse Walker, co-author of the study and assistant professor of marketing at The Ohio State University's Fisher College of Business, emphasizes this dichotomy in how people perceive wealth inequality. When presented with a single person's success, individuals tend to view them as more deserving of their riches, attributing their achievements to personal qualities. However, when contemplating the top 1% as a collective entity, the sentiment shifts towards concerns about fairness, luck, or systemic advantages that may have contributed to their



wealth.

This distinction holds real-life implications, influencing individuals' support for policies such as wealth taxes on the super-rich. The study indicates that people are more inclined to endorse such taxes when contemplating the top 1% as a whole, whereas support diminishes when considering a specific wealthy individual.

The researchers used various methodologies, including presenting participants with information about the salaries of CEOs relative to average employees. Results showed that individuals were more tolerant of lavish compensation when focused on an individual CEO rather than CEOs as a group.

The portrayal and acclaim of wealthy individuals in society and the media play a crucial role in shaping attitudes towards economic inequality, Walker notes. Participants exposed to Forbes magazine covers featuring a group of billionaires expressed more frustration and were more supportive of an inheritance tax to address wealth disparity than those who saw covers featuring only one billionaire.

The study underscores the importance of communication and presentation of information regarding economic inequality, with implications for policy preferences. As economic inequality continues to rise, understanding how individuals perceive and respond to information about wealth distribution is crucial for addressing societal challenges.



Who created the alphabet? A historian describes the millennia-long story of the ABCs

Turns out 'A' didn't have to be the first letter in the alphabet, nor 'Z' the last.

A, B, C, D, E, F, G – makes you want to hum the alphabet song. But there's no real reason why people should learn these letters in this order. There are plenty of ways we could structure the alphabet; the computer keyboard in front of me provides one alternative. Plenty of other alphabets exist too, as well as languages that don't use alphabets at all.

So why did we end up with this one – and who's responsible for it?

As a historian, I love "why" questions. I often like them a lot more than "who" questions, because it's actually really rare for a single person to change the world. Instead, most of history's biggest innovations come from teamwork, collaboration and groups figuring out how to make life better, easier and more fun.

What is a letter?

The alphabet is a perfect example of this process. Our ABCs, known as the Latin alphabet, are the result of millions of people over thousands of years slowly working together and ultimately agreeing on which letters to use and under what circumstances.

To figure out why they settled on the version we have today, you first need to understand what a letter is and what an alphabet is. Then, you can trace your way back to the very first examples of both.

Letters are symbols, just like emojis or crosswalk signs. Letters are shapes that we – the users – associate with a sound in a particular language.

But many letters change sound completely when they appear in a different language. The English "H," for example, makes a "ha" sound, but the same symbol "H" is pronounced as "en" in Russian; in the Cyrillic alphabet, "H" makes a "n" sound.



Even when the shape and sound of a letter stay the same within a single language, the letters themselves can have different names. In America, "Z" is called "zee," while in Canada, the United Kingdom and pretty much every other English-speaking country, it is called "zed."

All this variety is possible because letters, like languages, evolve and change over time based on what local people do out of habit or trend or just for the fun of it.

What is an alphabet?

An alphabet is a collection of lettersymbols that have been more or less standardized, and which often – though not always – reflect all of the sounds made in a particular language.

Some languages, like Chinese, don't have alphabets at all, using symbols to represent whole words. Others, like Cherokee, use symbols that represent syllables.

The first alphabet was invented in ancient Egypt, more than 5,000 years ago, and was developed to record religious texts. That's where its name "hieroglyphs," or "sacred carvings," comes from.

Hieroglyphs are beautiful and they do a good job recording prayers, but they are difficult to write quickly, because they are so detailed and often take the form of animals, people or day-to-day objects. Over time, people developed simplified forms of each glyph so they could take notes and write informally.

While hieroglyphs were mostly used by priests and elites, common people, including travelers and traders from other places, learned informal writing. These visitors realized the Egyptians had developed something useful – a way to record sales or send letters that would be clear to those who could read it but mysterious to everyone else. Many people never learned to read at all, because they did not need to or because they were denied access to education.

Vowels, consonants and the letter 'J'

The most important traders in this period were from Phoenicia – known today as Syria, Lebanon and Israel – and they spread the alphabet to the towns and villages that surrounded the Mediterranean Sea.

The Phoenicians established alphabetical order to make it easier to learn and share with others. But the Phoenicians and Egyptians used only consonants; eventually, as people began to write more and more, and more words needed to be created to describe different things, the Greeks adopted vowels.

The Greek alphabet looks a lot like ours, but our letters took their final form in Italy. First the Etruscan people, and then the Romans, adapted Greek letters to fit their language. The Romans spread their language, Latin, and its alphabet all over modern Europe, the Near East and North Africa. The earliest example of the Latin alphabet in use is called the duenos inscription and comes from the sixth century BCE, 2,500 years ago.

Even then, the alphabet was still incomplete, because Latin didn't have all the sounds that are common today. The most obvious is the letter "J"; even though the first month of the Roman calendar was January, it was written with an "I," "ianuarius," and pronounced with a "ya" sound. The "J" came into use during the Renaissance – during the 1500s in Europe – two or three centuries after the "W" was added, during the Middle Ages.

And there's no reason to think the alphabet might not change again. English, especially, has a habit of borrowing words from other languages, like karaoke from Japanese, cookie from Dutch and avatar from Sanskrit. Maybe, because of this borrowing, we might eventually need to add new symbols to our alphabet. In short, as the world grows more connected, the alphabet may have to adapt. It won't be the first time.







e matin, à la boutique du coin, les discussions sur la cherté de la vie suggèrent que la nécessité de compter chaque sou est devenue une règle incontournable pour tout consommateur souhaitant équilibrer dépenses et épargne à la fin du mois.

Le portefeuille impose une discipline plus stricte en période difficile que le code de la route, responsable de trop nombreuses vies perdues. Nous pouvons même comparer cela à la discipline nécessaire pour le respect de l'environnement, souvent négligée par les citadins, entraînant des canalisations obstruées et des déchets enfouis remontant à la surface.

Parfois, les informations étrangères, réduites au strict minimum, sont plutôt amusantes. Deux sujets au maximum: les dauphins sauvés et un sujet politico-économique de quelques secondes. Soit il y a une grande paresse dans le service, soit il y a une consigne à ne pas importer toutes les polémiques du monde.
