

Will Populism Save the Economy or Government?

ecent developments in Mauritius highlight a significant overlap between economic policy and political strategy, prompting important questions about the economy as elections approach. The Monetary Policy Committee's decision to lower the key interest rate by 50 basis points has sparked a lively debate among economists and political observers alike. While this move aims to provide relief to borrowers amid a climate of rising household debt, it also underscores a deeper political calculus that could have far-reaching implications for the nation's economic future.

In this week's interview, economist Vinaye Ancharaz highlights a significant backdrop to this decision: the recent cut in the Federal Reserve's interest rate and the government's controversial proposal to provide interest-free loans to young people. His critique reveals a common sentiment that the government's focus is increasingly on short-term political gains rather than sustainable economic strategies. With general elections looming, the modest rate cut could be seen as an attempt to placate the electorate by easing financial pressures on households. Yet, the broader economic context raises alarms.

Mauritius has experienced a concerning spike in household debt, which reached Rs 240 billion by the end of 2023. This alarming figure reflects a debt-to-income ratio of over 102%, placing immense pressure on household finances. While the interest rate cut will offer much-needed respite to borrowers, it also carries potential risks. The Governor of the Bank of Mauritius cites falling inflation as justification for this move; however, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) forecasts inflation could exceed the Bank's targets, fuelled by rising freight costs and salary increases. According to V. Ancharaz, lower interest rates might inadvertently discourage foreign investment, exerting further downward pressure on the rupee, which could counteract any benefits of cheaper borrowing.

The economic landscape is further complicated by the recent legal challenge from Business Mauritius regarding the government's salary realignment initiative. The expectation of salary adjustments for approximately 200,000 private sector employees has been met with resistance from employers concerned about the legality of the government's approach without passing through Parliament. This standoff not only raises questions about the stability of employer-employee relations but also the extent to which Cabinet or a Labour Minister can impose salary increases, remuneration orders and readjustments on an ad-hoc basis, weeks before general elections are due, throwing carefully constructed private company budgets and personnel recruitment plans in disarray. Most of them are not against the salary rises, some even paying interim allowances, but have been under pressure from political jockeying and will rather wait until the matter is sorted out in courts. With the opposition maintaining a cautious stance, the ruling alliance risks alienating the very workforce it aims to win over through financial incentives.

The political manoeuvering extends beyond interest rates and salary adjustments. The Prime Minister's proposal to provide interest-free housing loans to youths aged 18 to 35 appears aimed at securing votes from a demographic that has historically been less engaged in the electoral process. However, the effectiveness of such measures remains questionable. Given that most home loan applicants are over 30, and need first to buy an increasingly out of reach plot of land, this initiative may not resonate broadly. Furthermore, the implementation of this proposal could place an undue burden on public finances, with projections suggesting it could cost Rs 40 billion over five years.

The forthcoming announcement regarding retirement pensions on International Day of Older Persons further illustrates the government's populist strategy. With plans to significantly increase pensions, the ruling alliance appears focused on securing the support of senior voters. However, the increasing awareness among seniors about the economic realities - such as inflation outpacing their pension increases and the devaluation of the national currency - could diminish the effectiveness of these promises. As many elderly voters grapple with the rising cost of living, mere financial incentives may not suffice to garner their support.

ther potential measures, like a year-end bonus, which could serve as a sweetener for the electorate are also expected soon. Yet, imposing such a bonus amid ongoing salary adjustments could place additional strain on businesses, particularly small and medium enterprises already struggling with rising operational costs. As the government faces backlash from the private sector, the implications for employment and economic stability could be significant.

In this complex interplay of politics and economics, the role of the opposition remains critical. The Labour Party-MMM-ND-ReA alliance must manage a land-scape full of challenges and opportunities. While it may be politically expedient to remain neutral on the salary realignment issue, a robust critique of the government's approach to wage policies could resonate with an electorate increasingly aware of economic disparities.

Ultimately, the question remains: will the government's short-term measures be sufficient to secure electoral support, or will voters prioritize long-term stability and sustainable economic policies? As Mauritius approaches a crucial election, current choices will impact the economy for years. The challenge lies not only in addressing immediate financial pressures but also in fostering a resilient economic framework that can withstand the political tides ahead.

The Intelligence Age: Sam Altman's Manifesto and Its Oversights

In a new manifesto, OpenAl's Sam Altman envisions an Al utopia – and reveals glaring blind spots

y now, many of us are probably familiar with artificial intelligence hype. Al will make artists redundant! Al can do lab experiments! Al will end grief!

Even by these standards, the latest proclamation from OpenAl chief executive Sam Altman, published on his personal website this week, seems remarkably hyperbolic. We are on the verge of "The Intelligence Age", he declares, powered by a "superintelligence" that may just be a "few thousand days" away. The new era will bring "astounding triumphs", including "fixing the climate, establishing a space colony, and the discovery of all of physics".

Altman and his company – which is trying to raise billions from investors and pitching unprecedently huge datacentres to the US government, while shedding key staff and ditching its nonprofit roots to give Altman a share of ownership – have much to gain from hype.

However, even setting aside these motivations, it's worth taking a look at some of the assumptions behind Altman's predictions. On closer inspection, they reveal a lot about the worldview of Al's biggest cheerleaders – and the blind spots in their thinking.

Steam engines for thought?

Altman grounds his marvellous predictions in a two-paragraph history of humanity:

People have become dramatically more capable over time; we can already accomplish things now that our predecessors would have believed impossible.

This is a story of unmitigated progress heading in a single direction, driven by human intelligence. The cumulative discoveries and inventions of science and technology – Altman reveals – have led us to the computer chip and, inexorably, to artificial intelligence which will take us the rest of the way to the future. This view owes much to the futuristic visions of the singularitarian movement.

Such a story is seductively simple. If human intelligence has driven us to ever-greater heights, it is hard not to conclude that better, faster, artificial intelligence will drive progress even farther and higher.

This is an old dream. In the 1820s, when Charles Babbage saw steam engines revolutionising human physical labour in England's industrial revolution, he began to imagine constructing similar machines for automating mental labour.

Election anxiety: A neuroscience perspective



In America, tensions rise in the final year of a mandate, but here, it feels like we're in a constant electoral campaign, with nonstop political chatter both in public and on social media, reflecting our heightened anxiety

haven't come across anybody mentioning let alone speaking about 'election anxiety' in our coun-

try, where talk about politics seems to be the national pastime. Which reminds me of what a friend from then Rhodesia who like me was studying in Calcutta (now Kolkata) in the mid-1960s once told us: 'The national game in England is football. In Africa instead we play politics!'

So, I was a little surprised when I came across the expression election anxiety for the first time in one of the medical websites that I consult regularly. This was in an article by a neuroscientist, Michael Merzenich, last month, 'Navigating Election Anxiety: How Worry Affects the Brain.' The opening lines read as follows:

'Once again, America is deeply divided before a national election, with people on each side convinced of the horrors that will be visited upon us if the other side wins.

"Tis the season — and regrettably, not to be jolly but to

'As a neuroscientist, I am especially aware of the deleterious mental and physical impact of chronic worry on our citizenry. That's because worry is not "all in your head." Chronic mild stress drives a panoply of negative changes in your body and brain that add to your risk for physical and neurologic troubles. We modern humans live in a world of worry which appears to be progressively growing."

It takes a neuroscientist to detail the chain of brain events associated with anxiety that has a deleterious impact on other parts of the body. But first, given that anxiety is primarily a mental problem, let us see what a psychologist and a psychiatrist have said about election anxiety ear-

The psychologist wrote: 'The presidential election is taking a toll on the mental health of Americans. And that's according to recent surveys conducted before the attempt on one candidate's life and widespread calls for another to drop out of the race.

'In a poll by the American Psychiatric Association, nearly three-quarters (73%) of respondents said they're feeling anxious about the election. Another poll by Myriad Genetics found that nearly 40% said they are feeling anxious and/or depressed about the election season, and a similar share said they are "checked out" by the amount of news and social media attention on politics and the upcoming

As for the psychiatrist, he begins with: 'Instead of excitement about the upcoming election, many of my patients and friends - regardless of political affiliation report they're terrified at the thought of the "other side" winning. Democrats tell me they fear Donald Trump will end our democracy; Republicans are afraid Kamala Harris will turn the United States into a socialist society without family values.

'Watching the news leaves people from both parties exhausted, sad and scared about the future. Each half of the country is made to believe the other half is stupid, deeply misguided, immoral, dishonest or maliciously plotting to ruin the country they themselves love.'

It is noteworthy that these opinions come from and are about America, where they have both the resources and the interest to conduct such studies and surveys but given that human nature is the same everywhere we can safely assume that their findings may well have a wider resonance in politics elsewhere too.

Maybe in future such surveys may be carried out in Mauritius also. At least in America things get heated up in the last vear of the mandate, but here we seem to be in permanent electoral campaign. There is constant chatter about politics, politicians and elections among the public. but also an overload of bla-bla-bla on social media that is a reflection of our anxiety level.

However, attempts to settle the matter legally have not resulted in any more clarity, and this gives rise to even more anxiety regarding future elections.

For the past several months there has been speculation about whether a partial election will be held, if so when. and if not, when will the Parliament be dissolved, and general elections held. So widely has this been talked about that one wonders if there was any anticipatory election anxiety component at all affecting the population over this

election anxiety may persist subliminally as people resign themselves to seeing more of the same thing, which they had expected would happen.

Two countries in which election anxiety certainly prevailed to a highdegree are Bharat and the UK, which held general elections one after the other recently. In both countries post-election anxiety has substituted for the pre-election variety among their respective populations. In the UK, the massive victory of Labour Party is stressing not only the working class which it has turned against, as evidenced by police action in the recent widespread riots that targeted indigenous citizens and appeased the Labour electorate, but even the elite have raised their voices. Policy measures such as eliminating subsidies for heating to pensioners have given rise to a major concern about not only their comfort but their very survival as winter approaches.

In turn the body too is impacted by such changes in the brain that can 'contribute to elevated blood sugar levels, to craving high-sugar foods, to elevated blood pressure, and to weaker immune responses. This all contributes to higher risks for cardiovascular and other dietary- and immune system-related diseases. And ultimately, to shorter

Lutte anti-corruption: La leçon de Singapour

L'ancien ministre des Transports S. Iswaran devant un procès pour corruption 9 mois suivant sa démission

'ancien ministre des Transports de Singapour, S. Iswaran, a comparu mardi dernier devant le tribunal pour le début de son procès, le premier pour corruption politique dans le pays en plus de quarante ans.

Iswaran, reconnu pour avoir contribué à l'implantation de la Formule 1 dans cette ville-État financière, a démissionné le 18 janvier 2024 après avoir été accusé de corruption. Cela marque un développement historique pour un pays qui se targue d'un gouvernement exemplaire.

Les accusations portées contre lui incluent des allégations selon lesquelles il aurait reçu des cadeaux d'une valeur de plus de 119 000 dollars de la part du milliardaire malaisien Ong Beng Seng en échange de l'avancement de ses intérêts commerciaux. Ces cadeaux comprenaient des vols en classe affaires, des séjours dans des hôtels de luxe et des billets pour le Grand Prix de Formule 1 ainsi que pour des matchs de la Premier League anglaise.

Ce procès est considéré par les observateurs comme l'un des plus significatifs sur le plan politique dans l'histoire de Singapour et pourrait nuire à la réputation du Parti d'action populaire (PAP) avant les élections générales attendues d'ici la fin de l'année prochaine, selon des rapports de l'AFP.

Iswaran a quitté le PAP après avoir reçu un avis formel des charges retenues contre lui, tout en plaidant non coupable. La majorité des 35 accusations portées contre ce ministre de 62 ans concernent la corruption, dont une liée à un contrat gouvernemental qui pourrait lui valoir jusqu'à sept

ans de prison, mais il fait également face à une accusation d'obstruction à la justice.

Ong Beng Seng, l'un des hommes les plus riches de Singapour et directeur général de HotelProperties Limited, a été arrêté le même jour qu'Iswaran en 2023, mais n'a pas encore subi de sanctions. Le ministre des Transports est également accusé d'avoir accepté des bouteilles de whisky et des clubs de golf d'un directeur d'une entreprise de construction qui n'a pas été inculpé.

a plupart des accusations contre Iswaran sont formulées sur la base d'une loi criminelle rarement utilisée, qui stipule qu'il est illégal pour les fonctionnaires publics d'accepter des objets de valeur de la part de personnes avec lesquelles ils travaillent officiellement.

Les avocats d'Iswaran soutiennent que les hommes d'affaires sont ses amis proches et qu'il pouvait accepter ces cadeaux à titre personnel. L'ancien ministre rejette les accusations et affirme son innocence dans sa lettre de démission.

L'ancien Premier ministre Lee Hsien Loong a déclaré au moment de la démission d'Iswaran qu'il s'était engagé à restituer l'argent perçu dans le cadre de son salaire et de ses indemnités depuis son arrestation.

Les ministres du Cabinet sont rémunérés à des niveaux comparables aux plus hauts revenus du secteur privé afin de dissuader la corruption. Lee a précédemment admis que son parti, le PAP, avait "subi un coup" après une série de scandales politiques.

L'année dernière, deux législateurs du PAP ont démissionné en raison d'une affaire. Avant cela, deux membres influents du Cabinet avaient été enquêtés pour avoir prétendument reçu des faveurs liées à la location de vastes bungalows de l'ère coloniale, mais avaient ensuite été blanchis.

Le Premier ministre Lawrence Wong, qui a succédé à Lee, a déclaré que la position anti-corruption du PAP est "non négociable"

Le dernier responsable politique à Singapour jugé pour corruption était WeeToon Boon en 1975, accusé d'avoir reçu des pots-de-vin d'une valeur de plus de 600 000 dollars, selon les médias locaux.

Contrairement à ce qui se passe à Maurice, où les affaires de corruption impliquant des politiciens prennent souvent des mois, voire des années, pour être examinées, l'affaire Iswaran démontre une fois de plus que Singapour prend ces questions au sérieux : il a fallu seulement neuf mois aux autorités singapouriennes pour enquêter et porter des accusations contre l'ancien ministre des Transports.

En effet, la performance de l'ancienne ICAC, qui a maintenant été intégrée à la Financial Crimes Commission (FCC), et sa gestion d'un grand nombre d'affaires médiatisées ont été scrutées ces dernières années. La liste des affaires en attente d'enquête, telles que le scandale Dufry (2015), le scandale Alvaro Sobrinho (2018), ou encore celui du Sugar Insurance Fund Board (2018), souligne l'absence dans ce pays d'une agence d'investigation crédible capable de traiter les crimes en col blanc de manière indépendante. La FCC parviendra-t-elle à améliorer cette situation? Seul l'avenir nous le dira.

Hezbollah et Israël : Vers une nouvelle guerre?

epuis la mi-septembre, le conflit entre Israël et le Hezbollah libanais a connu une escalade vertigineuse. Cette tension, qui dure depuis près d'un an, a franchi un nouveau cap avec des échanges de frappes intenses.

Tout a commencé par deux jours de détonations de dispositifs de communication utilisés par le Hezbollah, des attaques attribuées à Israël, qui ont tué au moins 39 personnes et blessé des milliers d'autres. Le leader du Hezbollah a promis de riposter, et le 20 septembre, le groupe militant a lancé une salve de roquettes vers le nord d'Israël. Depuis lors, les deux camps ont intensifié leurs attaques, forçant des centaines de milliers d'Israéliens à se réfugier dans des abris anti-aériens et provoquant la fuite de dizaines de milliers de personnes

dans certaines régions du sud du Liban, où le Hezbollah est fortement implanté.

L'Organisation internationale pour les migrations a estimé que plus de 200 000 personnes ont été déplacées au Liban à cause du conflit, dont plus de 100 000 avant l'escalade récente. Selon l'agence de sécurité générale du Liban, plus de 31000 personnes ont traversé la frontière vers la Syrie en seulement deux jours.

Contexte et origine du Hezbollah

Le Hezbollah a été fondé en 1982 pendant la guerre civile libanaise, avec pour objectif initial de mettre fin à l'occupation israélienne du sud du Liban, qu'il a réussie à chasser en 2000. Depuis, le groupe a continué de lutter contre Israël, prônant la destruction de l'État israélien.

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Soutenu par l'Iran, le Hezbollah est à la fois un groupe armé et un parti politique, avec des représentants au Parlement libanais et une présence significative dans le gouvernement.

Considéré comme la force paramilitaire la plus importante du monde arabe, le Hezbollah dispose d'une structure organisationnelle robuste et d'un arsenal important, revendiquant environ 100 000 combattants. Il est estimé qu'il détient jusqu'à 150 000 roquettes et missiles, dont des projectiles guidés capables de frapper n'importe où en Israël. Récemment, le groupe a introduit de nouvelles armes, notamment des drones explosifs.

Efforts pour mettre fin au conflit

Les États-Unis, la France et d'autres alliés ont appelé à un cessez-le-feu immédiat de 21 jours pour favoriser la diplomatie. Cependant, le Premier ministre israélien, Benjamin Netanyahu, a déclaré que les frappes contre le Hezbollah continueraient «avec force» jusqu'à ce que les objectifs soient atteints, notamment le retour en toute sécurité des habitants du nord.

e Hezbollah a affirmé, quant à lui, qu'il ne pourrait pas cesser ses frappes sur Israël tant qu'il n'y aurait pas de cessez-le-feu dans le conflit entre Israël et le Hamas, son allié régional.

Des responsables israéliens laissent entendre qu'une opération militaire contre le Hezbollah pourrait s'intensifier, avec des appels à une invasion terrestre du Liban. L'armée israélienne a renforcé ses forces le long de la frontière libanaise, ajoutant des brigades de réserve.

Les chatbots IA prédisent les élections mieux que les humains

Selon Aaru, Kamala Harris gagnerait le vote populaire avec un écart de 4,2 points de pourcentage

ans une primaire démocrate très suivie à New York en juin, le centriste George Latimer a battu le titulaire Jamaal Bowman par une large marge de 58,7 % contre 41,3 %. Avant le vote, deux étudiants de 19 ans, qui avaient abandonné leurs études à Manhattan, ont mené un sondage qui a prédit avec précision les résultats, à seulement 371 voix près. Leur secret? Ils n'ont interrogé personne. Au lieu de cela, ils ont demandé à des milliers de chatbots IA d'indiquer le candidat qu'ils préféraient.

Bienvenue dans le futur du sondage, selon Cam Fink et Ned Koh, co-fondateurs d'une entreprise de sept personnes appelée Aaru. Ils affirment avoir trouvé la formule magique pour prédire des résultats électoraux précis, surtout depuis que la plupart des sondages publics ont échoué à anticiper la victoire de Donald Trump en 2016. La clé, selon eux, est d'ignorer les humains dont ils essaient de capturer le comportement.

Une nouvelle approche du sondage

Pour prédire les résultats électoraux, Aaru utilise des données de recensement pour reproduire les districts électoraux, créant des agents IA essentiellement programmés pour penser comme les électeurs qu'ils imitent. Chaque agent se voit attribuer des centaines de traits de personnalité, allant de leurs aspirations à leurs relations familiales. Ces agents naviguent constamment sur Internet, recueillant des informations pour imiter les habitudes médiatiques des humains, ce qui peut parfois modifier leurs préférences de vote.

Par exemple, lorsqu'une tentative d'assassinat a visé Donald Trump, une grande partie des agents d'Aaru a immédiatement changé de préférence pour soutenir l'ancien président. Mais à mesure que des informations supplémentaires sur le tireur ont émergé, beaucoup d'entre eux ont réajusté leur position.

Les sondages reposent généralement sur les réponses d'environ 5 000 agents IA, et leur réalisation prend entre 30 secondes et 1,5 minutes. Aaru facture moins d'un dixième du coût d'un sondage réalisé

The Spirit of Resistance: Lessons from Gandhi's Journey

Gandhi's teachings remain relevant today, reminding us that non-violence and truth are powerful tools in the quest for justice. His life inspires ongoing efforts to combat oppression and inequality around the world

ass mobilization and movements against injustice of all kinds have become even more necessary these days. On October 2, many will take a moment to reflect on the Mahatma and draw inspiration from his struggle to continue their fight for emancipation.

On January 30, 1948, at 4:30 PM, Mahatma Gandhi was on his way to the prayer ground in the large park near his home. A congregation of 500 was waiting for him for the evening prayer. As he approached the ground, he brought his palms together to greet the crowd. A man emerged from the crowd and fired two shots at him. Gandhi murmured, "Hey Ram," and a third shot rang out. On that Friday, Mahatma Gandhi died as a private citizen. He had no wealth, no property, no office title, nor any academic distinction. He had liberated his country from the British yoke, and India's liberation marked the beginning of the end of the British

Gandhi was born on October 2, 1869, in Porbandar, Gujarat. In the coming days, many will reflect on the man who became a world symbol in the fight against oppression and poverty. It was in South Africa that Gandhi forged the tools and techniques to combat evil in the world. There he united all Indians — merchants, indentured labourers, Hindus, and Muslims — to fight against racism and oppression. His Satyagraha, which literally means insistence on truth, and his conception of non-violence were shaped

by the unique conditions of South Africa. For Gandhi, Satyagraha was a means of avoiding violence; it was also an infallible weapon that oppressed individuals could use to confront all forms of injustice.

By the time he returned to India in 1915, these techniques had been refined. Through Satyagraha and Ashahayoga, he developed methods of agitation that he placed at the service of the Indian National Congress. Once he became convinced that British rulers in India had become oppressive and unscrupulous, he began a relentless struggle to end British rule. He transformed the Indian National Congress from an elitist party into a mass national movement, solidified the organization, and brought in leaders from every level of Indian society. He mobilized untouchables, peasants, women, and upper-class workers from both the Hindus and the Muslims behind Congress, giving new momentum to Indian nationalism

He explained to his people in "Hind Swaraj" the nature of British imperialism: "The English have not taken India. We have given it to them. They are not in India because of their strength, but because we keep them." He taught his people to rid themselves of the paralyzing fear that seized them. The essence of his teaching was fearlessness, truth, and action, and added to these, he always prioritized the welfare of the masses.

Thus, from 1920 to 1947, through a series of mass movements unparalleled in the history of British India, he broke the spell of British rule over Indians. However, throughout his struggles, he urged his people to regard the English as friends,

Are we witnessing a Kamala Harris phenomenon? Is this a new movement that will last and gain traction?

amala Harris will not be the first person of partly African ancestry to

become the President of the United States. That was Obama's breakthrough. Harris is not the first woman to be a major party's presidential nominee. Hillary Clinton holds that distinction. Obama won, Hillary Clinton lost. Harris is the first person of partly Indian origin to be a major party's nominee.

There have been two women vice presidential nominees, Geraldine Ferraro and Sarah Palin. Neither was elected. There have been two Catholic nominees, John F. Kennedy and Joseph R. Biden. Both were elected. Mike Pence, a Catholic was elected Vice President.

There is a tendency for those euphoric about such achievements by nominees to project victory. Often that is more hope than reality. In the 2024 election for President, the race is so close that it is difficult to say which side, Trump's or Harris's, is more about hope than reality.

What is significant is that Kamala Harris's campaign has become a movement and that since President Biden withdrew and endorsed her as presumptive heir, she has soared in the polls, caught Donald Trump, surpassed his numbers and then, ... well, we don't know quite what.

National polls in the US show that Harris is ahead by as much as 4 or 5 points. National polls also show that Trump is ahead by a few points. Which poll(s) should we believe? Well, that's hard to say for four reasons:

- We don't know how the polls were conducted, i.e., what is the demographic that makes up those surveyed? It is easy to get skewed results if one selects a cohort of voters who are in groups tending to favour one candidate or the other. Many pollsters are for hire, so caution is the watchword.
- 2. How does one accurately find a "likely" voter at this stage of the campaign? Most people when asked, will say they intend to vote. But reality is another thing. Voter turnout in US presidential elections is notoriously low. In presidential election years, the turnout is in the low 60 percents, with 2020 hitting 66% of registered voters. If those who profess to be likely voters are no more likely to vote than the historic voter turnout shows, the margin of error of the polls is probably as high as 40% and not the 3-5% that we often are told it is
- 3. What are the specific questions asked? It is well known that polls results can be skewed by how questions are phrased.
- 4. National polls don't really mean anything because ultimately, the presidential race is decided by the electoral college. It is well known that there are many states that are solidly leaning Blue or in favour of the Democratic nominee, and many that are solidly leaning Red or in favour of the Republican nominee. This leads to the oft-repeated caveat that the presidential race will be decided by the so-called swing states or "purple" states. Here "purple" conveys the notion that the state is neither solidly Red (Republican) nor solidly Blue (Democrat), but a mixture and hence, purple.

The result in these swing states often depends on

voter turnout, or, in other words, how many of the "likely" voters turn out to be "actual" voters. A few thousand votes in Georgia, North Carolina, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Wisconsin, Nevada, and Arizona, could make the difference. And this is true regardless of how the vote goes in New York, Massachusetts, Illinois, California, Oregon, Washington, Texas, Alabama, Florida, Arkansas, Oklahoma ... well, you get the idea.

A woman of colour

Kamala Harris's candidacy is notable because she is a woman of colour running for the highest office. She has both an African American and an Asian background. She has experience as a prosecutor in California, as Attorney General of California, as a United States Senator, and as Vice President.

But she must also contend with those who claim that these accomplishments are not adequate preparation for being President, as well as with those who diminish her achievements by suggesting she obtained them through favoritism or chicanery.

Clearly, Kamala Harris has struck a chord with the American people. Or to be more precise, with the Democrats and a fair number of women, Independents, and a cohort of Republicans who believe that Trump is reprehensible and a threat to American Democracy and to America's security. To the extent that her candidacy indeed represents a movement, it is about women's rights.

As one listens to the campaign rhetoric of the two candidates, Trump presents a dark, dystopian view of today's America, along with dire predictions of decline — and worse, an American Armageddon, if you will - should he be defeated. This American Armageddon is augmented with his dark and dystopian view of a worldwide Armageddon, as he predicts World War III. Much of his rhetoric is laced with the same old xenophobia and hate mongering. The recent false accusations that Haitian immigrants were eating the cats and dogs of their neighbours have caused many to observe that these types of accusations have their

roots in the anti-Semitic propaganda of the Nazis. Trump's running mate, J.D. Vance has added false accusations that HIV and tuberculosis cases are "skyrocketing" in Springfield. There is no empirical data to support these.

Trump's campaign during the 2016 presidential election was built on racist and xenophobic rhetoric with outlandish promises about what he would be able to achieve. He continues to promise housing and jobs for all, and even happiness to women.

As in 2016, his supporters are oblivious to the daily mouthfuls of falsehood that Trump and Vance emit.

In contrast, Harris has offered messages of hope and a future of opportunity for all Americans — a message of equal access to opportunity. More importantly, she has cast herself as a fighter for freedom for all Americans, and by implication, for all people in the world. Freedom includes the rights of women to make their own decisions about reproductive choices. The abortion question looms large in this election. But it must be remembered that in many Red or Republican states, whereas women may well vote to protect abortion rights, Trump remains to have a stranglehold on the Republican vote.

Is it important that Kamala Harris is a woman or a person of colour with African and Indian heritage? Her acceptance speech at the Democratic National Convention is instructive. She did not mention her sex or her ethnicity. Some have observed that it was necessary to state the obvious. But not running as a woman candidate, or as a Black or Indian, is smart. Trump's efforts to smear her for only recently having claimed to be Black fell flat. He has not attacked her personally based on her gender, but he has falsely claimed that Democrats welcomed the overruling of the Roe v. Wade case which established a woman's right to abortion.

Two other areas need mention: the US economy, and foreign policy.

Livery presidential election turns, to some extent, on the economy, or more precisely pocketbook issues affecting the voting public. There are some polls suggesting that more people have confidence in Trump to handle the economy than in Harris. There is little empirical data to support such a contention. The economy has been doing quite well under President Biden with steady growth of GDP, the boiling rate of inflation reduced to a simmer, almost 16 million jobs created, and the Fed finally lowering interest rates while the stock markets continue to soar. Trump's plans for the economy include imposing tariffs on all imported goods and another tax cut for the wealthy and for corporations.

On foreign policy, Harris's experience includes multiple engagements with foreign leaders. But most of this has been invisible to the American public and she gets no credit for it. Trump's record on foreign policy is abysmal, but he doesn't get enough blame for it.

Trump's efforts to dismantle NATO and rupture America's alliances with European nations seem to have been forgotten as Biden has strengthened those ties and worked with NATO countries in supporting Ukraine.

Biden's botched withdrawal from Afghanistan masked the fact that it was Trump's Secretary of State who signed the agreement to withdraw American troops from that country. Trump's inexplicable embrace of Putin and his opposition to American support for Ukraine should disqualify him from the presidency, but his supporters seem not to care.

Perhaps the American public has grown weary of conflicts all around the world and the sad reality that America's influence has waned to the point that we cannot do much about what is happening whether we are dealing with our allies or adversaries. The realization that Trump's pronouncements on foreign policy are bluster and that Kamala Harris is not likely to be any more effec-

tive than Biden suggest that there is no clear winner on this score.

So, are we witnessing a Kamala Harris phenomenon? Is this a new movement that will last and gain traction? For a time, right after Biden announced that he would not run for reelection, it certainly seemed so. But lately, the lotus blossom has faded somewhat.

We have an old-fashioned horse race for President. It is just too close to call today.

rn a rapidly changing economic landscape, recent developments have sparked significant discussions about the future of Mauritius's economy. The Monetary Policy Committee's recent decision to lower the key interest rate by 50 basis points has raised questions about its implications for borrowers and the broader economy. Dr Vinave Ancharaz. an International Economic Consultant, shares his insights on this crucial decision and its potential impact on Mauritian society. With general elections approaching, the interplay between economic measures and political strategy is more relevant than ever. In this interview, Dr Ancharaz also addresses the anticipated salary realignments, proposed interest-free loans for young people, and the possible ramifications of a looming political shift.

the government's recent manoeuvres have clearly shown that it is too fixated on political survival to care about good economics.

The rate cut will be welcomed by borrowers – and that

means practically everybody, whether those with home loans or car leases or hire-purchase agreements. House-hold debt reached Rs 240 billion in December 2023, equivalent to 102.5% of income, with debt servicing absorbing 17% of household income. The rate cut will thus bring long awaited relief to debtors, after rising continuously from 1.85% to 4.5% between December 2021 and December 2022, and staying at that level until the drop on Monday.

Inflation at the end of 2024 is estimated at 4%, that is within the Bank's target range of 2%-5%. However, the IMF projects the inflation rate to be 4.9%, and with the recent increase in freight and salaries, inflation is likely to be higher than expected. So, it may be too early to settle for cheap money. The risk is that lower interest rates may discourage portfolio investment in Mauritius, leading to reduced foreign currency inflows and increasing downward pressure on the rupee. Further depreciation could drive up inflation, ultimately defeating the Bank's objectives.

* Another significant development is Business Mauritius' decision to challenge the salary realignment in the Supreme Court. What potential impacts do you foresee from this challenge?

Some 200,000 employees in the private sector earning up to Rs 50,000 per month were expecting salary adjustments ranging from Rs 600 to Rs 2,925 at the end of this month, with back pay for July and August. The government gazetted the new salary structures on 13th September, allowing ample time to employers to effect the change in

their September payroll.

However, on Monday 23rd, Business Mauritius, called on its members to freeze payment of any salary adjustment pending further legal advice and, possibly, recourse to legal action at the level of the Supreme Court. Business Mauritius is concerned about the legality of the Remuneration Regulations issued by the Ministry of Labour and Industrial Relations. The Regulations did not evolve from the established process of tripartite consultations involving the National Remuneration Board (NRB) and the National Wage Consultative Council but were simply decreed by the Ministry.

* As we approach the elections, various freebies or 'bribes' are likely to be announced by both sides, particularly by the incumbent government alliance. The latest in this series is the announcement by the Prime Minister to make housing loans interest-free for youths aged 18 to 35. What potential economic impact do you see from this measure? Additionally, do you think it will be enough to attract young voters to support the MSM-led alliance?

This proposal has sparked considerable debate. Some estimates suggest that implementing the measure could cost the government nearly Rs 40 billion over five years. However, whether it will actually be a vote-winner is debatable.

First, the target age group is not quite representative of the typical home loan applicant. Most borrowers are over 30, so the measure will impact only a small proportion of the youth. Second, the measure will surely come with conditions which are not specified at this stage. For example, to what loan amount will it apply? Capping the mortgage size will clearly reduce the proposal's effectiveness.

Finally, given the prevailing property prices, only those who own land, or are well-off to begin with, are likely to benefit from the measure while the rest of us will pay for it through taxes

* Furthermore, many anticipate that the Prime Minister will announce another significant commitment regarding retirement pensions on International Day of Older Persons, October 1st, an event the government is preparing for with considerable interest. Do you share this expectation?

There is little doubt that the Prime Minister will make yet another big promise of pension hike, if re-elected. With the BRP at Rs 15,000 for those aged 60-64 as from January 2025, I won't be surprised if the PM announces that the BRP will rise to Rs25,000 during their next term. With some 270,000 beneficiaries of the BRP, a further Rs10,000 increase in pensions will take a heavy toll on public finances, costing an additional Rs35 billion annually, and raising questions about financing and sustainability.

Such an announcement will surely have the effect of locking in many, but by no means all, of our senior citizens' votes in favour of the government alliance. However, I doubt

* Besides the freebies and populist measures, there have also been the usual share of questionable practices, the latest being the revelation by ReA about a pos-



sible nexus between the government, Silver Bank, and the Mercantile and Maritime Group, which supplies fuel to Mauritius. What are your thoughts on this matter?

Little is known about the reasons behind the fall of Silver Bank—until now. The investigation by ReA has explored its connections with the government, the STC, and the Mercantile and Maritime Group (MMG). In June 2023, the STC justified selecting MMG as its oil supplier by highlighting better credit terms and the agreement to be paid in rupees. This raised eyebrows since MMG has no established business in Mauritius, but there was little questioning of the arrangement.

It now appears that MMG may have been pressured into holding its rupee deposits at Silver Bank. Was this an attempt to to give the bank a lifeline after uncovering systematic fraud in February 2023? Who benefited from this situation? Some power brokers close to 'Lakwizinn'? While these questions warrant further investigation by a proper commission of inquiry, it seems the STC's claim about MMG accepting payment in local currency is inaccurate, as around Rs30 billion transited through Silver Bank to be repatriated in US

ReA suggests that MMG would have put the STC in a difficult position on August 9 by allegedly refusing to offload its last oil shipment unless it was refunded a \$15 million security bond frozen at Silver Bank. If this is proven true, the government's questionable deals could have pushed the country to the brink of disaster last month.

* Besides the Finance Minister's positive remarks on the performance of the Mauritian economy, the Governor of the Bank of Mauritius has also painted an optimistic picture, especially regarding its "robust performance" during this year's first quarter. This is certainly not the time for complacency or indulgence.

In the future, Mauritius could benefit from a massive windfall if the UK and the US offered compensation for retaining Chagos as a military base. However, I don't recommend using those funds to prop up social spending in the country or to lavish the population with gifts. It would be more prudent to set aside the bulk of the proceeds in a sovereign wealth fund that would come in handy during rainy days.

* Sitting governments often find it easy to promote and implement populist measures, confident that the opposition will feel embarrassed and thus reluctant to oppose them. What stance should the Labour Party-MMM-ND-ReA alliance take regarding the salary realignment decision?

As I said before, the Opposition is quiet on the issue, maintaining a neutral stance. It would be politically risky for the Opposition to take sides. On the one hand, one

can sympathize with Business Mauritius. The government has played politics with wages, forcing many enterprises into a precarious position. Many companies are shedding labour; others are delaying recruitment, and yet others are opting for foreign workers who, they believe, can do a lot more for the same wage. he scene that prompts slave hunter Madame La Victoire to chase the Maroons, the fugitive slaves, is sparked by the cries of a baby unsettled while being breastfed. These heartbreaking images of a mother on the run with her baby capture the essence of the movie: there is a limit to how

much agony a human being can take before spiritedly seeking refuge and reparation. All this is masterfully staged in the dark forest with striking realism. When, in a dream, slave Massamba, Mati's father, brutally kills the slave owner, few viewers would remain unmoved. Director Simon Moutaïrou deserves praise for avoiding the easy path of depicting violence for violence's sake. He succeeds in conveying his motivation to raise awareness without resorting to an overkill. Sobriety conveys intense and lasting emotions more effectively.



Madame La Victoire's moral supremacism is a trap we can all fall into. When we live in a "tribe" with no bridges with the outside world, we only nurture affinities with fellow our human beings based on country of origin, ethnicity, religion,

class and gender. As a result, we tend to lose hindsight, discernment and even empathy with the Other, making our own values sacred and cursing those of others. And if the elites aren't very enlightened, they'll plot the status quo for as long as possible. In a plural society, social links grow defiant when the sense of entitlement trickles down. On the other hand, the "rebellious" son expresses some truth about the fact that younger generations, equipped with new bearings, are often more prone to be more open-minded.

"Ni chaînes ni maîtres"* is not a masterpiece, but it is a laudable attempt to offer us some riveting time. Jumping off the cliff to die as the climax of the ending, rather than enduring the slow death of the soul in captivity, brings a dignified relief. A deafening silence settled over the audience as the credits rolled as if to express liberation. A deserving ovation followed. French audiences, and many Mauritians, will clearly be more shaken by the movie's perspective, which breaks with historical taboos. What pathogen might spark the next pandemic? How scientists are preparing for 'disease X'



Allen Cheng Professor of Infectious Diseases, Monash University

efore the Covid pandemic, the World Health Organization (WHO) had made a list of priority infectious diseases. These were felt to pose a threat to international public health, but where research was still needed to improve their surveillance and diagnosis. In 2018, "disease X" was included, which signified that a

pathogen previously not on our radar could cause a pandemic.

While it's one thing to acknowledge the limits to our knowledge of the microbial soup we live in, more recent attention has focused on how we might systematically approach future pandemic risks.

Former US Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld famously talked about "known knowns" (things we know we know), "known unknowns" (things we know we don't know), and "unknown unknowns" (the things we don't know we don't know).

Although this may have been controversial in its original context of weapons of mass destruction, it provides a way to think about how we might approach future pandemic threats.

Influenza: a 'known known'

Influenza is largely a known entity; we essentially have a minor pandemic every winter with small changes in the virus each year. But more major changes can also occur, resulting in spread through populations with little pre-existing immunity. We saw this most recently in 2009 with the swine flu pandemic.

However, there's a lot we don't understand about what drives influenza mutations, how these interact with population-level immunity, and how best to make predictions about transmission, severity and impact each year.

The current H5N1 subtype of avian influenza ("bird flu") has spread widely around the world. It has led to the deaths of many millions of birds and spread to several mammalian species including cows in the United States and marine mammals in South America.

Human cases have been reported in people who have had close contact with infected animals, but fortunately there's currently no sustained spread between people.

While detecting influenza in animals is a huge task in a large country such as Australia, there are systems in place to detect and respond to bird flu in wildlife and production animals.

It's inevitable there will be more influenza pandemics in the future. But it isn't always the one we are worried about. Attention had been focused on avian influenza since Check-in 1|2

1997, when an outbreak in birds in Hong Kong caused severe disease in humans. But the subsequent pandemic in 2009 originated in pigs in central Mexico.

Coronaviruses: an 'unknown known'

Although Rumsfeld didn't talk about "unknown knowns", coronaviruses would be appropriate for this category. We knew more about coronaviruses than most people might have thought before the COVID pandemic.

We'd had experience with severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS) and Middle Eastern respiratory syndrome (MERS) causing large outbreaks. Both are caused by viruses closely related to SARS-CoV-2, the coronavirus that causes COVID. While these might have faded from public consciousness before COVID, coronaviruses were listed in the 2015 WHO list of diseases with pandemic potential.

Previous research into the earlier coronaviruses proved vital in allowing Covid vaccines to be developed rapidly. For example, the Oxford group's initial work on a MERS vaccine was key to the development of AstraZeneca's COVID vaccine.

Similarly, previous research into the structure of the spike protein – a protein on the surface of coronaviruses that allows it to attach to our cells – was helpful in developing mRNA vaccines for Covid.

It would seem likely there will be further coronavirus pandemics in the future. And even if they don't occur at the scale of Covid, the impacts can be significant. For example, when MERS spread to South Korea in 2015, it only caused 186 cases over two months, but the cost of controlling it was estimated at US\$8 billion (A\$11.6 billion).

The 25 viral families: an approach to 'known unknowns'

Attention has now turned to the known unknowns.

There are about 120 viruses from 25 families that are known to cause human disease. Members of each viral family share common properties and our immune systems respond to them in similar ways.

An example is the flavivirus family, of which the best-known members are yellow fever virus and dengue fever virus. This family also includes several other important viruses, such as Zika virus (which can cause birth defects when pregnant women are infected) and West Nile virus (which causes encephalitis, or inflammation of the brain).

The WHO's blueprint for epidemics aims to consider threats from different classes of viruses and bacteria. It looks at individual pathogens as examples from each category to expand our understanding systematically.

The US National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases has taken this a step further, preparing vaccines and therapies for a list of prototype pathogens from key virus families. The goal is to be able to adapt this knowledge to new vaccines and treatments if a pandemic were to arise from a closely related virus.

Pathogen X, the 'unknown unknown'

There are also the unknown unknowns, or "disease X" – an unknown pathogen with the potential to trigger a severe global epidemic. To prepare for this, we need to adopt new forms of surveillance specifically looking at where new pathogens could emerge.

In recent years, there's been an increasing recognition that we need to take a broader view of health beyond only thinking about human health, but also animals and the environment. This concept is known as "One Health" and considers issues such as climate change, intensive agricultural practices, trade in exotic animals, increased human encroachment into wildlife habitats, changing international travel, and urbanisation.

This has implications not only for where to look for new infectious diseases, but also how we can reduce the risk of "spillover" from animals to humans. This might include targeted testing of animals and people who work closely with animals. Currently, testing is mainly directed towards known viruses, but new technologies can look for as yet unknown viruses in patients with symptoms consistent with new infections.

We live in a vast world of potential microbiological threats. While influenza and coronaviruses have a track record of causing past pandemics, a longer list of new pathogens could still cause outbreaks with significant consequences.

Continued surveillance for new pathogens, improving our understanding of important virus families, and developing policies to reduce the risk of spillover will all be important for reducing the risk of future pandemics.

The first thing we may notice is a feeling, like joy or sadness, and physical sensations, like tightness or tenderness. Acknowledge these as you continue to breathe and focus, listening attentively. Surround these feelings and sensations with breath and recognize that they are contained and held in an immeasurable substance like air, intangible, ineffable, but utterly real. This is the silence of the heart, and the more we listen for it, return to it, and accept it, the more we bathe and purify ourselves in the soundless center of our being.

Modi refuses to give MAGA a desi boost, snubs Trump & skips meet

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi has wrapped up his three-day official visit to the US without meeting Donald Trump days after Republican presidential nominee announced the meet at the Flint, Michigan rally.

Fox News reported that Modi was expected to make an appearance on Long Island on Sunday for Trump's rally. However despite Trump's comments India had denied any such meeting even before PM left for US. Indian Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri confirmed that there is no "specific meeting at present" with the ex-President, reports HT.

During the visit Modi attended Quad Leaders' Summit in Wilmington, addressed thousands of members of the Indian-American community in Long Island, met US tech giants and addressed the UN's Summit of the Future on Monday.



He also held bilateral discussions with aligned with his own "Make in India" world leaders on all three days.

But chose not to meet both the presidential candidates Kamala Harris and Donald Trump. The apparent snub comes days after Trump claimed in one of his rallies that his fantastic friend Modi will be coming to US to meet him.

"He's fantastic. I mean, fantastic, man. A lot of these leaders are fantastic," Trump told supporters at a town hall in Flint, Michigan on Tuesday.

Modi dashes Trump's 'AbkiBaar, Trump Sarkar' hopes

Modi's move is in contrast to two earlier occasions when he had subtly endorsed a "Trump Sarkar."

Despite their 'friendship' being defined by a strong personal bond and shared political ideologies. Modi has often praised Trump's "America First" policy, which campaign.

Their relationship made global headlines, especially during the "Howdy, Modi" rally in Houston in 2019. At that time, Trump was president running for his second term, and Modi, as a foreign leader, invited him on stage in front of 50,000 Indian-Americans, a key voting base for Trump. In a show of support, Modi even shouted, "Abki Baar, Trump Sarkar" (This time, Trump government).

In 2020, Modi hosted Trump at the "Namaste Trump" event in Ahmedabad, drawing over 100,000 people. These events were significant during Trump's re-election campaign and helped him send a message to his Hindu supporters in the U.S. However, this year, there was no repeat of the "Abki Baar Trump Sarkar" moment from Modi.

Same-sex couples in Thailand can get married when equality law takes effect in January

hailand's landmark marriage equality bill was I officially written into law Tuesday, allowing same-sex couples to legally wed.

The law was published in the Royal Gazette after endorsement by King Maha Vajiralongkorn, and will come into effect in 120 days. This means LGBTQ couples will be able to register their marriage in January next year, making Thailand the third place in Asia, after Taiwan and Nepal, to allow same-sex marriage.

The bill, which grants full legal, financial and medical rights for marriage partners of any gender, sailed through both the House of Representatives and the Senate in April and June respectively, reports AP.

Thailand has a reputation for acceptance and inclusivity but struggled for decades to pass a marriage equality law. Thai society largely holds conservative values, and members of the LGBTQ community say they face discrimination in everyday life.

The government and state agencies are also historically conservative, and advocates for gender equality had a hard time pushing lawmakers and civil



servants to accept change.

The legislation amended the country's Civil and Commercial Code to replace gender-specific words such as "men and women" with gender-neutral words such as

The government led by the Pheu Thai party has made marriage equality one of its main goals. It made a major effort to identify itself with the annual Bangkok Pride parade in June, in which thousands of people celebrated in one of Bangkok's busiest commercial districts.

Kamala Harris takes massive lead over rival Donald Trump among young voters, new poll savs

ramala Harris has widened Democrats' advantage with younger voters, topping Donald Trump by 32 percentage points among likely voters between 18 and 29 years old, according to a poll by the Institute of Politics at the Harvard Kennedy School.

The poll showed Harris leading Trump 64% to 32% among young likely voters in a two-way hypothetical match up, reports Bloomberg.

"This poll reveals a significant shift in the overall vibe and preferences of young Americans as the campaign heads into the final stretch," said John Della Volpe, the Institute of Politics polling director.

A Harvard Youth Poll earlier this year showed President Joe Biden topping Trump by just 13 points among likely young voters in a multi-candidate field. By comparison, Harris leads Trump by 31 points in a multicandidate field in the latest poll.

The Harvard Youth Poll surveyed 2,002 young people aged 18-to-29 from Sept. 4 to 16. The margin of error for the total sample is /- 2.65 ppts.

5 executions being carried out in US in 1 week, who are the death row inmates?

s many as five executions are set to be carried out in the AUnited States in a span of just one week. This is an unusually high number, and if finally carried out, this will be the first time in more than 20 years, that is since July 2003, that five were held in seven days, the nonprofit Death Penalty Information Center revealed. The executions are being carried out in Alabama, Missouri, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Texas.

One of the executions - the one in South Carolina - has already been carried out. Freddie Owens was put to death for the 1997 murder of a convenience store clerk during a robbery. This was the first execution carried out in South Carolina in 13 years. Owens was put to death by lethal injection at Broad River Correctional Institution, reports HT.

If the five other death row inmates are executed, the US will have reached 1,600 executions since the US Supreme Court reinstated the death penalty in 1976.



Who are the four remaining death row inmates awaiting execution?

Alabama is preparing to carry out the nation's second execution ever using nitrogen gas this week. Alan Miller was sentenced to death for the murders of three men during back-to-back workplace shootings in 1999. Alabama

became the first state to use the new procedure in January this year.

Texas is set to execute Travis Mullis, who killed his three--month-old son in January 2008. Mullis, who has a history of mental illness, repeatedly tried to waive his right to appeal his death sentence. He will be put to death by lethal injec-

Marcellus Williams will also receive the lethal injection this week in Missouri. He was accused of fatally stabbing a woman in the St. Louis suburb of University City in 1998.

Emmanuel Littlejohn is set to be put to death in Oklahoma this week, also by lethal injection, for his role in the 1992 shooting death of a convenience store owner during a robbery. While Littlejohn admitted that he was indeed involved in the robbery, he has claimed that he did not fire the fatal shot

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'Not dating': Elon Musk clarifies as internet pairs him up with Italy's Giorgia Meloni

The internet has labelled Tesla CEO Elon Musk and Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni as a "perfect couple" after the former praised her at an awards ceremony in New York on the sidelines of the United Nations General Assembly on Tuesday.

Seeing the two together at the event, netizens exploded the internet with comments like, "I am totally shipping these two. Perfect" and "Now that is the kind of international power couple I can get behind." Some users also wrote, "That's Amore (That's love)."

"I wanna find someone that looks at me the same way Meloni looks at Musk," another user wrote, reports HT.

However, Musk silenced all the comments on Wednesday by replying to an X post that questioned if he and Meloni "would date".

To this, Musk wrote: "Not dating".

present the accolade to someone who is even "more beautiful on the inside than she was on the outside."

"She's also someone who is authentic, honest, truthful — and that can't always be said about politicians," he added

Meloni received the award for her "strong support of the EU and becoming the first female prime minister of Italy".

Previously, the internet was occasionally flooded with Prime Minister Narendra Modi-Meloni memes, jokingly portraying the romance between the two prime ministers. Some posts even created an imaginary phone call between the two. Such memes went viral on social media, especially during the G20 Summit in India and then after the BJP fell short of a majority in the Lok Sabha elections.

Netizens also created a #Melodi - connecting Meloni and Modi's names.

In December of last year, Meloni used the hashtag on a selfie she posted with Modi after meeting him on the sidelines of the COP28 summit in Dubai. She also shared a similar picture with Modi in June this year.

'Go back, step down': Bangladeshi nationals protest against Muhammad Yunus in US

A large group of Bangladeshi nationals in the United States staged a protest against Muhammad Yunus, who is leading Bangladesh's interim government, over the attacks on minorities in the country on Tuesday. The protests took place outside a hotel in New York where Muhammad Yunus is staying for attending the 79th United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) session.

Videos doing rounds on social media show the protesters chanting slogans such as "go back" and "step down". The demonstrators also held posters saying: "Sheikh Hasina our Prime Minister".

According to one of the protesters, Yunus came to power with "dirty politics", reports HT.

"Muhammad Yunus took the power unconstitutionally, illegally. He captured power with dirty politics, and a lot of people have been killed. So far, our elected PM, Sheikh Hasina, has not resigned. We request UN humbly that he did not represent Bangladeshi people here," the protester told news agency ANI.

Another protester said: "I am here to protest the illegal, unelected person representing 117 million people of Bangladesh...He is not elected, he has

been appointed by students. He doesn't care about minorities or anybody...He has illegally occupied the country."

Yunus took charge as the head of Bangladesh's interim government on August 8 after Hasina resigned and fled the country following widespread protests against her Awami League-led government over a controversial job quota system. Over 200 people were killed in the incidents of violence that erupted across the country amid the political

crisis.

Shortly after Hasina's downfall, some protesters vandalised temples belonging to the minorities and carried out loot and arson attacks in the country.

Muhammad Yunus in US

On Tuesday, Yunus attended a high-level meeting at an event on the sidelines of the 79th UNGA in New York. During the meeting, he stressed the urgent need for the repatriation of Rohingyas in Bangladesh, saying that the significant challenges the country has been facing are due to the presence of over 1.2 million displaced Rohingyas from Myanmar.

"Despite hosting the Rohingyas with great empathy, a densely populated Bangladesh has been incurring so much in terms of social-economic-environmental costs. These culminate in a series of traditional and non-traditional security risks for us. Much of our own development gains are at stake. Clearly, Bangladesh has reached its limits. Therefore, as much as Bangladesh engages in humanitarian aspects or ensuring justice, repatriation of the Rohingyas remains the only sustainable solution to the protracted crisis," he said.

1,000-year-old seed used to grow ancient Biblical tree, scientists claim it may cure cancer

mysterious ancient seed, dating back to a time between 993 AD and 1202, has grown into a 10 feet tall tree nearly 1,000 years after it came into existence. The seed, found in the Judean Desert between the West Bank and Israel, is likely to have belonged to a lineage of trees mentioned in the Bible, scientists say.

Named "Sheba", after a biblical queen, the ancient seed took 14 years to grow into a tree after it was discovered during an excavation in a cave in the late 1980s. Scientists believe the seed belongs to a now-extinct species of trees that existed in the region which is modern-day Israel, Palestine and Jordan, reports HT.

Scientists claim the fully-grown tree

could be the source of "tsori" (meaning balm) - a resin mentioned in the Bible for its healing powers. They claim the revival of the tree can unravel the mystery behind the Biblical balm.

The tree is also related to the Commiphora species that produce fragrant resins which some believe to be the source of another Biblical perfume called "Balm of Gilead"

"Our initial hypothesis was that 'Sheba' might be a candidate for the historical 'Judean Balsam," the scientists, but added that they refuted the idea as the tree lacks aromatic properties.

Anti-cancer properties

Sheba has shown a range of medicinal properties. Chemical analysis of the ancient tree's leaves reveals that it contains active compounds with anti-inflamma-

tory and anti-cancer properties. Its stems and leaves have antioxidant and skin-smoothing properties.

"We believe these findings support our second hypothesis, that 'Sheba' ... may represent an extinct (or at least extirpated) [lineage] once native to this region, whose resin 'tsori' mentioned in Biblical texts was valuable, associated with healing but not described as fragrant," scientists said.

After performing DNA, chemical and radiocarbon analyses of the tree, scientists have found that it belongs to the family of myrrh and frankincense, two compounds also mentioned in the Bible and closely associated with Jesus.

Island of Sweetness

ne way and another, Mauritius gets into the papers. January 8. for example. The Times carried a half-page advertisement for the Hawker-Siddeley Group (and other quality papers may have carried the same advertisement for all I know). It showed cane fields in the shadow of mountain peaks;

with a small map of Mauritius and a small picture of bags of sugar being carried on brawny shoulders.

Mauritius was headlined as "Island of sweetness and light", and the text accompanying the picture read "Sail south across the Indian Ocean and, 500 miles east of Madagascar, you'll come to the sweetest island in the world, Mauritius. Coral-reefed, palm-fringed, and beautiful. An island where half a million people live and work and read — by sugar! The entire economy of Mauritius depends on this one main crop. Sugar supplies work, trade, light and heat. For Mauritius, without fuel or any source of power, solved the problem of a one-crop economy by burning bagasse, the fibre that remains after the sugar cane is crushed. Bagasse is burnt to drive the turbines that supply power to the sugar crushers, and the same turbines provide a bonus of light and heat to the island."

Then follows the advertising puff for Hawker Siddeley turbines.

Whatever one may think of the references to an island of sweetness and light, and to the coral reefs and palmfringes, one must admit that it is useful even in an advertisement — to have the basic problems of Mauritius spotlighted: the one-crop economy on which the whole island depends, and the lack of natural resources to provide power. But "the sweetest island in the world"! I'd like to hear the opinions of some of the army of unemployed, underemployed, or underpaid labourers on that!

Mauritius also figures in the January number of Family Planning, the quarterly journal of the Family Planning Association. Mrs Nina Mackenzie has written about her visit to East Africa and Mauritius on behalf of the FPA. After referring to the people who met her at the airport, Mrs Mackenzie goes on "Mauritius has a large sugar growing industry and the population is over 600,000 with an annual birth rate of 44 per thousand. In the report of the Committee on Population 1954 the birth rate was said to be the highest in the world. The FPA of Mauritius and its 26 branches are faced with this vast problem of over-population and I found that much publicity had been given to my visit. I was invited to broadcast and received much encouragement when I called on important officials in the Government."

Mrs Mackenzie goes on to say that she was able to meet different sections of the community and was made to feel how much her visit was appreciated. She refers to the problems facing the Mauritius FPA: "A much needed centre to be built at Port Louis; a paid social worker needed to travel around the island, a change of name to the Family Welfare Association thought to be more acceptable to the people and the Government; and the overwhelming need for more education and help to be given to the villagers...



with the constant thought of how to find sufficient money. The sugar industry is very rich but with most of the large estates owned by Roman Catholics an appeal to them for help did not seem possible."

The recurring theme in people's minds was, says Mrs Mackenzie, that "The Government must help." She feels that the Government will help, but in its own time. Meanwhile people should join the Association so that there is a strong association which "would be of inestimable value when the decision was taken." As in News of Population two months ago, Mrs Mackenzie refers to the glove-puppet play in Creole. "On leaving," she says, "I felt that my visit had helped to dispel that feeling of isolation which affects all family planning workers in remote parts of the world."

There has, of course, been a recent furore in the UK about family planning. The British Medical Association found itself the centre of a storm of controversy when it rejected a Family Planning Association advertisement. This the FPA wanted to insert in the BMA's annual Getting Married; before deciding whether or not to accept the advertisement for the monthly Family Doctor, the BMA has asked for the comments of its Roman Catholic members. It was widely said that the BMA had rejected the FPA advertisement at the instigation of Catholic members; commenting on this, The Times quite properly said that if this was indeed so, then the BMA was allowing a tiny minority to prevent the free flow of information. The majority of people in the country were in favour of family planning; yet the views of a tiny minority were to be allowed to prevail.

Letters to the editor of The Times revealed the fact that the Family Planning Association lets the Catholic Truth Society advertise its anti-birth control pamphlets in the quarterly Family Planning; but the Catholic Truth Society will not accept the FPA's advertisements in its quarterly Catholic Truth. Can this be because the FPA's case for family planning is better than the CTS's case against it?

Educating Young Nations

The name of Mr W.E.F. Ward is not unfamiliar to the older generation of teachers. He left Mauritius to become an educational adviser at the Colonial Office; later still he became editor of Overseas Education. He has just had published, by Allen and Unwin at 15 shillings, a new book on education in the colonies. Its title is that which I have given to this paragraph: Educating Young Nations. In just under 200 pages, Mr Ward deals with the problems which crop up when an education system originally devised on Western lines for a Western country is set to work in a country where the traditional culture is not Western. The

problems are both professional and human, and Mr Ward tackles both. Naturally, since his active teaching career was in the Gold Coast (now Ghana) followed by four and a half years as Director in Mauritius, he draws plentifully upon his experience in both countries. The index gives some idea of the frequency with which he refers to Mauritius:

"Mauritius 16, 21, 23, 25, 29, 30, 41, 44, 74, 75, 97, 141-3, 159, 160, 192."

The big gap between pages 97 and 141 is because in the intervening pages Mr Ward is dealing with technical and informal education, in both of which Mauritius is at present lacking — though it will not be lacking if the plans which Mr Beejadhur has in mind come to fruit.

One of the special problems with which Mr Ward deals is the problem of secondary school selection; he takes the reader back to 1941 when he changed the basis and organisation of the Standard Six examinations. He refers to work which has recently been done in Nigeria and Northern Rhodesia in evaluating the results of selection examinations especially in the light of the need to remedy the gross inequalities of opportunity which arise from social differences and differences in environment. "One child comes from an efficient school in a town; his parents... have had some education: he drinks clean water from the tap, and eats food which has been bought in a properly supervised market; he may go barefoot but it is on relatively clean pavements: his house had electric light and newspapers, perhaps a radio, perhaps even books. Another child comes from a poor school in a remote village, with illiterate parents; he is infested with internal parasites from his food, his drinking water, and the mud he walks in; and he may have no opportunity... of seeing a newspaper."

The existence of these two contrasting environments is one of the problems confronting the colonial administrator or the newly-fledged Ministers of a colony which has achieved constitutional emancipation. This social problem must be solved, just as must the educational problems. Mauritius has both types of problem to solve. The Government has to help to improve the lot of the unfortunate majority of the citizens; it has to provide opportunity for work, it is called upon to do this, that and the other to make life better for everyone. But it cannot do everything at once; and in any case, as we have more than once pointed out in these columns, the way to a better Mauritius will not be quick, will not be easy, will not be smooth. All the Government can offer for the immediate future is toil and sweat: but toil and sweat now will avoid the blood and tears in the future.

Those jeremiads who cannot understand what the government is doing, what it is getting at in its plans and preparations for the next 10 years, should read Mr Ward's book. They will learn that in the field of education, as in all other fields of constructive governmental activity, one cannot get quick returns which are lasting returns. No Government can succeed if it acts according to the philosophy of "Eat, drink, be merry, for tomorrow we die", or "Come day, go day, and the devil take the hind-most." On the contrary, the Government, like all prudent citizens, takes thought for tomorrow, and plans for the future. It often may look as though the Government is sitting back comfortably on its collective derrière and doing nothing, but this isn't ever the case. No matter what the Government's Destructive traducers may say, it isn't lazing about and doing nothing. On the contrary, it is in many instances doing for people what these people might reasonably be expected to do for themselves.

Combating Money Laundering and Corruption

US and Mauritius strengthen collaboration in the fight against complex financial crimes

In a significant step toward enhancing the fight against financial crime, the US Embassy in Mauritius, in collaboration with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), has launched a week-long workshop focused on "Investigating and Prosecuting Complex Financial Crimes." The workshop, inaugurated at the Mauritius Revenue Authority (MRA) Customs House, brought together key stakeholders from various Mauritian law enforcement and prosecutorial agencies, including the Financial Crimes Commission (FCC),

the Financial Intelligence Unit (FIU), the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP), and the Mauritius Police Force (MPF). The goal is to enhance the capabilities of these agencies in tackling financial crimes, including money laundering, corruption, and other transnational criminal activities.

US Ambassador to Mauritius and Seychelles, Henry Jardine, highlighted the importance of collaboration in his opening remarks. He underscored the shared commitment between the two nations to address the complexities of financial crime in an increasingly interconnected world. Ambassador Jardine noted the assignment of an FBI special agent to the US Embassy in Mauritius — the first such posting since its opening in 1968 — as a testament to the growing cooperation between the US and Mauritius. This FBI presence, in conjunction with the US Embassy in Seychelles, signifies a concerted effort to strengthen law enforcement capabilities across the Western Indian Ocean region.



Ambassador Jardine emphasized the evolving nature of financial crimes, from money laundering and corruption to cyber-enabled offenses, and the need for law enforcement to stay ahead of these threats through innovation and cooperation. The workshop, designed to foster inter-agency collaboration, is an essential platform for sharing knowledge and strategies to dismantle complex financial networks that often span multiple jurisdictions.

FBI expertise and a Focus on Digital Financial Crimes

The FBI's participation brings a wealth of experience to the table, with subject matter experts providing training in forensic accounting, social media exploitation, and prosecution techniques. Leah Tanner, Supervisory Special Agent from the FBI, acknowledged the dedication of Mauritian officers and their critical role in addressing financial crimes, especially in the digital age, where emerging challenges such as cryptocurrency-related money laundering have become more prevalent.

This workshop also marks the beginning of a twoyear program aimed at building investigative and prosecutorial capabilities across Mauritius, Seychelles, Madagascar, and Comoros. Multiple training sessions will be held as part of this program, which is supported by the US Department of State's Bureau of International

Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs (INL). The broader goal is to enhance regional cooperation and ensure that law enforcement agencies are well-equipped to investigate and prosecute corruption and financial crimes effectively.

Mauritius' Progress and Commitment

Mauritius has already made significant strides in combating financial crimes, particularly through the efforts of the MRA's Anti-Money Laundering/ Combating the Financing of

Terrorism (AML/CFT) Unit. Over the past financial year, this unit has successfully investigated 126 cases amounting to Rs2.8 billion, with further assessments for the current year totalling Rs1.8 billion.

MRA Director-General Sudhamo Lal emphasized the need for innovative tools and techniques in the fight against money laundering and financial crime, given the evolving risks posed by new technologies such as cryptocurrencies. He praised the collaboration with the US government, noting that the training provided by the FBI would empower local agencies to better detect and prosecute financial crimes.

The workshop is a promising start to what both Mauritius and the United States hope will be a sustained effort to combat financial crime in the region. The collaborative effort underscores the global nature of financial crimes and the need for cross-border cooperation to effectively address them.

London's Grenfell Tower Inferno

am referring to the London's Grenfell Tower - the devastating fire that occurred on June 14, 2017, in a residential high-rise building in North Kensington, London. The fire started in a fourth-floor apartment and rapidly spread due to the building's external cladding, which was found to be highly flammable. The tragedy claimed 72 lives and left many others injured. A public inquiry into the devastating blaze blamed the disaster on failings by the government, construction industry and, most of all, the firms involved in fitting the exterior with flammable cladding. Not surprisinglv. all 72 deaths in were avoidable.

It really does seem there's no human(e) or moral accountability when big profit is involved; nor can there be a sufficiently guilty conscience if the malpractice is continued, business as usual. 'We are a capitalist nation, after all,' the self-justification may go.

Then, such big businesses can get, or are getting, unaccountably even bigger, defying the very spirit of government rules established to ensure healthy competition by limiting concentrated ownership.

Still, there must be a point at which corporate greed thus practice will end up hurting big business's own monetary interests. Or is the unlimited-profit objective/nature somehow irresistible? It brings to mind the allegorical fox stung by the instinct-abiding scorpion while ferrying it across the river, leaving both to drown.

One can see corporate officers shrugging their shoulders and defensively saying their job is to protect shareholders' bottom-line interests. And the shareholders also shrug their shoulders while defensively stating they just collect the dividends and that the big bosses are the ones to make the moral and ethical decisions.

A very large and growing populace are increasingly too overworked, tired, worried and even angry about food and housing unaffordability thus insecurity for themselves or their family — largely due to insufficient income — to criticize or boycott Big Business/Industry for the societal damage it needlessly causes/allows, particularly when not immediately observable.

Indeed, so very many people, perhaps an all-time-high percentage, have to choose between which necessities of life they can afford.

Nevertheless, the more that such corporations make, all the more they want — nay, need — to make next quarterly. It's never enough, yet the corporate newsmedia, which make up virtually all of Western mainstream news media, will implicitly or explicitly celebrate their successful greed [a.k.a. 'stock market gains'].

The Intelligence Age: Sam Altman's **Manifesto and Its Oversights**

Babbage's "analytical engine" was never built, but the notion that humanity's ultimate achievement would entail mechanising thought itself has persisted.

According to Altman, we're now (almost) at that mountaintop.

Deep learning worked – but for what?

The reason we are so close to the glorious future is simple, Altman says: "deep learning worked".

Deep learning is a particular kind of machine learning that involves artificial neural networks, loosely inspired by biological nervous systems. It has certainly been surprisingly successful in a few domains: deep learning is behind models that have proven adept at stringing words together in more or less coherent ways, at generating pretty pictures and videos, and even contributing to the solutions of some scientific problems.

So the contributions of deep learning are not trivial. They are likely to have significant social and economic impacts (both positive and negative).

But deep learning "works" only for a li-

mited set of problems. Altman knows this: humanity discovered an algorithm that could really, truly learn any distribution of

data (or really the underlying "rules" that produce any distribution of data).

That's what deep learning does - that's how it "works". That's important, and it's a technique that can be applied to various domains, but it's far from the only problem

Not every problem is reducible to pattern matching. Nor do all problems provide the massive amounts of data that deep learning requires to do its work. Nor is this how human intelligence works.

A big hammer looking for nails

What is interesting here is the fact that Altman thinks "rules from data" will go so far towards solving all humanity's problems.

There is an adage that a person holding a hammer is likely to see everything as a nail. Altman is now holding a big and very expensive hammer.

Deep learning may be "working" but only because Altman and others are starting to reimagine (and build) a world composed of distributions of data. There's a danger here that AI is starting to limit, rather than expand,

> the kinds of problem-solving we are doing.

> What is barely visible in Altman's celebration of Al are the expanding resources needed also for deep learning to "work". We can acknowledge the great gains and remarkable achievements of modern medicine, transportation and communication (to name a few) without pretending these have not come at a significant cost.

> They have come at a cost both to some humans - for whom the gains of global north have meant diminishing returns - and to animals, plants and ecosystems, ruth-



lessly exploited and destroyed by the extractive might of capitalism plus technology.

Although Altman and his booster friends might dismiss such views as nitpicking, the question of costs goes right to the heart of predictions and concerns about the future of

Altman is certainly aware that AI is facing limits, noting "there are still a lot of details we have to figure out". One of these is the rapidly expanding energy costs of training AI

Microsoft recently announced a US\$30 billion fund to build AI data centres and generators to power them. The veteran tech giant, which has invested more than US\$10 billion in OpenAI, has also signed a deal with owners of the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant (infamous for its 1979 meltdown) to supply power for AI. The frantic spending suggests there may be a hint of desperation in the air.

Magic or just magical thinking?

Given the magnitude of such challenges, even if we accept Altman's rosy view of human progress up to now, we might have to acknowledge that the past may not be a reliable guide to the future. Resources are finite. Limits are reached. Exponential growth can end.

What's most revealing about Altman's post is not his rash predictions. Rather, what emerges is his sense of untrammelled optimism in science and progress.

This makes it hard to imagine that Altman or OpenAl takes seriously the "downsides" of technology. With so much to gain, why worry about a few niggling problems? When AI seems so close to triumph, why pause to think?

What is emerging around AI is less an "age of intelligence" and more an "age of inflation" - inflating resource consumption, inflating company valuations and, most of all, inflating the promises of AI.

It's certainly true that some of us do things now that would have seemed magic a century and a half ago. That doesn't mean all the changes between then and now have been for the better.

Al has remarkable potential in many domains, but imagining it holds the key to solving all of humanity's problems - that's magical thinking too.

Le contrôle des économies par les milliardaires: Une alerte d'Oxfam

n nouveau rapport d'Oxfam, basé sur des données de UBS, révèle que le 1 % des plus riches possède plus de richesse que les 95 % les plus pauvres de l'humanité réunis. (Les données UBS font généralement référence aux informations financières ou économiques fournies par UBS Group AG, une entreprise de services financiers mondiale basée en Suisse.) À l'approche du débat général de haut niveau de l'ONU, cette analyse souligne une réalité alarmante : les milliardaires exercent un contrôle sans précédent sur les économies mondiales.

Actuellement, un tiers des 50 plus grandes entreprises mondiales, représentant une capitalisation boursière de 13,3 trillions de dollars, est dirigé par un milliardaire ou a un milliardaire comme actionnaire principal. Oxfam appelle à une action multilatérale pour établir un nouveau cadre global sur la fiscalité, annuler les dettes et réviser les règles de propriété intellectuelle concernant les pandémies. Le rapport, intitulé «Le Multilatéralisme à l'Ère de l'Oligarchie Mondiale», met en garde contre l'influence croissante des ultra-riches et des méga-corporations sur les décisions politiques mondiales, au détriment de l'avancement des droits humains et de la lutte contre la pauvreté.

Amitabh Behar, directeur exécutif d'Oxfam International, souligne que «l'ombre de l'oligarchie mondiale plane sur l'Assemblée générale de cette année. Les ultra-riches et les méga-corporations qu'ils

contrôlent façonnent les règles mondiales pour servir leurs propres intérêts, au détriment des populations.» Ce rapport dépeint une tendance inquiétante vers une oligarchie mondiale où les très riches, souvent par le biais de leurs corporations monopolistiques, influencent les décisions politiques.

EEG and the Future: Reading dreams and beyond as technology turns 100

s electroencephalography (EEG) marks its 100th anniversary, experts are reflecting on its impact and envisioning its future possibilities. Since its first recording in July 1924, EEG has been crucial for understanding brain function and diagnosing conditions like epilepsy, previously misclassified as personality disorders.

A recent survey, conducted by the University of Leeds, gathered insights from over 500 global experts with a combined 6,685 years of experience. The survey explored potential future developments for EEG, ranging from critical advancements to highly speculative ones. The results, published today in Nature Human Behaviour, reveal ambitious predictions for the next century.

Future Innovations

Experts foresee several transformative innovations within the next generation. These include:

- · Enhancing cognitive performance using EEG.
- · Early detection of learning disabilities.
- · Widespread use as a lie detector.
- Employing EEG as a primary communication tool for individuals with severe motor disabilities or locked-in syndrome.



Real-time diagnosis of brain abnormalities, such as seizures or tumors, is expected within 10-14 years. However, the feasibility of reading dreams or long-term memories remains speculative, with estimates suggesting it could be over 50 years away or closer to science fiction.

A surprising finding is the potential for personal, portable EEG devices within a generation. Dominik Welke, Research Fellow at the University of Leeds, envisions these devices becoming as common as smartphones, offering insights into physiological factors and potentially enhancing safety measures, such as monitoring driver or pilot vigilance.

Technological Advances

EEG hardware, essentially unchanged since its incep-

tion, has become more affordable, portable, and user-friendly. This evolution, coupled with its non-invasive nature, could make EEG more accessible globally.

The anticipated use of EEG in gaming and virtual reality, predicted within 20 years, could also extend its benefits to traditionally excluded communities, particularly in low-income countries. Advances in Al and automation are expected to further enhance data analysis and speed up research.

Dr. Welke highlighted the potential of EEG to democratize neuroimaging, contrasting it with more expensive methods like MRI. "EEG could become a global tool for brain research, making neuroimaging accessible to a broader population."

Ethical Considerations

Despite the optimism, the survey also raised ethical concerns. Experts warned of potential misuse by tech companies seeking to gather extensive data on users' preferences and emotions. Dr. Welke emphasized the importance of addressing cognitive freedom and mental privacy issues, alongside promoting responsible use of emerging technologies.

Research Priorities

The survey identified key priorities for the EEG community, including robust, ethical, and inclusive practices. Professor Faisal Mushtaq of the University of Leeds stressed that combining EEG with AI and virtual reality could revolutionize human-computer interactions and advance scientific understanding over the next century.



Why can't it always be summer? It's all about the Earth's tilt

Phones that transmit odors sound like science fiction, but researchers are working on making them real.

With its long days just itching to be spent by water doing nothing, summer really can be an enchanting season. As Jenny Han wrote in the young adult novel "The Summer I Turned Pretty": "Everything good, everything magical happens between the months of June and August."

But all good things must come to an end, and summer cannot last forever. There's both a simple reason and a more complicated one. The simple reason is that it can't always be summer because the Earth is tilted. The more complicated answer requires some geometry.

I'm a professor of geography and the environment who has studied seasonal changes on the landscape. Here's what seasons have to do with our planet's position as it moves through the solar system.

Closeness to the Sun doesn't explain seasons

First, you need to know that the Earth is a sphere – technically, an oblate spheroid. That means Earth has a round shape a little wider than it is tall.

Every year, Earth travels in its orbit to make one revolution around the Sun. The Earth's orbit is an ellipse, which is more like an oval than a circle. So there are times when Earth is closer to the Sun and times when it's farther away.

A lot of people assume this distance is why we have seasons. But these people would be wrong. In the United States, the



Earth is 3 million miles closer to the Sun during winter than in the summer.

Spinning like a top

Now picture an imaginary line across Earth, right in the middle, at 0° latitude. This line is called the equator. If you drew it on a globe, the equator would pass through countries including Brazil, Kenya, Indonesia and Ecuador.

Everything north of the equator, including the United States, is considered the Northern Hemisphere, and everything south of the equator is the Southern Hemisphere.

Now think of the Earth's axis as another imaginary line that runs vertically through the middle of the Earth, going from the North Pole to the South Pole.

As it orbits, or revolves, around the Sun, the Earth also rotates. That means it spins on its axis, like a top. The Earth takes one full year to revolve around the

Sun and takes 24 hours, or one day, to do one full rotation on its axis.

This axis is why we have day and night; during the day, we're facing the Sun, and at night, we're facing away.

But the Earth's axis does not go directly up and down. Instead, its axis is always tilted at 23.5 degrees in the exact same direction, toward the North Star.

The Earth's axis is tilted due to a giant object – perhaps an ancient planet – smashing into it billions of years ago. And it's this tilt that causes seasons.

It's all about the tilt

So that means in June, the Northern Hemisphere is tilted toward the Sun. That tilt means more sunlight, more solar energy, longer days – all the things that make summer, well, summer.

At the same time, the Southern Hemisphere is tilted away from the Sun. So countries such as Australia, Chile and Argentina are experiencing winter then.

To say it another way: As the Earth moves around the Sun throughout the year, the parts of the Earth getting the most sunlight are always changing.

Fast-forward to December, and Earth is on the exact opposite side of its orbit as where it was in June. It's the Southern Hemisphere's turn to be tilted toward the Sun, which means its summer happens in December, January and February.

If Earth were not tilted at all, there would be no seasons. If it were tilted more

than it is, there would be even more extreme seasons and drastic swings in temperature. Summers would be hotter and winters would be colder.

Defining summer

Talk to a meteorologist, climate scientist or author Jenny Han, and they'll tell you that for those of us in the Northern Hemisphere, summer is June, July and August, the warmest months of the year.

But there's another way to define summer. Talk to astronomers, and they'll tell you the first day of summer is the summer solstice – the day of the year with the longest amount of daylight and shortest amount of darkness.

The summer solstice occurs every year sometime between June 20 and June 22. And every day after, until the winter solstice in December, the Northern Hemisphere receives a little less daylight.

Summer officially ends on the autumnal equinox, the fall day when everywhere on Earth has an equal amount of daylight and night. The autumnal equinox happens every year on either September 22 or 23.

But whether you view summer like Jenny Han or like an astronomer, one thing is certain: Either way, summer must come to an end. But the season and the magic it brings with it will be back before you know it.

Coming Out: I told my family I was gay

Four years ago today, I told my family -- my mom, dad, three sisters, and their families -- I was gay.

And I'm okay.

Saying those words out loud to my parents and siblings was more terrifying than it should have been.

And I'm okay.

I knew that saying those words would be an end and not a beginning, which is something I still grieve sometimes



But I'm okay.

Except for a text message that I send Mom and Dad on occasion, I don't have any contact with my family. They have not reached out to me since 2022. I grieve that my parents don't get to enjoy my kids. Because my kids are just delightful. And Mom and Dad are missing out.

But it's okay. And I'm okay.

Last year, when my twin nieces turned 18, I sent them both text messages to wish them a happy birthday. Later, my sister (the twins' mom) texted me to never contact her daughters again. She then wrote that she was dead to me. One of the hardest parts of the story is that my family will never see how happy I am. They will never acknowledge the good work I've done. They won't ever get to walk with me in my pursuit of wholeness.

None of that is okay. But I'm okay.

A couple of months ago, on a Friday, my father had a stroke. Nobody called me to tell me that Dad was in the hospital. I found out the following Monday because somebody I went to high school with received the news on their church's prayer chain. If he hadn't reached out, I don't think I would have known.

Thankfully, my father's okay. And so am I.

The day after I told my family I was gay, I woke up with what a friend called "a vulnerability hangover". I felt exposed in a way that was unfamiliar and uncomfortable. But as I sat with those feelings, I also realized I felt free. I'd done the hard thing, the thing I never thought I'd ever do. I'd done it.

And I was okay.

It was scary. And it's been hard. I've certainly had to mourn and grieve the loss of my family.

But I'm okay. Some days, I'm more than okay. Occasionally, I'm pretty effing awesome. But almost always, I'm okay.


6. Pratiquer l'Intégrité

All the good we know about Keanu Reeves was not told to us by him, but by those who benefited from him. He never declared anything.


For everything he has experienced, he could have had a sadder and more pessimistic view of life, but despite this, he chose to be something good among all the evil there is.

Raj Kapoor's Heartbreak: Cigarette Burns and Bitter Tears after Nargis married Sunil Dutt



No account of Raj Kapoor is complete without mentioning his muse, Nargis. Their long affair was a defining chapter in his life, and Kapoor was devastated when she married Sunil Dutt in 1958. Despite their years together and Nargis's consultations with politician Morarji Desai about the possibility of marrying Kapoor, she eventually chose a different path. Kapoor perceived her decision as a deep

betrayal, as detailed in Madhu Jain's book, The Kapoors: The First Family of Indian Cinema, as reported by Indian Express.

According to the book, Kapoor expressed to journalist Suresh Kohli after their separation, "The world tells me I let Nargis down. It was she who betrayed me." The book describes how Kapoor broke down and wept bitterly in front of friends and colleagues upon learning of her marriage to Dutt. In his anguish, Kapoor reportedly burned himself with cigarette butts to convince himself he wasn't dreaming, grappling with the reality of her departure.

Kapoor's personal life was also affected; his drinking became a problem. Krishna Raj Kapoor revealed to author Bunny Reuben, "Night after night, he'd come home drunk... He'd collapse almost unconscious in the bathtub, weeping bitterly. It was not for me. I knew he was weeping for her." A close friend noted, "Nargis was his only true love. He never spoke ill of her publicly. Instead, he blamed her brothers for driving a wedge between them. In private, he often lamented what he called 'a great betrayal."

Even two decades later, Kapoor discussed the heartbreak with Suresh Kohli as if it had just happened. Despite his enduring feelings, Kapoor

reportedly kept Nargis on hold, repeatedly promising he would marry her. Nargis grew increasingly restless, yearning to become a wife and mother—Mrs Raj Kapoor. The book also reveals that Nargis, valuing the sanctity of marriage, even sought advice from Morarji Desai, then Home Minister, on how she might legally marry Kapoor, who was already married and a Hindu.



A mitabh Bachchan, often revered as the "Shahenshah" of Bollywood, faced one of the most challenging periods of his life in the late 1990s and early 2000s. This was a time when financial ruin seemed inevitable, and the very industry that once celebrated his success turned its back on him, even mocking his plight, reports Bombay Times.

The trouble began when Bachchan ventured into the business world with his production company, Amitabh Bachchan Corporation Limited (ABCL). Despite his stature as a leading actor, the company incurred heavy losses from ventures such as the 1996 Miss World Pageant in Bangalore. These failures led to a mountain of debt, eventually spiralling to nearly Rs 900 million. Amitabh found himself in a position where he couldn't even afford to pay his watchman, a shocking reality for a man who had once ruled the box office.

During this tumultuous time, many in Bollywood reportedly laughed at his misfortune. Once a towering figure, he now faced ridicule from peers who had celebrated his past glories. In subsequent interviews, Amitabh reflected on this dark period, revealing that the industry had largely written him off. The isolation he felt during this time compounded his





Un esprit de continuité

'intérêt national prime au-dessus de la politique partisane. Est-ce ainsi qu'il faut interpréter la composition du gouvernement, arrachée au forceps presque trois

mois après les élections législatives en France? Tout le scénario électoral déclenché par la dissolution du gouvernement en juin s'apparente à une mauvaise farce. Le deuxième tour en France ressemble à une crapulerie dont le seul but serait de manipuler le système électoral en faisant 'barrage' aux élus du premier tour et de réunir dans une coalition des partis aux idées divergentes et opposées. Cette pantomime réussit, par diverses contorsions, à reconduire les mêmes partis au pouvoir.

Alors que le pays traversait ses pires moments dans les années 70, les villages avaient quand même des clubs de ping-pong, de théâtre et quelques terrains de foot, destinés principalement à la population masculine. Hormis les terrains de foot, le théâtre et le ping-pong ont disparu définitivement du paysage rural.

- Y a-t-il eu un projet quelconque pour doter les villages d'un terrain ou d'une salle de badminton?

 Non
- Un espace pour pratiquer un sport aussi basique que le ping-pong? Non.
- Des clubs de natation, des associations de basket ball, etc., pour filles et garçons? Rien.

Ne parlons pas de sports qui restent élitistes, comme le tennis et les sports nautiques, inaccessibles à la majorité de la population. Mais y a-t-il un espace ouvert du District Council, par exemple, avec un jardin fleuri, une fontaine d'eau apaisante et quelques bancs pour les passants, un endroit accueillant ouvert au public? Rien.

Ce vide est sidéral. Il y a un manque criant d'espaces publics alors que le besoin en logement grignote de plus en plus de terrain.

Retards dans la politique sociale

La politique de promotion de la qualité de la vie accuse un retard flagrant depuis des décennies, et c'est l'épanouissement et le bien-être de la population qui en font les frais. Toutes les tranches d'âge méritent d'être prises en compte. La plage de Mont Choisy est pourvue d'un aménagement pour les amateurs de musculation et d'étirement, fréquenté principalement par des hommes. I faudrait aussi aménager les jardins d'enfants avec un coin pour les petits en bas âge, avec deux ou trois bancs où les parents peuvent les emmener pour se détendre après une journée de travail. Un espace de 60 mètres carrés pour un jardin d'enfants en bas âge, avec balançoire, toboggan, etc., et avec deux ou trois bancs, ferait le bonheur des enfants et des parents dans cette région.

Pour la énième fois, nous insistons sur le fait qu'il faudrait absolument développer des structures non lucratives mais qui contribueraient à l'épanouissement du grand public: petits, enfants, adolescents, garçons et filles, et adultes d'âge mûr. Ajoutons une piste de skateboard aux parcours de santé qui commen-

cent à sortir de terre un peu partout. Quelques bénévoles donnent des cours de yoga à leur domicile ou dans leur jardin. Des séances de yoga sur les plages publiques restent insuffisantes, et il manque certainement des moniteurs et monitrices de yoga. Une solution consisterait à recruter quelques professionnels de l'Inde.

Nous assistons à une phase intéressante d'une ambition affichée d'améliorer la qualité de vie de la population afin d'inclure le plus grand nombre. Il faut espérer que cette politique se concrétise dans un esprit de continuité et que le budget suive les déclarations d'intention.

Il demeure qu'il reste un vaste chantier à abattre dans le domaine médical afin d'améliorer l'accueil des patients et la qualité des soins dans les hôpitaux. Cela participe aussi de la qualité de vie des habitants.

Les valeurs démocratiques

Dans de nombreux pays, la démocratie est devenue un jeu d'arène d'une lutte pour l'amour du pouvoir, pour le pouvoir et l'ego des politiciens. Mais l'attachement aux valeurs de liberté et l'épanouissement du plus grand nombre par un partage de la prospérité reste, fort heureusement, le mot d'ordre. La France a fait le choix d'écarter le pire malgré les urnes. D'autres pays l'ont fait pour éviter les régimes obscurantistes qui se faufilent dans les partis politiques à l'apparence honorable. Quelques-uns continuent à verrouiller un système politique en écartant ou en éliminant des adversaires, et en opprimant leur peuple, qui commet la grande erreur de les élire par besoin de changement, irréfléchi ou par défaut.

La culture mauricienne a un ancrage fort dans les valeurs de liberté, du bien commun, la promotion de l'éducation et de la connaissance, l'esprit du bon sens et de la logique. Il est du devoir de chacun de veiller à ce que ce ne soit pas le Sri Lanka ni le Bangladesh ici.

Pour finir, stabilité et continuité d'une politique sociale raisonnable sont à souhaiter pour l'intérêt national.
