



fresh start often comes with high expectations. Yet, only months into its tenure, the Alliance du Changement finds itself under pressure. The coalition that promised sweeping reforms and a new style of governance is already showing signs of strain. While not at the brink of collapse, it is clear that the path to a revitalized democracy is proving far more complex than the simple act of winning an election. The euphoria of victory has given way to unease among leaders and a sense of frustration among citizens.

This is not just political theatre staged by opponents, but a reality shaped by missteps. At the centre of the government's difficulties lie two sensitive issues: the introduction of pension reform, which — though arguably necessary — was poorly explained, and a series of controversial public appointments. The pension reform in particular sparked a sharper backlash than expected, leaving many parliamentarians struggling to defend it. The government's response has often seemed uncertain, marked by hesitant communication and an air of detachment from public concerns.

The paradox is stark. After a decade of what many viewed as heavy-handed governance, the public expected a new era — one based on consultation, empathy, and meritocracy. Citizens, eager for a break with the past, sense too much continuity and too little change. The lack of wide consultation on important decisions, coupled with the persistence of political appointments, has fed the perception of "business as usual."

Old habits in new times

This situation is further complicated by the leadership styles of the alliance's two central figures. The elder co-architect of the coalition, known for his determination and tactical instinct, has remained consistent in his approach, even at eighty. Meanwhile, the Prime Minister, a veteran in his own right, has leaned on familiar strategies — appointing long-standing allies to key positions. While understandable from a perspective of loyalty and trust, this preference has disappointed those who hoped for new faces and a fresh direction. The result is an administration that feels highly personalized, with echoes of old political habits.

In many ways, the government is a prisoner of its own history. Mauritian politics has long been shaped by strong personalities and party leaders who dominate decision-making. Institutions, though formally established, often play second fiddle to personal authority. This culture, deeply rooted in decades of practice, makes genuine reform difficult. Citizens may have underestimated the resilience of these habits and overestimated the willingness of leaders to abandon them.

The government's loss of momentum is largely self-inflicted. Despite having time to signal a break from the past, it has so far

failed to move decisively on symbolic reforms — such as a Freedom of Information Act, or clearer rules for public appointments. Citizens are not looking for miracles, but they do seek visible signs of renewal. Without them, assurances that "things are different" sound unconvincing.

Even modest initiatives — such as town hall consultations, citizen advisory panels, or merit-based open competitions for top public posts — could have gone a long way in building trust. These do not require vast financial resources but rather a shift in mind-set. By failing to grasp the symbolic importance of such measures, the government has left space for disappointment to grow.

Friction Within the Alliance

Talk of a potential rift within the alliance may be premature, but it highlights underlying discontent. The junior partner, whose support was crucial in defeating the previous government, now appears sidelined. Its leader, without a substantive ministerial role, risks being overshadowed by the Prime Minister. His occasional public displays of frustration may be tactics to negotiate influence, but they also suggest that communication within the alliance is far from seamless.

The Prime Minister, on the other hand, has opted for silence in response to his alliance partner's remarks — a strategy that reinforces his authority but also leaves tensions unresolved. For the junior partner, any misstep in handling this delicate balance could prove costly, particularly if its members choose stability with the senior partner over loyalty to their leader. In a parliamentary system where numbers matter above

all, the loyalty of individual MPs can shift quickly, making political survival an ever-present concern.

What this moment underscores is the fragility of political alliances and the persistence of old political cultures. The current partnership was born of necessity rather than natural affinity. Historical ties with other players in the political arena remain strong, and these deeper loyalties could at any time complicate the present arrangement.

Mauritian politics has always thrived on shifting alliances, sudden ruptures, and unlikely reconciliations. Parties that seem bitterly opposed today often find common ground tomorrow, united by convenience rather than principle. Voters, weary of this cycle, were looking for something different in the Alliance du Changement. They wanted not just a new coalition, but a new way of doing politics altogether. The disap-

pointment stems from the perception that old instincts continue to dominate, regardless of the party label.

Legacies and Last Chances

Both leaders, now in the later stages of their careers, are acutely aware that their legacy is at stake. This may well be their final opportunity to leave behind a lasting, positive mark. To let personal ambition or entrenched habits derail that chance would be a profound disservice to the country.

The public's expectations are not extravagant. What is being asked is simple: integrity, transparency, and a genuine commitment to reform. The old ways of political deals and personal networks cannot deliver this. What is needed is courage to depart from the familiar, even if it means letting go of long-standing loyalties.

There is still time. The government can reset its course by prioritizing reforms that matter most to ordinary citizens: accountability in public appointments, real consultation on major policies, and stronger institutions that outlast individual leaders. These steps would send a clear message that the Alliance du Changement is not just another name for continuity but a genuine attempt at renewal.

In the end, the question remains whether the leaders of today can rise above old practices and fulfil the promise of renewal. The structures of party politics and coalition governments are unlikely to change. True transformation must therefore come from leadership itself — leadership willing to prove that the change it promised was real, not rhetorical.

The nation waits for this signal. What it expects is proof that the call for change was more than a slogan. What is at stake is not only the reputation of two veteran politicians, but the very credibility of the political system. If the current administration cannot embody the change it promised, public trust will continue to erode — and with it, the stability on which Mauritius prides itself. Leaders would do well to remember that a mandate is not a blank cheque. It is a responsibility to govern differently, to listen more, and to serve with humility.





Why is Valuation of Assets always Problematic?

• A Chronicle of Fiscal Follies and Controversial Transactions



The valuation of assets is guided by professional standards such as the "International Financial Reporting Standard (IFRS) No. 13 – Fair Value Measurement" that is in use in most countries or the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) that are in use in the USA. Although these standards are there to guide professional valuers, the valuation of assets in Mauritius over the years has become a practice full of pitfalls, causing controversy and even giving rise to disputes before a court of justice.

The IFRS No.13 defines "fair value" as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Every public or private entity has a duty to assign a value to its assets that reflects their book value (historical costless depreciation) or Net Realizable Value. It might be argued that since government is not a profit-making entity, it should not care much about the value of its assets acquired or sold. But as a steward of taxpayers' money, it has a duty to get the best possible prices for assets acquired or sold through an open market (public procurement) or a private deal (between one government body and a client).

Let us examine a few cases of asset valuation by government bodies that have gone awry, starting with the latest example.

Undervaluation of a car sold to a retired public servant

For moveable property such as vehicles, which depreciate over time through wear and tear, the resale value is usually based on objective criteria such as Net Book Value (historical costless depreciation) or Net Realizable Value. The car sold to the former commissioner of police cost Rs 6 million in 2018. It was depreciated annually by 15% so that at the end of 2024, its Net Book Value (NBV) was Rs 2.3 million (see table below). However, the car was sold at Rs 415,000 instead of

Rs 2.3 million, thereby providing a capital gain of Rs 1.8 million to the buyer (retired commissioner) and causing a capital loss of the same amount to the seller (government).

Certainly, the government is not a business entity that can write off the capital loss to a Profit and Loss Account, but the capital loss of Rs 1.8 million is money foregone (manque à gagner) by the Treasury. The government has an obligation to get the lowest prices on its purchases of goods or services and the highest prices on its sales of assets.

It is alleged that the buyer might have

resold the car at a much higher price than Rs 2.3 million, thereby reaping a greater capital gain of more than Rs 1.8 million. Since capital gains on property (both moveable and immoveable) are not taxable in Mauritius, which is contrary to the practice in developed countries, the buyer would have come out much richer after that resale transaction. In all fairness, the buyer should have paid at least the Net Book Value of Rs 2.3 million for the car.

How did the valuer come up with a valuation of Rs 415,000 is a mystery. Either the valuation method was basically wrong,

which indicates professional incompetence, or there was a political decision to offer a price below the Net Book Value to the buyer, which goes against the principle of getting the best return. If the first hypothesis were true, the whole basis of valuation should be reviewed to ensure that Selling Price is equal to Net Book Value at least for used vehicles being sold to retired civil servants. If the second hypothesis were true, it would mean that politics has trumped sound administrative practices in this case.

Under a progressive income tax system, the capital gain of Rs 1.8 million to the buyer would have been a taxable benefit, as is the case in advanced social-democratic countries. In those countries, when the employer sells an asset to its employee or retired

employee at a price below its Net Book Value or fair market value, the difference is treated as a taxable benefit. In Mauritius, if the capital gain on the purchase of a used car below its Net Book Value was included among taxable benefits in the Income Tax Act, the buyer would have had to pay 20% income tax on the capital gain of Rs 1.8 million, i.e., Rs 369,579.

This is the kind of fiscal policy which should be adopted in Mauritius to create a level-playing field for all employees and avoid favouritism for some well-connected people. Those countries also publish an annual handbook providing data on the values of used cars by make, model and age. The handbook is useful for tax authorities when assessing sales tax on used car sales or assessing income tax on capital gains arising from resale transactions. It is available in print and online for anybody to look up the value of a used car, irrespective of age.

MIC's investment in shares and land

The second example of faulty valuation is related to the funds used by the Mauritius Investment Corporation (MIC) to invest in companies and acquire assets during the Covid pandemic for a total amount of Rs 32.1 billion. This amount is broken down into: Rs 21.87 in convertible debentures, Rs 7.8 billion for the acquisition of land, and Rs 2.43 billion for the purchase of equity shares in companies.

The purchase price of land paid by MIC was said to be overvalued as no reasonable valuation was provided. The valuation method used by appraisers hired by the MIC was not known. The basis of the valuation for equity shares at the time of purchase was not known either. Most likely the shares were overvalued to the benefit of private corporations.

The convertible debentures are worth much less now than at the time of issuance. The private corporations can buy back the debentures at any time, but the MIC can only convert them after nine years while getting a low annual coupon rate of 3% before conversion (when the policy interest rate of the Bank of Mauritius is 4.5%). The whole funding policy of the MIC has been to the benefit of private corporations.

The MIC invested Rs 25 billion (amounting to a share ownership of 49%) in Airport Holdings Ltd (AHL), the parent company of Air Mauritius Ltd., while the government owns 51% of shares. However, the initial investment of Rs 25 billion was already marked down by Rs 1.778 billion in the financial year 2023-24 due to an impairment loss (caused by the losses of AHL's subsidiaries).

For the year 2024-25, the MIC Annual Report is not yet available. It would be safe to presume that the balance of investment in AHL of Rs 23.2 billion (Rs 25 billion less Rs 1.8 billion) as of June 30, 2024, was further eroded by another markdown in 2024-25 on account of continuing loss by AHL's subsidiaries.

It is obvious that the shares acquired in AHL were overvalued at the time of purchase. If the MIC were to sell its shares in AHL now, it would incur a substantial loss as it would not find buyers ready to pay the shares at their book value, considering the poor financial position of companies owned by AHL.

■ Air Mauritius' sale of aircraft

In September 2021, after 17 months of voluntary administration, Air Mauritius sold four aircraft at a staggering capital loss of Rs 3.377 billion (net book value of Rs 3.650 billion less proceeds of sale of Rs 273 million). That was a sale at bargain basement prices to get rid of unused aircraft, but it demonstrated a lack of foresight as subsequently the company had to lease aircraft when business picked up with the end of the Covid pandemic.

Who did the valuation of aircraft for the company at the time of sale? Was a valuation ever done or were the aircraft just sold to the first taker? That is a matter for the Financial Crimes Commission (FCC) to investigate to hold the decision makers accountable for their poor planning. It is incredible that the company paid Rs 100 million to the two voluntary administrators, including Mr Sattar Hajee Abdoula, the former chairman of SBM Holdings Ltd., when its corporate interests were not appropriately safeguarded.

■ MedPoint clinic overvalued

The MedPoint clinic, a property owned by the brother-in-law of the former Prime minister, was sold on December 29, 2010, at Rs 144 million to the Labour-MSM government when the initial valuation was Rs 75 million. Why was the valuation increased so much? Nobody knows. The government valuer, when he was questioned in Court proceedings, said he could not remember why the valuation was revised. He had sudden amnesia.

The former PM was prosecuted by the ICAC for conflict of interest under the Prevention of Corruption Act (POCA), and he was convicted by the Intermediary Court. However, the conviction was overruled by the Supreme Court. When the DPP appealed the latter's ruling to the Privy Council, the ICAC changed its position radically, abandoning its previous charges against the former PM. Consequently, the Privy Council upheld the Supreme Court's decision.

It seems that when government purchases or leases assets from private parties there is always a measure of over-valuation to the benefit of sellers. We know of buildings that are rented by ministries from private lessors at higher-than-normal prices. It is a situation

where taxpayers always lose (by coughing out more money than needed) while private sellers win. Not only the sellers or lessors get overvalued prices for their assets on sale or lease, but they also do not pay any tax on capital gains upon the resale of property.

We should recall that the contract for the sale of MedPoint clinic was signed on December 29, 2010, a few days before the introduction of the capital gains tax on real property on January 1, 2011, under section 10A of the Income Tax Act,1995 (titled "Gains on Immovable Property"). The seller shrewdly escaped that tax, which was abolished on November 5, 2011, by the Labour-MSM government. Since then, no government has had the courage to reintroduce a Capital Gains Tax on the sale/resale of immoveable property.

An attempt was made in the budget 2025-26 when the government proposed to levy a capital gains tax of 30% on the resale of real property by non-citizens under various property development schemes, but it was abandoned under pressure from property developers. The Finance Bill 2025-26 did not include that proposal. Is this government beholden to local capitalists? It's a legitimate question to some observers.

TAX ARREARS SETTLEMENT SCHEME (TASS) 2025

The Mauritius Revenue Authority (MRA) informs the public that the **Tax Arrears Settlement Scheme (TASS)** has been renewed.

Where tax arrears and contribution arrears are outstanding as at 30 June 2025, under an assessment issued or a return submitted under the -

- (i) Income Tax Act;
- (ii) VAT Act; or
- (iii) Gambling Regulatory Authority Act; and
- (iv) Social Contribution Act and Social Benefits Act 2021

any penalty, interest or surcharge included in the arrears will be fully waived, provided that an application for the waiver is made to the MRA on or before **Monday 01 December 2025** and the arrears are fully paid on or before **31 March 2026**.

The facilities to make an application for the waiver of penalties, interests and surcharges are available on the MRA website www.mra.mu

The scheme is not applicable to any person -

- (i) who has been convicted of an offence on or after 01 July 2012;
- (ii) against whom there are any pending criminal proceedings into an act of; or
- (iii) who is the subject matter of an enquiry relating to,

drug trafficking under the Dangerous Drugs Act, arms trafficking, an offence related to terrorism under the Prevention of Terrorism Act, money laundering under the Financial Intelligence and Anti Money Laundering Act, a corruption offence under the Prevention of Corruption Act or an offence under the Financial Crimes Commission Act 2023.

Assessing Competence and Integrity

The Power of the "Fit and Proper" Test

'Those at the Central Bank tasked with assessing whether a person is "fit and proper" must themselves be held to the same standard'

The "Fit and Proper" test is a crucial regulatory tool for ensuring that individuals in positions of influence within the financial sector possess the necessary competence and integrity. This concept, empowered by central banks guidelines, has become a focal point of public debate, especially concerning the appointment of bank officials. While its primary purpose is to safeguard financial stability, the principles behind the test — accountability, ethics, and due diligence — raise important questions about their potential application to public office and government appointments. Lex's analysis examines the test's legal basis, its practical application, the challenges of transparency and impartiality, and its broader implications for public governance.

* The concept of "Fit and Proper" test has gained prominence and entered public discussion following recent debates over the appointment of bank officials. What legislation empowers it, and why is it so important?

In Mauritius, the Banking Act of 2004 and the Bank of Mauritius Act 2004 are the key pieces of legislation that empower the "Fit and Proper" test. These acts give the central bank, the Bank of Mauritius, the legal authority to approve or reject appointments of individuals to senior positions in financial institutions. The requirement applies to key figures such as directors, senior officers, and significant shareholders.

The importance of the Test can be gauged from the 'Guideline on Fit and Proper Person', issued by the Central Bank, which states: "The probity and competence of senior officers, directors and shareholders who exercise significant influence on financial institutions regulated by the Bank of Mauritius are not only of strong interest to the Bank of Mauritius but also to the institutions themselves. As such, persons in these positions must have the necessary qualities, competencies and experience that will allow them to perform the duties and carry out the responsibilities required of the position in the most effective manner."

* We understand that the ultimate responsibility for conducting and approving "Fit and Proper" tests rests entirely with the regulator. To what extent is this process transparent? If not, what is the scope for making it transparent?

The proper functioning of the financial system hinges on the compliance of directors and other stakeholders with the Central Bank's guidelines. This is not merely about transparency; it is fundamentally about ensuring that the right people whose probity is not challenged occupy sensitive positions in the financial sector.

* The 'Fit and Proper' test is meant to ensure only suitable individuals lead financial institutions. However, this process requires a significant measure of judgment on the part of regulators, isn't it?

The "Fit and Proper" test is a vital gate-keeping function of central banks, designed to ensure that only suitable individuals lead financial institutions. The process indeed requires a significant measure of judgment because the assessment of an individual's character, competence, and integrity is not always a simple checklist exercise.

In the Guideline, a "fit and proper person" is defined as someone who, when subjected to the criteria of the Guideline and any other criteria prescribed by the board of directors, is likely to be in a position to discharge their responsibilities in a competent, honest, and correct manner in the best interests of the institution. Regulators should

ensure that these criteria are met.

* Given the subjective nature of a "good reputation" and "good character" as criteria for the "Fit and Proper" test, shouldn't the government in its role of arbiter ensure that regulators' assessments are not influenced by personal biases, political pressure, or social connections?

It must be presumed that regulators would assess a person objectively and, if need be, make public the reasons why a person is not fit and proper. If there is any suspicion that the regulators themselves are acting under political influence or are biased, they would not be fair in assessing whether a person is fit and proper.

* When an individual or financial institution believes that a regulatory assessment by the BOM or the FSC has been arbitrary, based on irrelevant considerations, or has ignored relevant information, they can seek redress through the courts, including the Privy Council. However, this process is often lengthy and expensive, which can create a significant power imbalance. What are your thoughts on this guestion?

Pursuing legal action against a regulator is often an uphill battle due to several key challenges. The process is financially demanding and time-consuming, which can create an overwhelming barrier for individuals and smaller firms, ultimately giving the regulator undue influence.

Furthermore, while "bias" and "irrelevant factors" are valid grounds for an appeal, the burden of proof is high and can be very difficult for the challenging party to meet.

* It is also understood that when licensing a new bank, central banks should also meticulously assess

the "Fit and Proper" status of its significant shareholders, board of directors, and senior management. Considering recent bank failures, such as that of Silver Bank, and the high number of bad loans affecting some of our local banks, to what extent could it be said that the Bank of Mauritius's 'Fit and Proper' tests proven to be truly effective in preventing systemic risks?

If the regulator, which is the Bank of Mauritius, fails in its objective pursuit of properly assessing all factors, then the whole system crumbles. * The recent deadlock concerning the appointment of a chairman and CEO for the State Bank of Mauritius (SBM) has been in recent weeks a focal point for social media activists, who have also called into question the credentials of the officials responsible for undertaking the "fit and proper" assessments. Would it be therefore a legitimate and pertinent question to ask whether those who perform the regulatory function are themselves "fit and proper"?

Those at the Central Bank tasked with assessing whether a person is "fit and proper" must themselves be held to the same standard. If there is any suspicion of impropriety on their part — such as bias, personal animosity, or a desire for revenge — they should be disqualified from the assessment

process.

* Governments and political parties could perhaps take inspiration from the "Fit and Proper" test concept to ensure that the men and women chosen for public office, including positions in government, parastatal bodies, State-Owned Enterprises, or as political candidates and Cabinet members, meet the necessary criteria. Wouldn't that be in public interest?

Applying a "Fit and Proper" test to individuals in public office would be in the public interest by promoting accountability and trust. Such a test would ensure that leaders not only have the necessary skills and competence for their roles but also possess an ethical and moral foundation. It would vet candidates for a history of dishonesty, corruption, or other misconduct, acting as a critical deterrent against appointing individuals with questionable pasts. By vetting leaders for integrity and competence, this process could help rebuild public trust and strengthen key public service institutions.

However, implementing such a test in politics is far more complex than in the financial sector. The main challenge is the subjective nature of defining "proper" when dealing with political integrity and independence. There is a high risk that the test could be used as a political weapon or be compromised by bias, as it would be difficult to establish a truly impartial, non-partisan body to conduct the assessments. Furthermore, a "fit and proper" test could be seen as an elitist mechanism that potentially infringes on the democratic right of citizens to choose their own representatives, creating a fundamental tension between vetting for public trust and upholding democratic principles.

The Empire Strikes Out

uring the presidential campaign, Donald Trump repeatedly claimed that had he been President in 2022, Putin would never have

attacked Ukraine, and that if he did become President again, he'd end Russia's war on Ukraine on his first day in office. Inauguration Day for Trump 2.0 was on January 20th this year. The war has raged on for seven months after that first day in office, and Putin shows no signs of abating his attacks on Ukraine.

The recent summit in Alaska was touted by Trump as the setting for a ceasefire that would lead to a peace agreement. Since Putin attacked Ukraine and President Zelensky has repeatedly called for a ceasefire and expressed a willingness to negotiate — but not to negotiate away Ukraine's territory — a ceasefire was entirely within Putin's control.

Before the summit, Trump sought to raise the stakes for Putin by declaring in response to a reporter's question about what would happen if Putin did not agree to a ceasefire: "Yes, they will. There will be consequences." When pressed for specifics, Trump demurred but emphasized the spectre of severity: "I don't have to say. There will be very severe consequences."

Meanwhile, as I have previously noted, Trump increased tariffs on India to 50% both because India has continued to buy Russian oil and because it is a member of the BRICS group of countries which he deems are hostile to America.

If Trump's threats of severe consequences for Putin and the spectre of an indirect route to secondary sanctions were an indicator that the Empire was preparing to strike back, by the end of a short summit meeting, it became clear that the Empire had not struck back, and indeed, failed even to strike a deal on a temporary ceasefire.

Since then, things have taken a more ominous turn. Russia's attacks on Ukraine continue to escalate. Obviously, Trump has all but completely backed off the idea of more sanctions on Russia and showed no appetite for imposing sanctions on China for its ongoing support of Putin's war on Ukraine.

Before the Trump-Putin meeting in Alaska, Zelensky accurately read the situation. While expressing hope that the US, Europe, and other countries that seek peace, might compel Russia to make peace, he wryly observed: "At present, there is no sign that the Russians are preparing to end the war."

Nor has the situation changed. When Putin said, after the summit: "I agree with President Trump. He said today that Ukraine's security must be ensured by all means. Of course, we are ready to work on this," President Macron of France read through the deception: "When I look at the situation and the facts, I don't see President Putin very willing to get peace now."

Details of what was said between Putin and Trump in Alaska are sketchy. Nevertheless, we can make some welldefined conclusions about the results.

First, Putin was not about to bend to Trump's demands and instead, sought to gain the upper hand and bend Trump to his will. He seems to have succeeded in convincing Trump to abandon his call for an immediate ceasefire and adopt the Russian view that a comprehensive agreement on a permanent peace is the only viable approach. This does nothing to stop the attacks on Ukraine and the ongoing carnage and given Putin's insistence that Ukraine formally cede Crimea which Russia has annexed, as well as the Donbas comprising Ukraine's Donetsk and Luhansk regions. This is Ukraine's industrial heartland to the east.

Second, perhaps in response to Putin's resolute refusal to agree on a ceasefire, Trump abandoned his call for that

Third, the summit all but ended Trump's and America's involvement in the peace process except perhaps as the host for future talks between Putin and Zelensky. The Empire not only did not strike back, but the Empire also staged a retreat. In the wake of this, the peace process, if one can call what remains a process, is likely to pivot to a European British centric initiative. This was evident from Trump's throwing the ball to the Europeans and Brits.

Fourth, although it is right to pursue even the faint glimmer of a cessation of Russia's relentless assault on Ukraine, the Europeans and Brits alone cannot bring this about without American help. Such help must have three aspects: first, a robust set of sanctions including secondary sanctions on Russia to deprive Putin of the funding necessary to carry on his war. Second, the US must provide a continuing flow of weapons, offensive and defensive to Ukraine even if these are passed through to NATO countries first. Third, the US must find a way to stop Iranian and North Korean supplies to Russia.

It is beyond cavil that there can be no lasting peace for Ukraine without iron-clad security guarantees. Unfortunately, history teaches that Ukraine relies on such guarantees at its peril. The 1994 Budapest memorandum declared American, British, and Russian assurances of respecting Ukraine's territorial integrity and independence. This was when Ukraine transferred all nuclear weapons that had been on its territory as part of the Soviet Union, to the Russian Federation. Putin has also violated the 2015 Minsk agreements by attacking Ukraine. The US has all but ignored the declarations in the US-Ukraine Charter on Strategic Partnership renewed by the Biden administration on November 10, 2021. That document stated, inter alia:

■ The United States and Ukraine intend to continue a range of substantive measures to prevent external direct and hybrid aggression against Ukraine and hold Russia accountable for such aggression and violations of international law, including the seizure and attempted annexation of Crimea and the

- Russia-led armed conflict in parts of the Donetsk and Luhansk regions of Ukraine, as well as its continuing malign behaviour.
- The United States does not and will never recognize Russia's attempted annexation of Crimea and reaf firms its full support for international efforts, including in the Normandy Format, aimed at negotiating a diplomatic resolution to the Russia-led armed conflict in the Donetsk and Luhansk regions of Ukraine on the basis of respect for international law, including the UN Charter.

Keep in mind that these proclamations are from a document signed before the latest 2022 attack by Putin.

The latest development is that whereas President Trump has stated that the US might augment British and European security guarantees for Ukraine, with support from the air, there is no commitment that US troops will have a presence in Ukraine. This makes talk of an NATO Article 5 like security guarantee, essentially vaporware.

In a late-breaking development, *The Wall Street Journal* reports that is that Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov, has warned that Russia should effectively hold veto power over any action to assist Ukraine after a peace deal is reached, rendering planned Western security guarantees for Kyiv moot and delivering a setback to negotiations championed by President Trump.

According to Lavrov, Russia would have a veto power over any action by the other guarantors of Ukrainian security — making those assurances pointless. On Wednesday, Lavrov said China should also have equal powers in these guarantees. "We will safeguard our legitimate interests in a firm and harsh manner," Lavrov said. "Seriously discussing issues of ensuring security without the Russian Federation is a utopia and a path to nowhere."

So, there you have it. The Empire strikes out.

Interview: Lindsay Rivière

'Navin Ramgoolam et Paul Bérenger ont largement sous-estimé

la volonté populaire de changement'

Mauritius Times: Le gouvernement de l'Alliance du Changement a déclaré, au début de son mandat, se trouver face à un vaste chantier. Cependant, à peine huit mois plus tard, des signes de malaise et d'agacement sont perceptibles au sein de la coalition. D'ailleurs, le mot "rupture" est revenu dans le vocabulaire des politiciens, y compris chez Paul Bérenger et des observateurs politiques. Selon vous, quels sont les facteurs clés à l'origine de ce malaise et de cette éventualité de rupture?

Lindsay Rivière: Il est indéniable qu'il y a aujourd'hui, au Gouvernement, des signes de nervosité grandissante, qui alimentent quelques premières tensions. Attention, pourtant, à ne pas indument exagérer celles-ci chaque semaine et à voir, dans chaque petit incident ou différence de vues qui pourrait intervenir entre le MMM et le PTr, l'imminence d'une dramatique rupture du Gouvernement.

Il faut signaler que Bérenger, lui-même, n'a jamais prononcé le mot 'rupture'. Il n'y a pas, dans ce qui s'est dit ou fait jusqu'ici, matière à rupture. Après 10 ans, les Mauriciens en avaient vraiment assez de se sentir prisonniers dans leur propre pays, harcelés, bridés, surveillés par un régime arbitraire et injuste, accaparant tout au profit de ses suiveurs.

L'exaltation qui a suivi le renversement du régime MSM n'était pas seulement un mouvement d'humeur passager. Elle traduisait quelque chose de très profond: l'attente ardente d'autre chose, d'une autre manière de gouverner, dans la consultation, l'empathie, le rétablissement de plus de justice.

La vérité est qu'on ne voit pas se concrétiser ce grand désir populaire d'une 'autre chose'. Il y a eu un bon début, mais on reglisse vers du 'more of the same' dans la pratique. L'absence totale de consultation sur les grands dossiers montre des dispositions inquiétantes. La politique de nominations souvent aberrantes heurte cette envie réelle de méritocratie et choque très profondément.

Le problème est que personne au Gouvernement ou sur le 'backbench' ne semble mesurer pleinement cette déception nationale. Dans ces conditions, appeler à la 'patience' ne sert à rien. Il ne faut pas juste se dédouaner en rappelant la mauvaise administration MSM mais convaincre que le changement attendu arrivera lentement mais sûrement.

On a l'impression qu'après avoir beaucoup promis, c'est du pareil au même. Paul Bérenger est tout aussi arrogant et méprisant envers ceux qui le contredisent. Il continue à faire de la politique comme dans les années 1970 ou 80. Il se comporte toujours comme un chef de guerre politique impitoyable envers ceux qui ne pensent pas comme lui, alors qu'on avait pensé qu'à 80 ans, il deviendrait enfin plus sage, plus tolérant et plus consensuel. Et il ne se trouve personne au MMM (en train de devenir le 'Fan Club' d'un leader charismatique, comme le fut hier le PMSD de Gaëtan Duval) pour lui dire fermement que les temps ont changé!

Quant à Navin Ramgoolam, il gouverne comme autrefois, en 1995, entre 2005 et 2014. Il est resté tout aussi méfiant et il n'accorde ses faveurs qu'à son entourage de vieux amis et collaborateurs, les recyclant dans l'appareil d'Etat alors que Maurice veut du neuf, de la fraîcheur, de nouveaux visages. Le pouvoir, après Pravind Jugnauth, demeure hyper-personnalisé. Le pays vit donc selon les habitudes, le rythme et les penchants de Navin Ramgoolam, alors qu'il faudrait d'urgence passer à autre chose. Comme au MMM, il ne se trouve personne au PTr pour tirer la sonnette d'alarme et réclamer de nouvelles méthodes de gouvernement.


D'une certaine façon, les perceptions négatives autour du Gouvernement sont 'self-inflicted'.

* Même si c'est évident que le gouvernement traverse une période difficile, une conséquence de la réforme de la pension, cette situation étant devenue plus compliquée avec les nominations controversées, il est toutefois probable que les choses vont s'améliorer au fil du temps. Cette période de turbulence est-elle un simple passage à vide inévitable pour tout nouveau gouvernement, ou révèle-t-elle des problèmes plus profonds qui pourraient persister?

Je ne crois pas nécessairement que 'les choses vont s'améliorer au fil du temps'. Les mêmes causes ont les mêmes effets. Il y a, au Gouvernement, des réflexes et des automatismes qui perdurent et qui inquiètent.

Le Gouvernement ne peut continuer à fonctionner de la même manière. Il a eu 9 mois pour venir avec la 'Freedom of Information Act', pour la modification constitutionnelle sur les candidatures au Parlement, avec les 'Appointments Committees' requis, pour les appels de candidatures aux postes importants à la tête des institutions, pour traquer et punir les pourris.

* En tout cas, si une rupture devait se concrétiser, elle constituerait une immense déception pour une grande majorité de Mauriciens. Partagez-vous l'avis de Jean-Claude de l'Estrac, qui connaît bien Paul Bérenger et ses méthodes, et qui a déclaré, dans une interview à *Week-End* dimanche dernier, que « l'Alliance est en sursis»? Et, si oui, quelles en seraient les conséquences politiques?

Vous savez, là où est Paul Bérenger, compte tenu de son caractère et de son absence fréquente de jugement, on n'est jamais bien loin d'un incident, d'une réaction empreinte de susceptibilité ou même d'une rupture, comme en 1983, 1995, etc.

Sommes-nous au bord d'une cassure? Pas encore, pas aujourd'hui, pas au vu de la situation et des enjeux actuels. Même si, en politique, tout peut arriver, je ne partage pas pour l'instant le pessimisme de notre ami Jean-Claude de l'Estrac.

Ce que je constate, moi, c'est le début d'une certaine frustration chez Bérenger. Sa priorité, l'année dernière, était de se débarrasser du MSM. Il a fait plusieurs concessions pour cela. C'est maintenant fait. Le danger MSM est écarté pour quatre ans. Le pays est sur la bonne voie. Paul Bérenger tourne maintenant son attention vers la contribution de son parti au Pouvoir, sa contribution personnelle, l'espace et l'influence qu'on lui accorde.

* Et comment cette situation affecte-t-elle le comportement du MMM ?

Bérenger n'aime rien davantage que son parti. Il a, de tout temps, défendu les intérêts du MMM en recherchant un rapport de forces privilégiant son parti. Pour lui, la politique est d'abord et surtout un rapport de forces, avec ses ennemis comme avec ses alliés.

Traduisant une frustration certaine, il a accepté, a-t-il dit récemment, 'seulement 8 ministères sur 26'. Rétrospectivement, il doit regretter avoir laissé ReA et Les Nouveaux Démocrates obtenir 6 sièges au Parlement qui auraient dû revenir au MMM dans une alliance PTr-MMM plus équilibrée (35/25). Aujourd'hui que Navin Ramgoolam peut gouverner seul et dispose, sans le MMM, d'une majorité de 52 (comptant les 4 députés Rodriguais, les 3 de ReA et des Nouveaux Démocrates) alors que le MMM a perdu Franco Quirin, Paul Bérenger doit se sentir aujourd'hui un peu à l'étroit au Gouvernement avec moins du tiers de parlementaires.

Ses fonctions, son rôle et son influence de Premier ministre-adjoint sont mal définis. En l'absence d'un ministère re reconnu, il est un peu comme le Vice-Président des Etats-Unis, en apparence à deux doigts d'un immense pouvoir mais, en réalité, n'accomplissant discrètement que les tâches que lui confie le Président.

Personne ne sait bien ce que fait Bérenger, et il a eu à préciser lui-même ses initiatives en conférence de presse pour que le 'out of sight, out of mind' ne commence pas à l'affecter. Devenir ministre sans portefeuille précis a sans doute été une erreur de Bérenger. Il est à la fois tout et rien.

Peut-être s'énerve-t-il de ce flou, de cette position mal définie? Peut-être rêve-t-il d'un modèle de Gouvernement où son avis et son conseil compteraient plus auprès du PM? Peut-être veut-il rééquilibrer l'Alliance et, comme le dit Nando Bodha, ne pas finir sa carrière politique à travailler 'seulement à la gloire de Navin Ramgoolam' qui, lui, 'shine' en permanence?

Je n'en sais rien, mais si j'étais Navin Ramgoolam, je laisserais à Bérenger un peu plus d'espace, plus de lumière, plus d'influence au Gouvernement, comme dans les coalitions allemande ou israélienne.

* Navin Ramgoolam, garde le silence – comme à son habitude – malgré deux conférences de presse où Paul Bérenger a publiquement exprimé ses frustrations concernant les retards dans la prise de décisions et les nominations toujours en suspens. Quel est, selon vous, le "game plan" du Premier ministre?

Navin Ramgoolam est bien dans son rôle. Il exerce pleinement ses privilèges, domine le jeu, garde tout le monde à sa place. Tout ce qu'il fait est conforme à son caractère, à sa conception du leadership.

Je ne pense pas qu'il veuille, tout au moins jusqu'ici, casser l'Alliance. Il n'a rien à y gagner. Pourquoi, alors que diriger Maurice aujourd'hui, est si dur et que sa popularité dégringole, voudrait-il renvoyer le MMM dans l'Opposition pour se retrouver face à Paul Bérenger, Pravind Jugnauth, Nando Bodha, Roshi Bhadain et autres? Ce serait, pour lui, une erreur de jugement fatale.

* À bien y regarder, diriez-vous que Paul Bérenger a fondamentalement raison quant aux motifs de ses frustrations, mais qu'il aurait dû soulever ces inquiétudes et frustrations en interne, et non sur la place publique?

Submission of e-EDF - Income Year 2025/26

The Mauritius Revenue Authority (MRA) informs all employers that they are required to apply Pay As You Earn (PAYE) for the income year starting in July 2025 and ending in June 2026 on the basis of Reliefs, Allowances, Deductions and Rates applicable for that income year.

Employees

All employees are informed that the facility to submit **Employee Declaration Form (EDF)**, electronically, is available on the MRA's website: www.mra.mu

In order to access the e-EDF, an employee should go to the MRA website, click on the link e-EDF 2025/2026 on the home page, and insert the following information:

- National Identity Card Number (NID), or Non-Citizen Identity Card Number (NCID), in the case of a non-citizen
- Mobile Phone Number or email address

Employers

Employers are required to login to the MRA e-services platform using their **Employer Registration Number (ERN)** and password and download the Excel file containing details of the Reliefs, Allowances, Deductions and Rates claimed by their employees in their respective e-EDF for the Income Year 2025/2026.

For the purpose of applying PAYE for the month August 2025, where an employee has not yet submitted his EDF for the income year 2025/2026, the employer shall take into account the Reliefs, Allowances and Deductions claimed by the employee in his EDF for the income year 2024/2025.

MRA requests all employers to inform their employees that they should submit their EDF **electronically** through the MRA Website.

The Scandal of the Phantom Informers

Cephalus: (Chortling bitterly) Would that it were so simple! No, this is money given by our guardians to those who provide information about drug traffickers. It's meant to be a tool for justice, a way to lure out the snakes from their holes. Now it seems we have to go after the snake charmers as well.

Socrates: A tool for justice, indeed! So, if I understand you, the state pays for secrets, and in doing so, it encourages citizens to act as informers. A noble, if somewhat... mercenary, purpose. But what is this scandal you speak of? Surely, the guardians are merely paying these informers the agreed-upon sum? They haven't been caught trying to make a deal with the local fishmonger for a cut of his profits, have they?

Cephalus: That is the very question, Socrates! The Crimes Commission has arrested some guardians who, it is suspected, have been taking this money for themselves, or who might have channelled the money for campaign expenses on the eve of the last elections in the Paradise Island. When asked who the informers were to whom they supposedly paid millions, they suddenly clam up, invoking some obscure law called the Official Secrets Act! They claim they cannot reveal the names to protect their sources.

L'affaire AFRINIC: Un Conflit de Pouvoirs et de Principes

'affaire AFRINIC, qui secoue actuellement Maurice, est bien plus qu'une simple querelle administrative. C'est un véritable bras de fer institutionnel qui met en lumière les tensions entre les pouvoirs exécutif et judiciaire, tout en soulevant des questions fondamentales sur la gouvernance, la souveraineté numérique et l'indépendance de la justice.

Au cœur du problème se trouve l'African Network Information Centre (AFRINIC), l'organisation responsable de la distribution des adresses IP sur tout le continent africain. Placé en redressement judiciaire depuis 2024, AFRINIC est paralysé. Un blocage qui a des conséquences majeures: depuis novembre 2024, aucune nouvelle adresse IP n'a pu être allouée en Afrique, entravant sérieusement le développement numérique de la région.

Le Gouvernement, sous l'impulsion du Premier ministre, Navin Ramgoolam, a réagi en ordonnant une enquête immédiate sur les affaires d'AFRINIC, en vertu de la "Companies Act". Pour mener cette mission, le Gouvernement a nommé un juge de la Cour suprême, Nicolas Ohsan-Bellepeau, comme inspecteur spécial, le libérant de ses fonctions judiciaires jusqu'à la fin de sa mission. Cette décision a été justifiée par le caractère "juridiquement discutable" des procédures ayant conduit au redressement judiciaire et par la nécessité de débloquer une "urgence technologique et diplomatique".

Cependant, cette nomination a immédiatement suscité des interrogations. Des critiques ont fusé, dénonçant un empiètement de l'exécutif sur les prérogatives du judiciaire. L'argument principal? La cheffe juge n'aurait pas été

consultée, et la désignation d'un juge en fonction pour une mission administrative contournerait les mécanismes de séparation des pouvoirs inscrits dans la Constitution. Cette ingérence perçue a suscité un malaise. Un autre juge de la Cour suprême, Azam Neerooa, a d'ailleurs émis une injonction provisoire pour bloquer la mission du juge Ohsan-Bellepeau, une décision qui illustre la gravité de la situation et le sérieux du conflit.

'entreprise Cloud Innovation Ltd, partie prenante dans les litiges judiciaires d'AFRINIC depuis 2021, a été la première à contester cette nomination. Elle a soutenu que le juge Ohsan-Bellepeau se trouvait en situation de conflit d'intérêts, car il avait déjà statué dans des affaires l'opposant à AFRINIC. Pour Cloud Innovation, confier cette enquête au juge équivalait à lui demander de réexaminer

des jugements rendus par ses pairs, et ainsi de remettre en cause la légalité de décisions de justice antérieures.

Face à la tempête médiatique et judiciaire, et pour préserver son intégrité et celle de l'institution judiciaire, le juge Ohsan-Bellepeau a finalement décidé de se retirer de son rôle d'inspecteur le 18 août 2025. Cette décision, annoncée par ses avocats, a rendu sa mission "caduque" et a permis de désamorcer, du moins temporairement, une crise qui

> menaçait d'ébranler les fondations de l'État de droit mauricien.

u-delà de cette péripétie, A'affaire AFRINIC soulève des questions cruciales pour l'avenir de Maurice en tant que iuridiction de confiance pour les organisations internationales, notamment dans le domaine technologique. Le fait que l'exécutif ait cru bon de recourir à une procédure aujourd'hui contesté pour résoudre un problème de gouvernance d'entreprise en dit long sur la perception de l'urgence et la confiance dans les mécanismes judiciaires existants. La réaction de

la justice, par le biais de l'injonction, a rappelé avec force l'importance de la séparation des pouvoirs et a souligné que même en cas d'urgence, la loi doit être respectée.

L'affaire AFRINIC est un cas d'étude fascinant sur les limites du pouvoir exécutif et la robustesse du système judiciaire. Elle met en lumière les faiblesses potentielles de la gouvernance mauricienne et la fragilité de la réputation du pays face aux défis de la souveraineté numérique. Emmanuel Macron: Le défi de la succession



Le défi de sa succession est de taille: comment transformer un mouvement d'individus en une institution politique pérenne? P - Radio France

n quelques années seulement, Emmanuel Macron est passé de l'anonymat à l'Élysée, bousculant les codes et les traditions de la politique française. Son ascension fulgurante, digne d'un roman, a marqué un tournant majeur dans l'histoire politique de la France. Son parcours, de l'ENA à la banque Rothschild & Cie, puis de conseiller à ministre de l'Économie sous François Hollande, a forgé sa réputation d'outsider brillant. En 2016, il a fondé «En Marche!», s'affranchissant des partis traditionnels pour dépasser le clivage droite-gauche. Sa victoire à l'élection présidentielle de 2017 fut un séisme politique, faisant de lui, à 39 ans, le plus jeune président de la Ve République. Son style de gouvernance, à

la fois moderne et solennel, a profondément marqué le paysage politique français. Son héritage reste à écrire, mais il a déjà ouvert la voie à une nouvelle génération de politiciens.

L'histoire d'«En Marche!», renommé plus tard La République en Marche (LREM) puis Renaissance, est inextricablement liée à celle de son fondateur. Sans l'aura d'Emmanuel Macron, le mouvement aurait-il connu un tel succès? Peu probable.

Son programme, son charisme et sa capacité à mobiliser la société civile ont été les moteurs de sa victoire. Le revers de la médaille, c'est que le parti a toujours eu du mal à exister en dehors de son chef. Ses figures de proue sont souvent perçues comme de simples porte-parole de la parole présidentielle, et le parti lui-même peine à développer une identité propre, une ligne politique distincte de celle de

ľÉlysée.

Alors que le second et dernier mandat d'Emmanuel Macron touche à sa fin, la question de la succession devient pressante. Qui pourra incarner l'héritage d'un tel leader? À l'échelle mondiale, de nombreux partis politiques ont été façonnés autour d'un leader emblématique, au risque de perdre leur âme et leur raison d'être une fois que celui-ci disparaît. En Inde, le parti du Congrès a longtemps été synonyme de la famille Gandhi. De Jawaharlal Nehru à Indira Gandhi, puis à Rajiv Gandhi et Sonia Gandhi et Rahul Gandhi présentement, la dynastie a incarné le parti au point que son avenir semblait incertain en l'absence d'un membre de la famille pour le diriger.

Parti Travailliste (PTr) et le Mouvement Militant Mauricien (MMM) ont connu des hauts et des bas en fonction de la popularité et de l'influence de leurs leaders respectifs. L'Independence Forward Bloc (IFB), par exemple, a connu son âge d'or sous la direction de Sookdeo Bissoondoyal, tout comme le Parti Mauricien Social Démocrate (PMSD) sous Gaëtan Duval. Une fois ces figures charismatiques parties, le défi de la continuité et de la pérennité s'est posé avec acuité.



La dépendance excessive à un leader unique pose un risque systémique. Sans un plan de succession solide, la

mort politique ou physique d'un chef de parti peut entraîner la dislocation de la formation et une perte de confiance de l'électorat. Les partis politiques ne devraient pas être des véhicules pour la célébrité d'un individu, mais des institutions basées sur des principes, des idées et une structure organisationnelle forte

'avenir du parti dépendra de sa capacité à transcender l'aura de son fondateur pour devenir une véritable institution, ancrée dans des principes solides et dotée d'un processus de succession clair. Vingt ans après le scandale MCB/NPF: une condamnation confirmée, une amende allégée

lus de deux décennies après l'un des plus grands scandales financiers de l'Histoire de Maurice, la justice a rendu son verdict définitif. Ce mercredi 20 août 2025, la Cour suprême a confirmé la condamnation de la Mauritius Commercial Bank (MCB) pour des manquements graves à la Financial Intelligence and Anti-Money Laundering Act (FIAMLA). Cependant, les juges Nicholas Ohsan Bellepeau et Jane Lau Yuk Poon ont décidé de réduire l'amende initialement infligée par la Cour intermédiaire, la faisant passer de Rs 1,8 million à Rs 1,2 million. Une décision qui, selon la Cour, prend en considération le temps écoulé depuis les faits.

L'affaire remonte à 2003, date à laquelle une fraude massive, estimée à environ Rs 880 millions, a été révélée. Les fonds détournés provenaient des comptes du National Pensions Fund (NPF) et du National Savings Fund (NSF), deux institutions vitales pour les retraités mauriciens. La découverte de cette escroquerie a provoqué une onde de choc dans le pays et a mis en lumière de graves défaillances au sein de l'institution bancaire.

L'enquête, menée par la Commission indépendante contre la corruption (ICAC), a révélé que la fraude aurait été orchestrée par un ancien employé de la MCB. Le principal bénéficiaire de ces transactions frauduleuses était un homme d'affaires mauricien basé à Londres.

La MCB a été poursuivie sous la FIAM-LA pour ne pas avoir mis en place les mesures nécessaires pour empêcher que ses services ne soient utilisés à des fins de blanchiment d'argent. Les juges de la Cour

intermédiaire, dont la décision a été confirmée en appel, avaient souligné l'existence de faiblesses structurelles au sein de la banque. Ils ont mis en évidence l'absence de contrôles effectifs, des audits internes déficients et une supervision lacunaire, qui ont permis à certains cadres de bénéficier de pouvoirs excessifs. Ces manquements ont créé un environnement propice au détournement de fonds et au blanchiment d'argent, ce qui justifiait la condamnation de la banque en tant qu'entité morale.

Le verdict de la Cour suprême vient clore une longue saga judiciaire. L'appel de la MCB, basé sur des arguments d'incertitude juridique et des délais jugés déraisonnables, a été rejeté par les juges, qui ont maintenu la culpabilité de la banque. Toutefois, la réduction de l'amende, de Rs 1,8 million à Rs 1,2 million, a été expliquée

par le temps considérable qui s'est écoulé depuis la découverte des faits. Un délai qui, selon la Cour, doit être pris en compte pour une peine plus juste.

u-delà de cette décision de justice, le scandale MCB/NPF a eu des conséquences profondes sur le système financier mauricien. Il a suscité un examen minutieux de la supervision bancaire et de la gouvernance d'entreprise, et a conduit à un renforcement des réglementations pour prévenir de futures fraudes. Il a également mis en lumière les défis liés à la coopération juridique internationale, l'extradition de Teeren Appasamy depuis le Royaume-Uni ayant échoué en raison de sa citoyenneté britannique.

En fin de compte, la confirmation de la culpabilité de la MCB, même avec une

amende réduite, envoie un signal fort. Elle rappelle aux institutions financières leurs obligations en matière de prévention du blanchiment d'argent et de protection des fonds de leurs clients. Pour le pays, cette affaire restera un douloureux rappel des failles du système, mais aussi un témoignage de la résilience de la justice face à des affaires complexes et de longue haleine

ans une affaire qui a soulevé de nombreuses questions sur la lenteur de la jus-tice, la Cour suprême a rendu un verdict qui suscite un débat sur l'adéquation de la peine par rapport au temps écoulé. En effet, la décision de réduire l'amende en raison du délai depuis les faits, tout en reconnaissant le principe que la justice doit prendre en compte ce facteur, soulève une problématique épineuse. Certains pourraient y voir un signal d'alarme, car elle pourrait être interprétée comme un message que les crimes financiers d'envergure perdent de leur gravité avec le temps, affaiblissant ainsi l'effet dissuasif de la loi.

Le cas a également mis en lumière un autre aspect crucial : la responsabilité des entreprises en tant qu'entités morales. La reconnaissance de la culpabilité de la MCB en tant qu'organisation, et non pas seulement des individus impliqués dans la fraude, a mis en évidence l'importance des systèmes de gouvernance et des audits internes. Cette décision symbolise que l'échec de ces mécanismes peut entraîner des conséquences judiciaires pour l'institution elle-même, renforçant le besoin de vigilance et de transparence pour prévenir les crimes financiers.

US-India relations in a "very bad place"

Former Trump National Security Adviser John Bolton has described the current US policy toward India as "very confused", stating that the relationship is in "a very bad place" for the time being. In an interview with HT, Bolton expressed concern that Washington has singled out India with a 25% penalty on its purchases of Russian energy, while major buyers like China face no sanctions. He believes this punitive action risks driving India closer to Russia and China, which he sees as a growing threat to global stability. Bolton acknowledges that he wishes India would not buy Russian oil, but places the fault for the current situation with the US, stating that India's actions are not prohibited by current sanctions.

Bolton attributes the strained relationship to what he calls the "aberrational" nature of the Trump presidency, noting that Trump's actions on tariffs have undermined decades of work to build trust and good faith with India and many other nations. He argues that since Trump lacks a clear philosophy and leaves no legacy for his successors, the primary objective for the US and India should be to limit the damage to the bilateral relationship during his remaining term.

Bolton also pointed out the perceived confusion in Trump's policy toward China. He stated that China, a "worse actor" in international economics,



has been given too much leeway and has not faced secondary sanctions for purchasing Russian energy. He believes that had the US wanted a trade war, it should have teamed up with other nations to confront China, which he views as a more serious economic threat.

Looking ahead, Bolton expressed cautious optimism. He suggested that continued conversations between non-governmental individuals from both countries are crucial to show that the strained relations at the government level do not reflect the entire sentiment. He also proposed that Indian Prime Minister Modi should seek a one-on-one meeting with Trump to clear the air. Bolton highlighted the importance of their previously good personal relationship, which is central to Trump's view of state-to-state relations, and believes that this personal asset could be the key to a quick recovery of the relationship after the current administration.

India, Russia agree to boost trade ties after foreign ministers meet in Moscow

India and Russia agreed to boost trade ties on Thursday as their foreign ministers met in Moscow, giving little indication that US President Donald Trump's hefty tariffs on India for buying Russian oil would disrupt their relations.

Indian goods face additional US tariffs of up to 50%, among the highest imposed by Washington, due to New Delhi's increased purchases of Russian oil.

Western countries boycotting Russian crude say India's purchases are helping to fund Moscow's war in Ukraine. But New Delhi says its purchases are purely commercial transactions, and accuses the US and European Union of double standards, noting that they continue significant trade with Moscow themselves, reports Reuters.

"We have good results in cooperation in the hydrocarbon sector, in the supply of Russian oil to the Indian market. And we have a mutual interest in implementing joint projects for the extraction of energy resources, including in the Russian Federation - in the Far East and on the Arctic shelf," Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said at a



joint news conference with Indian Foreign Minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar.

Jaishankar said that relations between the two countries had been among the steadiest of major nations in the world since World War Two, referring to a close friendship going back to the days of the Soviet Union.

The two countries reaffirmed their ambition to expand bilateral trade, including by increasing India's exports to Russia, Jaishankar said, according to a statement from India's foreign ministry.

"This requires swiftly addressing non-tariff barriers and regulatory impediments," Jais-hankar said. "Enhancing Indian exports to Russia in sectors like pharma-

ceuticals, agriculture and textiles will certainly help to correct the current imbalance."

Russia was able to divert its exports of oil, a significant source of state revenue, away from Europe and mainly to China and India after the West imposed sanctions on Moscow over its conflict in Ukraine. India and China are the biggest buyers of Russia's oil.

Russian embassy officials in New Delhi said on Wednesday that Russia expected to continue supplying oil to India despite pressure from the United States, adding that Moscow hoped trilateral talks with India and China would soon take place.

Israel opens Gaza offensive

Israel said it had opened its offensive aimed at taking control of Gaza City, even as efforts to secure a 60-day truce in the conflict intensified. Prior ceasefire negotiations have failed at latter stages, but mediators Egypt and Qatar have pressed on with talks aimed at getting Israel to agree to a deal already accepted by Hamas: Israel has said it will respond by Friday, though prominent ministers have opposed the deal. And despite discussions ostensibly persisting, Israel's forces have begun expanding their operations in Gaza, a push that the UN and aid NGOs say risks worsening an ongoing humanitarian calamity. Separately, Israeli authorities this week approved a settlement project that would, in effect, cleave the West Bank in two.



A new moon for Uranus

Nasa's James Webb Space Telescope spotted a new member of Uranus' "lunar gang." The discovery — just six miles (10 kilometers) wide — brings the total number of moons orbiting the blue planet to 29, though experts have said other similar bite-sized satellites may abound. "There's probably a lot more of them and we just need to keep looking," a planetary scientist involved in the find told the Associated Press. Scientists hope the moon may provide insights into Uranus, which remains one of the most mysterious planets in our solar system, NBC reported.

Ukraine peace plans proliferate

Vorld leaders and officials made myriad proposals and demands as part of efforts to end the Ukraine war, but there was little agreement on a path forward. Italy's prime minister won some European support for a plan to offer Kyiv a NATO-like security guarantee without Ukraine actually joining the alliance. The White House has so far been reluctant to make explicit promises, with Politico reporting that a top US official told transatlantic military leaders that Washington would play a minimal role in any European plan. Moscow and Kyiv have demands, too: The Kremlin — whose forces invaded Ukraine — wants a veto over any security guarantee, while Kyiv says it will only attend talks with Russia when that guarantee is agreed.

China's growing South America clout

Peru's gold exports to China in the first half of the year have surpassed those for all of 2024, highlighting Beijing's rising clout in South America. China has vied to increase ties across the region in recent years, announcing a bevy of trade and investment deals. In a sign of Beijing's ambitions, it recently unveiled plans to connect Brazil to Peru — where Chinese firms recently built a \$1.4 billion port — via a rail line that would cut transport times by 12 days. Experts warn Washington's regional influence may be slipping fast: If the US hopes to remain a credible partner, it must "match the scope and staying power of China's vision," one wrote for Americas Quarterly.

China's Xi Jinping urges 'ethnic unity' in rare visit to Tibet; gets roaring welcome



Chinese President Xi Jinping on Wednesday made a rare visit to Tibet. Xi's visit comes ahead of possible tensions over the succession of the 90-year-old Dalai Lama, who lives in India, where he established a Tibetan government in exile.

The long-standing China-Tibet dispute revolves around complex geopolitical issue concerning the status and governance of region.

Many Tibetans and international observers argue that Tibet was historically an independent nation, while China maintains that it has been an integral part of its territory for centuries.

In 1913, the 13th Dalai Lama declared

Tibet's de facto independence after the fall of the Qing Dynasty. The People's Republic of China (PRC), established in 1949, asserts sovereignty over Tibet based on historical claims and the principle of territorial integrity.

The vast high-altitude area on the country's western edge was established as an autonomous region in 1965 -- six years after the 14th Dalai Lama fled into exile.

What Xi said in Tibet

Xi Jinping, visiting Tibet for the first time since 2021, called for safeguarding political and social stability to safeguard the region.

"To govern, stabilise and develop Tibet, we must first safeguard political stability,

social stability, ethnic unity and religious harmony," AFP news agency quoted Xi telling a group of the region's officials on Wednesday, according to a broadcaster.

Visuals showed scores of people leaving red flags and cheering as a bus carrying Xi Jinping passed.

A massive portrait of Xi Jinping flanked a crowd numbering 20,000, according to CCTV, which included military personnel, school children and other members of Tibetan society, many in traditional Tibetan dress, AFP reported.

A parade also followed, showcasing Tibetan dancers, floats carrying official slogans, and formations of troops.

The visit by Xi comes weeks after the Dalai Lama said the spiritual institution would continue after his death, with a successor decided "exclusively" by his office

China has insisted that the next Dalai Lama must be approved by the government in Beijing.

Xi called Wednesday made no mention of the Dalai Lama in CCTV's coverage, however, he called for "guiding Tibetan Buddhism to adapt to socialist society in accordance with the systematic Sinicisation of religion".



Mexico denies US drug partnership

rexican President Claudia Sheinbaum has denied that her country agreed to a drug partnership announced by the US to fight cartels, heightening tensions between the two neighbors. US President Donald Trump has threatened steep tariffs if Mexico fails to stop drug flows, and his Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) said this week it would collaborate with Mexican law enforcement to combat cartels. However, Sheinbaum said her government had no idea what the DEA was referring to. Sheinbaum has veered from her predecessor's laissez-faire approach to crime, yet cartels are still thriving, while unchecked cocaine production in Colombia has fueled their takings, allowing them to further bolster their firepower. "It's really hard to be optimistic," an expert told the Financial Times.



Denmark's new tax on book sales to reverse declines in reading

All books sold in the country currently face a 25% tax, the highest in the world and an outlier even compared to its Nordic peers, which Denmark's culture minister said was contributing to a "reading crisis that has unfortunately been spreading." Along with the removal of VAT, Copenhagen also plans to spend more on public libraries and school book collections, "so that more children can be introduced to good literature," the minister said. Yet while a similar move by Sweden in 2001 resulted in an increase in book sales, The Guardian reported, most of those were by existing readers simply buying more books.

ECB head calls for non-US trade ties

Europe should strive to deepen trade ties with non-US partners, the head of the European Central Bank said Wednesday, as the bloc's economy begins to feel the heat from Washington's tariffs. ECB chief Christine Lagarde said that a recently outlined trade deal between

the US and European Union had "alleviated, but... not eliminated global uncertainty": EU exports to the US in June hit their lowest level since the end of 2023. The bloc is one of a number of economies reshaping its trading relationships in the face of US tariffs. China has ramped up exports to Southeast Asia and other developing nations, while Japan is mulling entering trade talks with Latin America's biggest economic alliance.

Americans fear Al-fuelled job loss

Asignificant majority of Americans fear artificial intelligence will cause widespread and permanent job losses, a new Reuters poll showed. Already, Al tools that can rapidly generate thousands of lines of code have impacted career prospects: The unemployment rate among new computer science graduates in the US is between 6.1% and 7.5%, more than double that of biology or art history majors. Students who would have been "fighting off offers from top firms" are now struggling, an academic told The New York Times, while one graduate said "the only company that has called me for an interview is Chipotle." Still, some experts argue against such doomsday scenarios and forecasts of job disruption vary.

Al won't doom handwriting skills

The ubiquity of technology in the classroom has sparked concerns that students' handwriting skills are disappearing — but putting pen to paper isn't at risk of becoming obsolete, analysts said. Experts broadly agree that simply learning how to write has cognitive benefits, and some US states have passed laws requiring students still learn cursive so the practice endures. But handwriting isn't doomed, ironically because of technology, Wired argued: As more people use artificial intelligence to cheat

their way through school, teachers are reverting to handwritten exams, requiring students to show their work and thought processes. "Handwriting won't die so much as... provide proof of life."



Floods devastate South Asia

Almost 400 people have died in Pakistan after flash floods brought destruction throughout the country's north. The heavier-than-usual monsoon season has also battered Mumbai, leaving swaths of the Indian megalopolis under water. Huge rainfall has wreaked havoc across much of the Northern Hemisphere this summer, including floods in central Texas that led to one of the state's worst natural disasters, as well as record downpours in Mexico City. Experts fear that global warming — which leads to increased evaporation and thus more frequent and intense downpours — will make once-extraordinary climatic events more common. The Pakistan floods, in particular, highlight "why a rapid transition from fossil fuels... is so urgent," an expert told the Associated Press.

Why Independence?

t has never been secret that the Mauritius Labour Party stands for an independent Mauritius within the Commonwealth. Since the general election of 1953 the people has been made aware of the fact that gradually and inevitably Mauritius will have to be ruled by Mauritians. It can be said without fear of contradiction that the election of 1953 was fought on the issue of Responsible Government coupled with universal adult suffrage. In its 1959 electoral manifesto the Mauritius Labour Party again made it clear that it was going to fight the elections on the issue of the ultimate

independence of Mauritius. The opponents of the Labour Party have therefore to agree that the people of Mauritius have expressed its opinion on this matter. There can't be any attempt at putting the clock back now.

Mr Bissoondoyal's implied allegations that the elections were rigged are worth the newsprint on which they are printed. And Mr Koenig's fears of the interests of minorities have proved to be completely imaginary. Such arguments might be useful at Plaine Verte, but it will be difficult to use them at a constitutional conference in London. Mr Macleod is no kid. It therefore follows that independence is going to be a natural sequence in our constitutional evolution.

But just now the Parti Mauricien and the IFB are bandying about all sorts of arguments which tend to confuse the issue. The main theme of their anti-independence campaign is that if Mauritius becomes independent it will no more be entitled to any help from the British Government. This is an argument which constitutes fraud on the public. Besides, one has the impression that the multi-headed opposition has come to a stage when its war-cry has become obsolescent. The days of "bateaux langoutis" are over and the era of "hégémonie hindoue" died together with NMU. What can the opposition offer now? An old battery how much it is charged, has no other place except the garbage: therefore, another bogey has been found, and it is the imaginary dangers of independence. The Labour Party must consequently keep on an incessant campaign if only to nullify the nefarious obscurantist campaign of the Opposition.

If we only take a look at what is happening elsewhere! Just see the amount of money which is being poured into the emerging independent countries. Cyprus is an opposite example: it became free at the cost of thousands of lives and millions of £ to the British people so much so that it tended to become the British Algeria! But on the next day of the proclamation of its independence the British Government announced the grant of a generous loan to Cyprus. The development projects in many newly-independent countries are still being helped by the British people. On the contrary it seems that when you are an independent country you have greater chances of obtaining help and not only from Britain.

Another bogey is being raised simultaneously: communism. From what has been published in other sections it is inferred that communism is finding its way in Mauritius and there is a carefully veiled attempt at sug-



gesting that the Labour Party is likely to go communist. We do not think communism has any chance in Mauritius. Nor do we think that Mauritius Labour Party has anything to do with communism. A political party which draws its inspiration from the British Labour Party cannot without openly contradicting itself have any communist affiliations. And everybody knows also that the British Trade Union Congress is certainly against communism.

Thatever be the theories of Mr Koenig or the special predilections of Mr Bissoondoyal, it is important that we know why we should fight for our independence. In other countries this would have sounded a rather stupid question. But believe it or not there are people who think that we should not be free! It takes all sorts of people to make this world, and democracy wants that every opinion be given a chance. When slavery becomes a habit and when it is taken as a normal condition of living it becomes more difficult to break its chains.

We cannot govern any more by Whitehall. It is time we started fending ourselves and as a country we have proved that we are up to the mark. If the Opposition thinks that it can do better, it should have the patience to wait for its turn. The fight for independence is not a fight against the Labour Party, but it is a fight against a system of government which is obsolete. If Mr Koenig or Mr Bissoondoyal is so sure that the whole population is behind them, one of them must start preparing his speech as the first future Prime Minister of Mauritius but let not anyone has the impudence to say that we do not want independence.

Supply of Fertilizers to Sugar Cane Planters for Crop 2026

- © Government has decided to renew the Fertilizer Scheme for Crop 2026 for all planters cultivating less than 100 ha.
- In this context, all planters cultivating less than 100 ha of sugar cane are eligible to a supply of 250 kg of fertilizer type 17-8-25 per arpent as an advance for the upkeep of their ratoon crop (repousse) including ammonium nitrate (AN) b based formulations. As from this year, planters are hereby strongly advised to opt for voucher for the supply of ammonium nitrate (AN) fertilizer formulations which are not subject to losses due to volatilisation in non-irrigated ratoons. Furthermore, for planters opting for AN fertilizer formulations, the number of fertilizer bags will be calculated on the actual cane tonnage supplied to mill and on a factor of 1.3 kg N per tonne cane.
- Planters will have to sign an agreement authorizing the Mauritius Sugar Syndicate to deduct 50 per cent of the cost of fertilizers from their sugar proceeds in 2026.
- Eligible planters are invited to apply for this Scheme at the Farmers Service Centre of their region as from 1st September 2025, producing the following documents (Original + 1 copy):
 - (i) National Identity Card
 - (ii) SIFB Registration Card 2025
 - (iii) Weighbridge receipts weight of cane milled in 2025. Only the area harvested in 2025 will be considered.
- The fertilizers will be supplied mainly through sales points of official importers and distributors of fertilizers as was the case last year.
- Planters having already harvested their fields for Harvest 2025 on or before 1st September 2025 can also benefit from the Scheme by applying for a refund for a maximum amount of Rs 9,960/Arpent. Eligible planters should produce evidence of purchase of fertilizers (Invoice from Supplier), in addition to the above-mentioned documents.
- Planters who have not yet paid the 50% of the cost of fertilizers for previous years will be required to settle same in order to benefit from this Scheme.

Income Support to persons attaining 60 years as from 01 September 2025

The Government of the Republic of Mauritius has decided to provide a monthly Income Support of Rs 10,000 including an end-of-year bonus for the month of December to persons reaching the age of 60 years as from 1 September 2025, and who would become ineligible for the Basic Retirement Pension (BRP) following the gradual transition of the eligible age to 65 years.

The Mauritius Revenue Authority (MRA) has been entrusted with the responsibility to put in place a system to provide for the income support to eligible persons.

The MRA informs eligible persons that the facility to apply for the income support is available on MRA website www.mra.mu.

Eligible persons reaching the age of 60 years between 1 September 2025 and up to 31 August 2026 are now requested to submit their application using that facility. In due course, the facility will be made available to persons reaching the age of 60 after 31 August 2026.

Eligible persons are required to use their National Identification Card (NID) Number or Non-Citizen Identity Card (NCID) Number to access the system and apply for the Income Support. The MRA will, after processing the applications, effect the monthly payments of the Income Support to eligible applicants, by crediting the bank accounts provided in the application.

Eligible Persons

A person is eligible to the Income Support from the month in which he/she reaches years of age 60 up to the month preceding that in which he/she becomes eligible to the Basic Retirement Pension, provided that he/she -

- i. reaches the age of 60 years on or after 1 September 2025;
- ii. is not eligible to Basic Retirement Pension, Widow's Basic Pension or Invalid's Basic Pension;
- iii. derives a net income not exceeding 10,000 rupees in that month, where he/she is single, or in the case of a couple, derives an aggregate net income not exceeding 20,000 rupees.

Net income of a person or aggregate net income of a couple excludes exempt income for Income Tax purposes, Basic Retirement or Invalid's Basic Pension or Income Support of the spouse, Disability Allowance, Social Benefits, Lump Sum, Retirement Allowance and Severance Allowance.

Eligible person refers to a Mauritian citizen who has resided in Mauritius for at least 12 years in aggregate since his/her eighteenth birthday or to a non-Mauritian citizen who has resided in Mauritius for more than 15 years since his/her fortieth birthday, including three years immediately preceding the month for which the Income Support is applied for.

Where there is a change in the net income of an eligible person or the aggregate net income of the couple and he/she becomes no longer eligible for the income support, he/she shall notify the Director-General of such change within a period of 14 days by amending his/her application using the facility available on MRA website.

Doctors say we've been misled about weight and health

Agrowing chorus of medical experts is challenging the pervasive notion that weight loss is the ultimate indicator of health. Writing in The BMJ, Dr. Juan Franco and colleagues argue that the long-standing obsession with Body Mass Index (BMI) and strict dieting may do more harm than good, asserting that a healthy lifestyle offers profound benefits regardless of the number on the scale.

For decades, the primary recommendation for indivi-duals with obesity has been lifestyle interventions focusing on calorie restriction and increased physical activity to reduce weight. However, rigorous evidence now suggests that these interventions are largely ineffective at achieving sustained, long-term weight loss. More importantly, they often fail to significantly reduce the risk of serious cardiovascular events or mortality directly linked to weight loss itself.

The harmful pursuit of weight loss

The experts highlight that the relentless focus on weight loss can carry significant harms that are often overlooked. This includes the reinforcement of societal weight stigma, which can lead to negative attitudes and judgments against individuals based on their size. Such bias not only contributes to adverse mental health outcomes but can also trigger disordered eating patterns, foster the adoption of other unhealthy habits, and, ironically, even lead to weight gain in the long run.

The authors stress that while a healthy lifestyle encompassing nutritious eating and regular physical activity — undoubtedly offers important benefits, weight alone does not provide an adequate picture of someone's overall health. Recognizing the limitations of weightcentric interventions could pave the way for more effective and patient-centered care.

A shift towards compassionate, personalized care

Encouragingly, recent clinical guidelines are beginning to reflect this growing understanding that weight is an insufficient measure of health. Alternative approaches, such as Health at Every Size (HAES), are gaining traction. These models acknowledge that good health can be achieved irrespective of weight loss and have shown promising results in improving eating behaviors and overall well-being.

While these alternative approaches require further large-scale clinical trials, doctors are encouraged to learn from them to provide more compassionate and effective care for patients in larger bodies. "Doctors should be prepared to inform individuals seeking weight loss about the potential benefits and harms of interventions and minimize the risk of developing eating disorders and long term impacts on metabolism," the experts write.

Ultimately, the goal is to offer high-quality, evidencebased care that aligns with individual preferences and needs, prioritizing overall well-being rather than just chasing a number on the scale. The advice to eat healthily and be physically active remains critical for better health, but it should be delivered with a focus on comprehensive well-being, discussions about benefits and harms, and what truly matters to the patient regardless of their weight.



Do people dream in color or black and white?

Researchers have found dreams are most likely to occur during the stage of sleep known as rapid eye movement, or REM.

reams are an astonishing state of consciousness. As you sleep, your mind creates fantastic and bizarre stories, rich with visual details - all without any conscious input from vou.

Some dreams are boring. Others show you shocking events or magnificent images. I frequently dream of alligators walking upright, wearing sunglasses and yellow T-shirts. Often the alligators are friendly and go on adventures with me, but sometimes they're aggressive and chase

The way the brain operates while you're dreaming explains why dreams can be so fantastic. A small structure called the amygdala is largely responsible for processing emotional information, and it's very active while dreaming. In contrast, the brain's frontal cortex, which helps you plan and strategize, tends to be rather quiet. This pattern explains why dreams can jump from one peculiar scene to the next, with no clear story line. It's as if you are sailing an emotional wave, without a captain.

Dreams can indeed be emotional and sometimes scary. But dreams can be enjoyable too - maybe you've had a dream so delightful you were disappointed to wake up and realize it wasn't reality.

Are the images in your dreams in vivid color? Perhaps you had a dream about playing Candy Crush and can remember the brightly colored red, purple and yellow candies cascading in your dream.

As a neuroscientist who studies sleep. I can tell you that about 70% to 80% of people report dreaming in color, as opposed to just in shades of black and white. But this estimate may be low, because scientists can't actually see what a dreamer sees. There's no sophisticated



technology showing them exactly what's happening in a dreamer's mind. Instead, they have to rely on what dreamers remember about their dreams.

Studying sleep in the laboratory

To study dreams, researchers ask people to sleep in laboratories, and they simply wake them while they're dreaming and then ask them what they were just thinking about. It's pretty rudimentary science, but it works.

How do scientists know when people are dreaming? Although dreams can occur in any sleep stage, research has long shown that dreams are most likely to occur during rapid eye movement sleep, or REM

Scientists can identify REM by the electrical activity on your scalp and your eye movements. They do this by using an electroencephalogram, which uses several small electrodes placed directly on the scalp to measure brain activity. During REM. the dreamer's eves move back and forth repeatedly. This likely means they're scanning - that is, looking around in their

That's when dream researchers wake up their participants. Dreams are really

tricky to study because they evaporate so quickly. So instead of asking participants to remember a dream - even one they were having a moment ago – we ask them what they were just "thinking." Dreamers don't have time to think or reflect, they just respond - before the dream is lost.

Dreams are full-sensory experiences

There seem to be age differences in color dreaming. Older people report far less color in their dreams than younger people. The prevailing explanation for this is based on the media they experienced while young. If the photographs, movies and television you saw as a child were all in black and white, then you are more likely to report more black-and-white dreams than color dreams.

This phenomenon raises some interesting questions. Are people really dreaming in black and white or just remembering their dreams that way after the fact? Was it as common for people to say they dreamed in black and white before these visual media were invented? There wasn't any focused research that relied on in-themoment dream reports back before blackand-white photos and movies existed, so we will never know.

Although visual features dominate, you can also hear, smell, taste and feel things in your dreams. So if you dream about visiting Disneyland, you might hear the music from the parade or smell french fries from a food stand.

You may have also wondered whether blind people dream. They do. If a person becomes blind after age 5 or 6, their dreams will contain visual images. However, someone who is congenitally blind, or becomes blind before about age 5. will not have visual images in their dreams. Instead, their dreams contain more information from the other senses.

Remembering your dreams

Some people may say they don't dream at all. They do, but many people don't remember their dreams. The vast majority of dreams are forgotten. That's because when we're in REM sleep, the hippocampus, the area of the brain responsible for long-term memory, is largely turned off.

Others may remember a dream immediately upon awakening but quickly forget it. That's because the hippocampus is a bit sluggish and takes some time to wake up, so you're not able to create a long-term memory right after waking.

Perhaps the biggest question about dreams is whether they mean anything. People have been discussing this since ancient times. Sigmund Freud, the founder of psychoanalysis, called dreams the "royal road to the unconscious." He believed they had a profound meaning that's hidden from the dreamer.

But today, scientists agree that dreams do not have any hidden meaning. So while it's entertaining to think about what your dreams mean, there's no scientific basis, for example, to think that a dream about your teeth falling out automatically means vou're anxious about a loss.

If you would like to remember your dreams better, simply keep a notepad and pen by your bed and practice writing down vour dreams right when you wake. This is the best way to remember the fantastical stories your brain creates for you every


Amitabh Bachchan set to be the narrator in Ramayana apart from playing Jatayu?







The Unseen Shackles

ometimes you just happen to come across fellow countrywomen who, in a few words, remind you that a certain way of thinking about gender roles doesn't belong to a recent past, but is still alive and kicking.

As I pulled up in front of a friend's house, a woman was walking down the road and, smilingly, said: "I admire you for driving your 4X4. You are very lucky."

"It is a Japanese brand 2X4 actually, it is very comfortable, and you feel safe in it," I answered. "And there is nothing admirable about it nowadays. You can do it if you want to," I added.

"Actually, I do have a driving licence," she said, pointing to her bag, "but my husband and my son do not want me to drive the family car."

"Oh my! Why do you allow them to prevent you from driving?" I asked, "this is not acceptable."

"You know how it is in our society. 'You can't do this; you can't do that." she observed.

She complained about the long distance she has to walk from the coastal road where she works in one of the bungalows. She has to walk from the bus stop on the main road and take the uphill road called 'Colline Road' at Pointe-aux-Canon-niers and trot on to her workplace. It is around a 250-metre walk, and it is quite a feat under the scorching sun! Now, if you are not the athletic type of person and wearing a 'churidar', it does make things a bit complicated.

Her work also adds to the family earnings undoubtedly. "Maybe if you try talking to them about it and insist a bit more, they will listen to you," I advised, knowing fully well that things do not work that way when one party refuses to review their attitude, let alone question it.

She showed me the mobile phone in her hand. "My son just called, asking me to get home quickly because there's a problem with the dog, as if I could get home quicker than the bus takes. It is always like that: every time they can't handle something, they call me and get impatient and nervous."

"You should probably let them sort things out on their own. Otherwise, they'll take you for granted and keep depending on you. You won't be getting out of it anytime soon," I said, encouraging her to assert herself.

rent male protection, it is just fine. Indeed, there are advantages attached to women's material needs being taken care of. However, it strikes a discordant note when the uninvited offer of male patronage is seen as treating women as children and irresponsible adults.

Noëline is a 92-year-old woman living with her son in a small, rented house nearby. Every time we chat with her in front of her gate by the roadside, it is quite a relish listening to her life story at Marie Reine de la Paix. Now and then she would cast a worried glance to her left, watching to see if her son, in his late forties, wasn't heading home.

Once, we witnessed her son shouting from thirty metres away, "What are you still doing outside here? Did I not tell you to stay at home?"

What a way of addressing one's mother, we thought. Needless to mention that her pension flows into the rent and monthly expenses. Apparently, he sets overly precautionary rules for fear of something that might happen to her. The secondary road is a peaceful place and inhabited with caring people who keep an eye on neighbours' safety.


